With almost all business firms, servicing organizations and professional offices in Goldthwaite expected to be represented, a four-night, ten hour credit and collection course will begin Monday night, July 25, at the American Legion Hall under the direction of Lowry M. Carpenter, a retail credit specialist from the University of Texas.

He said the course would be valuable to not only experienced personnel, but also beginners in credit and collection work.

During the 10 hours of lectures and discussions (Classes will be held each night for four nights, each class lasting two and a half hours) practical ideas will be offered on how to interview, investigate and accept or reject customers seeking credit, increase credit volume, control accounts effectively, decrease collection problems, conduct sales promotions and use the small claims courts.

Classes will start each night at 7:00 p. m.

Residents of Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1, will vote Tuesday, July 26, on a \$600,000 bond issue in a program to provide an adequate water supply for the City of Goldthwaite.

The election will be held in the City Hall from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. It was ordered by the Board of Supervisors of the District in a special meeting on June 28. The Water District was approved by voters on May 31. All regularly qualified resident property tax paying voters

in the district are eligible to vote.

The Water District comprises the City of Goldthwaite and a limited area outside the city limits.

If approved, the bond issue will finance getting water from the Colorado River.

Plans call for pumping facilities at the river, off channel storage reservoir, water treatment or filtration plant and 10 inch pipe line from the river to Goldthwaite.

The plan as outlined and recommended by engineers is projected far into the future and would take care of the city's water needs for the next 40 to 50 years, allowing for considerable growth in population.

It was recommended as the most practical solution to the city's water problem after extensive surveys and studies by engineers during the past year.

Engineering studies and survey took into consideration drilling more wells, utilizing Lake Merritt, combining Lake Merritt with a dam on Browns Creek and securing water from Lake Brownwood.

The indebtedness would be paid for with funds received by the Water District from property taxes and from the sale of water to the city. Retiring the bonds would be over a period of many years.

City and Water District officials have announced that according to best possible estimates available the bond issue would cost the average small property owner \$25 to \$30 per year for water district tax.

The following example is given: Person owning property with a market value of \$6,000 would be required to render the property at one-third, or \$2,000. With a tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation it would be a tax of \$30.

City officials and engineers stated that the city couldn't be in a worse location from the standpoint of securing water. Founding fathers located the town on just about the highest point in the county with water running away from the city and being miles from good streams.

The city's problem of being short of water is one of long standing. Officials have been working and trying to solve it for the past 15 years. Many improvements have been made. Each time an improvement program was completed it was found that the supply was still short of the demand.

More than \$75,000 has been spent on wells during the past 10 years. Yet, every summer the demand is greater than the wells can supply.

Ten years ago the static water level in the Trinity Sand of the City's wells was over 80 feet. Today the static water level is down to 30 feet. The static water level has dropped one-half in the past five years, records reveal.

If the bond issue is approved Goldthwaite can expect to get water from this new source by 1962. Plans and specifications would be prepared by December, bids called for by January 1961 and one year would be required for construction.

no objection against granting Goldthwaite a permit for use of Colorado River water.

The City of Goldthwaite has application pending before the State Board of Water Engineers for 1500 acre feet of water annually from the Colorado River in Mills County. Hearing for the application will be conducted in Austin on August 1.

The following letter was received by Barnett from Trostle regarding their position in the matter:

"Dear Mr. Barnett: We have received notice from the Texas Board of Water Engineers that a hearing will be conducted on Monday, August 1, 1960, on an application for a permit for the City of Goldth-

waite to appropriate 1500 acre feet of water annually from the Colorado River in Mills County.

"The people of Goldthwaite are to be congratulated on the steps they are taking to secure a supply of water. The amount which you are requesting is adequate and conservative. I have been instructed by the Board of Directors of this District to express to you our hearty cooperation. We have no objection to present at the meeting.

"We wish you well in your project and hope that you may soon see its completion and profit by its use."

New Water Storage Tank Fine; Doesn't Solve Supply Problem

The new 500,000 gallon water storage tank is a fine addition to the city's water department but it doesn't solve the supply problem, city officials have announced.

Completed a few days ago the new storage tank is now in use and is replacing the old open reservoir that has served the city for many years.

The enclosed storage tank had been recommended by the State Health Department "as a must" for years.

finances available to have the tank constructed and put into use.

"The new tank has improved the storage phase of the water system and meets health department standards," W. C. Barnett, City Manager, said here this week. He commented further: "However, it does not solve our supply problem. If the source of supply was cut off, the new tank, if full, would provide Goldthwaite water only one full day during peak summer use, and not over two days of average requirements."

THE BOND ELECTION NEXT TUESDAY—Next Tuesday, July 26, is an important day for residents of Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1, which comprises the City of Goldthwaite and a small area outside the city limits.

On that day all regularly qualified resident property tax paying voters of the district will be given an opportunity to vote on a \$600,000 bond issue for providing an adequate water supply for the city of Goldthwaite.

The bond election has been called after much work and planning on the part of the city council, citizens' water committee, water district supervisors, engineering surveys and studies with recommendations, and fiscal agent's studies and reports on ways of financing the program.

The city's water problem is not a new one and it is not something that has just cropped up during the past year or two. It is a problem of long standing and has been facing city officials for a number of years.

There has been a water shortage every summer for many years. Some Summers it has been worse than others with the supply running out earlier.

City officials have been working for the past fifteen years trying to improve the situation. Many improvements have been made during that time and yet, every time improvements were made it was found that it still didn't solve the problem. The demand for water continued to be greater than the supply.

During the past two years city officials with many other interested individuals began to study about an overall plan to solve the problem and provide an adequate water supply for years to come.

A year ago a Citizens' Water Committee was appointed to work with the council in trying to solve the problem.

Later an engineering firm was employed to make a thorough study and survey covering all possible sources of water supply and cost of developing each of them.

This survey included additional wells, developing Lake Merritt, using Lake Merritt and a dam on Browns Creek, getting water from Lake Brownwood and the Colorado River.

After the council received reports and recommendations and studied the matter it appeared that the best thing was to go to the Colorado River.

Organizing the water district was part of the program for financing the project.

Now the Water District Supervisors have called the election to approve bonds to finance the project.

The program as presented is what those who have been working on the problem feel is the best and most practical way to solve the water situation.

The bond issue is large, so is the water problem. If it is to be solved it will cost a lot of money.

The bond issue would be paid for through a water district tax and from funds the city would pay to the district for water.

According to best available information the water district tax would cost the average small home owner \$25 to \$30 per year.

For example: If you own property that is worth \$6,000 market value, it would be assessed at one-third, or \$2,000. With a tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation it would cost you \$30.

About a year ago in this corner we wrote: "Residents of Goldthwaite can have an adequate water supply if they are willing to pay for it." That still holds true today, and it will continue to hold true.

One might ask: "What is water worth?" This could be answered: "Water is worth what it costs," especially if you should happen to go to the faucet and turn it on and there is no water.

Residents of Goldthwaite have been unusually fortunate in having low taxes during the years. Those who have property in other towns and are paying taxes in other places know this.

With the additional taxes this bond issue would bring, property owners in Goldthwaite will still be fortunate with taxes well below most other cities.

We urge everyone in the district to be informed on the facts and go and vote in the election Tuesday.

TO THE PROPERTY OWNERS AND VOTERS OF MILLS COUNTY FRESH WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT NO. 1

What Is WATER Worth?

On Tuesday the 26th of July the voters of the above district will be asked to go to the polls and vote for the issuance of \$600,000.00 in bonds to finance a water supply for the City of Goldthwaite.

We, the members of the water board feel that you should be informed as to what the program involves.

THERE IS A WATER SHORTAGE

First, the city is faced with a definite water shortage. As a matter of fact the wells upon which the City has depended for water are slowly but definitely playing out. Upon actual test, the static water level has depreciated about 50% in the last five years, which means that within a short time the City may be completely out of water.

These facts have been known by the City Officials and other interested citizens for some time and efforts have been made to solve the problem by drilling additional wells, only to find that this is not the answer.

CITY COUNCIL TOOK ACTION

The City Council, when acquainted with these facts employed the Engineering firm of Joe J. Rady & Co., of Fort Worth, Texas, to make a study of the water problem and suggest a solution. This firm checked and analyzed every possible source of water.

For Example:

1. Lake Merritt, which upon examination and study was found to be badly silted up and the drainage area into it being only about 9½ square miles was determined to be insufficient, particularly in dry years.

2. Consideration was given to supplementing Lake Merritt with another lake some four miles down stream on Brown's Creek at the best possible site. The cost of this was determined to be upward of \$800,000.00 and too, without spending a lot of money on soil tests, there was some question as to the porosity of the soil which would make a lake unfeasible.

3. A water line to Brownwood which would be a good source was estimated to cost \$1,200,000.00 which is prohibitive.

COLORADO RIVER IS BEST SOURCE

That leaves the Colorado River as the most feasible and economical source of supply.

There is some apprehension on the part of some people as to the flow of the stream being adequate to assure a constant supply. This has been given due consideration and included in the plans will be an off channel storage reservoir sufficient in capacity to enable pumping from the river at convenient times to meet the peak demand period, when the river flow might be low.

In addition to this a commitment has been secured from the Brown County Water District whereby they agree to release water down the Pecan Bayou to the river at a small cost per thousand gallons and though a lot of this water might be absorbed, the overall cost would be negligible.

HOW IT WILL BE FINANCED

Even though the financing of the program will be undertaken by the Water District, an election must be held by the City of Goldthwaite authorizing the entering into a contract to purchase water from the district at a charge of \$15,000.00 per year.

The remainder of the principal and interest cost must come from taxation. We expect to set up a tax roll of about \$2,000,000.00 and set a rate of \$1.50 per \$100.00 of valuation.

WHAT IT WILL COST YOU

According to our best estimates, which have been made by examining City Tax Rolls and other valuations we have determined that the average small home owner's cost will be about \$25.00 to \$30.00 per year.

In other words, if you own property worth \$6,000.00 on today's market it will be necessary that you render it for taxation to the water district at one third of its value, or \$2,000.00, then applying the \$1.50 rate, your water district tax will be \$30.00 per year, or less than ten cents a day.

WHAT IS PROPERTY WORTH WITHOUT WATER!

The Citizens and voters should acquaint themselves with the problem that confronts all of us and realize that this is a matter of great importance.

Should you desire additional information, or explanation, contact any member of the Water Board, or of the City Council.

Go to the polls and vote on Tuesday, July 26th.
