Voters Turn Down Water Bond Issue



RATTLE SNAKE, PET???

Hopper operates Hopper's Nurseries and station on North Fisher Street. The huge rattler was captured by Hopper in January on the V. C. Bradford ranch East of Goldthwaite. He did have several more but at the present time he has only this one to feed and care for. Hopper reports that this rattler has shed his skin three times this spring, twice during the past month. The snake apparently goes blind for two or three days and then when the eyes clear up he sheds his skin. Hopper commented that Bradford not only raises good stock on his ranch, he also raises some pretty good size rattlesnakes.

Voters of Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1, turned down a \$600,000 bond issue in special election here Tuesday, according to unofficial returns.

The bonds were defeated when 381 voted against the issue while 146 voted for the proposal. A total of 527 votes were cast. Election returns are to be canvassed at the next meeting of the board of supervisors.

The proposed bonds were to finance getting water for the City of Goldthwaite from the Colorado River. The program as outlined by engineers for the city included pumping facilities at the river, off-channel storage reservoir, filtration plant and 10 inch pipe line from the river to the city.

Tuesday's vote was in marked contrast with the one on May 31, when the water district was approved and supervisors elected by voters. At that time voters approved the district by nearly two to one vote, with 198 voting for and 107 against. Creating the district and electing supervisors was part of an overall program to provide an adequate water supply for the city for many years to come.

Summer Revival To Begin Sunday At Goldthwaite Baptist Church

Sunday marks the beginning of the Summer Revival at the First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite.

Services will continue through Sunday, August 7, each night at eight o'clock. Week-day services, Monday through Friday, will be at ten o'clock each morning.

These services will climax an intensive four week "Prove Your Love" attendance campaign in the church.

Evangelist for the revival will be Dr. Gordon Clinard, professor of preaching, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth. Dr. Clinard, a native of Tennessee, has served in this position since 1955. He was

formerly pastor at First Baptist Church, Burleson, and First Baptist Church, Huntsville. He is to preach the principal sermon at the Texas Baptist Convention at Lubbock this fall.

The music director will be Dale Gore, Minister of Music and Youth, at First Baptist Church, Brownwood. Organist will be Mrs. Glynn Delapp, and the pianist will be Miss Lynetta Duren. There will be special music at every service.

All are invited to these revival services. "It is hoped that all will be blessed as they take advantage of these services," states Presnal H. Wood, pastor of the church.

supply and costs of each. Included in the survey and study was additional wells, which was ruled out by engineers because of the continuing decrease in the water level of city wells.

The water level of city wells had dropped from 80 feet to 30 feet during the past 10 years. It has decreased 50 per cent in the past five years, according to city records.

Supervisors had estimated that a tax of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation (based on one-third of market value) would be necessary to retire the proposed \$600,000 bond issue. The water district includes Goldthwaite and a limited area outside the city limits.

The city has been short of water every summer for many years, running out earlier some years than others. City officials have been under pressure for years from residents who requested that something be done to provide sufficient water.

The State Board of Water Engineers has scheduled a hearing next Monday on the City's application for 1,500 acre feet of water a year to be taken from the Colorado River. This would include 800 acre feet for municipal needs and 700 acre feet for industrial uses each year.

It wasn't known Wednesday what effect the bond issue defeat might have on the water hearing.

In commenting on the election results, W. C. Barnett, city manager, said: "Our job was not done well enough, too many people failed to realize the seriousness of the situation. Too many people were un-informed and were mis-informed by those un-informed about the facts of the case."

"This is just the beginning and not the end of our job on this program, if we are to save our town. We need to adopt a more optimistic attitude and not a defeatist outlook," he concluded.

They are working under the supervision of Mrs. C. G. Cruzcosa, Jr., R. N., who is instructing them from the R. N. manual for first year nursing students.

Senior Life Saving Course To Start At Pool Monday Evening

A senior life saving course of instructions will start at the swimming pool in Goldthwaite Monday August 1, if there is sufficient interest for a class, it was announced this week by Howard B. Campbell, Red Cross Water Safety Instructor.

Campbell announced that because of conflicting activities that are scheduled for the month of August it will be necessary to have the instructions from 5 to 7 p. m.

He has had a number of requests for the course and is inviting all persons who have had their sixteenth birthday and feel they can qualify for the course to contact him this week. If there are not enough seniors (16 years and older) he will take a limited number of juniors (14 and 15 years old) to make up a class. The class will be limited to 20 students.

Senior life saving course minimum requirements are as follows:

- 1) Persons who have passed their 16th birthday and are in sound physical condition.
 - 2) Do a standing front dive, reasonably good form.
 - 3) Swim 440 yards (may use different strokes).
 - 4) Dive from surface to a depth of six feet under water, and swim underwater a minimum of 15 feet in length.
 - 5) Tread water one minute.
 - 6) Be able to float motionless for period of one minute (instructor will teach this phase in cases where they don't already meet requirement).
- The course consists of 17 hard

and strenuous hours and one must attend every class. You cannot enroll the second or third day or any day after enrollment the first day.

Visitors will be welcome if they remain quiet and not interfere with instructions or students working.

No 14 and 15 year olds will be admitted to enroll for junior instructions and requirements except to fill a class to maximum of 20 students. Senior (16 year and older) will have first choice to enroll. Campbell stated.

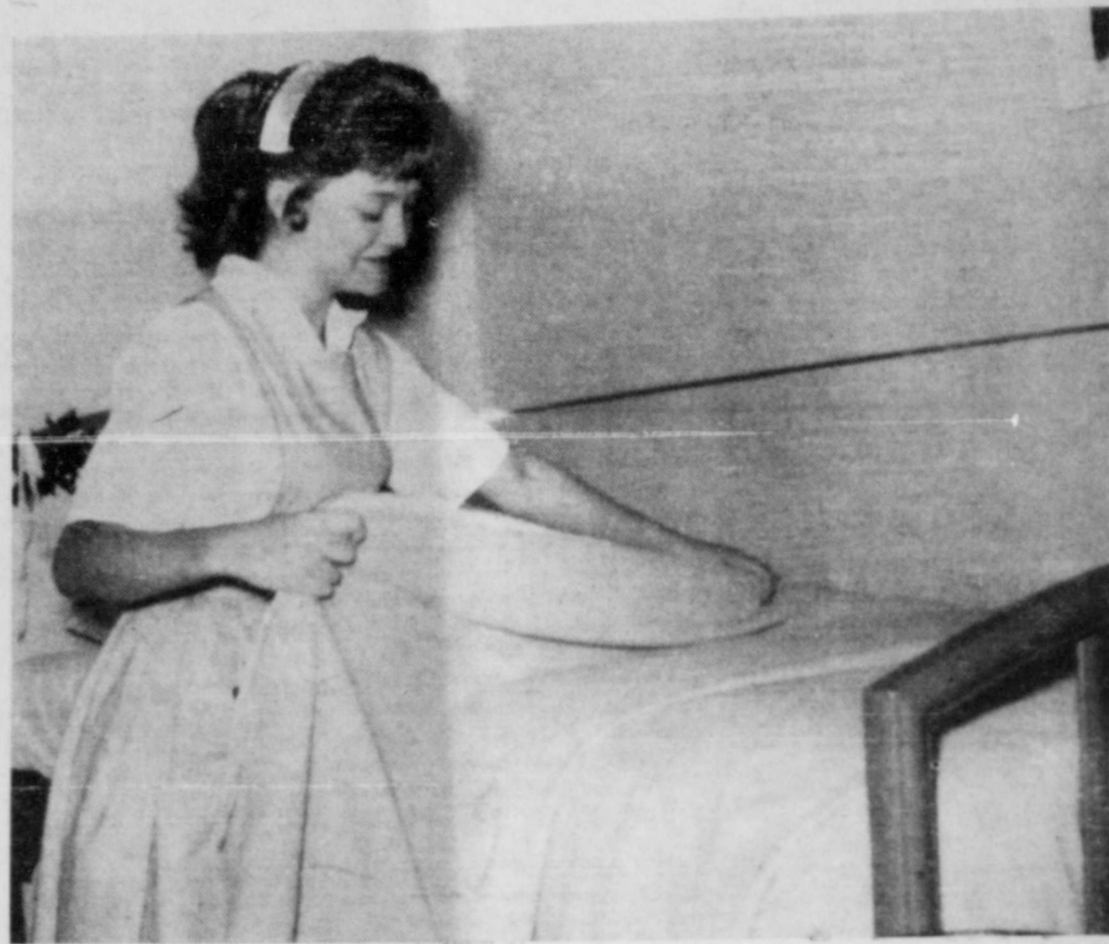

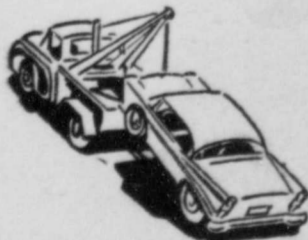

IRRIGATION OF TEXAS SOILS

The great demand for irrigation water makes soil and water management increasingly important in crop production.

Much more efficient use of the water and soil resources for crop production will be received if the dwindling water supplies are to be conserved and used most effectively. Since the competition among agriculture, industry, and municipalities for water will become greater in the future, it will be necessary for each segment to make the most efficient use of its share of water if the public interests are to be served in the most effective manner.

When a farmer changes from dryland to irrigation farming, he often overlooks the importance of the relationships which exist among soil, water and plants. Good irrigation practices also must take into account such important factors as soil fertility, amount and quality of water, adapted crops and varieties, land preparation for irrigation, water distribution over the land, irrigation timing to suit crop needs, rate of water application for a particular soil type, capacity of soils to store and release water, rates of seeding and root development and distribution within the soil storage reservoir for obtaining both water and plant nutrients.

The variable distribution of rainfall continues to be the most important factor affecting the yield and quality of crops in Texas. As a result, the irrigated acreage has grown from approximately 1 million acres in 1939 to about 7 million acres in 1959. This expansion has come about largely by individual development of ground-water resources.

Since soil and climatic conditions vary greatly over Texas,

it is impossible to give a set of rules for irrigation which can be applied to every problem area. However, by studying and considering all aspects of the interrelated soil - plant - water system, the irrigation farmer should be in a much better position to work out a suitable soil and water management program for his farm. It is of major importance that the irrigator be more concerned about what is taking place below the soil surface than he is about the conditions above it.

In many cases, special problems will exist on individual farms. If a farmer cannot cope successfully with a particular problem concerning soils and irrigation, he should consult a local representative of the state or federal agency concerned for additional technical help.

Corsicana is a famous oil center and is located approximately 50 miles south of Dallas, Texas.

Texas has been the home of many great and courageous men. A few words describing their feats often can imply the magnitude of their character.

Such are the words on a marker on the highway southwest of Llano, in Central Texas, which reads: "Enchanted Rock. From its summit, in the fall of 1841, Captain John C. Hays, while surrounded by Comanche Indians who cut him off from his ranging company, repulsed the whole band and inflicted upon them such heavy losses that they fled."

Sam Houston was converted and baptized in Rocky Creek in 1854, 18 years before they built the Old Baptist Church that now stands at Independence, in Central Texas.

A monument stone on the bell tower by the church reads, "She sleeps within its sound." Reference is to Mrs. Nancy Lea, mother of Houston's wife. She donated her silver service to be melted into the bell.

The tower was erected with stones from the ruins of the original Baylor building. Judge Baylor's hearthstone is said to be included in the tower.

Historic old Fort Bliss, established in 1848, was rebuilt by the city and county of El Paso in 1948. They built it as an exact reproduction of the original fort, but on a miniature scale.

This miniature fort now is on permanent display at the new Fort Bliss in El Paso.

We all knew Texas was big but we didn't know it was so old until the discovery of the Midland Skull in 1954.

Scientists estimated this human skull, found in a prehistoric water hole, to be over 12,000 years old. This may be the oldest skull ever discovered on earth. If so, it means that human beings lived in the Ice Age with the huge Mammoths.

It's an art lover's paradise. But you really don't have to be an art lover to enjoy the Indian Pictographs drawn on the rock cliffs of INDIAN SHELTER CLIFF.

This pictorial cliff is located about 25 miles north of Fredericksburg—near Doss, Texas—and close to the scenic old Lange's Water Mill.

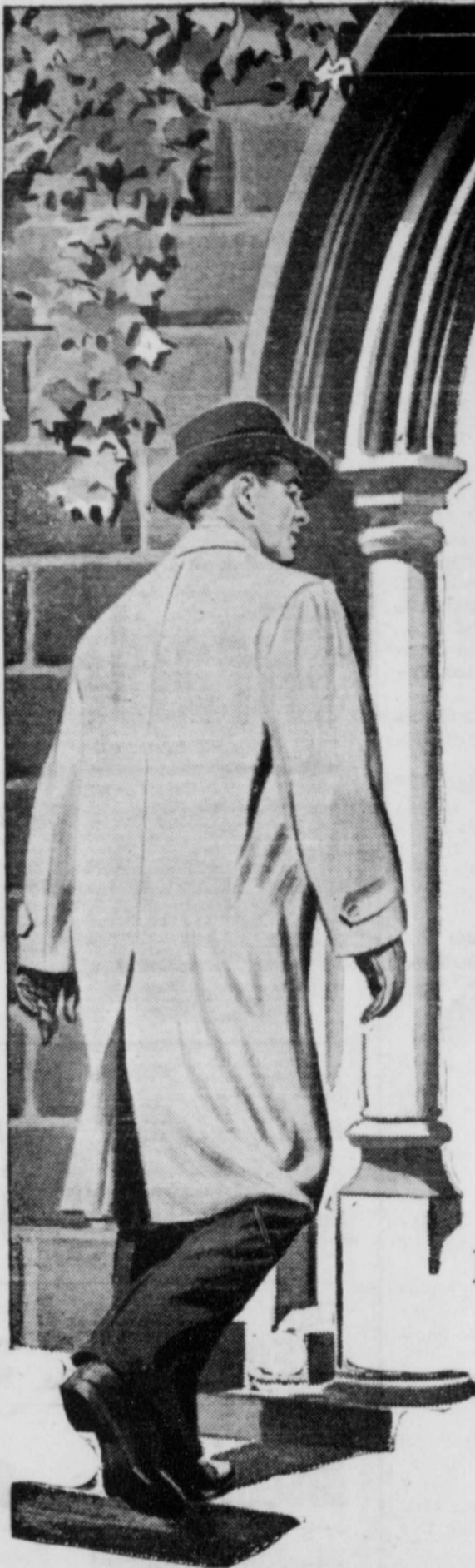

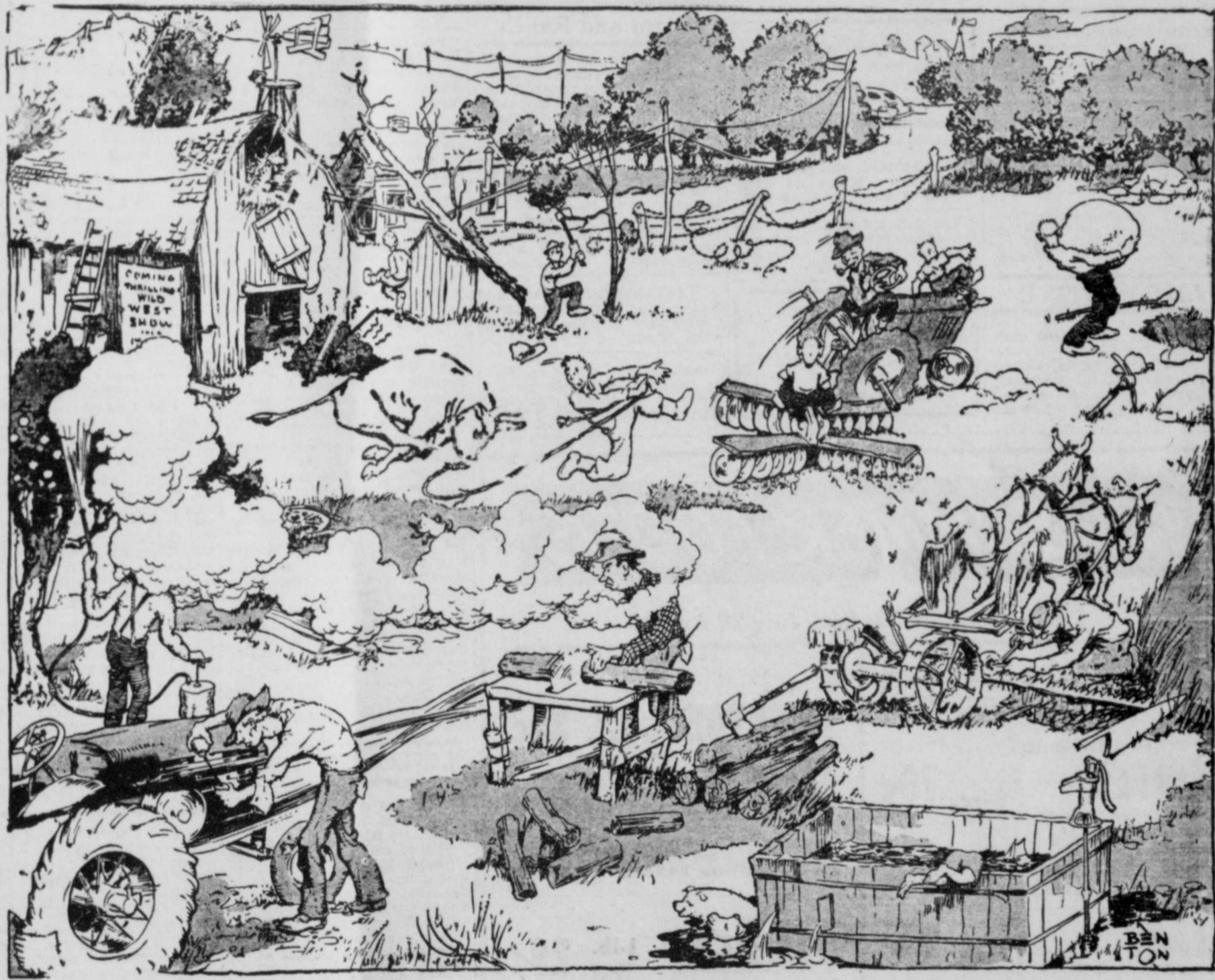

Some Receiving Social Security Eligible For Refigured Payments

Some Mills County residents who are receiving Social Security benefits may be eligible to have their monthly payments refigured, according to Maurice M. Chastain, District Manager of the Temple Social Security Office.

Those who may have their benefits recomputed include (1) persons who filed their original application for benefits in 1959 and their 1959 earnings were not used in computing their benefit; or (2) beneficiaries who earned over \$1200 in covered wages or self-employment last year or other years since their

benefit was last figured. A representative of the Social Security Administration will be in Goldthwaite at the Department of Public Welfare on July 14 and 28 at 8:30 a. m. Applications for recomputations may be filed at that time. Self-employed persons who apply should bring a copy of their 1959 income tax returns and their cancelled checks showing that the social security tax was paid.

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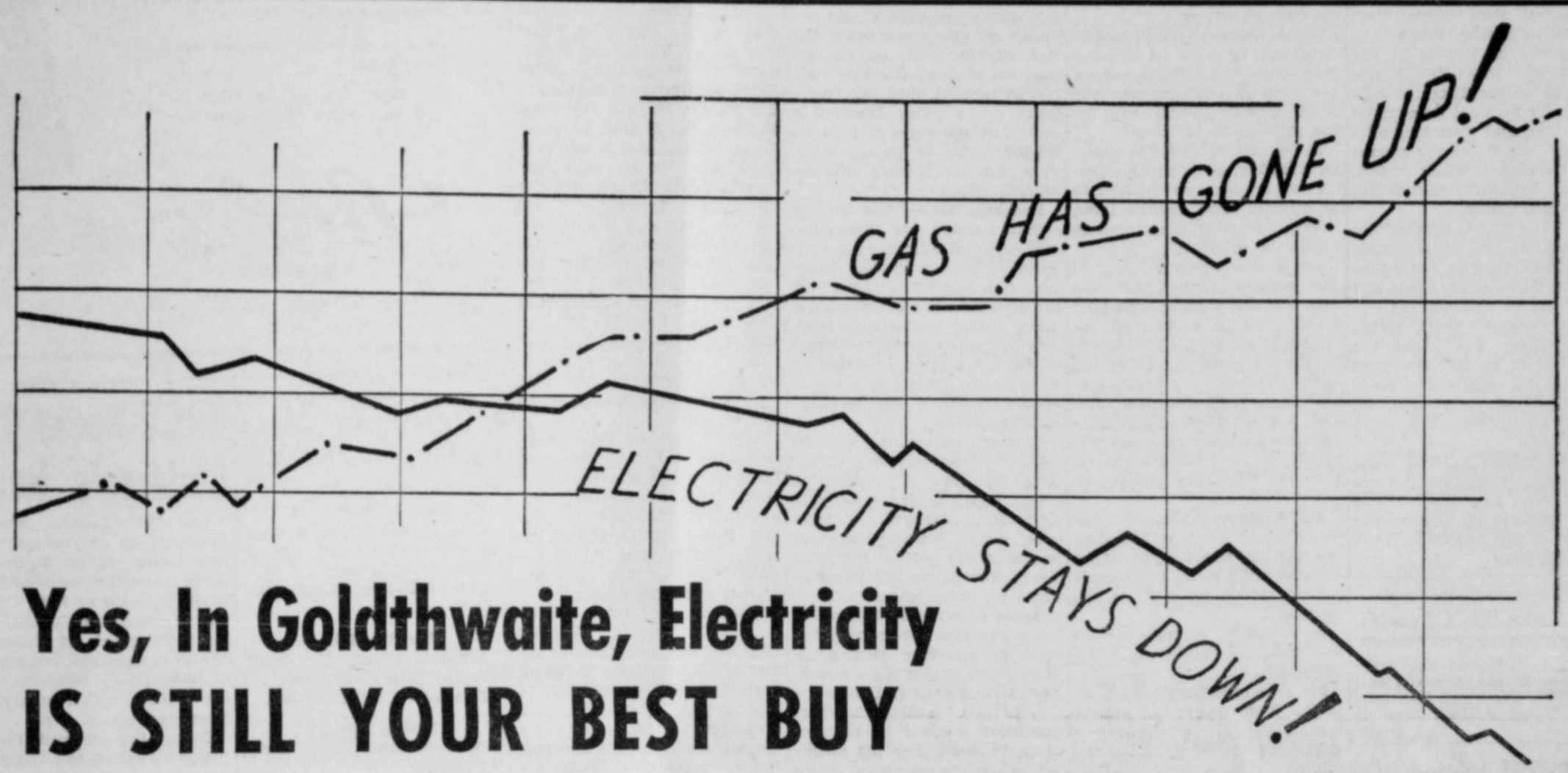
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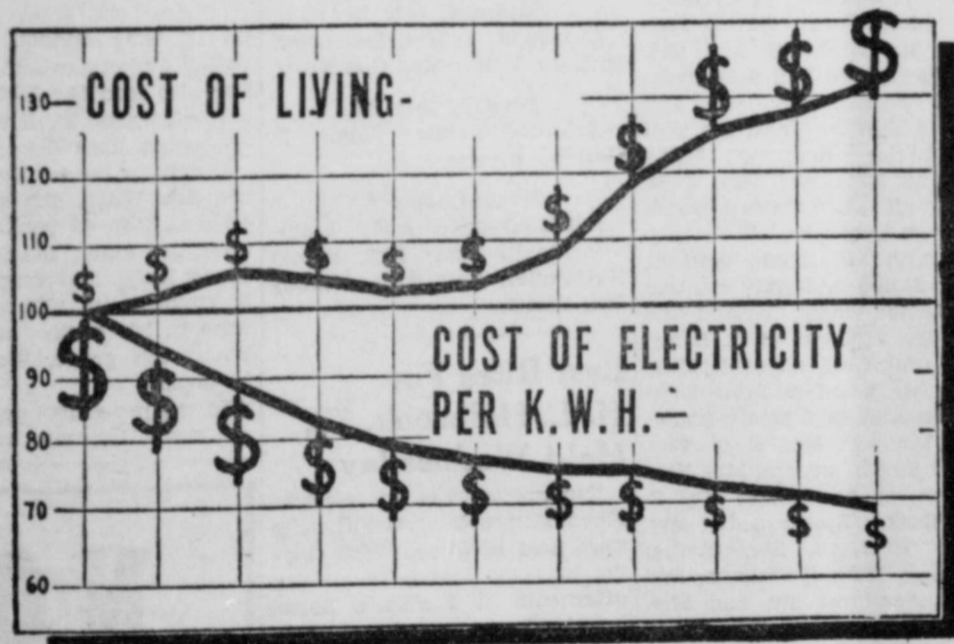

Austin, Texas — Things are rather quiet around the State Capitol these days.

For one thing, it's the "off season," the hiatus that regularly occurs between state elections and the convening of a new Legislature.

For another, it's vacation time with a part of almost every agency staff off to forget it all for a time.

But mostly, for this week, the Austin lull stems from most people's suspenseful interest in the activity of Texans in Los Angeles. Gov. Price Daniel, vice chairman of the Texas delegation to the National Democratic Convention, and numerous others have been away for several weeks working in behalf of Sen. Lyndon Johnson's nomination for the presidency.

Despite these distractions, state government goes on. Studies are under way on many subjects, on budgets, tax plans and other future legislation. It's important work, but quiet, during this digging and analyzing stage. It'll break into the news next fall as reports are made and trial balloons are run up on bills to be introduced in January.

Surest indication that state government is still on the job is that even now it's hard to find a parking place near the Capitol or the adjoining state office buildings.

During the summer a dozen or so parking slots by the Capitol's east entrance are set aside for tourists. As a rule, tourists don't keep them filled, and Capitol guards are regularly beset by the persuasiveness of local people who need a place "just for a minute."

No Turning Back—Child adoption procedures, under Texas law, are about as final as a thing can be—more so than marriage or divorce.

Texas Supreme Court underlined this in a recent decision that denied the right to change her mind to a mother who had given written permission for her children to be adopted.

In the case at issue, the mother, a widow, gave written permission for her two children to be adopted. Two months later, having remarried, she sought to regain the children.

Lower courts held in favor of the natural mother, but the Supreme Court ruled that only fraud could be a basis for revoking of adoption consent. Said the court opinion of the adoption laws: "The Legislature had the safety, education, care and protection of the children uppermost in mind and not primarily the contentment or welfare of either the natural or adoptive parents."

No Misunderstanding—In another ruling involving adoption, the Supreme Court held that an adopted child could not inherit a trust set up for a direct descendant.

As a result, a four-year-old boy lost the chance to claim \$830,000.

In the case originating in Dallas, lower courts had upheld the child's claim to the money from his late grandfather's estate.

In his will, the grandfather had instructed that the \$830,000 trust be set up if "any child of my son is born after my death." High court ruled that this made it highly unlikely that the maker of the will intended the money to go to a child born to persons other than his son and daughter-in-law.

Road Closed—If Texas' truck licensing law had a loophole you could drive a truck through the State Supreme Court has, in effect, halted the traffic.

High court ruled that a motor freight line cannot register and pay license fees on its trucks in Texas and use Mississippi licenses on its trailers. Texas' fee for a truck trailer is \$226, compared to \$10 in Mississippi.

Reading, Riding And Driving—State Board of Education took a jaundiced view of a proposal of state-supported driver education in public schools. Plea for driver education, one of the main planks in Governor Daniel's program for increased traffic safety, was presented by Brad Smith, director of the governor's Highway Safety Commission.

"Driver education in the schools is the only way to reduce the flow of uneducated drivers into the stream of traffic," Smith declared. A statewide driver training program has been the goal of the huge Texas Federation of Women's Clubs for some years.

Board members said they felt the matter did not properly belong in a school curriculum. They declined to make a recommendation to the Legislature.

Legal Test Probable—Board of Education decided to consider again in September the dilemma of school districts which stand to lose their state aid money under terms of a 1957 law governing school integration.

Under this law, districts which integrate without approval in a local election automatically lose state aid.

Dallas and Houston schools are under federal court order to integrate this fall. Houston voters turned down integration. Dallas' election is set for Aug. 6.

State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar said he had written Houston and Dallas school authorities telling them their state aid would have to be cut off if they integrated without a voter mandate.

Board discussed seeking an attorney general's opinion on the problem, probably in September after the Dallas election.
