



ECONOMICS IN THE HIGH SCHOOL-The National Association of Secondary-School Principals recently held its annual convention in Portland, Oregon. One of the speakers was Keith Funston, president of the New York Stock Exchange. He proposed a program to deal, at the high school level, with what he termed economic illiteracy.

Thus far, he said, economics has been an orphan in the curriculum. If it is to be taught properly, qualified teachers must be assigned to the job. Teaching techniques need to be improved-in which connection Mr. Funston cited the example of a high school economics class that invested in the shares of a leading corporation to the extent of 50 cents a student, and then learned how taxes and tariffs, competition and even fiscal policy affected "their" company. And economics, in his view, should be made compulsory for all students, perhaps by including it as an essential element in a two or three year history course.

Mr. Funston declared that teachers must not be afraid to make economics controversial. He did not mean that teaching should be slanted, but, as he put the case, "it is surely a greater disservice to make believe that diverse points of view do not exist, or that economics is not one of the great, legitimate, continuing debates of a free society."

This proposed program has merit. It would fill an increasing need. Today some 12.5 million Americans own stocks in corporations and their number swells each year. A high proportion of today's students will be investors of tomorrow. Their knowledge of economics will determine, to an important extent, the success of their financial futures.
