Made For Fourth Annual Registered Angora Show & Sale

Angora goats were made at a meeting Monday night for the annual Central Texas Angora Goat Breeders' Association show and sale. The show and sale will be held at Goldthwaite on August 26.

There were 24 members of the association present at the meeting. The association is made up of approximately 50 members, including Mills and adjoining counties.

It was decided that the sale consist of 135 Bucks and 150 does. Each member is entitled to bring 15 Bucks and 15 does to the sifting of the sale.

Only high quality goats will be allowed to be shown at the annual sale. The goats will be on display at the show barns in Goldthwaite.

The sale will be judged for sale on August 26. Breeder of champion Buck will receive a premium of \$100.

Water Tank Complete: Will We Have Water?

The city's new 500,000 gallon water storage tank is being completed this week and the big question in the minds of city officials is: "Will we have water to fill it?"

Interior painting of the tank was reported complete Tuesday. Some outside painting is yet to be finished. The interior will be left to dry until Friday when it will be ready for water and chlorination to make it safe and get it ready for use.

W. C. Barnett, city manager said Tuesday: "We expect to put a little water in the tank Friday," but he continued his remarks, "however, for the past few days we have lost ground with the water level in the reservoir falling while all city pumps were going at full capacity. If the present trend continues with high water usage and dry weather, it will be the same old story—we'll be out of water—and the new tank will not solve our problem."

During the past year the Goldthwaite FFA Chapter has established a livestock rotation program in hogs and sheep, according to Thurman Head, V. A.

The wool money goes into a replacement fund to keep up the number of ewes.

The chapter purchasing committee for lambs was Gerry Head, Jimmy Wigley and Coy Cline.

John Burdette as Chapter president worked with both committees. This committee purchased 3 Delaine ewe lambs from Joe LeMay and he donated another, and two Delaine ewe lambs from David Watters who also donated a lamb to the program. This made seven Delaines and they were received by Buddy Morgan.

Five Ramboulllets were purchased from C. C. Wright of Mullin and he also gave one which made six to be presented to Roger Horton.

Ronald Cagle is the member receiving the 5 Columbia ewes which were bought from the 711 Ranch at Boerne.

This program has been made possible by the proceeds of the chapter rodeos.

In addition the rodeo money has been used to build three new sections of bleachers which can be used at future rodeos, stock shows and other outside affairs.

O. O. Smith was elected president of the Board of Supervisors for Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1, at a special organizational meeting Monday night.

Lewis T. Hudson was elected secretary of the board.

The meeting was attended by members of the board of supervisors, tax assessor-collector, city council and city officials, citizens' water advisory committee, engineering and fiscal agent representatives and the press.

The meeting Monday night which was termed a "Water Meeting", was arranged with the various groups attending for the purpose of bringing the

board of supervisors up-to-date on what has been done by the city council with respect to the overall program of providing an adequate supply of water for the city.

W. C. Barnett, city manager, gave the group a report on water problems dating back several years. He also explained what has been done during the past year since engineering firm and fiscal agent were employed, water survey made and possible ways of financing the program outlined.

Mayor Johnson told the group of activities of the council during the past two years and pointed out reasons for the water district and method of nomination of supervisors.

Bob King, representing Joe J. Rady & Company, Engineers, explained their water survey and recommendations to the city.

Henry Keller, representing

First Of Texas Corporation, the city's fiscal agent, outlined possible ways of financing the project and the need for the Water District and organization of the

Auldridge Submits Low Bid For Addition To Hospital

Truett Auldridge, general contractor of Goldthwaite, submitted the low bid for construction of a new addition to Childress Clinic and Hospital, according to announcement by Dr. M. A. Childress.

His bid was \$56,693, and calls for the job to be completed in 95 calendar days.

The bid was accepted by Dr. Childress and Wiedemann and Salmond when bids were opened at the Hospital Monday afternoon. Wiedemann and Salmond, architects, prepared plans and specifications for the addition

and will supervise construction. Contracts are expected to be signed within a few days when construction will get underway, Childress stated.

The new 42 by 100 foot addition to the hospital will provide accommodations for 16 additional patients. It will join present building on the South and will run East and West, with East front, to match the Clinic part on the North.

Cost of the new addition will be approximately \$6,000 more than estimates, Dr. Childress said. Reason for the increase is due principally to the new hos-

pital licensing law which went into effect the past year. The new requirements call for all wiring in conduit, equipment or mechanical rooms with concrete walls, floor and ceiling and special thickness and treated sheet rock for walls.

FINANCING

Dr. Childress said Tuesday that the increased cost of the addition leaves the financing program short approximately \$7,000. This is open to Mills county residents who would like to invest funds in the project at six per cent interest.

POISONOUS SNAKES—This is vacation time for thousands and with it comes the usual desire to get out into the open spaces. Fishing, camping, hiking or just general outdoor activities are a vital part of vacation time for Americans.

These out door activities put thousands into contact with nature and the elements which at times can prove pretty rough and sometimes dangerous.

The June issue of Texas Game and Fish magazine points out that there is a big increase in the poisonous snake population in Texas this year. The story also speaks words of warning to those trekking to the outdoors to be on guard against the possibility of an encounter of one of the poisonous snakes that are found in big numbers this year. The four species named and pictured in Game and Fish are the Copperhead, Western Diamondback Rattler, Coral Snake and the Cottonmouth Moccasin.

Not many people will take chances when they come in contact with snakes, but, to those who are tempted, one can only say, be careful — whether you know what kind of snake it is or not, be careful, it may be poisonous.

There have been some snakebite cases in Mills County this year, by the way, if you didn't know it.
One case was treated at the hospital earlier this spring and Mrs. Orville Hale was hospitalized for a week this month after being bitten by a copperhead.

NEW WAY TO CATCH FISH—Here is a new way to catch catfish, in case some one is looking for a new twist in the art of fishing with results.

We have heard of many ways and means of fishing, some of which are smiled on while others are frowned upon. This newest method sounds to me like it is all right and legal and could be smiled upon, by everyone.

The new method is raking them out of the tank with the old-fashioned horse drawn hay rake. You don't think so? Then just read this.

E. H. Thorne reported this experience by Ernest Burdette. Burdette stocked a tank with yellow catfish about five years ago, and knew he should be having some pretty good fishing by now.

The past year or two though, he had become quite concerned with the green moss forming in the tank. It looked like the moss was just about to take over and fill the tank.

He decided he must do something about getting rid of at least some of the moss. So he got the idea of raking out the moss. He got the old-fashioned horse drawn hay rake and placed it at one edge of the tank and pulled the rake through the tank with the claw hooks down to rake up the moss.

It did just that. The rake rolled up a big mass of green moss and brought it out on the other bank. When he examined the moss he found nine yellow cats ranging from seven to 14 pounds each rolled up in the moss.

I've fished a number of ways and under many circumstances during my carefree fishing days as a boy, but, I've never done any fishing with a hay rake. I know what the hay rake is though, I mean the old-fashioned horse power type too. I spent many hours on one of them.

As national committeewoman, Mrs. Randolph is entitled to be a delegate to the national convention and cast one-half delegate vote. Convention declared she must be bound by the unit rule and vote with the rest of the delegation. In short, "all the way with LBJ." Also, the convention asked that she have no control over credentials and tickets to the national convention.

GOP Plans Laid—Texas Republican leaders are saying, in effect, that they won't fight among themselves but will save their strength to fight Democrats in the general election next fall.

Texas' GOP traditionally has been very harmonious, except in 1952 when newcomers supporting Eisenhower wrested control from the Old Guard.

Texas' delegation to the GOP Chicago convention are pledged to support Vice President Nixon for president, Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona for vice president. Early talk of supporting Senator Goldwater or New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller for president ended short of a floor battle.

Most Republican energy at their state convention was used to try to lure Independent and Conservative Democrats to their fold by criticizing Democrats as the party of "give-away programs" and "federal intervention."

Moving Up—Preliminary 1960 census figures show Texas, with a population of 9,493,895, ranking sixth among the 50 states—behind New York, California, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Ohio. Houston apparently will be moved up from 14th largest city to sixth largest city in the nation, following New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Los Angeles and Detroit.

Enlarged Reservoir Planned—Governor Daniel and the State Water Board have approved plans to enlarge a proposed salt water barrier and reservoir on the Trinity River near Wallisville to four feet, instead of two feet, above water level.

Applications to build the new Trinity reservoirs were granted last spring after one of the longest, most heated hearings ever held before the Water Board.

Austin, Texas—Texas Democrats are starting a fresh page in their history. The era when the party could be split on the basis of who voted for Eisenhower in 1952 is ended.

Only thing which could revive that long-cherished bone of contention would be for the Party to nominate a ticket so distasteful to Texans that the state would again go Republican.

At the state convention Democrats of widely varying views united behind the Lyndon Johnson banner to bury the extreme loyalists of the DOTC in the most overwhelmingly lopsided vote in party history.

Even seasoned political reporters were caught off balance by the 2,252-to-40 vote by which the DOT proposal was defeated. They used such unaccustomed adjectives as "astounding" to describe the victory.

State Executive committee proposed a loyalty pledge binding on state party officials, delegates to Los Angeles and presidential electors.

DOT insisted that in addition, a loyalty pledge should be circulated among the county delegations and that no one should be allowed to stay in the state convention hall unless he signed it.

DOT did everything possible to fan the issue. Blurred, hastily printed flyers headed "Who Says Party Loyalty Is a False Issue?" were scattered outside the convention hall. Flyers

showed a picture of Gov. Price Daniel introducing Eisenhower at a 1952 campaign rally and reproduced a copy of the ballot by which a majority of Texans split their tickets in '52 and '56 by voting Democratic on the state level and Republican on the national level.

Alex Dickey of Denton, one of the DOT spokesmen given equal time to debate the issue before the delegates, proclaimed heatedly that "party loyalty is the issue before this convention."

But his weapon had lost its edge. After the vote, Governor Daniel declared that any group that tries to send a rival delegation to Los Angeles on the basis of 40 votes out of 2,292 "must be out of their minds."

Even drooping DOTers agreed. Dickey refused to bolt, told sympathizers waiting outside they had been beaten fairly.

Reporters, who had tried to beat the deadlines by writing "hold for release" stories describing the expected "rump" convention, hastily filed mandatory kill orders.

Unity in Diversity—Events at the State Democratic convention, though it was frequently referred to as the most united, most harmonious in history, demonstrated clearly that it is, as it always has been, only as united as strong personal leadership can keep it.

By its very make-up the Texas Democratic Party is like six tomcats in a tow sack. Gulf between the very conservative delegation sent to Austin by Harris County and the very liberal delegation from Bexar County is greater than the gulf between Republican and Democrat in many parts of the country.

Convention keynoter, Rep. Jim Wright of Fort Worth, took note of this. "Out of our disorganization, our diversity... and even our disagreements," said Wright, "comes our strength. We are the party of no one because we are the party of everyone."

Test of this came after Senator Johnson made his triumphal entry to the accompaniment of marching placard-carriers, music and cheers. When the tumult ended and Johnson began to speak, the Harris County delegation, which had voted not to support Johnson, booted at the end of each statement. It was an awkward moment.

Senator Johnson, who was discussing his experiences in the U. S. Senate in working with men of such contrary views as Senator Byrd of Virginia and Senator Morse of Oregon, departed from the text of his speech.

Despite their differences, said Johnson, these senators "always behave in a courteous and gentlemanly manner."

Harris County was heard from no more, and Texas Democrats proceeded with, for Texas, first class harmony.

FARMERS GASOLINE TAX REFUND

Mills County farmers may file a claim for refund of Federal tax on gasoline used on their farms.

WHAT GASOLINE

TO INCLUDE

Include gasoline purchased before July 1, 1959, and before July 1, 1960, for farming purposes.

CHANGE IN TAX RATE

Gasoline purchased before October 1, 1959, was taxed at three cents per gallon. Refund of the tax on such fuel will be at the rate of three cents per gallon. The Federal tax on gasoline was increased to four cents per gallon after September 30, 1959, by an Act of Congress. Accordingly refund claimed for tax on gasoline purchased after September 30, 1959, will be at the rate of four cents per gallon.

WHERE TO FILE

The claim should be filed with your U. S. District Court Internal Revenue.

PERIOD COVERED

The period covered by the claim is from July 1, 1959, through June 30, 1960.


TIME FOR FILING

The claim will be allowed if filed on or before June 30, 1960. Only one claim should be filed. It is the responsibility of the filer to file the claim in time to get one of these tax


