Absentee Voting Starts Wednesday For General Election November 8

Absentee voting for the general election on November 8 opened Wednesday of this week, according to Walter A. Bryant, county clerk.

The official ballots have been delivered to the clerk's office and voters who expect to be out of the county on election day may now make their application for voting absentee ballot.

Application for absentee ballot must be notarized and those making application must bring their poll tax or exemption receipt. Applications made by mail must be postmarked outside Mills County.

The ballot this year contains six columns in the following order: Democratic Party, Republican Party, Constitution Party, Prohibition Party, Independent and Write-In.

In addition to the six columns for political parties, independent and write-ins, the ballot also contains four proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on.

The Democratic Party has full list of candidates for all offices to be filled. Republican Party column has candidates for the offices of: president and vice-president; governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, U. S. Senator, railroad commissioner, comptroller of public accounts, commissioner of general land office, state treasurer and commissioner of agriculture.

In the Constitution Party column candidates are listed for the following offices: president and vice-president, lieutenant governor, attorney general, U. S. Senator, judge of court of criminal appeals, railroad commissioner, comptroller of public accounts, commissioner of general land office, state treasurer, and commissioner of agriculture.

The Prohibition Party column has candidates listed for only the offices of president and vice president.

SPLIT TICKET VOTING LEGAL

Split ticket voting in the November 8 election is legal as it has been in the past.

The fact that a person's poll tax receipt is stamped "Democrat" does not prevent such a voter from voting for any other political party's candidates at a general election. The same applies to a person whose poll tax is stamped "Republican" in areas where a Republican primary election was held.

The Election Code of Texas, as amended 1959, requires that for a voter to participate in the primary elections or conventions of a political party, such voter must have his party designation stamped on his poll tax, or have a certificate from the primary election judge that the voter has participated in the primary election. Such voter is then eligible to participate in the convention of such political party, and is not permitted to participate in the convention of another party.

This article has no application to the General Election to be held November 8, 1960. All voters will receive the same type ballot in November and are free to mark it as they wish, regardless of any party designation stamped on their poll tax receipts. The ballot is secret and will be entitled to be counted in the election as it is marked, whether it be marked as a "straight ticket" for any one party, or "split" to vote for different parties' candidates. Only one candidate for each office, regardless of party, should be left unmarked, to be counted.

In voting for President and Vice President the vote must be cast for both nominees of one party. The voter cannot vote for one party's nominee for president and another party's nominee for vice president, because these nominees' names are printed on the ticket in place of the names of the presidential electors who support their respective party's nominees for both offices.

ABOUT VOTING BOXES—Earlier this year Mills County commissioners' court gave consideration to consolidating a number of small voting boxes in the county.

This was recommended by a citizen's group headed by the chairman of the Mills County Democratic Executive Committee, Mrs. Claudia Cockrum.

The recommendation was made after a number of parties had expressed their ideas to the County Chairman in favor of combining the boxes.

A public hearing was called by the commissioners on the subject. Not many attended the hearing and after making survey among some of the voters in their respective precincts the commissioners decided to leave the voting boxes as they are at present.

The matter of small voting boxes and expensive elections also came up in our neighboring county, San Saba. There the Commissioners gave study to the problem and came up with the idea of having the citizens vote on the matter at the general election.

The Commissioners ordered ballots prepared and the proposal of consolidating small voting boxes in the various commissioners' precincts will be voted on by the people.

Sounds like a good idea. This will give every qualified voter an opportunity of expressing himself by ballot without having to take a stand on the subject one way or the other before a public hearing.

If the majority favor having small voting boxes consolidated then the commissioners can order the change made in line with what residents of the precinct want.

It might be a good idea to have the proposal placed before the voters in Mills County sometime.

COURTHOUSE PECAN TREES—Ever wonder how old the two pecan trees on each side of the north walk to the Mills County courthouse are? Or who took part in planting them? Here is a little information on the subject, as supplied to the Editor by Wellie Saylor.

The two trees were planted on Washington's birthday in 1932. The one on the west side of the walk was named after Jeff Davis, and the one on the east side after Abe Lincoln. They were so named, as Wellie said: "To keep peace, since some of us were Republican and some of the Commissioners were pretty strong Democrats."

Saylor was in the nursery business at that time and donated the two trees.

"Saloon Clubs" Under Fire — State Liquor Control Board has set a hearing Oct. 24 on proposed new regulations for private clubs selling liquor by the drink.

Bona-fide, non-profit clubs are not the target of the proposed new rules, said Liquor Board Administrator Coke Stevenson Jr.

It's aimed, he said, at "fly-by-night operators" who give away membership cards or have only the flimsiest sort of organizational set-up as an excuse for selling liquor by the drink.

New rule would require all clubs to have a private club registration permit, to be renewed annually. To get the permit, the club would have to have dues or fees, exclusive of liquor charges, sufficient to pay rental, insurance, taxes, repairs, etc., on its premises.

Liquor dealers would be forbidden to deliver liquor to any club without a permit.

Stevenson said there are probably more than 1,000 clubs

Textbooks Challenged — "As the twig is bent, the tree's inclined"—which led a group of citizens from over the state to come to Austin to challenge proposed public school textbooks they felt might incline youngsters the wrong way.

J. Evetts Haley of Canyon headed the group called the Texans' Committee for Education which appeared before the State Textbook Committee, Haley, an arch-conservative, ran for governor in 1956.

Haley's committee objected to references in the proposed texts to persons they regarded as "subversive" and to what they called "left-wing comment." Some books, they said, encouraged "government doles" by picturing farm subsidies in a favorable light.

Members of the State Textbook Committee, made up of teachers, said that any favorable reference to proven subversives would be taken out of any books recommended for state adoption.

Texas-Alaska Agreement — Texas and Alaska, the big two of the United States, have worked out a "visiting privileges" agreement for motorists from the two states.

Texas vehicles can operate in Alaska up to 90 days without additional registration charges, and Alaskan cars, trucks and buses may do the same in Texas.

State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer announced the agreement. He said Texas now has reciprocal passenger car agreements with all other states and truck and bus agreements with all but six states.

Short Snorts—Governor's Advisory Commission on Finance knocked down one of the favorite themes of the optimistic—that the state has enough money in special funds to offset the shortage in the general revenue fund. Month by month, the balances in the statutory special funds would not cover the general fund deficit, said a commission report. . . . Land Commissioner Bill Allcorn has announced the appointment of Jack Giberson as chief clerk of the

General Land Office, Giberson was serving as legal counsel for the land office. . . . Howard Arno will become engineer of secondary roads for the State Highway Department beginning Oct. 15. He succeeds Perry Bailey who is retiring after 37 years with the Highway Department. . . . Texas Employment Commission notes a drop in unemployment notes a drop in unemployment dropped by 3,000 to a 176,700 total, says TREC while total employment slipped by 23,600 to 3,504,300.

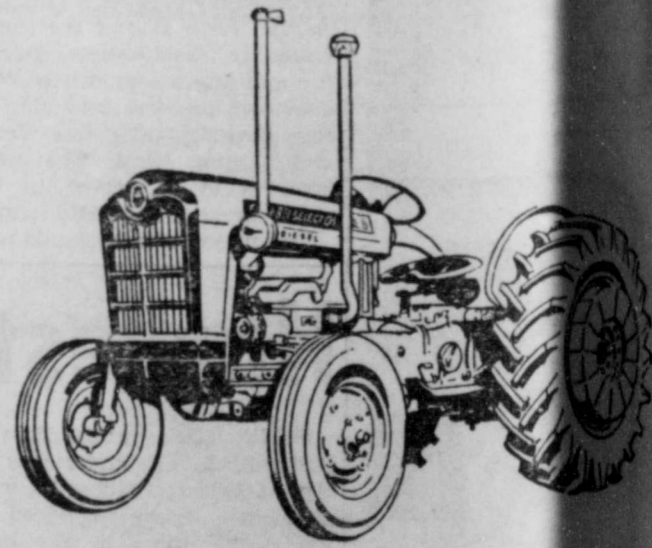

He was coming to the aid of Al Darow (12) at the time. It was in second quarter that Glenn's injury became apparent, but he was thought to have been merely shaken up. He was not taken to a hospital until the game's end. He died soon after of what physicians said apparently was a concussion of the brain and cerebral hemorrhage.

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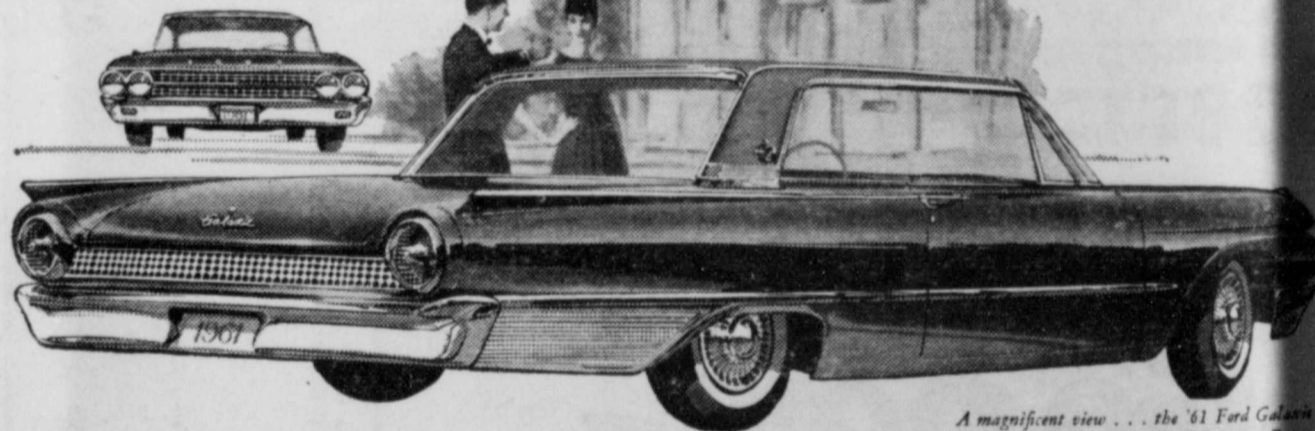

Bill describes them. And he sure has the figures to prove it. Sportsman's Products makes the soft plastic "Catch-Em-Quick" lures. They are called bloodworms, gollywhompers, tadpoles, and what have you. Latest product, however, is their blue, floating plastic worm. It doesn't have a hook in it. To use it, Bill suggests that you mount a 2/0 weedless hook in the head of the worm. Then add a No. 7 split shot about 24 inches up the line.

Flash up and down the slopes, deep cliffs, and both sides of points . . . as well as the top of the ridge when you're fishing a point.

Now that he has told you where to do it—here's how to do it.

Drag the weight along the bottom so that the floating worm is suspended a foot or two above the bottom. Fish it slow. As the weight bounces along the bottom, or among the rocks or other underwater objects, it disturbs the sand or silt, thus attracting the fish.

For best results reel in three or four times slowly, then twist or bounce the weight lightly, just enough to attract attention. Repeat that procedure until retrieved. Allow two and one half minutes to retrieve 60 feet. Then cast out again.

If you want to get some real action, Bill suggests that you tie a loose knot in the tail of the worm. Then cast it out and follow the procedure outlined above. As the lure is retrieved the knot gradually will untie itself. The water action will cause the worm to unkink. When it does, the worm will jump. This gives the worm added action.

Well, that's a trick we hadn't heard of. How about you?

When we look at some of the TV westerns we get the idea that most of our grandfathers were gun slingers. However, today there are perhaps more gun slingers than there were in the Eighties. And the guns are faster.

Gunslinging is a fad now. Every town has one or more persons who stands for hours practicing the quick draw and twirling a revolver.

It has meant lots of business for the arms manufacturers, too. Colt, High-Standard, Ruger, Western and some others, all have come out with frontier models especially adapted to the quick-draw trade.

There are numerous quick draw clubs scattered over the country. San Antonio has a big one. It is composed primarily of business men who practice before an electric timer. But that isn't the unusual

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hit a can at a side glance they sound like a .22 bullet on a flat surface.

Don't underestimate the power of these guns, and be careful where you shoot them. They are excellent to take on camping trips. The gas powered gun is ample for killing small game animals and birds. They also are excellent for popping snakes.

Keep in mind though, that you are not to shoot song birds or game birds out of season. This is rather costly. Game wardens frown on it. Judges assess fines. It's a lot better to stick to tin cans.

And it's real fun, too!

Generally the practice shooting is done with .22 ammunition. Many of the guns now on the market are for .22 caliber. These include all the top brands.

There are many conversions. You can get inserts for the cylinder or a new cylinder for the .22 caliber to be used with the .38 special or the .45. These, however, are only good where you practice the quick draw and want to hear the reports. If you actually shoot at a mark, you need a barrel of the proper caliber.

Most of the quick draw work is done with the tied-down buscadero-type belt.

Phillip Y. Hahn, president of the Crossman Arms Co. has produced a gas-operated single action revolver, especially for the quick-draw enthusiasts. This CO2 pistol is made exactly like the old .45 single action. In fact, it is so good it is being used on some of the TV westerns.

If you are watching one of these pictures and you see a cowboy knock off 18 Indians in a row with a six gun, chances are it will be one of the Hahn BB guns. They fire 18 shots with BB pellets.

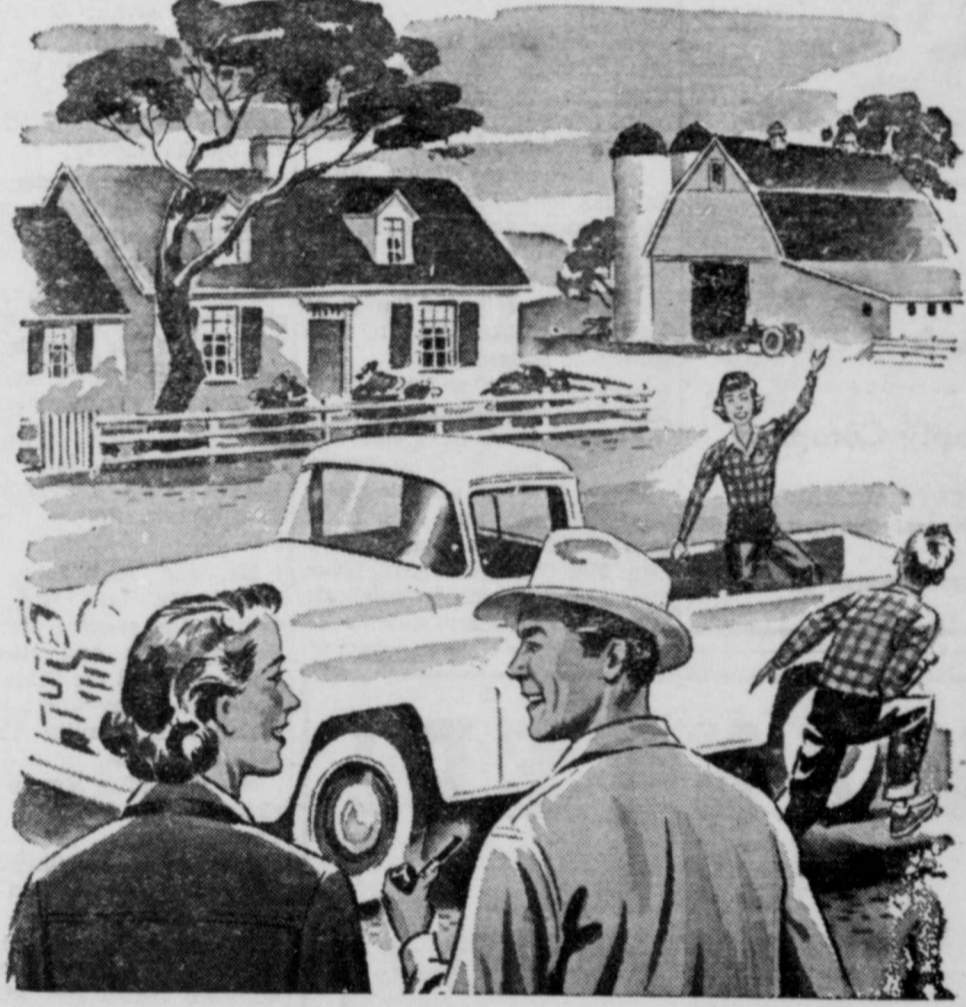
Hahn also did another piece of clever merchandising. He made a buscadero quick draw scabbard and belt to accompany the gun. Now you can buy a fast draw combination at your favorite gun store without being in violation of the law. And it is a precision gun, plenty good for target practice.

If you've never tried BB or pellet gun shooting, you've missed something. In the first place it is a great deal more economical than shooting a firearm. The guns themselves are precision made. You can get them in various types. Some are the pump-ups, others are lever action, and still others are gas powered.

They are wonderful for target practice and basement shooting. I like to shoot tin cans with them. Frequently I'll take a spree at saving small cans until I get a box full. I punch a hole in the end of these cans, then run a wire through the hole and suspend them from a tree limb—where there is a hill for a backdrop. Then I back off 30 or 40 feet and start to work on the cans.

It is more interesting if the wind is blowing. Then the cans begin to swing and they are harder to hit. With a little practice you can hit them almost every shot. The real fun is to start one swinging and then plink it with one of these BB guns.

Gas powered guns, like the Crosman, are real effective. Once in awhile they'll cut small limbs off the trees. When they

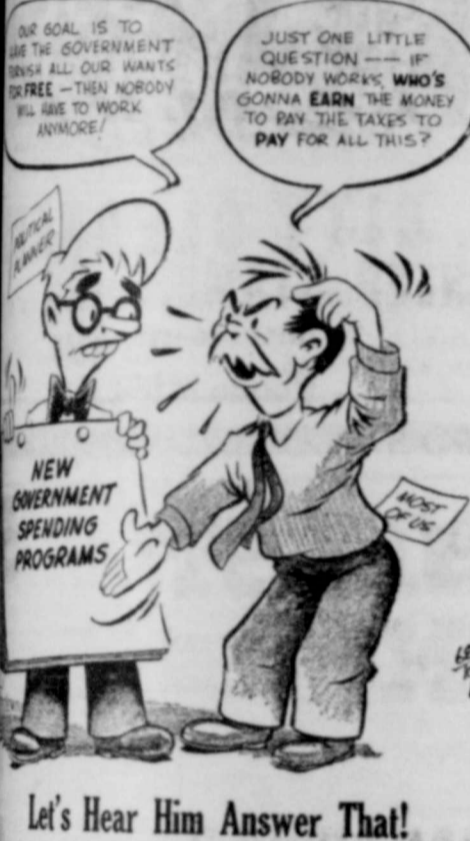

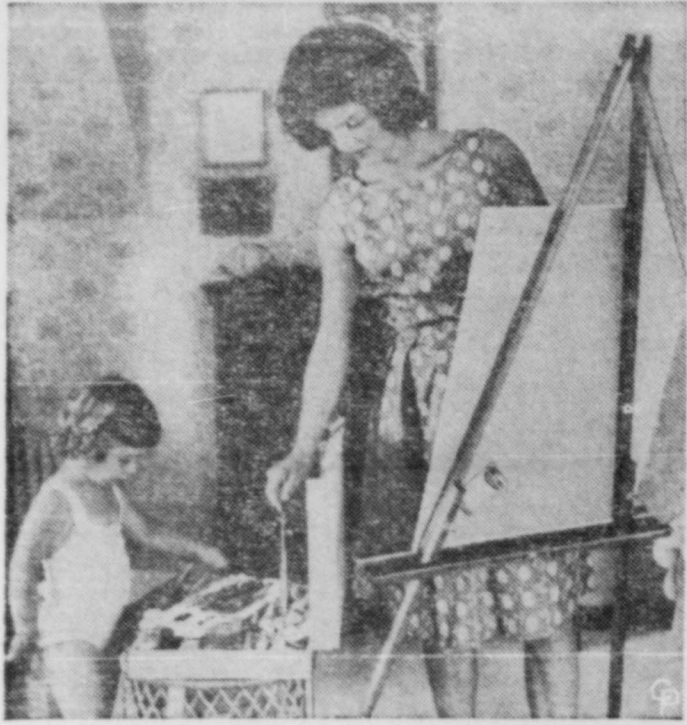

Sweet potatoes offer food value and fuel for energy. The Texas Food Standard calls for a serving of potatoes—sweet or Irish—every day.

Baking sweet potatoes retains much of the flavor and food value, and saves time for the cook. All you do is to wash and dry the potato; greasing before baking serves no real purpose. Bake one hour in a moderate oven (250° F.) for medium sized

potatoes. Potatoes may "leak" if baked too long or with too high heat. Test for doneness by pressing rather than puncturing with a fork.

Left over sweet potatoes will keep for several days in the refrigerator. Serve them mashed, fried or candied. Citrus juices, tart apples and nuts combine well with the flavor of sweet potatoes.

RUGS—Depressions left in rugs by heavy furniture can be raised some by steaming with a hot iron pressed on a damp cloth and then brushing with a stiff brush.

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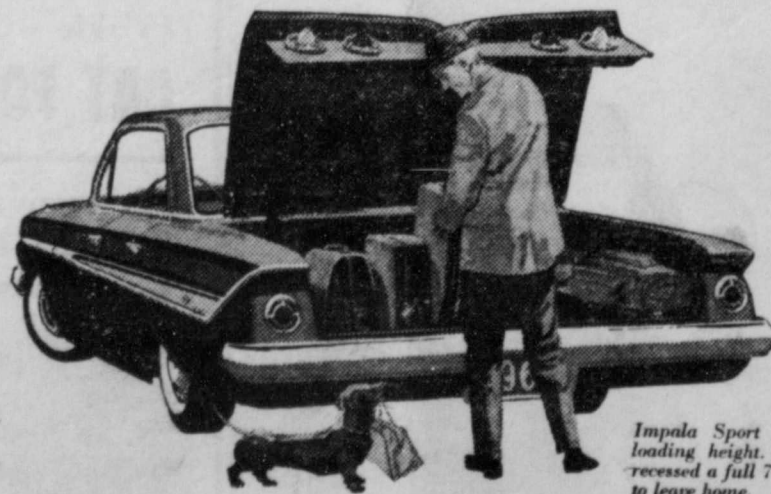

been holding meetings over the
state, have come out flatly for
a retail sales tax. They contend
that to meet its needs, present
and future, Texas must have a
broad-based, spread-thin tax
that will grow with the economy.
Representatives of organized
labor, strongly opposed to a
sales tax, fired back. Labor has
endorsed the idea of a broad-
based, "growth" tax, but insists
it should be an income tax, on
corporations and individuals.
Governor Daniel has voiced
opposition to both sales and in-
come taxes. Many legislators
were elected on platforms op-
posing both.
Only other likely courses
would be to raise taxes that al-
ready exist, or vote taxes pre-
viously rejected. But these roads
also are blocked by groups
ready to defend to the last.
On such a battlefield, law-
makers might be tempted to re-
treat—except that this course
is cut off too by supporters of
better colleges, teacher raises,
medical payments for the aged
—all of which require more
money.
U. Of Houston Aid Approved—
Commission on Higher Educa-
tion recommended that the
University of Houston be added
to the state college system if it
wouldn't cut into funds needed
by the 19 already existing state

colleges.
Final decision can be made
only by the Legislature.
A Commission study indicated
the University of Houston would
cost the state approximately
\$4,000,000 a year more from the
general revenue fund. It has a
22-acre campus and a plant
valued at \$22,000,000. Enroll-
ment for this year is 11,500, sec-
ond only to the University of
Texas with 19,000.
Commission emphasized that
adding the Houston school
should be conditioned on pro-
viding adequate financial sup-
port to existing state schools.
Commission is tentatively rec-
ommending an appropriation of
\$69,350,000 for higher education
in 1962. University of Houston's

Two machines joined together cannot get by on the same li- cense, said Wilson in the same opinion, given at the request of State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.
Only service machines are tax exempt, said Wilson.

Quail Season Modified

The quail season in a number of Texas counties under regula- tory control has been modi- fied by the Game and Fish Commission, according to W. J. Cutbirth, Jr., assistant execu- tive secretary.
Biologists reported an "ab- normal" quail year throughout the state, with a spotted popu- lation. Generally, however, the season was liberalized in those counties not under general laws.

In the Possum Kingdom area the new season will be from Nov. 24 through Jan. 20. The daily bag limit will remain at 15 and 45 in possession. Quail numbers in this area are much higher this year, according to the biologists. However, the food supply is short and a carry-over loss can be expected after bad weather sets in.

In the Trinity-Brazos regula- tory area the quail season was set at Dec. 1 through Jan. 31. The bag limit here will be 12 per day and 36 in possession.
In the Trans-Pecos area the season will open Nov. 1 and close Dec. 31. Crockett County has been added to the Trans- Pecos area this season.

In the Panhandle area the season will be Dec. 1 through

Jan. 16, with the bag limit of 12 and 36 in possession.
No changes were made in either the Northeast Texas or the Southeast Texas areas, where the season will be from Dec. 1 through Jan. 16, with the bag limit of 12 and 36. In South Central Texas the season

will open Dec. 1, and close Jan. 16, except in Dimmit and Zavala counties where the season will be Nov. 1-Dec. 31, inclusive. All other counties of Texas are un- der the general laws, to run from Dec. 1 to Jan. 16, except in a few counties where special laws apply.

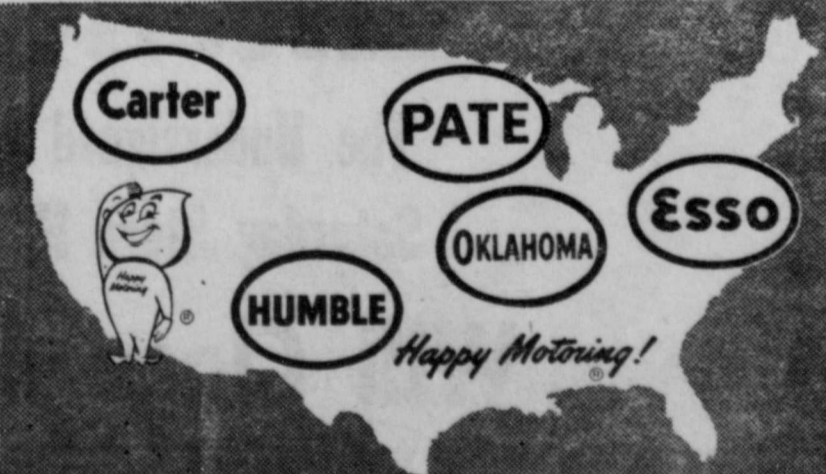

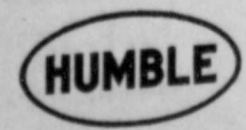
