Three Faculty Members Named By School Board For Next Year

Members of the Goldthwaite School Board meeting in their regular session for the month of June elected three faculty members for the new school year starting in September.

John G. Milnor and Mrs. Lois Skipping are new members to be added to the faculty while Mrs. Iva Cockrell will re-join the local faculty after being away for some time.

Milnor was named band instructor and choral director. He is a recent graduate of Howard Payne College, Brownwood, as a band music major. He is a native of Highland Park where he graduated from high school. During the past year he has been part time band director at the May Public Schools and has served as music director for the First Baptist Church, San Saba.

Mrs. Skipping has been on the faculty of Iraan Public Schools for the past 15 years. She formerly taught at Regency, Richmond Springs and Zephyr. She is the wife of C. A. Skipping who is a member of the Goldthwaite school faculty. Mr. Skipping returned to the Goldthwaite school faculty last year as science teacher. They own their home in Mills County.

She will teach first grade, filling the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Myla Manikin who has been a member of the Elementary school faculty the past five years.

Mrs. Iva Cockrell was elected to fill the vacancy in the history department. She formerly was a member of the Goldthwaite school faculty and has been teaching at Evant.

Hospital Wing Bid Opening Is Re-Set June 20

Opening of contractors' bids for construction of a new wing for Childrens Clinic and Hospital was postponed here Tuesday when it was found that more time was required by contractors.

Tuesday, June 14, was originally set for the bid opening. The delay was necessary because final plans and specifications were completed later than originally anticipated.

Tentative date for opening bids has been reset to Monday, June 20.

The contract will cover a new wing for the hospital which will provide accommodations for 16 additional patients.

735 Mills County Growers Apply For Wool Payments

11.25 Inches Of Rainfall Recorded Here First Five Months Of 1960

Rainfall recorded in Goldthwaite the first five months of 1960 measured 11.25 inches, according to official report from Harry Allen, weather observer.

This is almost double the amount of 1959 when 6.57 inches was recorded for the same period. This has accounted for much better grass and improved grain conditions this year over 1959.

The long term normal annual average for Goldthwaite is 30.14 inches. Long term normal average for January through May is 13.16 inches.

Following is a comparative report of long term normal average and rainfall recorded here for the January-May period of this year.

Total rainfall recorded here during the first five months of 1958 was 12.40 inches. In 1957 Goldthwaite recorded 21.23 inches during the same period. This was the second wettest of 55 years. The only year when more rainfall was recorded here than in 1957 was 1919.

With the deadline now past to apply for payments in the national wool program for the 1959 marketing year, a total of 735 growers in Mills County have applied, according to Lee W. Tabor of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office. The deadline for applications was May 2.

Applications received throughout the country will now be used in computing the rate of payment, after which payments will be made to growers through their ASC offices. Payments are expected to be made some time after July 1.

Under the wool program, payments are made at the percentage rate necessary to bring the national average farm price of wool up to 62 cents a pound, which is the announced incentive level. That percentage is applied to each grower's marketings to calculate his payment. On unshorn lambs, payment is made at a rate based on the wool rate. For 1958, the payment rate was 70.3 per cent for shorn wool and \$1.02 per hundredweight on unshorn lambs.

The purpose of the percentage method of payment, Mr. Tabor points out, is to encourage wool growers to do the best possible job of marketing their clip. Payments under the wool program are made as an incentive to growers to bring about an increase in national wool production.

Schwartz Food Store To Have New Home After July Fourth

Schwartz Food Store will be in a new home starting July 5, it was announced this week by Milton Schwartz, owner and operator of the store.

The store will be moved from the corner of Third and Fisher Streets to the Burnham Building on the corner of Third and Parker Streets, one block west from present location.

The building is undergoing some repairs and redecorating and will be completely air conditioned with refrigerated air. Two seven and one-half ton refrigeration units are being installed. Floor space of the new store will be more than double the present size.

There will be all new steel shelving throughout and two new check-out stands. More than double frozen food storage display, double dairy products display, enlarged market display and an air-conditioned egg storage room. Schwartz produces on his own ranch about one-half of the beef sold through his market.

Fresh fruit and vegetable display will be increased one-third and there will be more merchandise with a wider selection in every department of the store.

There will be all new grocery carts for shoppers and a ladies' waiting lounge. Also story books, coloring books and puzzle contests for children.

Air conditioning will be installed next week and installation of new equipment will begin by this weekend.

Stocking the store will be started next week. The store will be completely stocked before the move is made.

Schwartz said they will close in their present location on Saturday night, July 2, and will open for business in the new store on Tuesday morning, July 5.

The front steps will be remodeled with iron railing for safety. There will be a 16 car parking lot just east of the building with entrance at one end and exit at the other. Stalls will be marked for car parking.

A new six by eight foot sign "Schwartz Food Store," will be placed on the corner of the building.

Shareholders Of Hunting & Fishing Club Have Annual Meeting June 8

Shareholders of the Mills County Hunting and Fishing Club, Inc., held their annual meeting on the veranda of the Club House at Lake Merritt on the evening of June 8. Following the business meeting, the members enjoyed a covered dish supper in the picnic area under the supervision of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Moreland and Mr. and Mrs. Howard Campbell.

Following the report of a record year, the four club directors whose terms expire this year were unanimously re-elected for another two year term. These directors are, President, W. G. Saylor; M. Y. Stokes, Jr.; W. P. Duren and Nelson Griffin. Holdover directors are Lee Roy Stacy, T. J. Blackburn and Edw. Rackow.

The shareholders continued the present dues of \$10.00 per year and water assessment to

cabin owners of \$5 a year with discounts of \$1.00 each for prompt payment. Dues may be paid at Saylor Chevrolet Co., or by mail.

Club regulations prohibiting dances in the Club house were amended to permit dances of teenagers when sponsored by Club members and authorized by the Directors.

A board of three members is to be established to inspect private piers and cabins and issue instructions for bringing them up to Club standards of safety and appearance.

Plans for eradicating the moss in the lake, particularly that in the swimming area, were adopted. The Directors were directed to enforce safety regulations by boat operators.

The secretary-treasurer, M. Y. Stokes, Jr., reported that the

Club membership is now the highest on record with 12 new members added the past year. Not a single member was behind with his dues. There was no outstanding Club indebtedness, and a healthy balance in the bank and U. S. Bonds has been accumulated to provide for any emergencies.

The price of the few shares still for sale by the Club was increased from \$75 to \$100 plus federal excise tax and dues. This increase will take effect at the beginning of the new club year on July 1. After these shares are disposed of, it will be necessary to purchase the share of a member who is willing to sell.

Applications for shares may be placed with any of the directors.

The pier and stairs at the swimming area have just been

rebuilt with treated, water-resistant timbers.

An attractive cabin at the Lake has been completed by Dr. T. C. Graves and additions have been made by the F. P. Bowmans and Parker Shaws. Delmar Sears has started construction of a cabin and an application for a cabin site from A. L. Oliver is pending. Since last year, A. G. Wasserman has built an attractive cabin just south of the Club house. Many other cabins have been painted or otherwise improved.

Visitors are invited to inspect the Club area at Lake Merritt any Sunday afternoon. To use any of the Club privileges—picnicking, swimming, boating, fishing or hunting in season—visitors must be sponsored and accompanied by a Club member as the property is posted to non-members.

CHILEAN RELIEF—Hundreds of thousands of Chileans are cold, sick, injured, and homeless.

It's a natural characteristic of Americans to want to help people in trouble the world over. The Chilean disaster has proved no exception. Committees for Chilean relief are forming throughout the nation. Tons of food, medical supplies, tents, and other aid have been airlifted to help the homeless and helpless.

But this is only the beginning. American Red Cross disaster experts in the disaster-wracked country report a long-range recovery program of gigantic proportions is needed to put Chile back on its feet.

The supplies are certainly needed. But a look at the map proves that the most efficient way we Americans can help is with funds. Nearly 5,000 miles separate us from the stricken area. The cost of collecting, packing, and shipping donations would be staggering.

But with money, the urgently needed help can be purchased in areas near to the disaster scene and promptly distributed to points where they will do the most good.

That's why immediate contributions are urged to the American Red Cross or other agencies having programs in Chile. They include Catholic Relief Service, Church World Service, CARE, Seventh Day Adventists Welfare Service, and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

All are working closely with the Red Cross, whose president, General Alfred M. Gruenther, is acting as coordinator for voluntary Chilean relief at the request of President Eisenhower.

As General Gruenther has said, "The impact of voluntary contributions by individuals on the suffering people of Chile will be tremendous."

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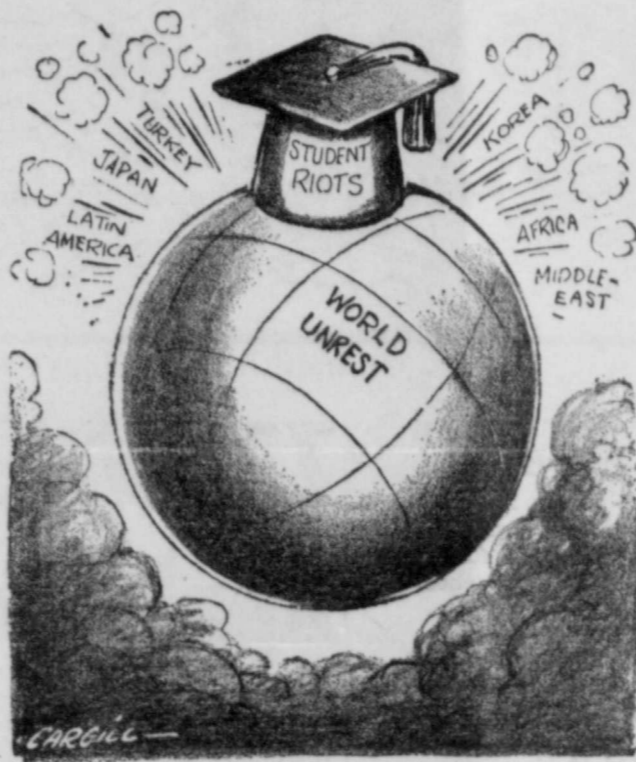

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Russia Still Way Ahead
In Space and Missiles
Soviet Students
Far Greater Interest

WASHINGTON—Despite all the discussion, the United States apparently has not found the key to overcoming Russian lead in space, missiles and technical education, on which accomplishments are based.

A careful study by the National Science Foundation shows that the Soviets are not only maintaining their lead, but in some areas they are actually increasing it.

This is particularly true in their educational institutions which in 1959 graduated 10 times the number of engineers the United States did. The NSF found Russian graduates to be as well trained as the American graduates and in some instances even better.

Reporting on this situation to Congress, NSF declared: "In view of what is happening in Russia and the satellite countries and Red China, it is apparent that we are falling behind and that we must take steps to buttress our own scientific and technological educational system."

The nub of the problem appears to be greater incentives and deeper motivation which drive the Russian students. One spokesman, himself a distinguished scientist and educator, drew the following contrast:

"In the free world, education is directed toward the development of the individual. The young people in the Soviet Union know that a good way out of their low economic and social environment is through education. The material rewards of learning (for Russian students) are real—better food and better living for example."

The National Science Foundation is hard at work on a program to increase the quality and the numbers of United States engineering graduates, but they admit it is a long-range effort. They're seriously concerned about the outlook.

ELECTRONIC BRAIN—For years, the military services have been providing handsome young escorts for the state promenade at Washington's annual Cherry Blossom festival. The practice has been to take a representative group of young officers to match them with the princesses according to height and age. This year the Air Force thought it would try something different. It decided to have both the princesses and the officers fill out questionnaires, feed the information into an electronic brain, and come out with sets of princesses and escorts who matched intellectually as well as in appearance.

It was question number 20 that caused all the racket. The question wanted to know whether the individual preferred twin or double beds after marriage.

About a dozen of the officers, recruited from all of the services, balked at answering, charging an invasion of privacy. The Air Force high command agreed, and ordered that the question did not have to be answered by the young men.

The princesses showed no such reticence. All but one of the 53 young ladies replied, and all who replied expressed a preference for double beds. One young lady, who had said otherwise on the questionnaire that she did not intend to get married, answered the question by saying that if she did, she, too, would prefer a double bed.

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I have just hired a man at \$100 per month to work on my farm. When do I pay social security taxes on his wages?

Answer: Farmers and ranchers file their social security reports only once a year. This report is filed on Form 943 during the month of January—listing all covered wages paid during the preceding year. Agricultural wages are covered under the following conditions:

1. If an employee is paid at least \$150 in cash wages during the calendar year, or
2. If work is performed on 20 or more days in a calendar year and the pay is figured on a time basis; that is, by the day, month, etc. If the worker meets this provision, he is reported even though his cash wages do not total \$150 in a year.

Question: When was the Social Security Act passed?

Answer: President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the bill making the Social Security Act a law on August 14, 1935.

Question: How much are the benefits today?

Answer: Retirement payments, based on past wages, range from \$33 to \$120 a month at the present time. Total family payments can reach \$254 a month to the retired worker's family.

HORN FLIES CAN BE CONTROLLED

Hot weather is horn fly weather, and the insects will be one of the chief stock pests from now until fall, reports C. F. Garner, extension entomologist for the Texas A&M College System.

The horn fly, a close relative of the stable fly, pierces the skin of livestock to suck blood, the specialist explains. The pain and annoyance caused by these bites interferes with the animal's feeding and resting, resulting in a loss of weight, de-

creased milk yield and indigestion. Horn flies also have been suspected of carrying anthrax, Garner says.

Garner recommends the following methods for horn fly control: add to 100 gallons of water 3 1/3 quarts of toxaphene 60% emulsifiable concentrate, or 8 quarts of 25% methoxychlor, or 16 pounds of 25% Korlan wettable powder, or 16 pounds of 25% wettable powder Co-Ral. The above insecticides should not be used on lactating dairy cattle, and Korlan and Co-Ral should not be used on dairy cattle under any circumstances, Garner cautions. The specialist also warns against using any insecticides other than those especially formulated for livestock.

For lactating cattle the specialist recommends one heaping tablespoonful of 50% wettable methoxychlor powder per animal. Sprinkle on the poll, neck, back and upper sides then rub lightly by hand to carry powder

beneath the hair. The above controls last for about three weeks, Garner says. Garner concludes by cautioning that cattle should not be slaughtered for at least 28 days after application of toxaphene; 45 days for Co-Ral; and 56 days for Korlan. He also warns that DDT should not be applied to either beef or dairy cattle.

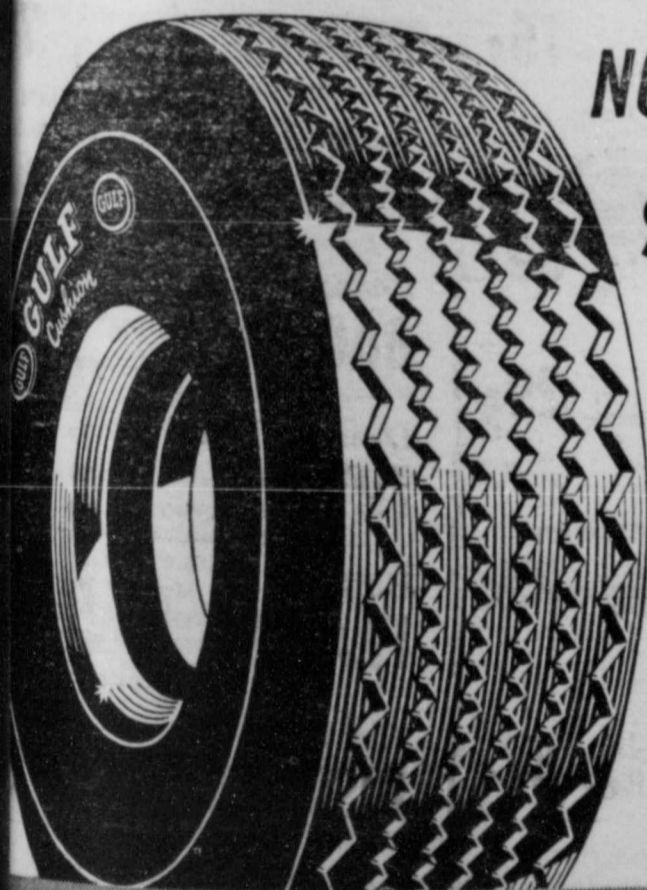

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS AND NATURAL GAS SERVICE TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF GOLDTHWAITE, MILLS COUNTY, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 20th day of July, 1960, the general service rate for sales of natural gas and natural gas service rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Goldthwaite by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

Minimum Monthly Bill \$1.53
First 1 MCF at \$1.760 per MCF gross; \$1.584 per MCF net.
Next 1 MCF at \$1.482 per MCF gross; \$1.334 per MCF net.
Next 3 MCF at .927 per MCF gross; .834 per MCF net.
Next 20 MCF at .649 per MCF gross; .584 per MCF net.
All Over 25 MCF at .593 per MCF gross; .534 per MCF net.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

This ordinance does not regulate any rate or charge except those specifically set out hereinabove.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an immediate change and adjustment in the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the mayor.

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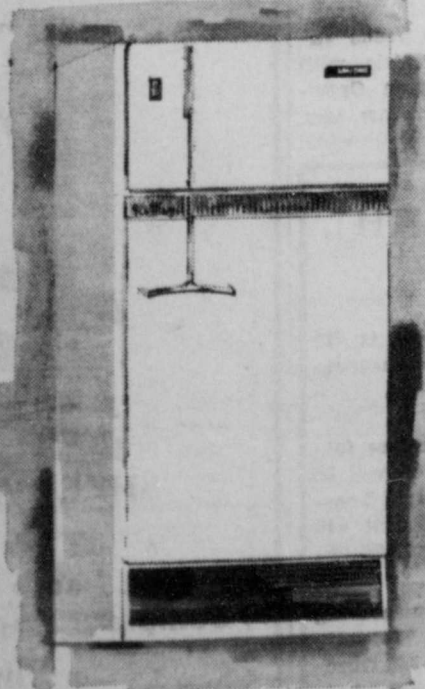

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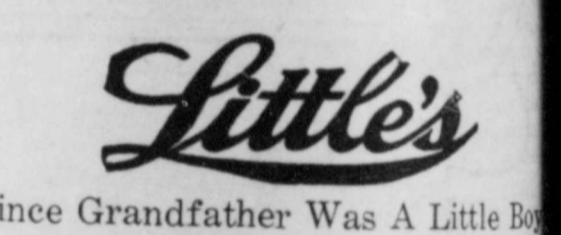
