After the driver realized his brakes were out he tried to shift to lower gear and when this failed it left the truck out of gear and without brakes.

He herded the truck at an estimated 50 miles per hour across two railroad tracks, through a traffic signal at the northeast corner of the square going west through the busy block on the

north side of the courthouse square, passing the post office corner and out West Fourth Street past the Methodist Church and down a steep grade to the end of the street through a fence and out into a mesquite patch where he made a turn and stopped the truck.

S. D. (Sig) Jernigan who had a ringside seat for the event gave this eye witness account of what happened.

"I was driving north on Fisher Street and came up over the

hill at the Eagle office.

"As I approached the traffic signal at Fourth Street it was green and I noticed the big truck coming from the East and I knew right away that he couldn't stop.

"I sat down on my brakes and stopped. Some darn fool behind me started to honk for me to go. I kept holding my brakes and looking at the truck coming on.

"About that time I noticed a car coming from the North at slow speed approaching the in-

tersection while the traffic light was still on green. Just then the big truck 'barrelled' across the intersection. It clipped the front fender of the car with its right rear trailer wheels and kept going.

"It went through the block on the North side of the courthouse with cars parked solid along the curb and in the center of the street and everything kept clear.

"I started to follow. As I did the truck rolled past the post office corner down grade and

up grade. When he went over the hill and down the grade at the Methodist Church I could see a cloud of dust as he hit the dirt streets below.

"When I got to where the truck was the driver had it stopped out in a mesquite patch.

"The driver was pretty well shook up and in a cold sweat. It took one of the boys from the Equipment Company to drive the truck out of the field."

The car hit at the intersection downtown was occupied by five

women traveling from Throckmorton to Austin. None were injured.

Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield, who investigated, said: "That was most fortunate, the town was fortunate. If that truck had hit a car or truck broad side downtown and gone into a building no telling how many people would have been killed and how much property damage would have resulted."

The driver commented later that evening: "I died 900 times as I went through town."

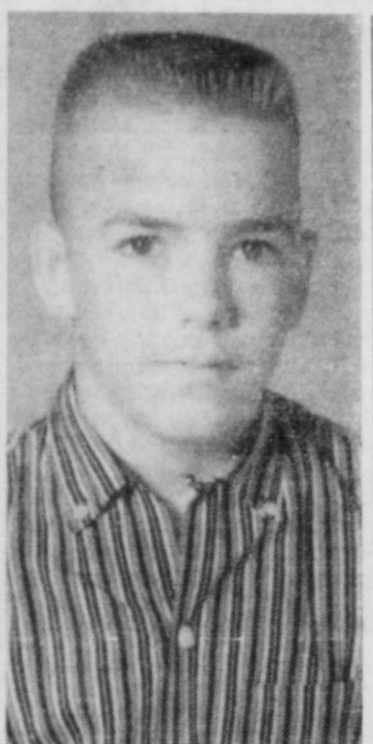
After hearing from a number of representatives from over the county the Court recessed until Monday, August 22, when the matter will come up again. At that time definite plans for combining boxes will be considered.

## Construction Started On \$300,000 Power Line To Supply Goldthwaite

Construction is now under way on a new 69,000 volt electric line to supply electricity to the city of Goldthwaite.

The line is being built by Lower Colorado River Authority from San Saba to Goldthwaite. In addition to the line the project also includes two sub stations, one at the end of the line.

Estimated cost of the overall project is \$300,000. The job is completed by November 1.

The new line will replace the 100 volt line from Lometa to Goldthwaite sub station south of the city. It will increase the voltage of the line supplying the

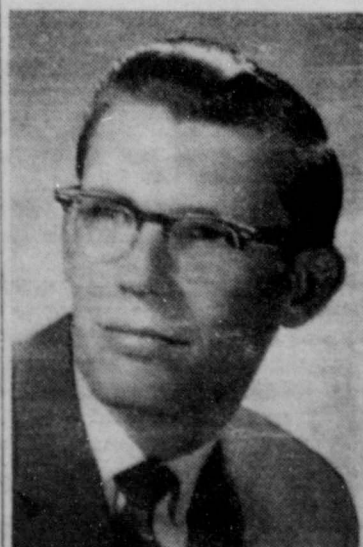

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**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**—Voters will have a chance to ballot on four constitutional amendments in the upcoming general election on November 8.

Constitutional amendments are now being published in this paper.

We invite our readers to study each of them in order to be better informed on what these amendments cover.

Here is a brief digest of the four constitutional amendments to be voted upon.

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 39)**—Authorizes the Legislature to create hospital districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, and sets forth certain powers, duties and limitations.

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)**—Increases the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board to three and one-half per cent.

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 3)**—This bill is what is known as the "Annual Salary Bill" for legislators. It provides for an annual salary of not to exceed \$4,800 for each legislator, and a per diem allowance of not to exceed \$12 a day for the first 120 days of each regular session and for 30 days of each special session as maximum compensation for members of the Legislature. Also it limits the regular session to 140 days.

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 6)**—Authorizes the Legislature to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per cent per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; provides that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; provides for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event of cancellation of or refusal to grant any permit.

## Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to read: "The Legislature shall fix the maximum compensation for members of the Legislature: limiting the regular session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and forty (140) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication."

"The addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles; the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from the place of residence of the member to the seat of government, and from the seat of government to the place of residence of the member."

"Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and forty (140) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication."

"Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State."

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Texas—About a dozen state agencies thus far have presented their budget requests for the 1960-62 biennium.

As yet, none has failed to ask for more money than it's presently getting.

Many agencies cite Texas, growing population as justification for expansion. They say, in effect, that they are in the same position as the housewife who has to put another potato in the pot to set another plate at the table.

Others seek to woo state funds with a "bread cast upon waters" approach. They contend that money spent on developing the state's resources will come back

multiplied in the form of increased state revenue.

Almost all emphasize the difficulties of luring and holding highly trained personnel at present state salaries. Some say, too, that they've been working with a too-short stick for years and need some "keep up with the times" improvements.

Budget proposals are presently being studied by the Legislative Budget Board and the Governor's budget staff. Each will make recommendations, and the final decision will be made next year by the Legislature.

With a money-short, tax-fighting session ahead, it won't be easy for anyone.

These budget requests have been added to those already under study:

**State Parks**—An investment in state parks is an investment in the Texas tourist industry and a potentially rich source of additional funds for the state treasury.

This is the theme of the State Parks Board in asking for a \$2,000,000 appropriation for the next two years. This is almost double the present spending level.

Of this million-dollar-a-year appropriation, the Board proposes to use \$700,000 a year for improvements, \$300,000 a year for administration.

Texas, says parks director Bill Collins, spends less on its state parks than Rhode Island. He cited figures showing that Texas would get \$81,000,000 a year more in tax revenue if each out-of-state visitor stayed in the

state one more day.

**General Land Office**—A bigger budget is asked by the General Land Office and Veterans Land Board to assure the state's realizing full value from the resources of state-owned lands.

A two-year budget of \$3,042,339 is asked.

Land Office noted the state now has clear title to 8,000 square miles of tidelands. It wants to employ three oil scouts and a geological director to explore the development of the tidelands' mineral resources. Altogether, 29 new land office employees are being asked.

Land Office claims that for every dollar it has spent in the past 22 years, \$90.18 has been returned to the state treasury in revenue.

**Agriculture**—Complexities of increasingly scientific farming put greater demands on the State Department of Agriculture, says Commissioner John C. White.

His "sink or swim" budget request is for \$3,061,421 for the coming two-year period. This compares with a \$1,930,966 appropriation for the present period.

White said the "chemical revolution" in agriculture today puts heavy responsibilities on his department. He also asked for more equipment and more salaries for personnel to check weights and measures.

**Highways**—State Highway Department is asking for a two-year allocation of \$698,600,000.

Of this, \$348,300,000 would be for the 1961-62 period; \$350,300,000 for the 1962-63 period. This compares with \$337,000,000 spent by the Highway Department in 1959.

Most of the highway revenue comes from special earmarked sources, such as the gasoline tax, license fees, etc. Department is asking \$600,000 from the general revenue fund to be used for tourist advertising.

**Game And Fish**—Game and Fish Commission is asking for what it calls a "status quo" budget, except for salary raises for some of its top technical personnel.

Commission is asking for \$12,034,945 for the coming two-year period compared to \$11,593,651 for the present biennium.

Executive Director Howard Dodgen declared the commission's top echelon employees are "grossly underpaid" for highly trained persons, some with master's degrees.

**State Colleges**—Three Colleges, East Texas State, Stephen F. Austin State and Sam Houston State Teachers College, have told the Commission on Higher Education they need more money.

These requests, along with all those from state-supported colleges and universities, will be studied and screened by the Higher Education Commission before a recommendation is presented to legislative and executive budget officials.

**Where To Get It**—With new spending requests piling up, the search for new money-making plans is ranging far and wide.

Four broad-based tax plans are being considered by tax hunting sub-committee of the Governor's State Finance Advisory Commission.

They are: (1) a payroll tax, paid half by employers, half by employees, (2) a utilities customers tax adding a percentage to all utility bills, (3) a business activity tax which would combine some of the features of payroll, gross receipts and corporate income taxes and (4) a transfer which would be similar to a sales tax.

Other ideas suggested to the panel include higher taxes on liquor and beer, sales tax on soft drinks and restaurant meals and a tax on sporting events.

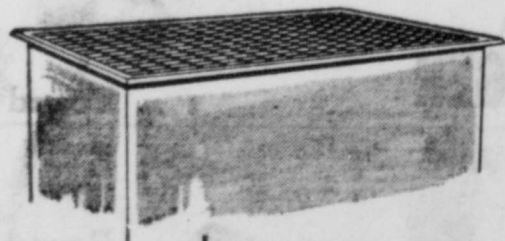

#### REGULAR MEETING OF THE GOLDTHWAITE ISD BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education met  
in regular session on August 8,  
1960, with Dale Reid, President,

Conrad and L. B. Burnham all  
attending and on time. Visi-

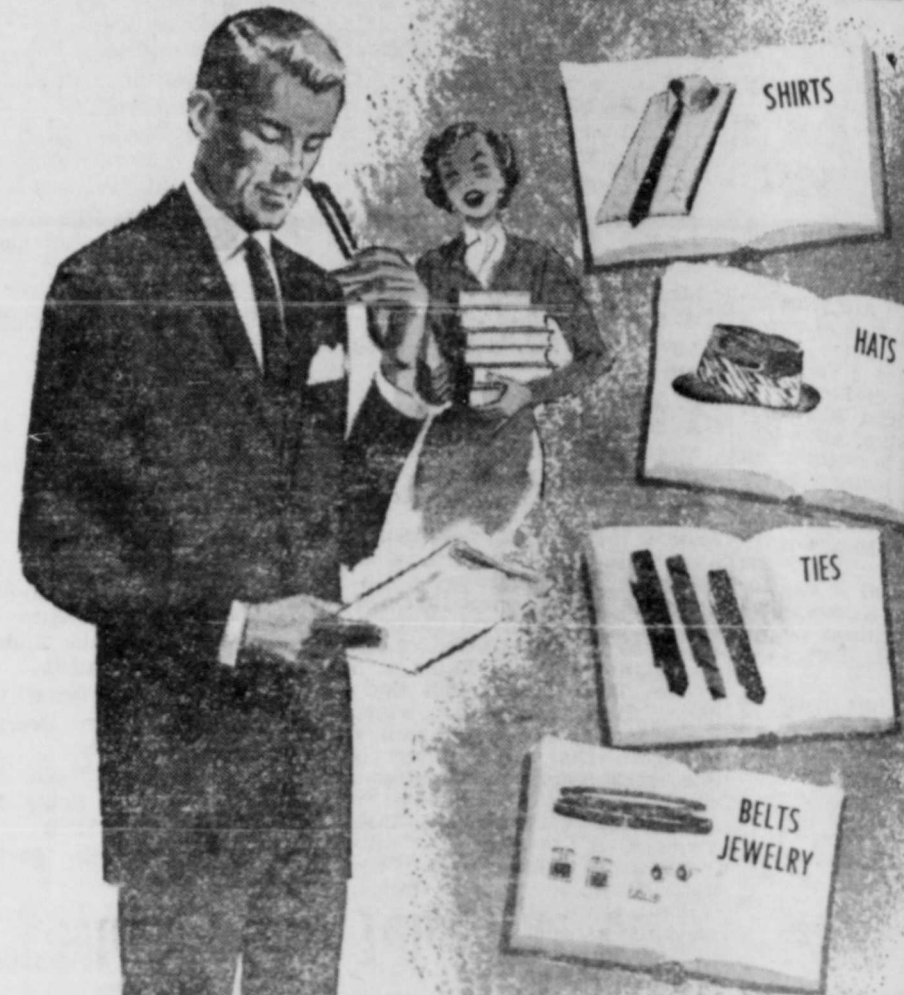
