## School Board

Adopts Budget

Board of education of Goldthwaite Independent School District has adopted a budget for an expenditure of \$15,894 for the 1960-61 school year. The budget cost is the largest in the district and totals \$15,894. Second largest item is for transportation, and service runs a close second at an expenditure of \$15,894. The entire budget amounts to \$15,894, or an average for the district of \$158 each for the 500 students, according to J. T. Jones, superintendent. Jones also stated this is considerably more than neighboring schools.

# SOLILOQUY

**VOTERS ATTENTION**—In this issue of the Eagle there appears the full text of the four Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election (Nov. 8).

So that you may be fully informed, we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before going to the polls to cast your vote.

Here is a brief digest of the four Constitutional Amendments to be voted on.

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 39)**—Authorizes the Legislature to create hospital districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, and sets forth certain powers, duties and limitations.

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)**—Increases the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board to three and one-half per cent.

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 3)**—This bill is what is known as the "Annual Salary Bill" for legislators. It provides for an annual salary of not to exceed \$4,800 for each legislator, and a per diem allowance of not to exceed \$12 a day for the first 120 days of each regular session and for 30 days of each special session as maximum compensation for members of the Legislature. Also it limits the regular session to 140 days.

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 6)**—Authorizes the Legislature to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per cent per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; Provides that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; provides for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event of cancellation of or refusal to grant any permit.

We call this to your attention again this week because this is the last publication of the amendments. Possibly some have not taken time to read the amendments before and it is our hope that this last minute reminder will give everyone an opportunity to read them and know what is to be voted on.

## Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto new Sections to be known as Sections 6, 7, and 8, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of Hospital Districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain state limitations; providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; providing for the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended by adding the following Sections which shall read as follows:

"Section 6. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 6(a), of the Constitution of Texas, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Lamar County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be seventy-five cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation.

"Section 7. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Hidalgo County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 6(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Hidalgo County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hidalgo County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be seventy-five cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District subject to district taxation.

"Section 8. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District to be co-extensive with the limits of County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, Texas.

"If such District is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75¢) on the (One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxing voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections as long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of seventy-five cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the Commissioners Precinct

No. 4 of Comanche County. "If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within the District may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the District shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the bonds and warrants of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the District to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially shall be payable from said seventy-five cent (75¢) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the District.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Comanche to render financial aid that District by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the District (whether assumed or created by the District) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed ten cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the County except without the County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the District shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the County in the manner provided hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries co-extensive with the District, and the County shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the County.

"(c) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO CREATE A HOSPITAL DISTRICT CO-EXTENSIVE WITH LAMAR AND HIDALGO COUNTIES, AND CO-EXTENSIVE WITH COUNTY COMMISSIONERS PRECINCT NO. 4 OF COMANCHE COUNTY."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

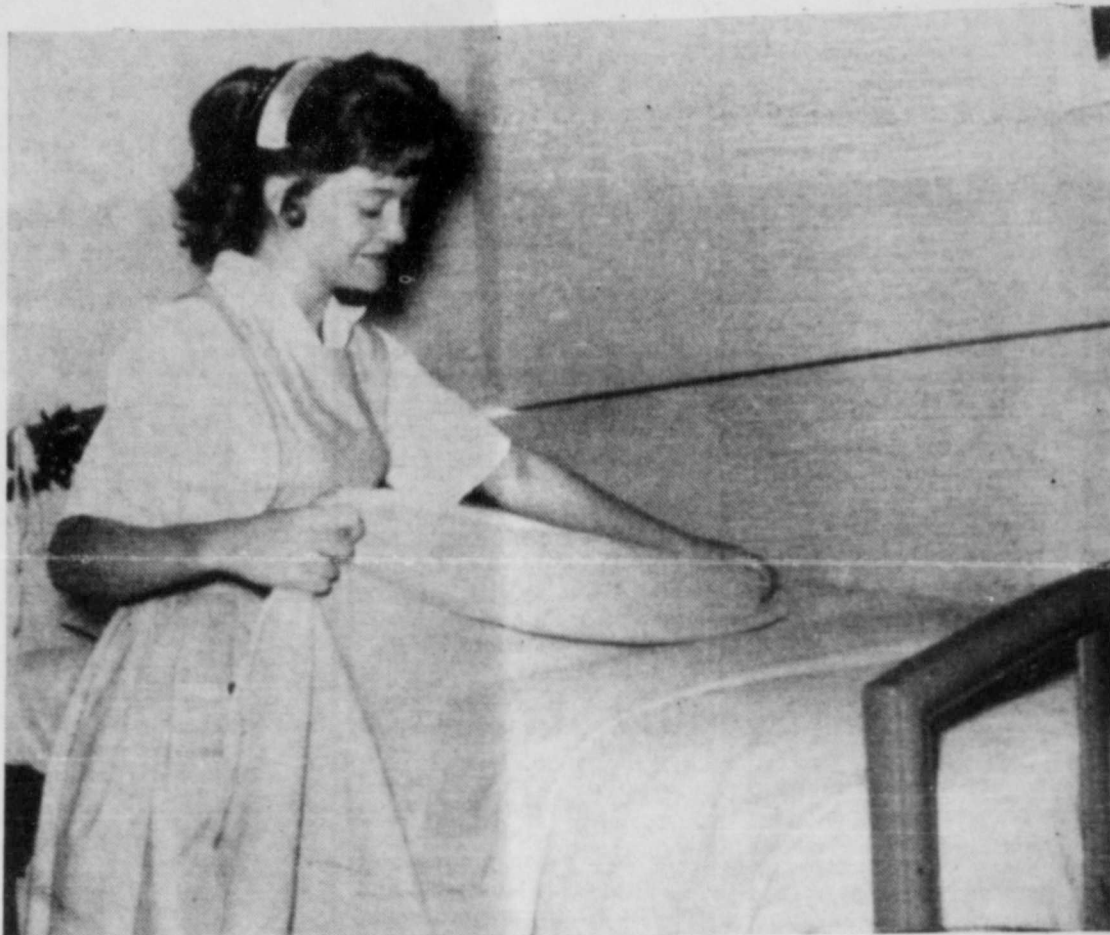

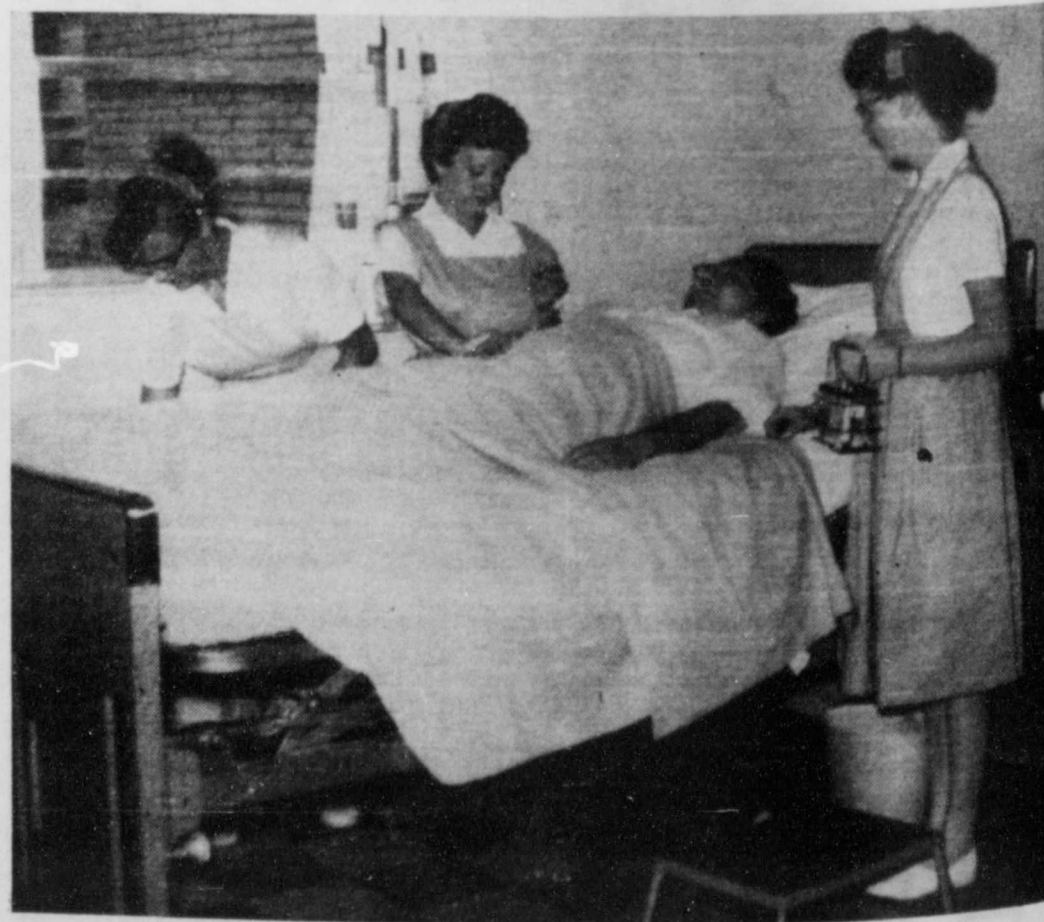

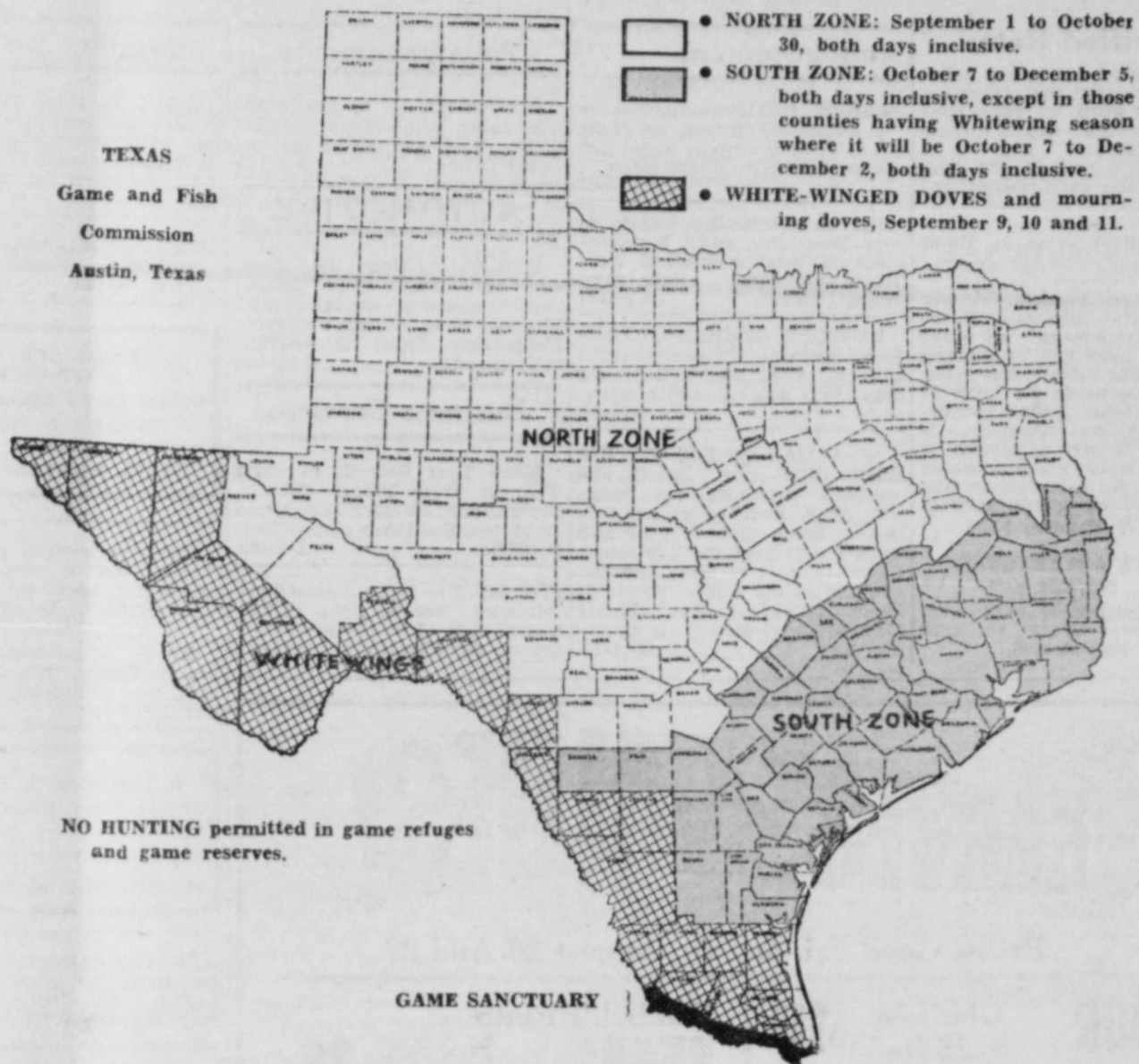
## MOURNING DOVE—WHITE-WINGED DOVE

### Open Seasons 1960

MOURNING DOVES: Daily bag limit—15. Possession limit—not to exceed 30.

WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—10.

NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-winged doves are possessed—Possession limit—30, in the aggregate, and not more than 10 may be white-winged doves.



SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U. S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary."

SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having white-wing season, where the shooting hours will be from 2 p. m. to sunset on September 9, 10 and 11 (consecutive days) only. White-winged doves, in season, 2 p. m. to sunset.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Section 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Interest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Should any regulatory agency, acting under the provisions of this Section, cancel or refuse to grant any permit under any law passed by the Legislature; then such applicant or holder shall have the right of appeal to the courts and granted a trial de novo as that term is used in appealing from the justice of peace court to the county court."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### CHARGE IT, PLEASE

These are magic words in a sense; yet, not so, for credit cannot take the place of income. It can only alter the time when money is spent. The day of reckoning always comes.

There are a number of cases when it may be wise to use credit. Such decisions need to be made through family discussions and planning.

In using any type of credit, families will do well to follow through on these suggestions:

1. Get acquainted with the various credit sources available before credit is needed.
2. Build up a credit rating by beginning with smaller amounts, paying promptly.
3. Borrow for as short a time as possible in order to keep interest charges at a minimum.
4. Borrow on the best terms available. The family with a good character, adequate capacity, or some capital, can usually get the best terms.
5. Understand the terms and meet them promptly.

### CONTROL HOUSEHOLD INSECTS

Warm weather brings insects of all kinds. Flies, ants, mosquitoes, moths and other insects endanger health, feed on fabrics, contaminate food and are general nuisances. Use up-to-date control measures to fight these insects. A leaflet compiled by extension entomologists of Texas A&M College offers directions for choosing and applying insecticides.

This handy leaflet, "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects," classifies all major pests except the termite into

specific categories relating to type of damage. Insects are illustrated for easy identification, and concise control measures are given for each insect. Also listed are some important cautions to observe in using insecticides.
