

## Wilson Head Of Star Is Named Conservation Rancher Of Month



WILSON HEAD

Wilson Head, Mills County rancher and Superintendent of the Star, Texas school, has been selected "Conservation Rancher of the Month" by the supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District.

Head taught school in Denver City, Texas for 18 years prior to buying his 700 acre ranch in 1958. This ranch, 8 miles southeast of Goldthwaite had been owned by his father at one time so Wilson is no stranger to Mills County, having been reared at Center City.

This ranch has 100 acres of cropland which makes it a well balanced unit. The rangeland is cross-fenced into 6 pastures.

In January of 1958 Head took possession of the ranch and removed all the livestock except goats to utilize the brush that had been dozed around 1950. The following fall he added sheep and cattle and sold part of the goats.

In April 1959 he removed all the goats, taking them to a leased pasture. The shinnery brush was controlled or eradicated to the point where it no longer hindered grass growth or ranch operations.

The grass was completely utilized when Head began his ranching operations. The spring of 1959 he planted 50 acres of

Sorghum alnum for temporary grazing and all pastures were given a deferment that summer. In October the goats were brought back. During the winter of 1959, sheep, cattle and goats were grazed on small grain easing the grazing pressure on native rangeland.

He rested two large pastures and a small pasture in the summer of 1960 by utilizing cropland, a creek bottom pasture and an upland pasture which had been rested nearly nine

## Southwestern Granted Telephone Rate Increase By City Council

Southwestern States Telephone Company was granted a rate increase for Goldthwaite subscribers by the City Council meeting in regular session Monday night.

The new rates as approved by the council amount to an increase of approximately fifteen per cent. This was a compromise rate worked out by the council and accepted by Telephone Company representatives A. J. Lacy, and John Allen.

Company representatives made their request for a rate increase when they met with the council in October. Their request was for a substantially higher rate than the one worked out and approved.

New rates which will become effective with the January billing are as follows:

Business one party, from \$8 to \$9. Business two party, from \$6.50 to \$7.25. Business extension, from \$1.50 to \$1.75. Residence one party, from \$5 to \$5.75. Residence two party, from \$4 to \$4.50. Residence four party, from \$3 to \$3.50 and Residence extension, from \$1 to \$1.25.

The council adopted an ordinance setting occupation tax covering medicine shows, carnivals, skating rinks, traveling shows and circuses, shooting gallery and nine and ten pin alleys.

Monthly operating statements of receipts and disbursements for the various departments of the city were presented to the council and other routine business matters were disposed of.

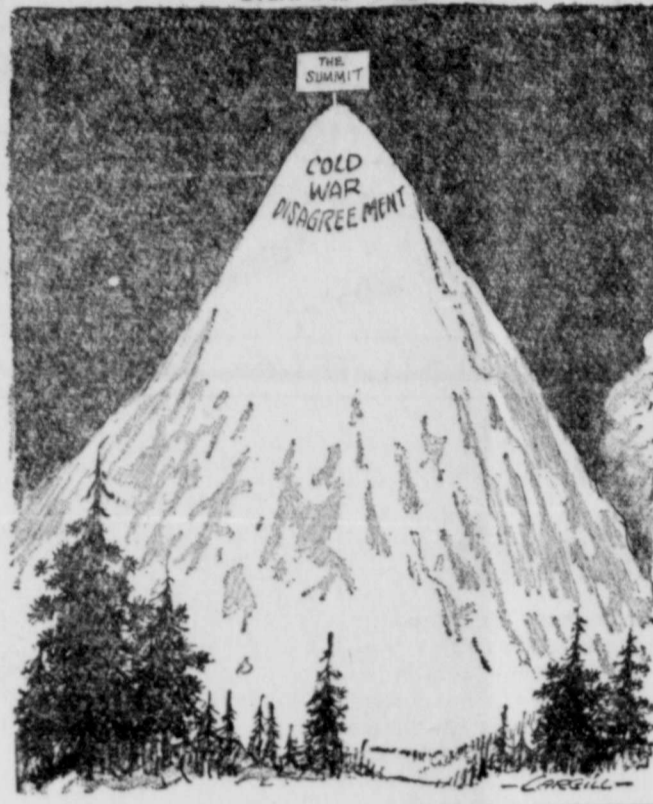

## Inside WASHINGTON

MARCH OF EVENTS  
SOME DAY YOU MAY VOTE FOR PRESIDENT ON SUNDAY | SEPARATE BALLOT URGED FOR NATIONAL OFFICES

WASHINGTON—Now that the elections are over, some deep thinkers in Washington are advocating a change in the day for presidential and congressional voting.

They favor a separate day for voting on national offices to prevent extraneous issues and personalities from diluting the will of the public.

Political pros know that a weak or strong local or state ticket can have a major effect on voting for national offices. They feel that the personal popularity or program of a candidate for state governor, for instance, should not attract votes either toward or away from presidential, senatorial or congressional candidates.

Conversely, an immensely popular presidential candidate can sweep local office-seekers into power with him. In many instances, these pros have found that the majority of the electorate have regretted this in the cold light of morning.

Objectors declare that the expense and trouble of putting on two political campaigns would make such a plan unworkable.

However, advocates reply that the elections dates need only be days apart. They suggest that presidential and national office voting could take place on Sunday and state and local office elections be held the following Tuesday.

● **ELECTRONIC BRAIN**—Some day in the not-too-distant future an electronic computing machine will diagnose your medical complaints and prescribe for them far more accurately than doctors do today.

Progress on such an electronic device was reported in Washington at a recent conference on electrical techniques in medicine and biology.

A computer was adapted to "read" electrocardiograms with 93 per cent accuracy, far better than that obtained in normal clinical practice. The machine is part of a joint project of the National Bureau of Standards, the Veterans Administration and Georgetown University.

However, the developers of medical automation have far more ambitious plans. They hope to develop a computer into which can be fed patient histories, symptoms, clinical test results, and other pertinent data and have the machine analyze all the factors and come up with the correct treatment.

Doctors themselves have no fears that the electronic monsters of the future will do away with their services. They will only be additional tools to remove the human factor from the diagnosis and treatment of illness and disease.

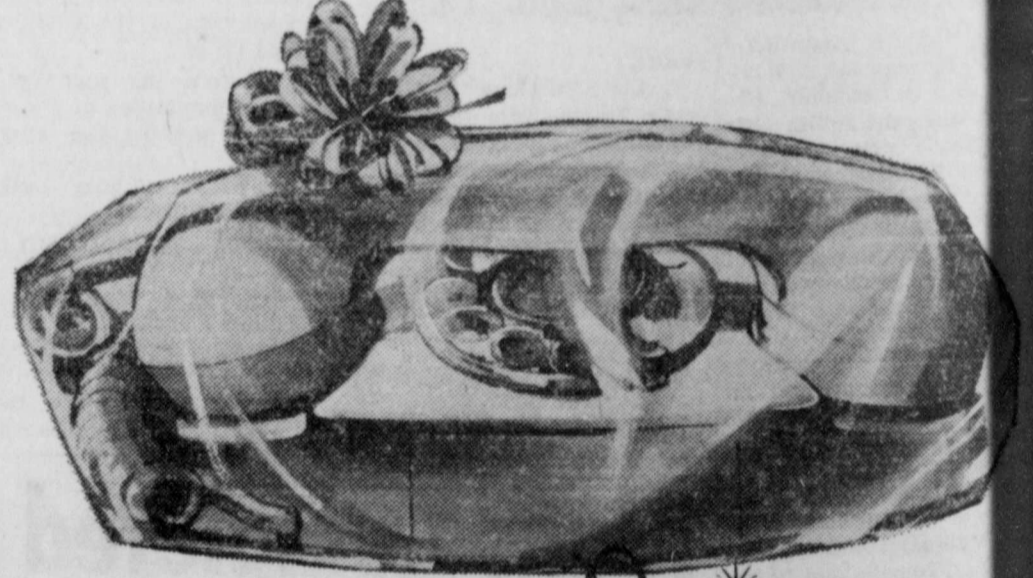
● **THE CANDIDATES**—And, speaking of the elections, Washington newsmen who have been on the long and arduous campaign trail with Sen. John F. Kennedy and Vice President Richard M. Nixon firmly believe that something has to be done to lessen the rigors of future campaigns.

Here were two young and vigorous men who literally beat themselves into the ground in their prenetic search for votes. They traveled more, talked more, shook hands and survived greater physical exertions than ever before in a presidential campaign.

It is doubtful that two older men could have stood the pace. Yet, the jet and television age will make the same demands on future candidates who might be older and less able to stand up to the rigors and hardships of such a campaign.

It is difficult to envision any future candidate who will not try to put out the same physical effort as the young men did in 1960, unless some agreement can be reached to curtail their activities to the point where a normal human being can survive them.

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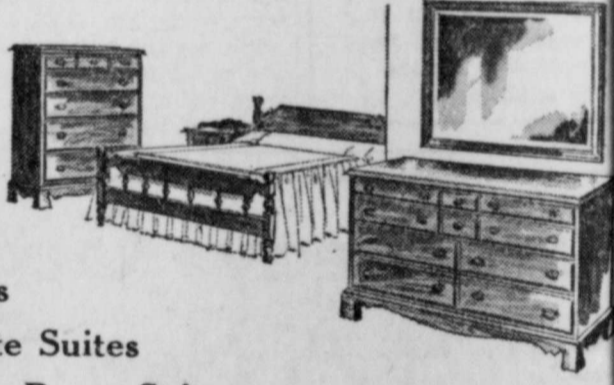
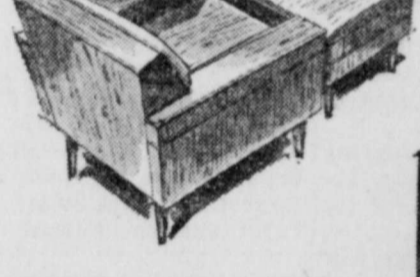
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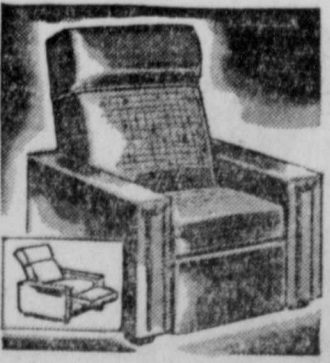
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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

**Out-of-State Tax Denied** — Mrs. J. S. ... cannot collect a tax on premiums of an insurance policy sold to a company in Texas by an out-of-state firm not doing business in Texas. The court of Civil Appeals held that this would conflict with the U. S. Supreme Court decision in effect. A Texas law requiring purchasers of insurance in Austin to be licensed in the state to pay a tax equal to 5 percent of the premiums. This is higher than the tax on commissions licensed in the state. The Supreme Court suggested that the Supreme Court might reconsider its position so that the Texas law become valid.

**Flow Uppe**—Texas Railroad Commission has set the number of barrels of oil allowable at 2,819 barrels a day on a nine-day leasing pattern.

Over the past seven months the state has been limited to producing days. Independent producers, most of whom have been strong for production to eight million in previous months, recommended nine for December. The TIPRO (Texas Independent Producers and Royalty

Owners) had asked the Commission to consider whether the sharp cut-back in Texas production during the past two years actually had improved the supply situation or enabled other producing areas to grab some of Texas' share of the market.

**"Controversial" Books Adopted**—In the enormous and often touchy job of adopting textbooks for public schools, the State Board of Education rejected one and accepted two of three books against which protests had been raised.

Board asked the publishers of the history text, "Texas and our Spanish Southwest," to correct errors before it reconsiders the book in January. Two other books criticized by J. Evetts Haley and a committee known as Texans for America were accepted by the Board.

These are "Language for Daily Use" for grades 7 and 8 and "The Stockmen's Handbook." Haley's committee said the language book was based on too limited a vocabulary and the stockmen's book was too welfare state-ish in its discussion of farm issues.

Seven books opposed by Texans for America already had been eliminated by a teacher-composed advisory committee which screens textbook offerings before they are considered by the Board of Education.

**Local Help To Aged, Ill** — A plan that would divide part of the responsibilities for care of the aged and mentally ill, between state and local government, may be proposed in the next Legislature.

It would take a constitutional amendment approved by the people to put the plan into effect.

Legislative Budget Board has tentatively approved a recommendation whereby the state would split with a city, county or district the cost of such programs as out-patient care for mental patients and nursing home care for elderly patients.

It is felt that this approach might be more economical and effective for some patients. Nearly-recovered mental patients, for example, could be released from bed space at expensive state institutions and get treatment as needed from a nearby clinic.

**Perjury Ruling Reaffirmed**—Court of Criminal Appeals refused to reconsider its 2-to-1 decision that former Insurance Commissioner J. Byron Saunders could not be convicted for perjury as a result of testimony before a legislative committee.

But it did not make the opinion final. Travis County District Attorney Les Procter is filing a second motion for rehearing in hopes of keeping the issue alive until after the first of the year.

At that time one of the members holding in Saunders' favor,

Judge Lloyd Davidson, goes out of office. If incoming Judge W. T. McDonald took the other side, the scales would be tilted and Saunders' conviction upheld.

**Short Snorts** — Secretary of State Zolie Steakley has issued a charter for Houston Baptist College to be built by Texas Baptists on a 200-acre site in Harris County. College is to open its doors by September, 1962. It already has a \$3,000,000 endowment for buildings. . . . Department of Public Safety reports a 7 per cent decrease in Texas traffic fatalities this year as compared with the same period last year. Number of death-causing accidents dropped 9 per cent. . . . Some parts of Texas had the wettest October on record, and all parts of the state except the southwest portion received above-average rainfall last month. State Board of Water Engineers reported that Corpus Christi and Victoria had the wettest October ever, Amarillo had rainfall 16.42 inches above normal by the first of October. . . . Unusually heavy moisture is blamed by Texas A&M experts for the state's generally poor pecan crop this year. Horticulture Professor Dr. Benton J. Store says why wet weather makes bad pecans is not fully understood. Most growers just call it "blight". . . . For ranchers, however, the rainy weather is mostly good news. U. S. Department of Agriculture says Texas ranges are going into the winter in "above average" condition.

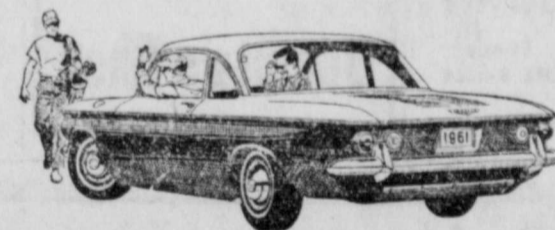

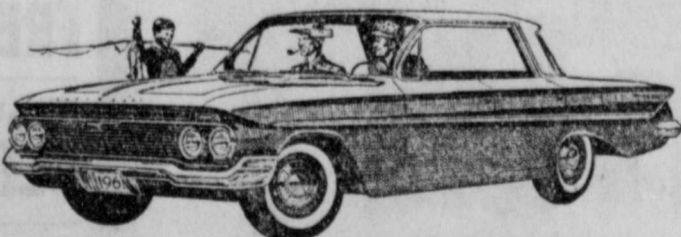

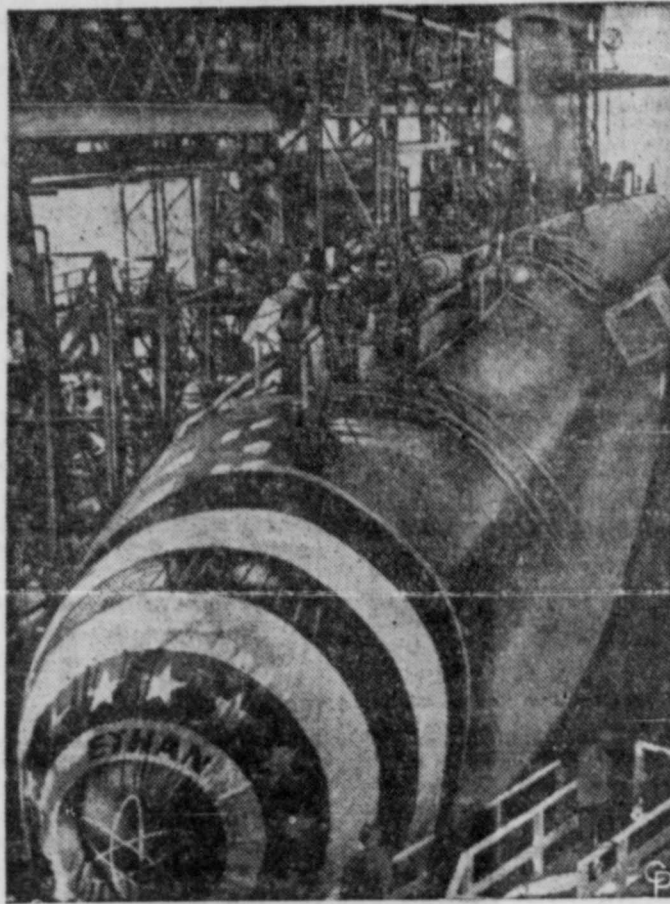

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Texas—By the time the sweeps up the last of the holiday tinsel, it will be time to prepare for another round of festivities.

Committees already are meeting to plan details of the inauguration events that will attract thousands of visitors to the capital, come January 17.

Price Daniel will take oath of office for his third term. Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey, for his part, will ride at the head of the parade these officials will ride at the head of up Congress Avenue.

to the Capitol grounds where the swearing-in ceremony will be held.

A reception and a half-dozen balls will fill out the day. For his past two inaugurations, Governor Daniel has held a prayer breakfast beforehand for state officials.

**No Special Session**—Haggling and suspense over who will be Speaker of the House for the 57th Legislature will continue until January 10.

That is the first day of the regular session when House members, by secret ballot, will elect the speaker from their membership.

Rep. James Cotten of Weatherford asked Governor Daniel to call lawmakers together this month. New members could be sworn in and a speaker elected in a one-day session, he said. This would give the speaker time to organize committees and be ready to go to work in January.

But Governor Daniel said that any legislative meeting this year would be the 56th Legislature, which could not elect a speaker for the 57th Legislature.

Reps. Wade Spilman of McAllen and James Turman of Gober are candidates for speaker. Both, reportedly, are "ahead."

Spilman, in a recent letter to House members, announced addition of two more pledges to him. He said, "A majority of the members have committed their vote to me for Speaker." Jim Turman says the same thing. So, the big question still is: How will the members vote?

**Safety Drive Launched**—This year's campaign for careful driving during the holidays will be launched on "Safety Sunday," December 11.

the Texas Press Association, will help in the annual drive to cut the Christmas-through-New Year's accident toll.

"Safety Sunday," said the governor in his proclamation of the special day, is "to awaken the conscience of every driver to the understanding that negligence at the wheel is a transgression of God's own command, 'Thou shalt not kill.'"

In past years, the governor noted, the all-out campaigns have resulted in the death toll's falling below Department of Public Safety predictions.

Last year the DPS predicted 111 deaths. When the holiday season ended only 91 had died, for a total of 20 lives saved.

**Program For Aged**—Enactment of medical care for the aged and an increase in state pensions are among recommendations of a joint legislative committee to study problems of the aging.

Committee announced it would work for a constitutional amendment to raise by \$10,000,000 a year the ceiling on old age assistance. It also urged that

the next Legislature pass laws to put into effect a program to provide state help for the medical expenses of needy oldsters.

Transfer of senile, but not mentally ill, patients from the mental hospitals to nursing home care was recommended.

Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, is chairman of the committee, and Rep. Howard Green of Fort Worth, is vice-chairman.

**Vet Bond Sale Cancelled**—Veterans Land Board has set aside plans to hold a bond sale this month because of criticism from Land Commissioner-Elect Jerry Sadler.

Board announced its decision "with regret," declaring that the veterans waiting to buy land would be the losers.

No bonds have been sold since June, 1958, because the state ceiling on interest was too low to attract buyers. Board said it felt the people were expressing their desire to get the program in full operation again when they approved a constitutional amendment in November to raise the interest ceiling.

Sadler had protested the sale. He said he felt the bonds could be sold at a more favorable rate next year after a change in the national administration.

**Dam Site Recommended**—Millican, in Brazos County has been recommended to the State Board of Water Engineers as the site for a proposed reservoir on the Lower Navasota River.

An engineering firm made the recommendation after a study contracted by the Brazos River Authority, the towns of Bryan, College Station and Navasota and several industrial firms.

Statistics for the proposed water project are staggering. It would yield in the neighborhood of 200,000,000 gallons of water a day, cost an estimated \$44,000,000. It would not be completed until about 1970 and paid for in 2020.

**Parr Loses Out**—Texas Supreme court refused to review a lower court ruling that blocked George Parr's fight to become Duval County's Democratic Party chairman.

Parr won a district court order for a re-count, but the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals overturned the decision. Su-

preme Court refused to step in, noting that the Election Code said it had no jurisdiction to review election contests.

It was another setback for the Duke of Duval, once credited with the power to decide how any political race in the county would go.

**Short Snorts**—State's general revenue fund is going deeper into the hole, sinking to a deficit of \$76,724,738 on the state treasurer's last report. Deficit increased \$10,000,000 in three weeks. On the plus side, the state has received a check for \$536,547.92 as its share of income

from the sale of 119,400,000 board feet of lumber and other uses of the Texas national forests. Money will be divided among the 11 East Texas counties in which the forests are located.

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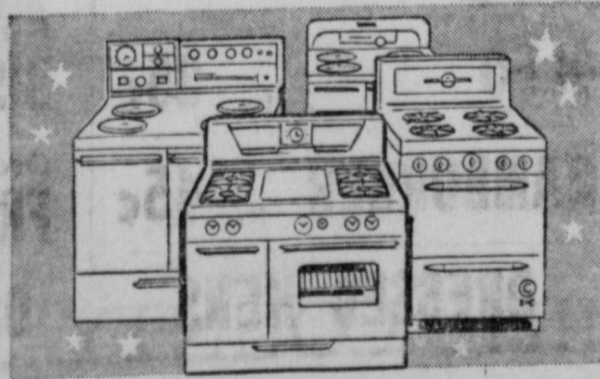

Hunters all across the state say that a deer is a deer no matter what the kind.

However, such a statement is only partially true. True enough, both mule deer and white tails have four legs, a head, and grow antlers. But when it comes to hunting them, the two are quite different.

In the first place, the mule deer likes a different type of terrain for its stomping grounds. It loves the mountainous country like the Big Bend National Park area and the Trans-Pecos. Unlike the white tails the mule deer prefer more open country, with fewer large trees.

A hunter after mule deer had best take along his mountain climbing shoes, a canteen, and enough food to keep him going.

The white tail deer hunter often can drive almost to the spot where he intends to hunt. But the mule deer man must travel by foot or horseback for miles, up into the mountains, after he parks his car.

Mule deer move up high, along ridges and ledges, during the day. There they can watch for intruders. Early in the morning hours they feed along foothills and breaks, moving up to higher area as the sun heats up their range.

A mule deer's makeup is so well suited for his surroundings that often he will stand very still, or hide behind a boulder, while a hunter moves by only a few feet away.

Don't look for the old mossbacks below the does and fawns. They won't be there. They will be higher up.

If you go out for a trophy head you're in for a work-out. You have to do lots of trawling and sign reading, to get a rack worthy of mounting.

When you arrive at the general area on which you plan to hunt, get out and look around for deer tracks or other signs of recent activity. If you see enough fresh tracks to indicate that deer are in the area, you stand a good chance of getting one.

But, don't head out in just any direction. Look the situation over. Which way do the tracks lead and are they doe tracks or are they big buck tracks?

If they are sharp pointed, small, and barely visible in soft soil you are looking at the tracks of either a small buck or

a doe. If they are deep and large and rounded off in front, you are looking at the tracks of a buck worth hunting.

Now, if you brought along that rifle with a scope, and it has been sighted in for 150 or 200 yards, you're ready for a hunt. You won't get nearly as many close shots at mule deer as you do white tails.

If it's early morning, watch closely along places where the brush ends and the open grassy areas begin. These breaks are favorite hiding places for muleys. They can feed in the open at the edge of the breaks and dart back into the brush should something or someone surprise them.

Always move slowly. It's not easy to see a deer standing in the brush with just his head protruding.

Also, if you're moving rapidly a deer will know instantly that what it hears is either another deer moving out in fright, or some predator rushing in on it.

If you move slowly the deer might think that you are just another deer grazing nearby.

Mule deer don't follow trails like white tails. In the first place, the terrain in mule land is rocky. It doesn't change much when hoofed feet march across it.

But these mountain loving deer do prefer certain places for traveling. A lot of times it depends on the conditions. They

like to be where they can have the advantage of air currents. If the breezes are moving downward they will travel along the lower ledges. If the currents are moving up the mountain sides, they will likely be traveling high on the ridges.

It is possible to take a stand and wait them out. But you'd better know the abilities and habits of these deer. They'll outsmart you most every time.

It's not unusual for an old buck to keep just far enough ahead of its pursuer to stop on a rise or ridge out of sight and watch absolutely motionless.

Sometimes, I've wondered how these animals can cover terrain that I couldn't even begin to cross. Don't ever be surprised at anything they might attempt. I've seen them leap from ledge to ledge and climb bluffs that I thought only mountain goats could master.

Their gait, a high, bouncing, stiff-legged one, is ideal for their travel. But it makes them an impossible, moving target.

I don't intend to turn you against hunting mule deer. In fact I strongly recommend this type of hunting. A mule deer is one of the few animals we can

hunt in Texas today where lots of planned strategy is a must.

If you are one who loves to climb mountains and tramp around in high places, then get out that rifle and go after an old trophy-horned mule deer.

You'd better be in pretty good physical shape. You can get the youngsters with fairly nice spreads, on the lower levels. But you'll have to get out and work for prize racks.

Remember too — after you've bagged him, high on a mountain top, you still have to get him back to camp.

When you do get him down, and the head has been mounted and hanging on your den wall, you'll be ready for another hunt.

AN ORDINANCE IMPOSING OCCUPATION TAXES ON EVERY PERSON, FIRM, COMPANY OR ASSOCIATION OF PERSONS PURSUING CERTAIN OCCUPATIONS WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE, MILLS COUNTY, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH TAXES SHALL BE LEVIED AND COLLECTED; PRESCRIBING A PENALTY AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.  
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE:—  
Section 1.  
There shall be, and is hereby levied on and collected from every person, firm, company or association of persons, pursuing within the limits of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, any of the occupations named in the following lettered subdivisions of this Ordinance, an annual occupation tax, which shall be paid in advance on every such occupation or separation establishment, as follows:

(a) Medicine Shows. From every person, firm, association of persons, or corporation, owning or operating for profit a medicine show there shall be collected in advance an occupation tax of \$2.50 for each performance given by a medicine show, but the total collection can not exceed \$25.00 in any one year.  
(b) Carnivals. From every carnival showing or exhibiting in the City of Goldthwaite, there shall be collected in advance a quarterly tax of Twenty-Five (\$25.00) Dollars. For the purposes of this ordinance a carnival is defined as a collection of shows, exhibits, riding devices and other amusement devices collected and operated as a whole under one management.  
(c) Skating Rinks. From each and every owner or keeper or operator of any skating rink used for profit, whether furnishing skates or not, there shall be collected in advance, an annual tax of Twelve and One Half (\$12.50) Dollars.  
(d) Traveling Circus and Shows. From every person, firm, association of persons or corporation exhibiting performances such as a circus, menageries, wild west, dog and/or pony show, or any other show exhibiting or performance similar thereto, for which an admission fee is demanded, required or received, for each day or part thereof on which performances or exhibitions are given, there shall be collected in advance a daily tax of Twelve and One Half (\$12.50) Dollars.  
(e) Shooting Gallery. From every person, firm, association of persons or corporation, owning or operating a shooting gallery at which a fee is demanded, required or paid, there shall be collected an annual tax of Seven and One-Half (\$7.50) Dollars.  
(f) Nine and Ten Pin Alleys. From every person, firm, association of persons, or corporation, owning or operating for profit every Nine or Ten Pin or other alley, by whatever name called, constructed or operated upon the principle of a bowling alley, upon which pins, pegs, balls, rings, hoops or other devices are used, and where the player thereof does or is not required to make a coin deposit causing an electrical connection of any nature or kind before such game may be actually commenced, there shall be collected an annual tax for each track or alley the sum of Five (\$5.00) Dollars.  
Section 2.  
If any person shall violate any provision of this ordinance he shall forfeit to the City of Goldthwaite, as a penalty, the sum of not less than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars and not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each violation, and each day's violation shall constitute a separate offense, and in addition thereto, delinquent taxes shall draw a penalty equal to one per cent (1%) per month from due date.  
Section 3.  
Upon the payment of the tax imposed by this ordinance the City Tax Assessor and Collector

of the City of Goldthwaite, shall issue to the person, firm, association of persons or corporation paying such tax a receipt evidencing such payment.  
Section 4.  
Whoever shall pursue or follow any occupation, calling or business for which a tax is herein required to be paid, without exhibiting and displaying the tax receipt issued to him in the manner provided in this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars.  
Section 5.  
All taxes herein levied and imposed are made payable in current money of the United States of America, only.  
Section 6.  
If any section or subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Article.  
Section 7.  
It is further ordained that all ordinances or parts of ordinances heretofore adopted and in conflict herewith, be and the same are hereby expressly repealed.  
Section 8.  
By reason of the fact that the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, considers the passage of this ordinance necessary for the preservation of the public welfare, health and safety of the said City of Goldthwaite, Texas, and its citizens, it is hereby declared by the said City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, that an emergency exists demanding that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at more than one meeting of the City Council be suspended and that this ordinance take effect immediately after its passage and publication.

cast anticipates relative stability in cash receipts, farm cost rates and net farm income.  
 In summary, the forecast predicted about as follows:  
 "Relative stability in cash receipts, production expenses, and net income will likely continue in 1961. Reflecting record farm output this year, the volume of farm marketings is running about three per cent above 1959 and may increase further in 1961 if growing conditions are average or better.  
 "Livestock production will likely increase in 1961. Cattle prices in 1961 probably will continue to decline under the impact of larger marketing and result in some further decline in cash receipts from cattle.  
 "Marketing of hogs will continue below a year earlier well into 1961, reflecting the reduced pig crops this year, and prices are expected to remain relatively high well into 1961.  
 "Prices for dairy products and eggs are expected to hold above a year earlier well into 1961. But egg marketings in the last half of 1961 are expected to rise above a year earlier and prices may be lower. Prices for most crops so far in 1960 average about the same as a year earlier, and they probably will continue fairly stable in 1961."  
 President-elect John F. Kennedy has pledged to sponsor a broad program aimed at boosting farm income by various means, including higher price supports, stricter production controls, and an intensive program for disposing of farm surpluses which tend to hold prices down.  
 The USDA forecast was included in a farm income report prepared for a department outlook conference with government farm economists, state extension leaders and others taking part.

Programs affecting most 1961 crops, of course, will have been set before the new administration gets well under way, and there would not be time before the planting season for sharp changes to be made. The fore-

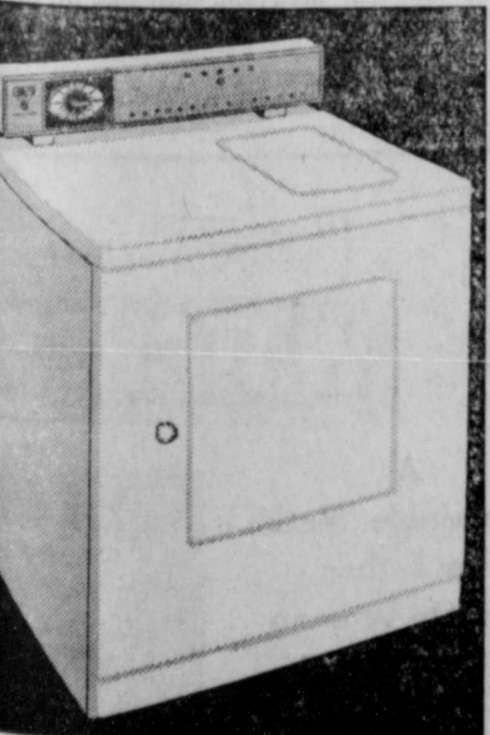

## 1959 Census Of Agriculture For Mills County Is Released

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Mills County last fall, counted 767 farms, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

Total land in farms was 424,393 acres. The average size of farm was 553.3 acres. The average value of farms (land and buildings) in the county was \$37,870.

Of the county's farm operators, 448 owned their farms, 200 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 115 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 53.6 years. There were 173 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

Of the 767 farms in the county, 482 were commercial farms. Detailed statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc., are presented in the preliminary report, with comparable statistics

for 1954. Copies of the county report may be obtained for 10 cents from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

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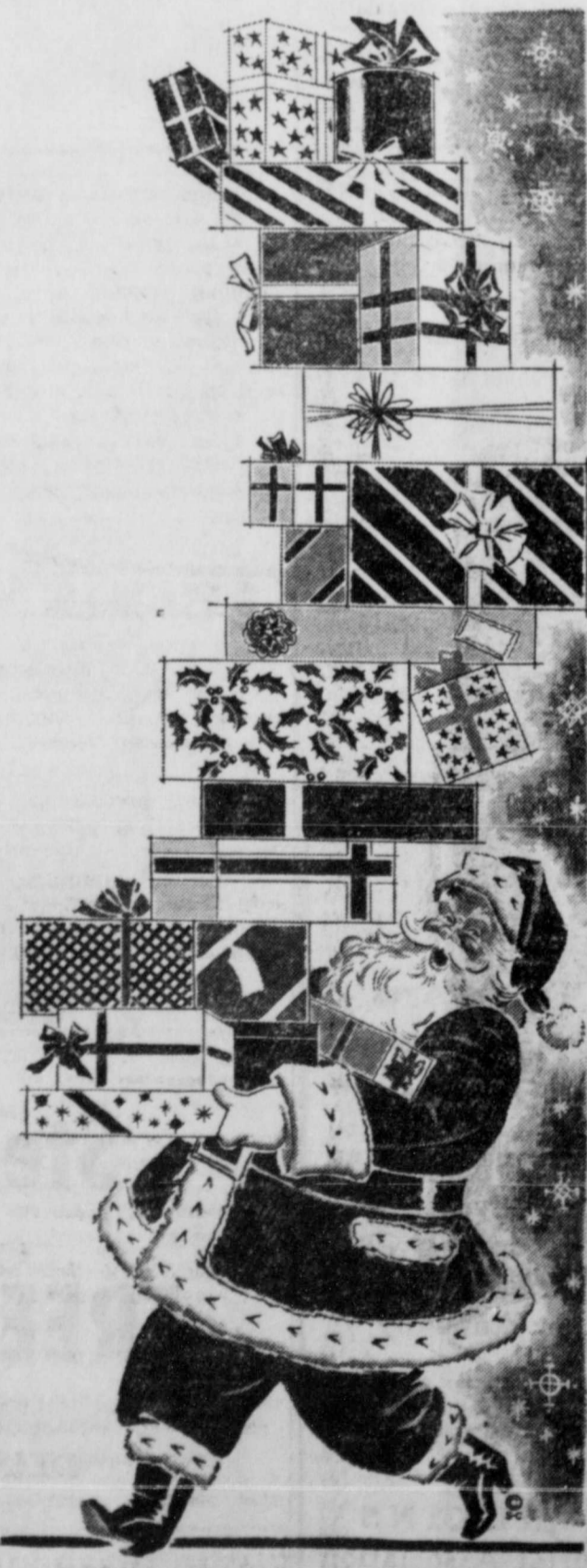

months the year before.

When Head brought the sheep out of the Bermuda grass bottom on Bennett Creek to the Little bluestem and Indian grass upland pasture he said, "I could tell in two weeks they had been gaining weight." He had been a little worried his sheep would not do good since the grass in his rested pasture had become quite tall.

Since becoming a cooperator with the Brown-Mills SCD Head has developed a basic conservation plan including a conservation cropping system of contour farming, cover cropping, rotation hay and pasture, fertilization, and crop residue management. On rangeland, proper range use and deferred grazing is planned to be applied.

All fields are terraced and protected with diversions. He plants small grains for winter grazing and has temporary pasture for summer grazing. He plans to work a legume into his cropland program for soil maintenance and use fertilizers as they are needed.

Since Head began carrying out a conservation program on this ranch he is well pleased with the results. Texas grama, 3-awns, seep muhly and some of the lower producing grasses have begun to be replaced by higher producing plants such as sideoats grama, Indian grass and little bluestem. Properly grazing his pastures has given only one side effect—his ponds no longer fill as quickly as they did. In fact, it takes a large rain to create run-off at all.

All the ponds on the ranch are stocked with fish as his interests includes fishing and hunting. The excellent growth of grass and knocked brush left on the ground provides a seed source and provides food and protection for quail while making effective use of rainfall and soil resources.

To further improve and speed up improvement on his ranch, Head plans to reduce his livestock numbers thereby reducing feed and labor costs. He feels this will make a more economical ranch unit from the reduction in feed and labor and he hopes to increase the production of livestock due to the fact they will have more available forage. By trial and error he will arrive at a safe stocking rate which will give him the highest possible return for his investment.

## Cotton Referendum December 13

Chairman E. L. Burkett of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization committee is reminding growers of upland cotton of the referendum to be held Dec. 13 to determine whether marketing quotas will apply to their crop production in 1961.

Marketing quotas have been proclaimed for upland cotton as required by law on the basis of the estimated supply for the 1960-61 marketing year.

The quotas do not take effect unless approved by at least two-thirds of the farmers voting in the referendum. Any grower who engaged in production of the crops in 1960 is eligible to vote, Mr. Burkett said.

The national acreage allotment for 1961-crop upland cotton is 18,458,424 acres, of which Texas has received an allotment of 7,849,196 acres.

Individual growers will receive their farm allotments through the mail before the referendum.
