ABOUT CIVIL RIGHTS-While the Senatorial windbags are going full blast in Washington with one of their pet election year projects Congressman O. C. Fisher has this comment on the subject. He states:

"While the Senate argued over the iussue of Civil Rights or Civil Wrongs, the House coasted along with annual appropriation bills last week, and maneuvered for a test on the civil rights issue in early March.

"The House debate will begin on March 10, and a bill is certain of passage, though probably milder than the Senate version It all boils down to the big battle for the Negro vote in 1960. While all sorts of pretentions are advanced, every one knows what the real objective is. In calmer, more objective moments most polititians will admit that special laws are not needed for any minority group, racial, religious or otherwise, But not so on election years.

THE GREAT BANK ROBBERY-Newsweek says, under the title "The Great Bank Robbery": "For Americans wondering why the U. S. soil-bank program has not been more successful in holding down the staggering farm surpluses, U. S. Comptroller General Joseph Campbell had an answer Of all the 23 million acres that have gone into the soil bank, nearly one-quarter (or 5.4 million acres) of the 'idle' land has not been producing crops anyway . . Campbell said owners of fallow acreage have been paid \$54 million a year for five years. Thus the government, now moving to halt the abuses, spent a total of \$270 million to reduce crops that never existed."

GOVERNMENT FUNCTION-We live in an era in which, apparently, vast numbers of people regard the government as the proper source of almost every kind of handout, grant, and so-called "benefits.

So something that Henry Hazlitt has to say in Newsweek about government is important. In his words: "Its true function is to maintain peace, order, and justice; to protect life and property; to refrain from burdensome and inequitable taxation; to remove the punitive laws and deterrents that previous governments have imposed. Its function is to permit and preserve a sound currency. When it fails to do this, it must bear sole responsibility for the failure."

Once government breaks its historic bonds and goes beyond these functions, the result is always the same: Oppressive taxation, a degraded currency, diminished incentive, and a steady whittling away of the freedoms of all citizens.

It was 161 years ago, on March 2, 1799, that Congress passed the first Federal weights and measures law in the U.S. It was pointed out then that "weights and measures may be ranked among the necessaries of life to every individual of human society. They enter into the economic arrangements and daly concerns of every family

Texas businessmen, it has been pointed out, have even greater financial stakes than family consumer units in making sure that their scales and measuring devices are completely accurate. Where large volume business is transacted, it is possible to give away thousands and tens of thousands of dollars worth of goods by means of scales that are inaccurate on the side of the purchaser.

It is also emphasized that it is almost impossible to name anything the American consumer wears, uses or eats that has not been weighed or measured once or many times in its production and dsitribution.
