A & A Paint And Supply Company Gets New Home On Fisher Street

A & A Paint and Supply Company will be moved to a new location on Fisher Street the first week of July, according to Truett Auldridge, general contractor and owner of the firm. In the new location the firm will continue to feature line of wall paper and paint and will add electrical and plumbing departments with fixtures and supplies for sales and service, Auldridge announced. The building will be air-conditioned with GE year around WeatherTron all electric heating and refrigeration, which is featured by A & A. A 20 by 40 foot storage shed will also be constructed on the back of the lot. The building now occupied by A & A on Third Street will be retained as a workshop.

Water District Supervisors Call Election On \$600,000 Bond Issue

125,000 Gallons Of Water In New Storage Tank On Tuesday

Water was being pumped into the city's new 500,000 gallon storage tank over the past weekend and if weather conditions are favorable during the next few days the tank may be filled to capacity. The new tank was washed, chlorinated and cleaned last Friday and Saturday. The slow rainfall here Friday and Saturday gave the city an opportunity to fill the old reservoir and pump some into the new tank. On Tuesday the new tank had 125,000 gallons which is one-fourth capacity. Water is being pumped from city wells into the old city reservoir with any surplus over the customer demand going into the new tank. The new tank will take the place of the old reservoir which has served the city for many years and outlived its usefulness.

Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1, board of supervisors meeting in special session Tuesday night, adopted a resolution calling for an election to approve a \$600,000 bond issue to finance a program to provide an adequate water supply for the City of Goldthwaite. The election is scheduled for Tuesday, July 26, in the city hall, from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. All property tax payers of the district will be entitled to vote in the election. The district was approved by voters in a special election on Tuesday, May 31. The bond issue would finance getting water from the Colorado River. The proposed program as recommended by engineers for the city would provide pumping facilities at the river, an off-channel storage reservoir, water treatment plant and ten inch pipe line from the river to the city. If the bond issue is approved by voters on July 26 plans specifications will be prepared by engineers for construction of the facilities. Tentative schedule as outlined by engineers would be for plans and specifications to be ready by December 1, getting bids by January 1, 1961. Approximately one year would be required for construction. The city could expect to get water from this source about January 1, 1962. The board of supervisors entered into agreement with First Of Texas Corporation to represent the district as fiscal agent for the program. The board last week had entered into agreement with Joe J. Rady & Company to represent the district as engineers. The engineering firm and fiscal agent, or bond firm, have been working with the city for the past year on the water problem. When the district was approved and elected supervisors took office the matter was transferred from the city to the district. Members of the board present Tuesday night were: O. O. Smith, president; Lewis T. Hudson, secretary; Forest E. Frazier, Hollis Blackwell and Jack O. Reid. Others present were W. C. Barnett, city manager, Bob King of Joe J. Rady & Company, Henry Keller of First Of Texas Corporation and Vic E. Koleber.

One Block On Hutchins Street Paved Last Week

One block on West Hutchins street was paved during the past week, W. C. Barnett, city manager, announced Wednesday morning. Two or three more blocks in that area are to be paved as soon as city crews can get to the project. Street paving was slowed down some the past two weeks due to other jobs requiring attention.

Dog With Rabies Reported Here

Dr. M. A. Childress, city health officer, issued a word of warning Wednesday morning that Goldthwaite residents should be on the lookout for possible mad dogs in the community. One case of a mad dog was reported the past week. The dog's head was sent to Austin and report came back Tuesday evening that lab tests were positive and the dog had rabies. If a mad dog is found he should not be killed but should be kept tied or kept in a pen until he dies so that tests may be made, Childress announced.

Mulberry Tree Makes Way For Hospital Wing

A huge Mulberry tree which in all probability was old enough to tell many a tale on Goldthwaite happenings covering a number of decades made way this week for progress. The tree was cut down to clear the way for construction of the new wing for Childress Clinic and Hospital. Removing the tree and hauling in dirt for the fill got underway Monday morning and actual construction on the building is expected to get started in the next few days. Contract for the new wing was awarded last week when bids were opened. The new \$56,000 addition will provide accommodations for an additional 16 patients.

Wheat Referendum Scheduled For July 21

In line with currently controlling legislation, Secretary of Agriculture Benson has proclaimed marketing quotas on the 1961 wheat crop and set July 21 as the date for a referendum to determine producer approval or disapproval of quotas. The Secretary also proclaimed a national wheat acreage allotment of 55 million acres, the minimum permitted by law and announced State shares of the allotment. Texas' share of the allotment was set at 4,047,136 acres. This compares with 4,092,251 acres in 1960. An announcement was also made that the minimum national average support price for 1961 production will be determined before the wheat referendum on the basis of the latest available

supply information. If producers approve marketing quotas, under the proclamation announced, the national average support price available to eligible growers in the commercial area will be not less than the minimum support to be announced before the referendum. On the basis of the present supply of wheat and present legislation, the legal minimum wheat support price for the 1961 crop would be at 75 per cent of parity. Individual farm marketing quotas will be the normal production or the actual production from the farm acreage allotment, whichever is larger. Growers in the commercial area who stay within their allotments will be eligible for price

support on their entire production. Growers who exceed their acreage allotments will be subject to market quota penalties if they have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest. Growers who sign applications for exemption under the feed wheat provision permitting 30 acres or less to be used exclusively for feed on the farm will not be subject to marketing quota penalties. If marketing quotas are not approved by the necessary two-thirds of the voting producers in the July 21 referendum, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketings. Acreage allotments will remain in effect as a condition of eligibility for price support at 50 per cent of parity as required by law.

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DID YOU KNOW? WELL I NEVER — Yellow cats must choose own partners.

Hatching and raising yellow catfish presents more problems to the State Fish Hatcheries than any other species of fish, according to the Director of Hatcheries, Texas Game and Fish Commission. "The greatest problem is raising that spawn once it hatches," said the director. "However, nearly as great is the problem of matching brood fish and feeding the little offspring."

It seems that yellow cats, like many other forms of wildlife, must choose their own mates. Other fish, such as bass, are not so particular, but yellows will not produce unless they are with the mates of their choice.

Usually, hatchery personnel catch mated cats in their nets since pairs normally travel together. These are transferred to hatching ponds where they can spawn. Often, when a hatchery pond containing yellow cats is drained, pairs tend to isolate themselves in the shallow water. These also are kept together and used as brood fish. Once a pair accepts each other and successfully spawn one year, they will continue to spawn each year as long as they remain together.

Once the eggs hatch, biologists are faced with the problem of feeding the little ones. Baby cats manage in hatching ponds until they reach about 2½ inches. Then, they refuse anything but live food.

"These are just some of the problems encountered in our experiments with yellow cats," said the director. "Some day we hope to find solutions to these obstacles so we can satisfy the stocking demands in the state."

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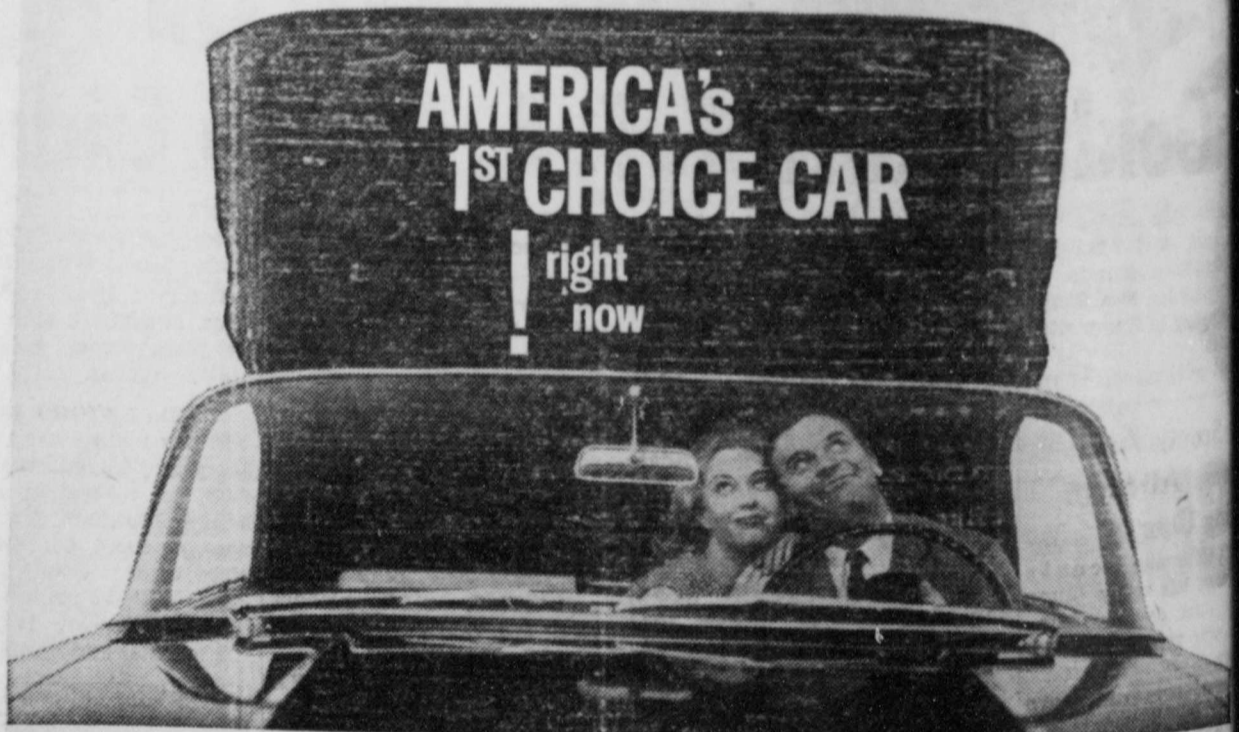

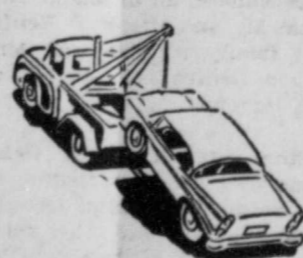

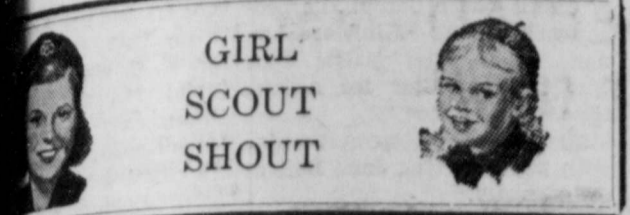

NEWS from YOUR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

CATTLE BRUCELLOSIS

The status of Texas counties in the Brucellosis Control Program, as of June 10, 1960, is as follows: Thirteen counties have been declared modified certified areas. Nine counties are in the process of testing for Type II control area and petitions for Type II areas are complete in nineteen counties. Seven counties, along the Gulf Coast, have selected Type I Control Area.

The Type II program is designed to certify a county as a Modified Brucellosis Area, while the Type I program is a vaccination program that is designed to prepare areas of high infection to enter Type II program. After counties have reduced the Brucellosis infection rate by Type I plan they will still be required to adopt Plan II to become a certified brucellosis free area.

Mills County has 167 signatures on the petition for the Type II control program. Approximately a total of 486 signatures will be needed to have 75 per cent of the cattle owners on the petition as the law requires.

Counties to the West and South of Mills County are now in the process of testing their cattle in the Type II plan of control.

This question is often asked: What will happen to a county that does not engage in a program? Nothing will be done to a county that does not engage in a program. Any pressure that comes to bear will be the result of reluctance of buyers in bidding on their cattle because these cattle cannot be shipped to clean areas without severe restrictions.

Probably more than five per cent of Texas' beef cattle carry the disease. However, in the south and western arid regions the infection rate will be much lower, while in the humid eastern areas the rate may approach twenty per cent infected animals in some counties.

As a result of our disease problem we have a difficult marketing problem. More than half of the counties in the United States are now Modified Certified Brucellosis areas. Another large group of counties are designated as Brucellosis Control Areas and are engaged in county-wide blood-testing programs. Counties in both categories have stringent rules covering animals coming into their counties that originate brucellosis infected areas.

The Mills County Livestock Breeders Association, R. L. Steen, President, has charge of circulating the petition for Mills County for the Type II Program.

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: As the dependent sister of my brother, who recently died, am I eligible for a monthly benefit from his social security account? He was not survived by a widow or minor children. I am age 57, have been confined to a wheelchair for many years, and was entirely dependent on my brother.

Answer: The Social Security Law does not provide survivors benefits for a sister. However, you may be eligible for assistance from the Texas State Department of Public Welfare. You should contact the field worker at the Courthouse for full information.

Question: I lost an arm in the Korean War, but it has not kept me from working full time. I receive disability payments from the Veterans Administration on account of this impairment and was wondering if social security benefits would also be payable.

Answer: Disability benefits under social security are payable only if a person's impairment makes it impossible for him to engage in any substantial gainful work. Since your impairment does not prevent you from working, you are not eligible for payments.
