Kerby And Elms Angoras Win Top Honors At 4th Annual Show

Bob Kerby, Goldthwaite, and Mrs. W. A. Elms, Mullin, showed the grand champion billy and grand champion doe, respectively, at the fourth annual Central Texas Registered Angora Breeders' Association show and sale

here last Friday and Saturday. The grand champion buck sold for \$235 and the grand champion doe sold for \$210. A surprise of the sale was the reserve champion buck bringing \$439, a record price paid for a

single buck at the sale here the past four years.

Total sale receipts for the 131 bucks and 41 does were \$10,347.50. The top 25 bucks averaged \$122 and the top 10 does averaged \$77 each. The 41 does brought \$2,017.50, an average of \$49.20, while the 131 bucks sold for \$8,333.00, for an average of \$63.59 each.

The sale consisted of 131 billys and 41 does. It was considered satisfactory for both the seller and the buyer, according to V. Z. Cornelius, president of the association.

Bidding was consistent and sharp throughout the sale. As usual, the demand for the better goats created the most interest among the buyers. This year's consignment of goats was considered better than any previous consignment.

It is anticipated by the consignors that this will continue to improve as better stud bucks have been made available to the breeders of Mills County Registered Angora Goat Breeders' Association, as well as to adjoining counties.

Auctioneers were Pete Guley of Uvalde, Lem Jones of Cooperas Cove, and M. L. Jernigan of Goldthwaite. The goats were placed by Arthur Davis of Sabinal, Texas, national known judge.

Trophies were presented by Miss Putzi Schoenewolf of Lometa, Texas.

Bob Kerby, of Goldthwaite had the grand champion billy, and was presented \$106 by Hollis Blackwell Wool and Mohair Company, along with the Blackwell sterling silver trophy. This is the second time Mr. Kerby has had the grand champion billy.

Mrs. W. A. Elms had the grand champion doe, and was given this award by Sam H. Rahl & Co. of Goldthwaite. Mrs. Elms won the Blackwell sterling silver trophy for the champion doe. This being her third champion, she retains the silver trophy.

The reserve champion doe was also shown by Mrs. W. A. Elms and went to M. L. Jernigan for \$100. A \$25 award was presented by Ranchmen Wool and Mohair Co. of Brownwood, for this placement.

Contract Let For Improvements At North "Y", Highways 16 And 183

A contract for .05 mile of construction on U. S. 84 in Mills County has been awarded to a Fredericksburg firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Allen Keller Company submitted the low bid of \$82,528 on the project.

Channelize intersection, (grading, structures, base and surface) located at the intersection of State Highway 16 and U. S. 183 near the north city limits of Goldthwaite is expected to take 60 working days, according to Robt. J. Milligan, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood.

John M. Arthur, Resident Engineer at Goldthwaite will be in charge of the project while it is under construction.

The project will provide a new intersection for the two highways with an additional traffic lane. The big hill on the east side of present highway will be cut down and the existing highway grade will be lowered for a distance of about 2,500 feet.

Improvements will cut out the landscaped triangle as it appears today.

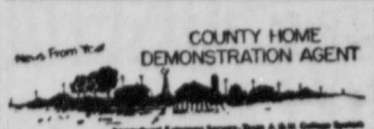

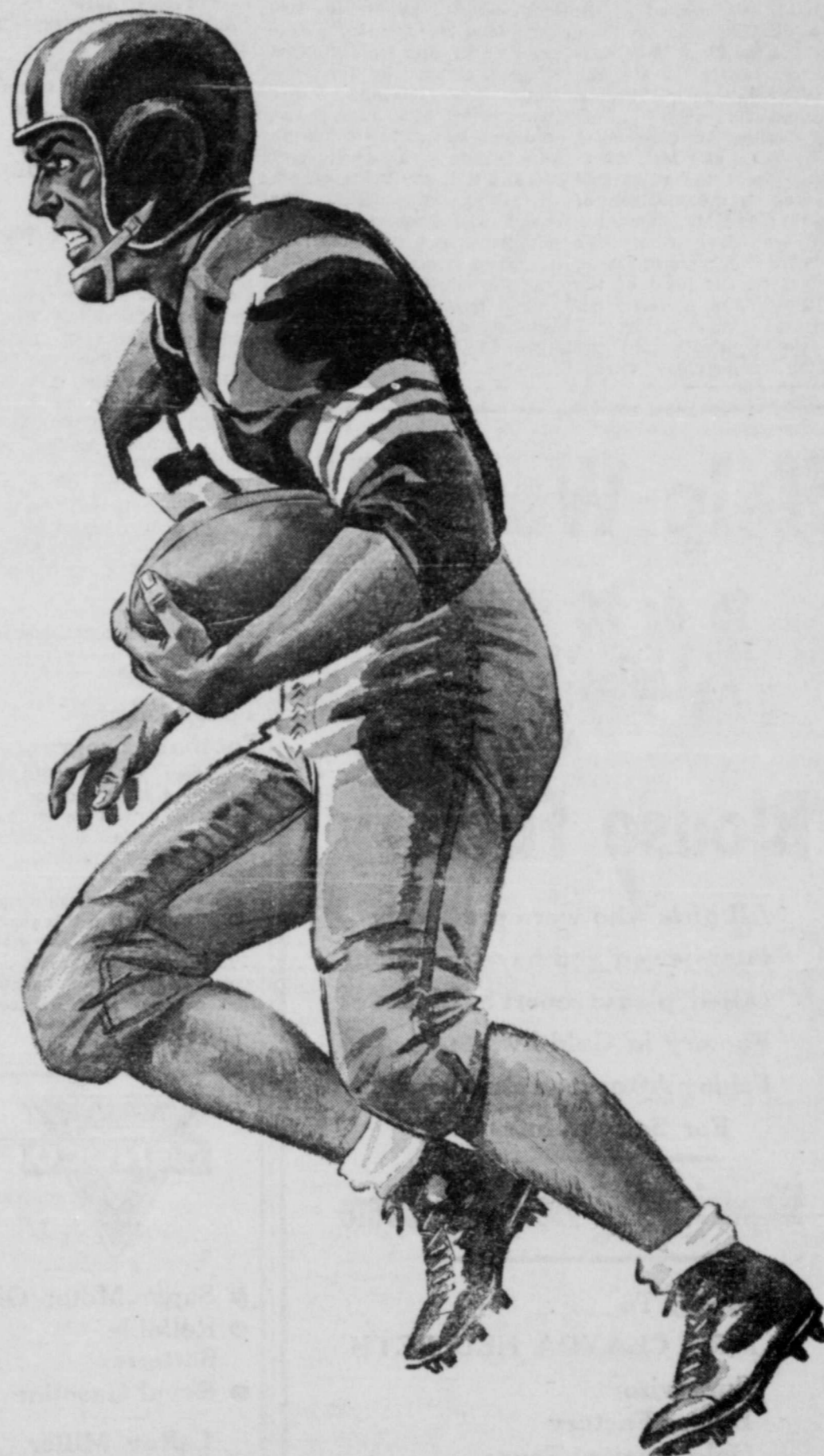

Overplanting Affects Future Wheat History

With seeding of the 1961 winter wheat crop about to get under way, growers are reminded that overplanting the farm's wheat allotment will usually have indirect as well as direct effects upon the farm's crop or operation.

According to E. L. Burkett, chairman of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, farmers generally understand very well that wheat from a farm where the wheat allotment has been exceeded is not eligible for price support. With a few exceptions, such as the 15-acre exemption provision and the feed wheat exemption, it will also be subject to marketing quota penalties. What is not so well understood, however, is that such overproduction can also reduce the farm's wheat allotments under a ruling provided by legislation enacted within recent years.

"If a farmer complies with his 1961 allotment," the Chairman explained, "the base acreage—which is the farm wheat acreage allotment plus the acreage diverted from wheat for the current year—will be considered as the farm's wheat acreage history for 1961 in determining future allotments."

"If the 'excess' wheat were stored or delivered to the Secretary of Agriculture as provided by regulation, the farm could then be credited with its base wheat acreage—instead of the allotment—in determining future allotments. But if the stored wheat were later used or marketed and a marketing quota penalty became due, then the farm would be considered as a noncomplying farm for such year when future wheat allotments for the farm were determined."

Mr. Burkett pointed out that the rule governing wheat history applies in all cases where the farm allotment is exceeded regardless of the size of the allotment. Thus, if the farm allotment is exceeded, a farm not subject to marketing quotas—such as a farm with 15 or less acres of wheat or a feed wheat farm with 30 or less acres of wheat—still would be credited only with the wheat allotment—not the base acreage—when future allotments were established. None of the wheat produced on a farm where the allotment is exceeded is eligible for price support.
