## General Election Is Next Tuesday

General Election will be held next Tuesday, November 8. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. A record number of Mills County voters is expected to turn out and cast their ballots. The ballot for Mills County this year contains six columns in the following order: Democratic Party, Republican Party, Constitution Party, Prohibition Party, Independent and Write-In. In addition to the six columns for political parties, independent and write-ins, the ballot also contains four proposed con-

stitutional amendments to be voted on. The Democratic Party has full list of candidates for all offices to be filled. Republican Party column has candidates for the offices of: president and vice-president; governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, U. S. Senator, railroad commissioner, comptroller of public accounts, commissioner of general land office, state treasurer and commissioner of agriculture. In the Constitution Party column candidates are listed for the following offices: president and vice-president, lieutenant governor, attorney general, U. S. Senator, judge of court of criminal appeals, railroad commissioner, comptroller of public accounts, commissioner of general land office, state treasurer, and commissioner of agriculture. The Prohibition Party column has candidates listed for only the offices of president and vice president.

General Election is legal as it has been in the past. The fact that a person's poll tax receipt, or exemption certificate is stamped "Democrat" does not prevent such a voter from voting for any other political party's candidates at a general election. The same applies to a person whose poll tax is stamped "Republican" in

areas where a Republican primary election was held. The Election Code of Texas, as amended 1959, requires that for a voter to participate in the primary elections or conventions of a political party, such voter must have his party designation stamped on his poll tax, or have a certificate from the primary election judge that the voter has participated in the primary election. Such voter is then eligible to participate in the convention of such political party, and is not permitted to participate in the convention of another party. This article has no application to the General Election to be held November 8, 1960. All voters will receive the same type ballot in November and are free to mark it as they wish, regardless of any party designation stamped on their poll tax receipts. The ballot is secret and will be entitled to be counted in the election as it is marked, whether it be marked as a "straight ticket" for any one party, or "split" to vote for different parties' candidates. Only one candidate for each office, regardless of party, should be left unmarked, to be counted. In voting for President and Vice President the vote must be cast for both nominees of one party. The voter cannot vote for one party's nominee for president and another party's nominee for vice president, because these nominees' names are printed on the ticket in place of the names of the presidential electors who support their respective party's nominees for both offices.

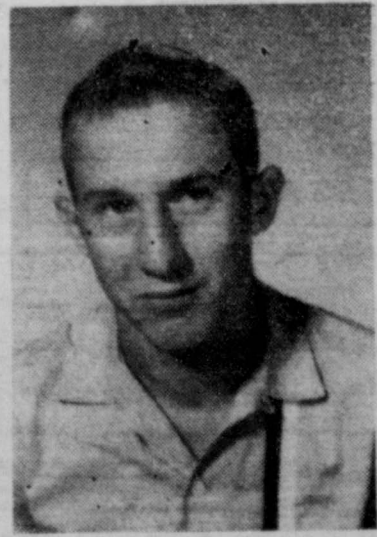

**GENERAL ELECTION NEXT TUESDAY**—Next Tuesday, November 8, is an important day in the United States, when all qualified voters in the country should go to the polls and cast their ballots in the Presidential Election.

Campaigning has been going on hot and heavy. Sometimes one wonders if the campaign has been going too long and that the candidates and their supporters in both political camps have almost run out of "Soap." From all indications during the past week political speeches had all the earmarks of the same thing over and over—some of which is getting pretty old to listeners.

Be that as it may, the drive for votes is drawing to a close and next Tuesday the American people will cast their votes for a President and Vice-President and all other candidates for offices to be filled in this General Election.

The ballot this year has six columns with four political parties offering candidates for the offices of President and Vice-President, and for some of the other offices. They are Democratic, Republican, Constitution and Prohibition parties.

There has been much talk about the split, or straight voting privilege the public has in the General Election.

As you know, the Texas Election Code has been amended to require the stamping of the word "Democrat" or "Republican" on poll tax receipts or exemption certificates when one votes in a party primary. This has nothing whatever to do with General Election voting, but some confusion has resulted.

Governor Price Daniel stated the facts succinctly when in a newspaper interview appearing October 21, 1960, he said that there is no "Legal or moral" bar to an individual's voting according to his own conscience in the General Election, no matter how or whether he voted in the primaries.

The Governor further stated that the "pledge" on the Democratic ballot, expressing the voter's intention to support the nominee of the primary, has no application or bearing upon the General Election.

This not only applies to the Democratic and Republican party columns on the ballot, but, also to the Constitution and Prohibition parties as well.

If a voter is not happy with candidates that appear under one party heading he can cast his ballot for candidates under another party, or may write-in candidates.

So as election day draws nearer people should keep in mind that, (1) they can vote as they choose in the General Election, regardless of what they have done in the past, and (2) it is legal to split the ballot in Texas, (3) each voter should be adequately informed as to his legal voting rights; and (4) every qualified voter ought to exercise this great right and go vote in the General Election, next Tuesday, November 8.

BOTH CANDIDATES WORRY OVER ALIENATED VOTERS | THAT'S ANOTHER REASON FOR BIG DRIVE TO POLLS

WASHINGTON—Perhaps the biggest dilemma in encouraging non-voters to come to the polls is the uncertainty of how they'll vote when they get there. Obviously, many don't vote have a different set of standards, and probably a different concept of politics, than those who do.

In 1948, for example, Harry S. Truman won re-election to the presidency over Thomas E. Dewey, in one of the smallest presidential votes cast in recent U. S. history. This was so, despite the fact that to political experts, a small vote normally results in a Republican victory, and a large vote in a Democratic victory.

What actually happened was that Dewey repelled a voting faction of his party, while Harry Truman had no such effect on adherents to his cause.

Oddly, both GOP presidential candidate Richard M. Nixon and Democratic presidential candidate Senator John F. Kennedy have serious worries along these same lines this year.

Kennedy and the extremely liberal platform adopted by his party have tended to alienate conservative Democrats, particularly in the South. Nixon and his party's liberal platform have tended to do the same, although to a lesser degree, among Republican conservatives of the Goldwater-Taft stripe.

One of the principal reasons for their vigorous get-out-the-vote drives is to compensate for these expected defections.

NEW RULES—He probably won't get anywhere, but freshman Senator Joseph S. Clark (D), Pennsylvania, wants to do something about Senate debating rules that have made the body one of the most agonizing, as well as long-winded legislative operations in a practicing democracy.

Clark wants to change the rules that now permit senators to talk about anything for hours or days at a time in the midst of debate on legislation of vital interest to the well-being of the United States.

He also wants to change the rule that permits the objection of one senator to prohibit a committee from considering such legislation while the Senate is in session.

Among others, he wants to give senators permission to enter their Senate speeches in the main body of the Congressional Record without the present requirement that they be read in full, usually a time-consuming operation before an empty chamber.

Clark plans to propose these rule changes, and other, to the Senate on the opening day of the next session, when such proposals are in order. There are long, long odds against him as some of his changes would curtail the devices used to produce an effective filibuster.

THE LADIES—For the first time, two women are campaigning against each other for a seat in the U. S. Senate. Miss Lucia M. Cormier, Democrat, is seeking to unseat Senator Margaret Chase Smith in Maine.

Mrs. Smith, a widow, is seeking her third term in the Senate. She got into politics to succeed her husband when he died. Miss Cormier is no stranger to politics. She has been an elected official in Maine state government since 1947, and once before sought unsuccessfully to win a seat in Congress.

One thing is certain, neither candidate will campaign on the argument that a woman's place is in the home.

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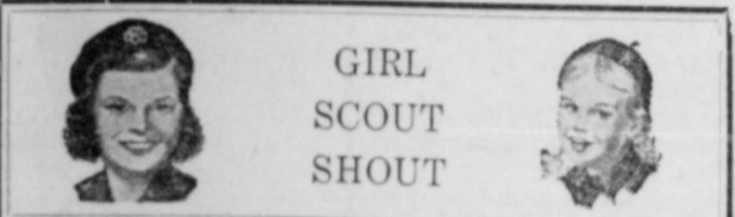

Don't motor to the exact spot where you want to fish. Kill the motor about 20 feet short and paddle toward the spot in question. Or, let the boat drift to the point where you want to fish. A silent approach is your goal.

A fault of some fishermen, says an angling friend, is that he is too impatient to see the fish which has taken his bait. In his anxiety, he lifts the fish up out of the water before he gets it alongside the boat.

Proper procedure is to keep the fish in the water, with the line fairly tight, until you have him within reach. Then lift him firmly but gently over the side and into the bottom of the boat.

Most fishermen let the fish "play" until fully exhausted, then lift him aboard, quickly. Because of the acrobatics which a fish can perform, when lifted free of the water, his chance of release is much greater than if he is kept in the water until the last moment, he has only the resistance which the water provides, unless he can dive among brush and rocks.

An acrobatic fish can fling a hook easily, while one that is in the water has only the possibility of diving deep and becoming entangled in brush or rocks, and then pulling himself free.

Work an area thoroughly before moving your boat to another location.

Many fishermen recommend that casts be made short at first, then a little longer, then distant. Suggested procedure is to cast along the bank and around the boat from left to right, so that all the area is covered before moving to a new location.

Reason given for taking a short cast first is that if you hook a fish, you will not disturb those beyond that catch. Then you have an opportunity to you have an opportunity to more fish.

One tip from a top-water angler — when the fish misses your lure (and you, of course, miss your fish) let the lure rest right where it is for a few moments. Then jerk it slightly so as to give it a "live" effect.

Try that two or three times, then reel it in, light a cigarette and wait for four or five minutes before casting again. Then lay the lure right back in the exact spot where you had it before. There is a good chance that the bass is, by that time, back in his lair and ready to try again.

Another suggestion: If you land a lunker and seem to get no follow-up strikes, move around to the other side of the spot and try it from there. Very

likely you'll find another big one lurking nearby.

Many fishermen feel that a bright, sunny day is the best day to fish.

Not so with one angler. He contends that he had much rather fish when the sky is cloudy, and the sun's rays do not fall directly upon the water. That's when he likes to work around stumps, logs, brush piles, or fallen trees — especially if they are in from two to six feet of water.

Ordinarily, he says, stumps, logs, brush piles, and windfalls will outproduce any other kind of bass cover five to one.

Another angler says that you should fish on the shady side of any lake or stream—which means working one side in the early morning and the other side in the late evening.

Midday is regarded by many as the poorest time to fish.

One angler who heads for the lake at least once a week reports that he never has any success fishing unless there is a ripple on the water.

Also he has discovered that the clarity of the water must be such that he can see his hand at least eighteen inches under the surface. Otherwise, it is his contention that the bass cannot see his favorite lure—a top-water spinner — even though the popping sound does attract their attention.

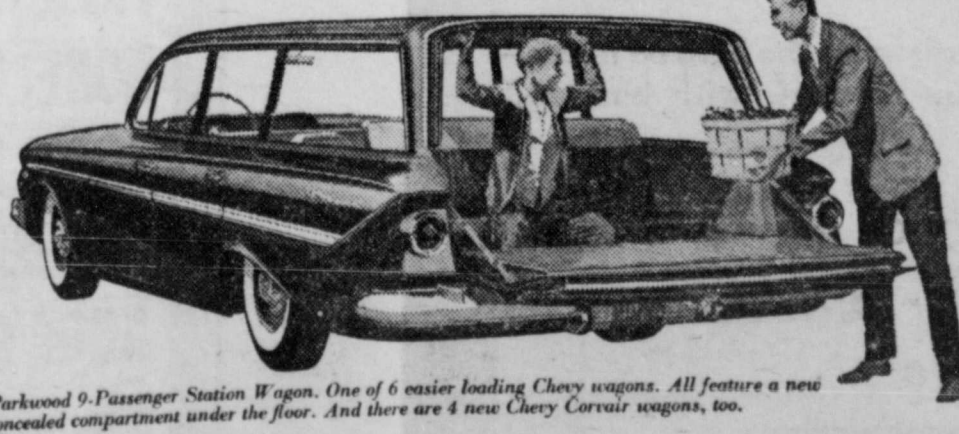

#### YOU CAN PLANT ROSES NOW

Anyone can grow roses, according to A. F. DeWerth, head, Department of Floriculture, Texas A&M College. They may be planted in the fall or spring. In Texas, fall planting is generally preferred.

Aim for quality and you may also get quantity. Many gardeners try to grow too many varieties or too many plants. Given careful attention, Mr. DeWerth says that 10 well chosen varieties will produce as many flow-

ers and give far more pleasure than 50 poorly tended plants.

Essentials for success with roses are: proper planting, a sunny location and well-drained soil. Start with No. 1, grade plants, and have the ground ready when the plants arrive. Make sure the roots are never exposed to sunlight or drying winds.

For details on selection, soil preparation, pruning and care of roses, get a copy of TAP-1—Roses For Texas—from the county extension agent's office.

Last year 850 persons died in the United States in farm fires. Fires also caused an estimated 174 million dollar loss in property. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council says a lot of these fires happened in Texas and there will be others today, tomorrow, next week and next year; that is, unless rural Texans do a much better job of fire prevention. The Council believes that most fires can be prevented and that losses can

be greatly reduced if all Texans will make it impossible for "Fire to find a place to start."

**AUSTIN, TEXAS** — Many a deer may survive the Texas hunting season because the hunter died first.

According to the State Health Department, there were 181 accidental deaths in Texas, attributed to firearms, in 1958. Last year the number increased to 198.

November is the month when hunting starts in earnest. Normally sane men will start blasting away at one another, on deer leases, or contrive intricate

methods of suicide such as climbing over barbed-wire fences with their rifles off safety.

Firearms are not the only threat. Health officials point out that a good many hunters slip and fall over precipices, while gazing off into the distance. Others never get to the lease because they combine a few warming drinks with a fast drive through the pre-dawn chill.

Texas Game and Fish Commission offers these rules for hunting safety:

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun.
2. Always unload and take down guns carried into home or camp.
3. Keep guns clean and be sure to have the right size ammunition.
4. Carry gun so that you can control the muzzle, even if you fall.
5. Be sure of your target before you fire.
6. Avoid all horseplay.
7. Keep guns out of reach of children.
8. Never climb a tree or jump a ditch while carrying a gun.
9. Never shoot at a flat surface.
10. Take no alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

Insurance Hike Asked—A 2.6 per cent increase in workmen's compensation insurance rates has been recommended to the State Board of Insurance.

State Insurance Department statisticians said that the rate increase was needed because of the increased cost of individual claims, rather than an increase in the number of claims.

It would up by \$3,000,000 a year the \$112,000,000 a year paid by Texas employers for on-the-job insurance of workers.

Crop Dusting Damage Upheld—A landowner is liable for damages caused to neighboring farms by crop dusting activities.

The State Supreme Court ruled. Defendant in the case was the Pitchfork Land and Cattle Company which was sued by a group of King County landowners. Suit also was brought against the aerial spraying firm hired by the land company.

Pitchfork Company contended that the spraying firm was solely responsible for any damages, but the high court held the land company responsible too.

**Water Pollution Ruling** — In another case involving landowner rights, the Austin Court of Civil Appeals upheld a lower court decision awarding damages from salt water pollution.

A Runnels County woman, owner of a 150-acre farm, claimed her fresh water supply had been polluted by salt water discarded by a drilling firm during oil exploration efforts.

District court found the drilling firm negligent in not having sealed the pits in which it discarded the salt water. It awarded the landowner \$9,000 in damages.

**Pickle Named To TEC**—J. J. (Jake) Pickle, Austin public relations man, has been appointed by Gov. Price Daniel to succeed Maurice Acers as employer representative on the Texas Employment Commission.

Acers' term expires Nov. 21, but he will remain in office, at the governor's request, until January 9.

Pickle has had a significant background role in many of Texas' major political events in the past decade. He was director of the State Democratic Executive Committee for four years and has worked at one time or another in the political campaigns of Governor Daniel, former Gov. Allan Shivers and Sen. Lyndon Johnson.

Acers, an attorney and former FBI agent, was appointed to TEC by Governor Shivers. He served as Shivers' executive assistant in the governor's office.

listening to a round of protests at a hearing on proposed new regulations of private clubs, the State Liquor Control Board plans to re-study the rules and possibly make some changes.

Administrator Coke R. Stevenson Jr. indicated, however, that the rules would probably be basically the same.

Primarily, says Stevenson, the rules are designed to give the Board a means of preventing the operation of open saloons under the guise of private clubs. They would provide for the licensing of clubs and forbid liquor dealers to deliver liquor to those that did not meet licensing standards.

Representatives of private clubs called some phases of the rules unreasonable, such as requiring a club to be in existence three years before receiving a liquor selling permit. They declared they would welcome some workable guidelines for operation.

along country lanes. It often happened that a grower living miles from town would start moving his flock toward town, often buying up neighbors' turkeys and adding them to his flock as he passed along.

A turkey drive of this kind required several days. At night the birds would roost in live oak trees along the route, foraging on acorns and grasshoppers as they pursued their leisurely way.

It was in 1912 that the late J. C. Howerton, editor of the Cuero Record, developed the idea of building a community celebration around the turkey drives. The first Turkey Trot parade was led by Governor O. B. Colquitt and his staff.

The celebration was staged almost every year until 1947, when the passing of the old range type of turkeys brought about its temporary abandonment. The hybrid, baby beef type of turkey which by then had become standard was not adapted to being driven through the streets under its own power before thousands of onlookers. Among other handicaps, they lost too much weight.

But in 1956 a plan was worked out to compensate growers for the loss in poundage and a shorter parade route was arranged.

The celebration this year, first in four years, will have at least 10,000 gobblers being herded down Cuero's Main Street, and the three-day celebration will include many side attractions.

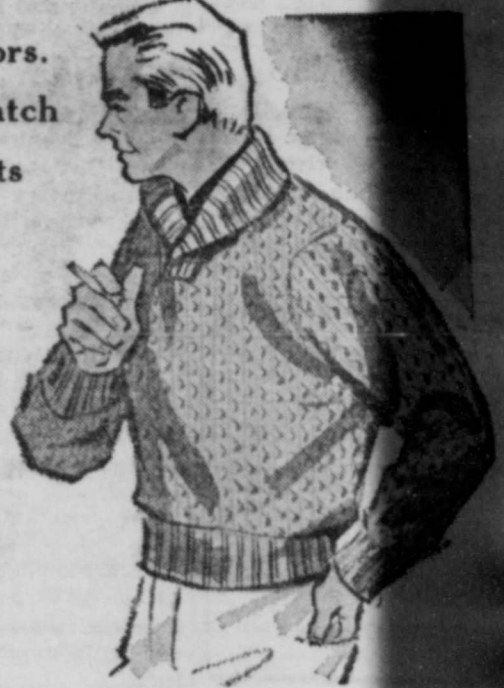
