Water Storage Tank Going Up

Construction of the new 500,000 gallon water storage tank is progressing on schedule.

The second rim of steel wall was being completed Wednesday morning. There are two more rim sections to be added to those already in place. Each section is eight feet high. The four sections will make the tank 32 feet high when completed. It is 52 feet in diameter and when filled to the roof will hold 510,000 gallons.

The land mark is beginning to show up with a bright orange undercoat of paint. The new tank is located on the mountain just outside the East city limits.

When completed the tank will be painted aluminum color with the lettering: "Goldthwaite Water Department" on it and flood lights will be installed on it. It will be visible for a long distance since it will be the highest point in Mills County.

Ben Barnes Is Nominated For State Representative

More than 2,200 Mills County voters went to the polls Saturday in the first Democratic Primary election of 1960 and put Glynn R. Petty and C. F. Stubblefield in the run-off for the office of Sheriff-Tax Assessor and Collector.

They also nominated Ben F. Barnes of Comanche County for State Representative and Guy Rudd, commissioner of precinct one and W. R. Lindsey over incumbent W. T. Lee as commissioner of precinct three.

In the three-way sheriff's race, incumbent Stubblefield received 1,089 votes and his opponents Petty 781 and Dale E. Reid 375.

Ben Barnes was favored in Mills County by nearly three-to-one vote over his opponent I. N. Hickman of Brown County for the office of state representative for Mills, Brown and Comanche Counties. Barnes got 1,513 votes and Hickman 538.

Guy Rudd was successful in his bid for nomination for county commissioner, precinct one, and polled 622 votes. His opponents Burthel Roberts got 318 and C. N. Scrivner 170. For commissioner of precinct three W. R. Lindsey received 330 votes to unseat incumbent W. T. Lee who received 313 votes.

In the governor's race Mills County gave Jack Cox 1181 votes and Price Daniel 942.

Ben Ramsey received 1306 votes for Lieutenant Governor and Don Yarborough 721.

In the attorney general's race Will Wilson received 951, Robert Everett Looney 112 and Waggoner Carr 768.

Robert W. Calvert received 1069 votes for Chief Justice of Supreme Court and his opponent Robert G. Hughes 831.

Election Called May 31, To Vote In Fresh Water Supply District

County Commissioners' Court granted a petition for an election to be held on May 31, at the City Polls will be open from 7 p. m. to 7 p. m.

The proposed water supply district will be called Mills Fresh Water Supply District No. 1.

A public hearing Monday when the petition for formation of the fresh water supply district was presented to the court.

The petition which required signatures was signed by persons who are residing in property owning tax-district in the proposed district. Purpose for which the proposed district is requested was explained to the court and proposed boundaries outlined. The district is part of a long range overall program for providing adequate water supply for domestic and commercial use for the City of Goldthwaite.

Boundaries of the proposed district will follow closely to the city limits with few exceptions where it will include limited area outside the city limits. Reason for this is to establish the boundaries as nearly as possible to the city limits line and yet follow established survey lines to eliminate expensive new surveys. Also the area included has a possibility of benefiting from the district, engineers pointed out.

One protest was heard by the

Court. The protest was on the basis of party living outside the city limits and having own water supply it was felt that there would be little or no benefit to be expected from the proposed district. He told the Court however that if the boundaries had been approved and agreed on he would go along with the majority thinking on the subject.

For the benefit of all interested parties a plat or map has been filed with the county clerk showing boundaries of the proposed district. Also the map shows boundaries of the city limits with relation to the district and shows property owners that would be included in the district outside the city limits.

All qualified voters will have an opportunity to vote for or against the proposed district. In order to vote in this election one must be qualified by having poll tax or exemption and must be a resident property owning tax payer in the proposed district.

In addition to voting on establishing the district voters will also elect five supervisors and a tax assessor-collector.

Those presented by the petition and who will be listed on the ballot as supervisors are: O. O. Smith, Farest E. Frazier, Hollis Blackwell, Lewis T. Hudson and Jack O. Reid. M. Y. Stokes, Jr., for tax assessor-collector. The supervisors and tax assessor-collector elected will serve on a temporary basis until the regular election.

All members of the Commissioners' Court were present along with County Judge Wm. G. Yarborough and his secretary, Odell Burns.

Childress stated also that they have used seven pints of blood since the bank was created. Four of these were for emergency cases and blood was ready for administration within one hour after the accident.

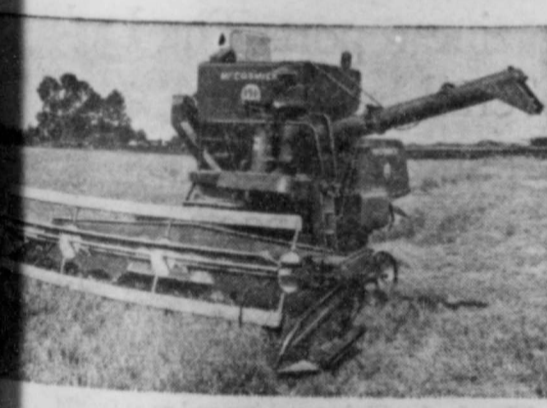

tinue in school past the fourth
grade. Miss Poe also discovered
that if one wishes to attain a
higher education, one must
have no church affiliation or
sincere religion.

Miss Poe also spoke of her
journeys in the satellite coun-
tries. Today in Hungary, 18-
year-olds are being taken out of
prisons they were sent to in
1956. They are being given the
death sentence for their part in
the Communist massacre of
Hungary four years ago. Miss
Poe deeply impressed upon the
audience why we Americans
should be thankful for all our
blessings, and the privilege to
live in America.

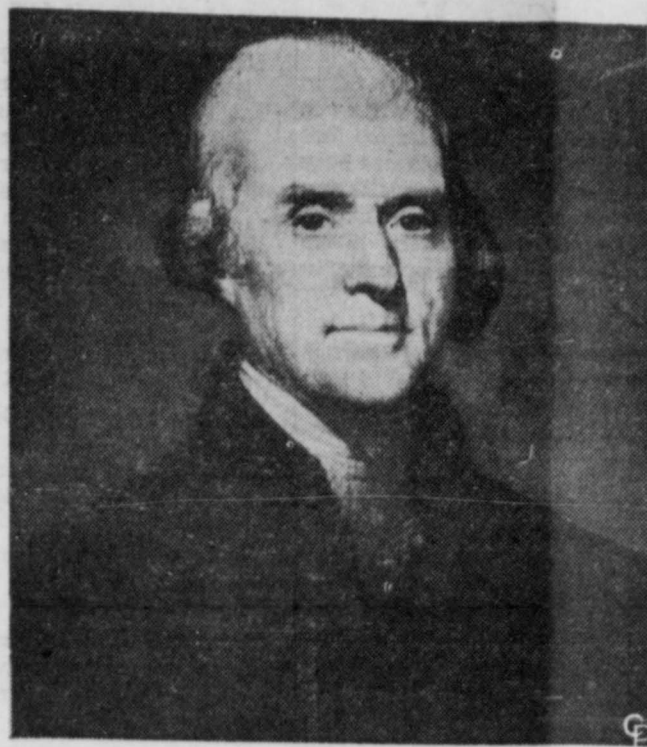

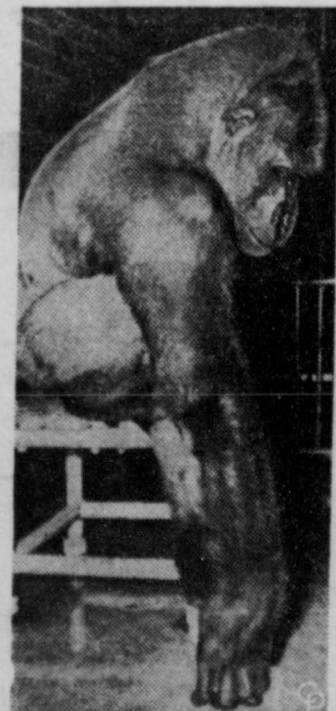

A Checkup Or A Check

Faced With Death, Gus Still Thinks Of Others

What does a man do when he has only months to live?

Some would plan a trip around the world, others might decide to do the things they've planned but never accomplished, many would attempt to cram in the many things they have missed.

But not Gus Obenhaus. It was only a week ago that a doctor told the 54-year-old Borgan the shocking news: "You only have six months to live at the most."

Last Monday morning Gus Obenhaus was on the job at Finger Motor Company where he is manager. He says he'll stay there until illness forces him to quit. He talked a little apprehensively and bit uncertainly about the sudden knowledge of eminent death. But his thoughts were neither apprehensive nor uncertain.

"The one thing I want," he said, "is to be instrumental in preventing someone else from going through what I'm going through."

Gus Obenhaus, outwardly the picture of health, has cancer of the lungs. He underwent an operation for it last November in Oklahoma City and thought he was on the road to recovery. Then a knot appeared on the back of his shoulder. An Amarillo doctor took an X-ray, consulted an Oklahoma City specialist, and told him the news. The doctor offered no hope.

Almost immediately after hearing the news, Gus was questioning friends on how the American Cancer Society or newspapers could use his case to illustrate the necessity of periodic checkups by a physician.

Gus's interest in helping others wasn't a sudden thing provoked by fear of death.

"He's always been like that," a friend said. "He'd walk over hot coals if he thought it would help someone else. I can't understand why something like this has to happen to someone like him."

Obenhaus has been active in civic affairs ever since he came to Borgan in 1950. He is a member of the Chamber of Commerce and is a past president of the Borgan Kiwanis Club. He belongs to the Masonic Lodge of Altus, Oklahoma, and the First Baptist Church of Borgan. Many Borgans remember him as the rich baritone who led the singing at Community Christmas carolling and sang at Kiwanis Minstrel Shows. He has also been parade chairman for the past two Borgan birthday celebrations and for the Christmas parade.

He lives at 1108 Roosevelt and also Mrs. Emmet Blodgett.

SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

Mullin
REGULAR MEETING OF THE GOLDTHWAITE SCHOOL BOARD OF EDUCATION met at the regular session on May 2, 1960. On roll check, Dale Reid present and President with Union, 7:30 p.m. Secretary, O. P. Daniel, L. R. Burnham and Char. Conradt all present and on agenda. Others present were Supt. T. Jones and Prin. D. J. Williams. The following transactions were approved:
1. Minutes of the April meeting were approved after each member had studied the minutes, without voting opposition. Supt. Jones was asked to lead through the agenda.
2. After a lengthy discussion, a motion was moved by Conradt, seconded by Burnham that the minutes published in the Goldthwaite Eagle each month, correspond exactly with minutes of the official minutes of the board. Motion carried.
3. Supt. Jones read a paragraph from The Handbook for School Board Members handling complaints within the school district. After thoughtful consideration, motion was made by Burnham, seconded by Shelton that the paragraphs of the handbook be followed verbatim in handling complaints. Upon calling for a vote, all members voted yes and the following for the agenda to follow: Any complaint should be presented to the superintendent and put into writing; the superintendent should investigate and present his findings to the board and the complainant; if the complainant then wishes to present his case to the school board (if the superintendent has not dismissed the case) he should be permitted to do so by the superintendent and scheduled to appear at the next regular meeting; the school board should, upon additional information furnished by the superintendent and staff, and then make the best possible decision. (At no time should a board member forget that, as an individual, he has no authority to act or promise board action on a complaint.)
4. After invoices were studied, motion was made by Conradt, seconded by Burnham and voted unanimously to pay all bills for which invoices are filed.
5. Motion was made by Conradt, seconded by Burnham and voted unanimously to change date of meeting to the first Monday Night following fourth of each month. This will give more time for filing and arranging bills for payment.
6. Supt. Jones was asked to continue to send courtesy notices to each board member along with probable agenda and other duplicated matter that might be useful in preparing the board members for the board meeting. Four days' notice or less was considered the proper time for sending the materials ahead of the meetings.
6. Motion was made by Conradt, seconded by Shelton that Mr. Luther Jernigan and Mr. P. R. Reid be named to the Board of Equalization and that Mr. Jones work with them and select a third good man for the board and that the final decision or appointment of the third member be presented to the board in our next meeting for final action. This motion carried unanimously.
7. Motion was made by Daniel, seconded by Shelton and voted unanimously to hire the present six lunch room employees for another year; namely: Mrs. A. D. Welch—as supervisor at \$110.00 per month and Mrs. Opal Henkes, Mrs. Lola Huffman, Mrs. Loretta Long, Mrs. Nadene Peniston and Mrs. Mildred Crumley each at \$80.00 per month. The year is to be for nine full months or the duration of the school year.
8. Motion was made by Conradt, seconded by Shelton that the six bus drivers be re-employed for the 1960-61 school year with Dan Long as Bus Foreman at the price of \$115.00 per month and Elton Horton, Joe A. Kemp, Hugh Owens, Cruz Corona and R. W. Phillips at \$95.00 per month for nine months with Dan Long for 9½ months. The motion carried unanimously.
9. Motion was made by Harper, seconded by Rudd and voted unanimously that Robert Terry be elected for high school janitor at \$150.00 per month and Mr. A. C. Brown be hired as elementary school janitor at \$100.00 per month for the school year of twelve months beginning July 1, 1960 and continuing through June 30, 1961.
10. Motion made by Daniel and seconded by Rudd that Frank Bowman be hired as tax-assessor-collector at \$150.00 per month said term to begin July 1, 1960 and run through June 30, 1961. This motion carried unanimously.
11. Motion made by Burnham, seconded by Shelton that The Goldthwaite ISD again compete or participate in The Mills County Cooperative Program on special personnel: that is a county nurse and a county supervisor and that our prorata part of the salaries thus paid be provided in our budget to meet the excess salary paid the supervisor from local taxes and that we pass such a resolution as presented by the office of the Ex-Officio County Superintendent, Mr. Bill Yarborough. The motion carried, and the resolution was signed.
12. Motion was made by Conradt, seconded by Shelton and voted unanimously to allow Supt. Jones and coaches to purchase letter jackets for those boys in track who lettered that had not already received letter jackets. Miniature trophies are awarded lettermen who received jackets in either football or basketball. The limit as set forth by University Interscholastic League is to be strictly adhered to.
13. In reference to the previous minutes of April, D. J. Williams had been informed as to who made the complaint about his absences from class but the general sentiment of the board being that his absence was justified and such com-

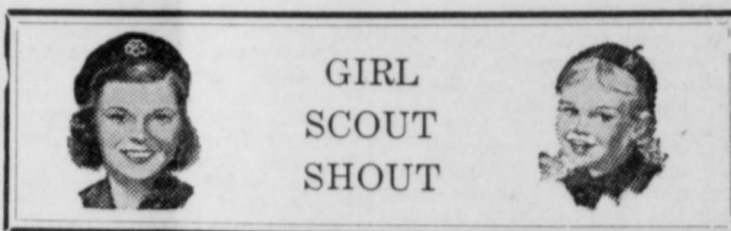
