THINK AGAIN-Remember that expected federal budget surplus of \$4.2 billion, for the current fiscal year, that was making the headlines a few months ago?

Well, to use the vernacular, it ain't there!

The Council of the State Chambers of Commerce makes this report: "The President's budget for 1961 provided for expenditures of \$79.8 billion against estimated receipts of \$84 billion with a surplus of \$4.2 billion. Barring any material change in overall economic activity, receipts are likely to reach only about \$82 billion with most of the drop accounted for in corporation income taxes. On the other hand, Congressional actions on spending and failure to raise postal rates as proposed will increase budgeted expenditures by \$1.7 billion to \$81.5 billion. These changes from the January budget estimates would still leave a surplus, but only in the amount of \$500 million."

In other words, the surplus estimate was predicated on the theory that Congress would show some restraint in making appropriations - and that business profits and the resultant tax revenue would soar. Neither of these anticipations has become an actuality. So anyone who thinks the inflation problem or a freespending Congress has been licked had better think again.

CAN OUR YOUTH BE FOOLED?-American youth is being wooed by the Communists.

J. Edgar Hoover of the FBI, reports: "In 1959, the Communist Party, U. S. A. launched a major campaign with youth as its target The purpose . . . was to devsie a program to attract young blood-teenagers, students, and working youth-to the ranks of the Party The Party began operating what amounted to a regular lecture bureau, with Party spokesmen seizing every opportunity to project their views on campuses across the country.

"Further illustrating the tremendous drive the Party is making to infiltrate the student groups is the agenda for a youth conference the Party held in Chicago, June 11-12, 1960. The major points on the agenda for the two-day conference were (1) 'mass developments on the campus' and (2) 'left-student developments'. Discussed in relation to these points were ways and means by which young Communists could exploit such controversial issues on campuses as civil rights, academic freedom, and other so-called lea. The Communist threat from without must not blind us to the Communist threat from within, which, if successful, would wipe out the very things Communism professes to promote, namely, civil rights, academic freedom and peace issues.

Unhappily, that is rarely the case. Let's look at parcel post.

This is not a basic post office function. It is a comparative latecomer to the roster of post office activities. It does not contribute to public enlightenment, as do the carrying of letters, newspapers and periodicals. It competes directly with private carriers of parcels, on the national, state and local leves.

private carriers but for the taxpayers at large, parcel post has been operated at a loss during most, if not all, of its history. Reliable estimates indicate that the increase in parcel post charges that went into effect a few months ago will make up only about half of the deficit. Pointing out that the big research promise today lies in the new area of attack, chemotherapy, Doctor Mallams gave specific examples of the results of some of the scores of new compounds being used for cancer treatment. He told in detail of the efforts being made to develop a serum to provide immunity to certain types of cancer, and also the exploration of the theory that some cancers are virus-caused. 
