LIVESTOCK AUCTION REPORTS
Additional reports will be assigned later, eventually expanding the program to cover the entire state. In its opening phases, the project will cover 12 key markets in an area which is co-extensive with two of the six districts of the Texas Department of Agriculture. The program is a cooperative State and Federal undertaking.

Initial research to get the program under way has been conducted by the Texas Department of Agriculture, the Texas Extension Service and Texas A. and M. College in cooperation with the Texas Livestock Auction Association. Demand for such a reporting service has been widespread.

Expansion of livestock auction markets in Texas within the past few years has been exceptional, and currently there are more than 160 such markets operating in the State. A reliable, regular and accurate market news program to serve these sales outlets has been regarded as one of the prime necessities for their further orderly development.

Claimed By Death September 26**

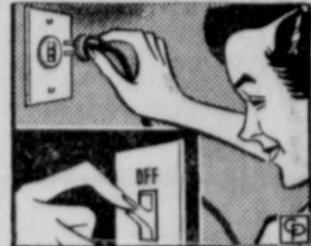

Bond Sales For August

Savings Bond sales in Texas increased 15% in August over the same period of 1959. This report was made today by Mr. W. P. Duren, Chairman of Mills County Savings Bonds Committee.

They cooperate with State health and law enforcement agencies to see that all regulations are strictly enforced—and there are many of these regulations.

"It is our hope that this new market news program will offer material benefits in the further development and improvement of this essential livestock activity."

Lake low?
If your favorite fishing lake is short of water — due to summer evaporation and lack of rain—it could be a blessing. Nope, it's not likely to improve fishing. Not now at least. But it could tip you off to some fine fishing to come.

How?
Simply by exposing sand bars, stumps, brush piles and underwater trees, drop-offs, undercut ledges and other cavernous openings where fish like to hide out. They will be around these spots when the rains come and the lake fills again.

Now is the time to make a mental note of their locations—or better yet, a written memo. Unless you are an artist and can sketch the "lay of the land"—or have a photographic mind—we suggest that right now is a good time to do a little picture taking.

You don't have to be an expert photographer, even an amateur, for that matter. An ordinary box camera will do. All you want is something with which to refresh your memory—about the contour of the land that's under water — after the lake returns to its normal level.

Once the water begins to rise you'll be surprised how soon you'll forget where that big ledge used to be, or where the thick brush pile used to lay — or where the sand bar extended out from the bank — or where that big drop-off was located.

So, right now, while the lake level is low — take camera in hand and make a number of pix of the terrain and water. Take pictures that will show the present water level AND enough of the bank, trees and rocks that are higher up.

Take particular pains to include objects that mark the area well—fixed objects such as fences, big boulders, twisted or broken trees, nearby bridges, windmills or other objects above the high-water mark.

Include an object close up too, if possible, so you can get an exact fix on the spot.

Only really accurate way to position a submerged island, for example, is to shoot pictures north, east, south and west from the island itself. Then when the island is covered with water, all you need to do is boat to the conversion point of the four pictures—and let down anchor. Remember that in pictures distance is sometimes deceiving. Hence, the 4-Direction pictures are necessary if you are to locate the precise spot.

This type of picturing can't be done in every instance, however. So, the next best method is to criss-cross—say from one side of a bank to the other. Anyway, whatever the camera's target may be—be sure that you shoot plenty of the background and include several fixed objects in the scene, so that you can determine the exact spot when the water reaches the usual level of the lake.

Fishing will return to normal as the lake begins to fill and the fish find new food along the banks.

Until they are ready to feed, the big lunkers will hide out under that big rock that's now fully submerged. Or they will relax in the brush where they are safe from harm and can feed upon the other marine life.

Come sundown, or sunrise, the lunkers will move up from their hideouts and feed among the stumps and along the sand bars in the shallow water, or go on a scouting expedition near the shore.

They will seed the green grass, the food that has been washed to the banks, or the worms that have been flooded out of their homes, or the insects that have fallen from the overhanging tree limbs.

To capture the big ones your

best bet, naturally, is to fish where the fish are.

That means to work the shoreline early in the morning and late in the evening. During the heat of the day go after them where they hide from man and beast—deep down. That's when you fish the drop-offs, the ledges, the points, and the deep holes.

Your bait? There are hundreds to choose from.

Use top water lures early-morning and late-evening.

Try spoons and jigs when you want to go deep, especially when the water is hot on top.

Use jigs with pork rinds or artificial worms or eels, when you want to go deeper and have the patience to wait 'em out. This is the slowest fishing, but it lands the lunkers.

Whatever your method your goal is to catch fish. And if you want to be successful at that—you gotta know where the fish are to be found.

So, we repeat—get your camera out when the lake is low—and make a number of shots of likely underwater hideaways.

Then—keep the prints handy right there in the old tackle box — where they'll be instantly available.

We regret to hear of the death of Col. F. A. Lumsden, of the N. O. Picayune and his family. They were on a steamer on Lake Michigan and came in collision with a schooner; she sank in twenty minutes, burying about 300 passengers in a watery grave. Col. Lumsden and Mr. Kendall were the first founders of the Picayune, they were excellent printers, and by their industry had amassed a respectable fortune.

Chief Justice Taney Renounces Squatter Sovereignty — The Philadelphia Pennsylvania states upon undoubted authority, that the Chief Justice of the Supreme Bench of the United States, who pronounced the opinion in the Dred Scott case, denounces Douglas's Squatter Sovereign doctrine as the worst

heresy. The Chief Justice will support Breckenridge and Lane. The Democracy have planted themselves on the Constitution of the country, and have the endorsement of the highest judicial authority of the Union.

Capt. C. C. Herbert of Eagle Lake, Colorado County, the present Senator from this District, came in to see us on Wednesday. The Capt. is dealing some heavy blows against the opponents of States Rights Democracy. He was to have made a speech yesterday at Industry, on the political topics of the day. Capt. Herbert is a whole souled gentleman, a man of vigorous intellect and has faithfully served us in the State Senate. Sorry are we that the District has been changed, otherwise he might be easily and triumphantly re-elected.

WALKER CAPTURED AND TO BE SHOT

The Steamship Star of the West at New Orleans on Tuesday last from Havana, reports that Walker and his party 70 in number, have been captured in the River Negro by the British War steamer Jearus and a schooner with troops from Gen. Alvarez army. They were taken back to Truxillo and handed over to the Honduras authorities, "with the condition," says the Havana correspondent of the True Delta, on the 13th, "that the seventy men, who were in a most wretched situation from wounds and disease, should be allowed to return to the United States, after taking an oath never to engage again in any expedition against the States of Central America, and the Consular Agent of the United States to provide their return passage expenses—Walker and Butler to be dealt with as the laws of the land and its justice may determine. They have both been shot, probably, before this reaches you, as they were in the Castle, with the understanding such was the fate predetermined for them, on the morning of the 11th inst.

GOLDEN ONION ROLLS (makes 2 dozen)

Gladiola's Baking-Recipe-of-the-Month

MRS. JANAK'S GOLDEN ONION ROLLS

- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1/4 cup shortening or oil
- 2 cakes compressed yeast
- 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 2 eggs, beaten slightly
- 5 to 5 1/2 cups sifted GLADIOLA Special Hard Wheat Flour
- Sesame seed or poppyseed

Scald milk; add sugar, salt, and shortening or oil and cool to lukewarm. Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water. Combine milk mixture, yeast, and eggs and blend. Gradually add flour, beating well, to form a stiff dough; knead on floured surface until smooth and satiny, about 5 to 8 minutes. Place in a greased bowl, turn dough to greased surface, cover and let rise in a warm place until double in bulk, about 1 hour. Meantime prepare Onion Filling (below) and cool. Pinch or cut off pieces of dough sheet and flatten with palm of the hand. Place 2 inches apart on greased baking sheet and flatten with palm of the hand. Brush with reserved egg from filling. With a tablespoon make an indentation in the center of each roll and fill with Onion Filling. Sprinkle with poppyseed or sesame seed. Let rise 30 to 45 minutes until light and almost double. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees) about 15 minutes until golden brown. Makes about 2 dozen.

ONION FILLING: Cook 2 cups chopped onion in 1/2 cup butter or margarine over medium heat until well cooked and golden in color but do not brown. Stir in 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons slightly beaten egg (reserve remainder) and 2 tablespoons cream. Cool.

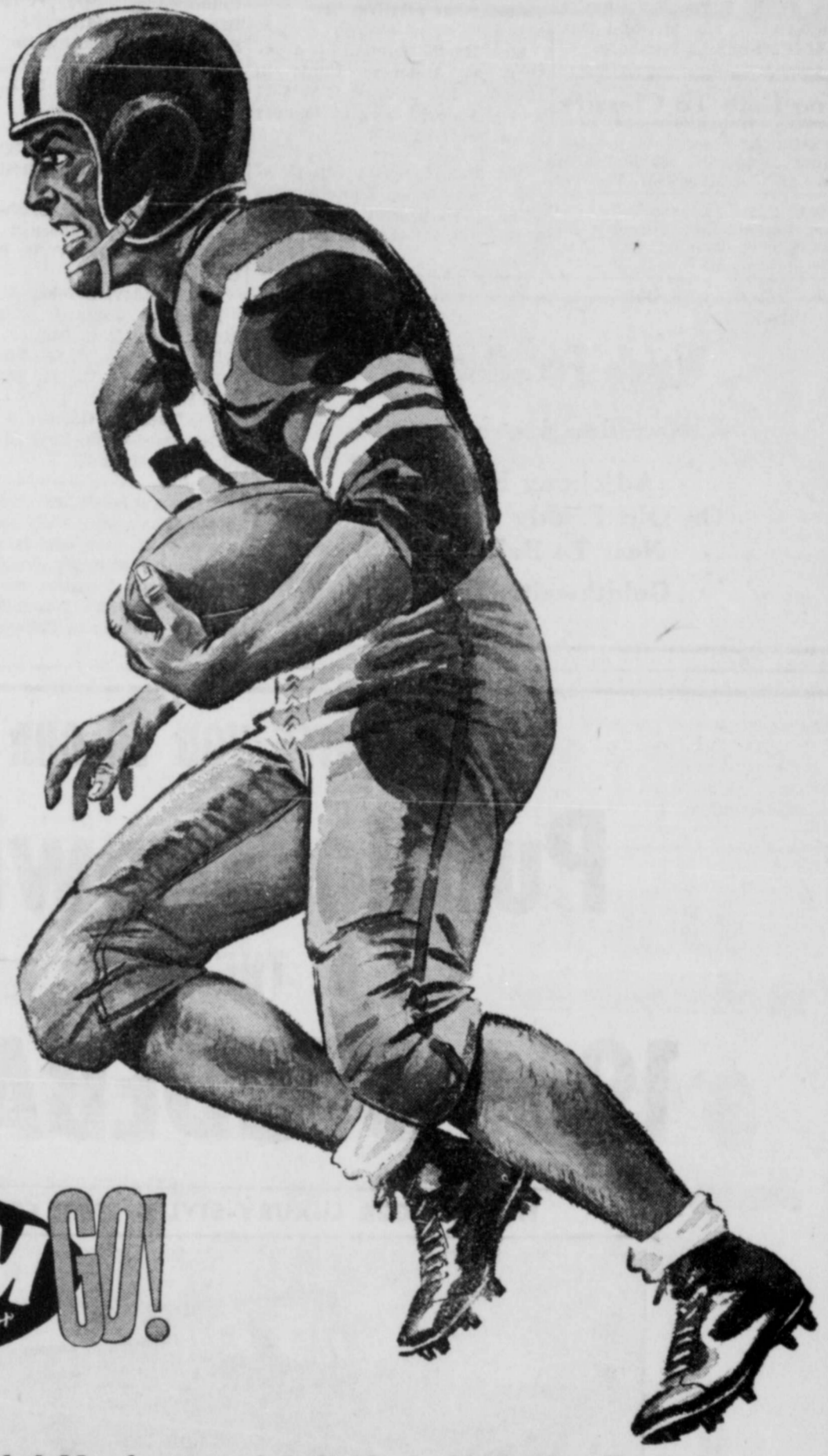

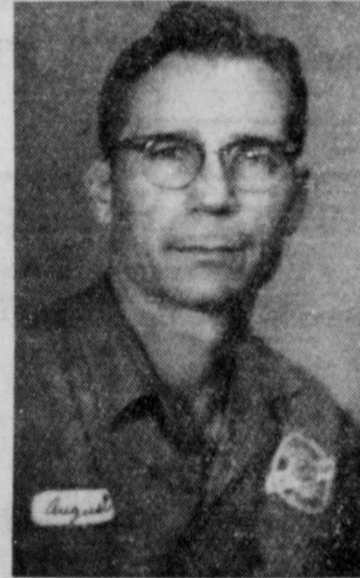

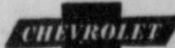

Lifted up somewhat on the mountain side as we are, we have a beautiful view of the city. Especially at night. The lights are so beautiful and El Paso extends so far in so many directions.

We're all as busy as bees. John is still watering the grass seed, and it is coming along slowly. Johnny's school is near his Daddy's store, so he rides with him in the morning, but comes home on the bus in the evening. Billy's school is farther away so he rides the bus morning and evening. Grace discovers that her school is made up entirely of Air Force children. She finds them very intelligent and cooperative, making her work quite pleasant. We find ourselves terribly far from town. The bus runs only once every hour and the fare is 25c. On Delta Street the bus ran every half hour and the fare to town was only a dime.

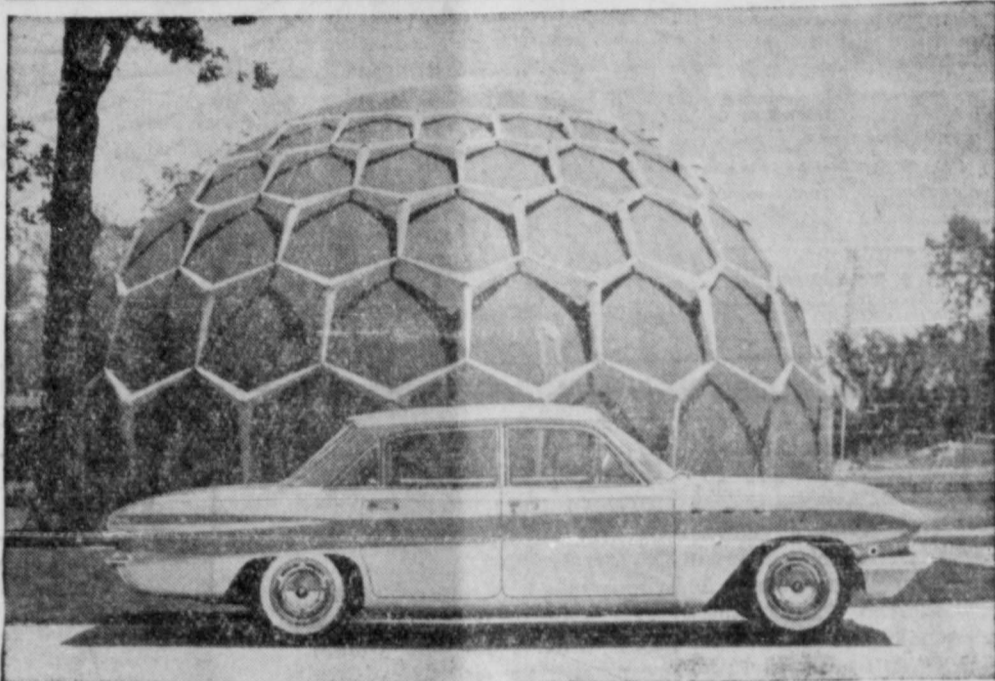



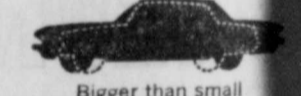

*Anti-static Agent. This is a laundry aid which you can add to the final rinse to prevent build-up of static electricity which causes crackling and clinging in some fabrics.

*Fabric softeners. When you add this product to your rinse water, it gives softness or fluffiness to all washable fabrics. It will reduce wrinkling and make ironing easier. Often used on infants' garments.

*Brightener. A product which clings to fabrics like a dye to produce greater whiteness or brightness. Brighteners are included in most washing products, but are also available separately.

*Rinse Conditioner. To be used in your first rinse to prevent minerals in hard water from forming a curd. It will also redissolve detergent residue from previous washes.

*Water Softener. They are two types: One "locks up" minerals in hard water to prevent them from forming curd or film. The other combines with the minerals in hard water and forms insoluble particles that settle to the bottom. Read labels before you buy and follow directions carefully when you use any of these products.

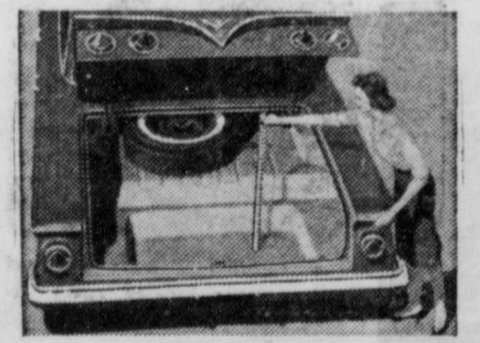



Austin, Texas—Neither Texas civilians nor the armed forces can afford the losses incurred through traffic accidents involving military personnel in the state.

On this note, the Texas Military-Civilian Traffic Safety Council was formed in Austin with a goal of reducing the accidents.

About 200 persons, civilian and military, attended the Council's first meeting, called at the behest of Gov. Price Daniel.

Servicemen have more accidents than any other population group in Texas, said Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety. Last year servicemen drivers were involved in 103 fatal accidents in which 130 persons were killed.

A great many of the servicemen in Texas are in the 18 to 25-year-old age bracket, said General Edward T. Williams, Fourth Army commander. People in this age bracket generally are the most inclined to have auto accidents.

Gen. Williams urged vigorous enforcement of traffic regulations so that the driver knows he will be caught and punished if he breaks the law.

Brad Smith, director of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, outlined the five-point program recommended by the governor to improve highway safety.

1. Driver education for all high school students.
2. A law to permit chemical tests to determine if a driver is intoxicated.
3. At least 200 additional highway patrolmen.
4. Revision of the drivers li-

cense law.

5. A system of traffic courts.
Water Program Studied—Texas' 7-man Water Development Board is considering whether to ask the next Legislature to expand and liberalize its program of lending financial aid to local water projects.

Decision is to be made at the Board's October 28 meeting.

Board presently has authority to issue \$100,000,000 in bonds and use the money to make loans to local governments for water conservation projects. Loans are limited to one-third the cost of the project and cannot be more than \$5,000,000 for any one project.

Under study is whether to ask the Legislature to step up the program by authorizing the Board to lend as much as \$15,000,000 per project and to issue another \$100,000,000 in bonds to purchase water storage space in federal reservoirs.

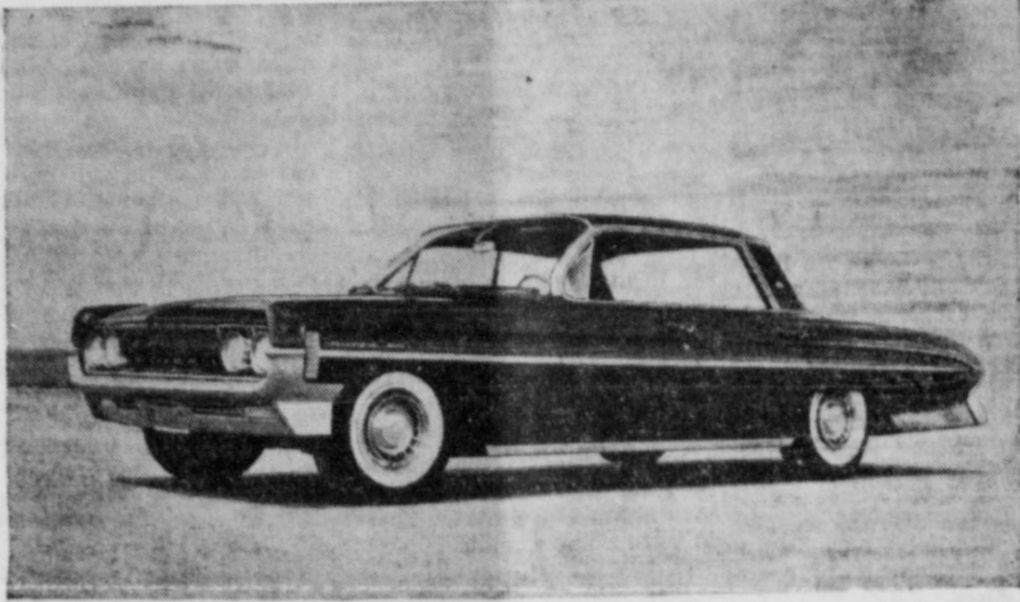
When the Board was created, the law provided that another \$100,000,000 in bonds could be authorized by a two-thirds vote of the Legislature.

Daniel Honored—Governor Daniel is the newly-elected chairman of the 16-state Southern Governors Conference.

He is the second Texan in a decade to head the group. Former Gov. Allan Shivers was chairman in 1951-52.

Conferences are devoted to the study of problems which the member states have in common. This year the protection of home industries against ruinous competition from imports has been a prime issue.

Governor Daniel said he felt much could be accomplished by

Hurry-Up Hospitals—With a long, long waiting list of mentally retarded patients, the State Hospital Board is studying short cuts toward providing housing for them.

A contractor-member of the

Board presented drawings of one possible approach—semi-permanent one-story, concrete block cottages. They would provide for 40 persons, cost \$38,000 apiece and could be ready for occupancy in 20 months.

More than 1,000 children are now on the state homes' waiting list.

Board has authorized getting

an estimate of the cost of putting an automatic sprinkling system in the Confederate Home in Austin, now used for mental patients. Home has been called a fire trap, but if it could be made safe, the cost of replacing it could be postponed.

Also voted by the Board was a policy of preventing tuberculosis patients, by force if neces-

sary, from leaving state hospital until they are well enough not to infect other people.

A recent attorney general's ruling held that the hospital system does have authority to make TB patients stay in the hospital until they are no longer contagious.

Education Support Sought—Texans will be penny wise and pound foolish if they try to avoid the cost of establishing a top-notch system of higher education.

This was the theme at an Austin meeting of the members of governing boards of state colleges and universities. A series of regional meetings are planned during October and November to rally public support for better appropriations for state colleges.

Regrettably, the regents pegged Texas state-supported colleges as less than best. A survey was cited showing that 65 per cent of the top jobs in Texas industry are held by graduates of out-of-state colleges. Texas is training the hired hands; other states are training the bosses, said Reagan Houston III of San Antonio.

Texans will pay, said John Newton of Beaumont, whether they ante up for good education or not. In an age of electronics, automation and exotic fuels, good educational and research facilities are a prime attraction for new industries, said Newton.

"Cost of losing major opportunities for growth will be at least as great as the cost of

providing what we really need," he said.

Prison Problems Cited—Seventy-five per cent of the inmates of the Texas prison system are in "tanks" or dormitories which crowd impressionable young offenders in with hardened criminals, says the chairman of the Department of Corrections.

More housing to correct this situation is urgently needed, H. Coffield told an Austin audience. On the bright side, Coffield said the Texas system had pulled up from one of the worst to one of the best in the nation, in the past 10 years—a period when the prison population skyrocketed. Yet pre-prisoner cost is far below the national average.

As an "ounce of prevention" Coffield urged citizen support of such local agencies as churches, Scouts and Salvation Army.



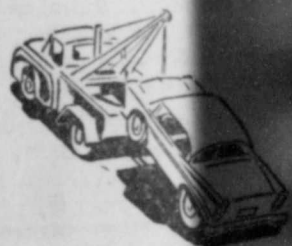
