Priddy Boys & Girls Are Winners Of Annual Invitational Tournament

Priddy boys and girls were top winners in the ninth annual basketball tournament which got underway Monday night, December 12, in the Goldthwaite High School Gym with Mullin girls meeting the Pottsville team. Pottsville girls defeated the Mullin lassies by a score of 43-21.

Other games of Monday night saw Star boys defeated by Pottsville by a score of 39-36; Priddy girls team defeated the Llano girls by a score of 59-31 and Priddy boys defeated the Mullin boys by a score of 64-35.

Play was resumed again Tuesday with games between the Early girls and Lometa in which Lometa won by a score of 53-23. The Goldthwaite Eaglettes defeated Star 30-27. In the boys bracket, Early defeated Lometa by a close score of 53-52 while Goldthwaite took the contest from Cherokee by a score of 34-28. Wednesday night was a rest from basketball.

Play was resumed again Thursday afternoon at 3:30 with a consolation flight game between Mullin and Star girls in which Mullin won by a score of 43-38; Priddy lassies won from Early by a score of 56-2. The boys of Star defeated Mullin boys by a score of 37-31 and Priddy boys defeated Pottsville 60-35. Then in the fifth game on Thursday, the Goldthwaite girls defeated Pottsville girls by a score of 34-29.

P-TA Executive Meeting January 3

The Goldthwaite P-TA Executive meeting will be held in the conference room at the Goldthwaite High School building on Tuesday, January 3, 1961 at 4:00 p. m., according to announcement by Mrs. Walton Daniel, president of the P-TA.

The number of games was out of balance Thursday and Friday due to other Mills County teams other than Goldthwaite being in Conference play but in the three games of the Friday session, Lometa boys won from Cherokee 59-35; Early won from Goldthwaite 48-40 and the Fems of Llano defeated Lometa by a score of 41-32, according to coaches and Supt. J. T. Jones.

The finals were unrolled Saturday night with Llano girls defeating Mullin 45-22. In the other consolation game, Lometa boys won a close one from Star by 51-48. The Goldthwaite Eaglettes played an outstanding game against Priddy that saw the lead change hands several times but finally succumbed to Priddy by the close score of 36-33.

The final game was played between the boys of Early and Priddy but Priddy was too much by far for the Early Longhorns and they took the final contest 61-37.

Trophies were awarded winners in each division for First Place; second place and first place in the Consolation Flight. Thus in the girls division Priddy was first; Goldthwaite second, and Llano third. The winners of the boys trophies were Priddy first; Early and Lometa.

All tournament players receiving individual trophies were (Girls Division) Sellhammer and Senger, Priddy; Berry and Elliott, Goldthwaite; Morgan of Llano and Watkins of Early. Boys Division, Currin and Evans of Priddy, Morgan of Goldthwaite, C. A. Milam of Early and L. Morrison of Lometa. No records were broken in this tournament.

Gate receipts for the tournament amounted to \$484.50 with expenses other than utilities and pictures of winning teams amounting to \$217.63, according to announcement by Supt. J. T. Jones.

Coaches Looney and Williams have arranged a tournament for the 7th and 8th grade boys and girls for January 14 and they want to enter a good tournament for the freshman boys and girls. The varsity teams will play in the Early High School tournament January 2 through January 8.

Official Census Figures Show Goldthwaite 1,383; County 4,467

Goldthwaite has a population of 1,383 according to official census figures that have now been released.

The official report shows that Mills County has a population of 4,467.

In 1950 Goldthwaite had a population of 1,566 and Mills County had 5,999.

Both figures show a slight increase over the preliminary count which was released last spring after the count was made. At that time the district

supervisor announced the count for Goldthwaite 1,365 and for Mills County 4,430.

Mullin has a population of 219 according to the official count. Priddy and Star are not listed since they are not incorporated towns.

Mills County had three census divisions which are as follows: Goldthwaite division 2,246; Mullin-Priddy division, 1,495; Star division 726.

FOOD & NUTRITION BRIEFS

Try new garnishes for soup. Everyday food items which make unusual soup garnishes are thin strips of canned pimiento, paper thin slices of lemon, orange or lime, slices of stuffed olive, and grated or crumbled cheese. Whipped cream with a dash of horseradish is good with some types of soups. With tomato soup, try popped corn.

Eating tossed green salads is an easy way to "take" vitamins and minerals. Dark green and yellow vegetables are excellent sources of vitamins A and C. High on this list of vegetables are fresh cabbage and other salad greens, carrots, asparagus, broccoli and green peppers. Snowfall measuring 8.6 inches in El Paso during Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of last week set an all time record, the Weather Bureau said. The former three-day record was set Feb. 1-3, in 1956 with 8.1 inches.

This is Friday. Just last night there was still a little snow, and today, though the sun has shone, there is still snow on the mountain and it is very chilly outside.

The supper for the college age groups from Texas Western College and the Military Service last Sunday night came out just fine. The living room was cheery with Christmas decorations. The members from this area brought food, and those near by stayed to help. After supper Grace played the piano and the young people sang Christmas carols. It was all very enjoyable.

Tuesday night Johnny and Grace and I went with Billy to a pageant at his school. They really had crowds of children there. The band played and the choruses sang. It was great. Billy played his French horn in the band.

The chorus looked so pretty in their parachute-white-silk choir robes, each adorned with a red velvet ribbon bow at the neck front. Yesterday we heard from the Lanes. They are our good friends who used to live second door to us on Delta Street. Just about a year ago they were sent to Germany. The star at the top of the tree contains 40 bulbs.

AUSTIN, TEXAS—So far this year, the average number of persons killed in Texas traffic accidents has been slightly more than four per day.

But during the 10-day holiday period, the average is expected to jump to nine.

Department of Public Safety is predicting 90 traffic fatalities in the 10 days from December 23 to January 1. In the first 49 weeks of this year, the traffic toll was 2,025.

Tabbed to be the worst day of the year is Saturday, December 24. Tying for second in the DPS predictions will be Friday, December 23, and Sunday, December 25. New Year's Day will rank third.

DPS predictions, though based on sober experience, are not the last word. During last year's holidays, which were marked by an intensive safety campaign, drivers brought down a predicted 111 deaths to an actual 97. A similar cut would hold this year's holiday motorcides to about 80.

More important than totals and averages to the man at the wheel is whether he himself will wind up a statistic. Best way to get "home for Christmas" and back again, DPS officials advise, is to obey traffic laws scrupulously.

Says Col. Homer Garrison Jr., department director, "Experience has shown without a doubt that in most fatal traffic accidents, at least one violation of the traffic laws is a causative factor."

Tax Take Down—Revenue from the new tax bill passed by the Legislature in 1959 is running nearly 11 per cent below expectations.

The Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy (a legislative study group) reports income for the first year of \$81,700,000, compared with a predicted \$91,100,000.

A big part of the discrepancy came from a cut in cigarette smoking after the tax jumped from five to eight cents a pack. Revenue from hotel room rentals also fell short of predictions. Income from the severance beneficiary tax on gas is tied up pending a final court decision on whether it's constitutional.

Besides these new tax setbacks, an old faithful revenue raiser, the motor fuel tax, is off. State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said gasoline tax revenue was down .23 of one per cent from July to October. Cited as possible causes were compact cars and "piggyback" shipment of trailer trucks by rail.

F-M Road Change Urged—Texas Good Roads Association will ask the next Legislature to authorize use of the \$15,000,000-a-year farm road allocation for maintenance as well as construction of rural roads.

At present, the state spends \$27,000,000 a year on upkeep of the vast farm road system. This comes from regular Highway Department funds since the \$15,000,000 is an automatic general revenue appropriation which can be used only to build new farm roads.

TOGA favors continuing to take the F-G road money from the general revenue fund. This is to "get back" part of the \$70,000,000 a year in highway-use taxes (gasoline, car registrations) that go to non-highway purposes.

It recommended giving the Highway Department authority to zone the new divided highways for higher speed limits, up to 70 miles per hour.

Gas Tax Held Void—Texas' severance beneficiary tax on natural gas took another legal tumble when the Third Court of Civil Appeals agreed with district court in holding it unconstitutional.

Case goes now to the Texas Supreme Court and then to the U. S. Supreme Court to be settled finally.

Thus far, the severance beneficiary tax is having worse luck than the gas gathering tax which the Civil Appeals Court held constitutional in 1953. It was finally knocked down by the U. S. Supreme Court.

Thus far, \$11,016,414 in severance beneficiary taxes has been paid to the state under protest. This cannot be spent, however, as long as the tax is being contested in the courts.

Saunders Case Closed—Court of Criminal Appeals has closed the books on the perjury charge against former State Insurance Commission Chairman J. Byron Saunders.

A district court sentenced Saunders to two years in prison on the charge that he lied to a legislative investigating committee about money he received from an insurance company. Appeals Court threw out the conviction, saying that false testimony before a legislative committee is not perjury in the legal sense.

Travis County Dist. Atty. Les Procter twice asked for re-hearing, contending the decision left legislative committees without authority to get truth from witnesses. But the court made the decision final by overruling Procter's motion with no written opinion.

Property Owner Vote Upheld—Texas Supreme Court issued an opinion upholding the action of Laredo election judges in restricting the vote in an urban area renewal election to property owners.

In the Laredo election, a proposal that the city participate program lost. Urban renewal supporters challenged the election because of the property owner restriction on voting.

San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals ruled that the restriction was unconstitutional because the proposal did not call for spending money. Supreme Court disagreed, pointing out that an urban renewal agency

could spend money and issue bonds. High court sent the case back to the civil appeals court with instructions to reconsider.

Short Shorts—Texas Railroad Commission decided to continue December's oil quotas through March. This means production of 2,799,157 barrels a day on a nine-day producing pattern.

Earlier, Commission Chairman Ernest O. Thompson had suggested that perhaps Texas should start producing more oil to keep other states from grabbing the market. . . . Despite protests of several legislators, the State Library Commission voted to merge the Texas Rural Library Service and the State Library's extension division. Five employees lose jobs in the change. . . . Governor Daniel appointed John Barron, Bryan attorney, to succeed District Judge W. T. McDonald, who was elected to the Court of Criminal Appeals. McDonald will succeed Judge Lloyd Davidson, whom he defeated for re-election.

SHRUB DISEASES—

Many people notice leaf spots in ligustrum, euonymus, gardenia, holly, photinia and other broadleaf evergreens at this time of year. These fungal leaf spots may be of different sizes and colors. They lower the aesthetic value of shrubs; however, the plants are damaged little since the damage is on one-year old leaves that will soon be ready to naturally fall from the shrub. Several different fungi or molds may cause these leaf spots.

A preventative spray program is effective in reducing the damage by leaf spots. Use 2 tablespoons of captan or 2 tablespoons of zineb per gallon of water. Add a spreader-sticker to the spray. A combination of zineb and captan may be more effective. Zineb or captan may be used with safety during any part of the year.

With bacterial leaf spots, it may be necessary to spray with a fixed or insoluble copper such as Copper A Compound or Tri-basic Copper Sulfate. Bordeaux mixture may also be used.

Leaf spots may occur during the growing season. Continued premature loss of leaves may weaken a shrub so that it is more susceptible to other troubles. A good spray program plus proper fertilization and watering will help improve the health of shrubs. Avoid wetting foliage while watering as this tends to spread leaf spots.

MINERAL SUPPLEMENTS—

Beef cattle need a liberal supply of minerals for proper bone development and growth. Extension animal husbandmen at Texas A&M College say that mineral supplements are no cure-all, but they are necessary for successful grassland cattle production in areas where soils have become deficient in min-

erals. Minerals most likely to be needed by cattle are sodium, chlorine, phosphorus and calcium. You can supply sodium and chlorine by feeding common salt. The other two—phosphorus and calcium—can be furnished through mineral supplements.

Phosphorus deficiency may occur in any part of the State at any time, but in some sections it is present at all times. A year round supplement feeding program should be carried out if you live in one of these sections.
