Bond Sales for November

Savings Bonds sales in Mills County were \$16,599 during November. Purchases for the first seven months of 1960 totaled \$5,552 or 74.1 per cent of the early goal. Mr. W. P. Duren, chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee said:

"E and H 1960 sales in Texas amounted to \$139,283,903. This represents 84.2 per cent of the 1960 goal of \$165.5 million. According to Mr. William H. Neal, National Director of the Treasury Bond Program, "November marked the eleventh consecutive month in which Savings Bonds Program has shown growth. We are especially encouraged by the continued downward growth in redemptions a major factor contributing to this sustained growth," Neal concluded.

Business Population Of Mills County Listed In Dun & Bradstreet Increases

Today, Mr. A. J. Hemphill, manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced statement requests were mailed to businesses in Mills County. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1961 totaled 84 manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers in this area as compared with 87 in January, 1960—an increase of 25 per cent for the period.

According to Mr. Hemphill, each January, business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to approximately three million business concerns—to the corner grocery store worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth

millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.

Committee Announces Drive For Park Maintenance Fund

The 1961 drive for Mills County Park maintenance fund will be officially opened this week, according to announcement by W. P. Duren, chairman of the park committee. Other members of the committee are Lewis T. Hudson, Charles Conrad, Har-

old Yarborough and Houston Duren.

Details were worked out Tuesday night when the committee met to discuss the campaign.

Plans call for enlisting a minimum of 100 interested persons who will contribute \$12, or more, for the year to provide funds for year around caretaker and proper upkeep of the park.

Last year 123 interested citizens contributed \$1,210 to the fund which made it possible for the committee to accomplish some major improvements in the park. More improvements are needed this year in addition to regular upkeep.

Chairman Duren announced that letters will be sent out this week to all who supported the project last year asking their continued support for this year. Letters will also be mailed to an additional 300 citizens enlisting their support.

The committee feels that \$1,200 will be needed for this year's work.

The \$12 contribution for the year is a suggestion and it was pointed out that many may want to make a larger contribution which will certainly be in order and will be appreciated.

During the past week \$110 was contributed to the park fund after story appeared in the Eagle last week pointing out that the park fund was needing a boost.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Soil Surveyors with the Soil Conservation Service of the USDA have mapped approximately 50 million acres during the year. This represents an increase of 2 million acres over the previous 1959 fiscal year. Four Soil Scientists within the Brownwood Area, namely D. R. Coffee, Lee Bolts, Randy Burton, of Brownwood, and Otto Bynum of Brady mapped 380,000 acres of the national total during the year, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist at Brownwood.

Field soil mapping is being stepped up by Soil Scientists within the Area and throughout the nation as a part of the National Cooperative Soil Survey and for use in planning soil and water conservation measures by farmers and ranchers. Next year's goal for mapping within the Area will exceed 500,000 acres, Hughes said.

Soil surveys are made by about 1,200 Soil Scientists of the SCS who examine soils, field by field and record their findings on aerial photographs, which

then become soils maps. Information recorded includes the kinds of soils; their properties, such as productivity and response to management; slope, losses of soil by erosion, and other features of the land that will influence use for cultivation or grazing.

Standard Soil Surveys, which will contribute to the National Land Inventory, are now underway in all counties. First priority counties for Standard Soil Surveys to be completed within the Brownwood Area are Menard, Mills, and Coleman Counties. Field mapping is scheduled for completion in Menard County by the end of 1961.

The Standard Soil Survey field work will be finished in Mills County by 1963 and in Coleman County by about 1965, according to present plans.

Other counties within the Area will have Standard Soil Surveys scheduled for completion by about 1975, with priorities established in keeping with annual progress and available technical help, Hughes related.

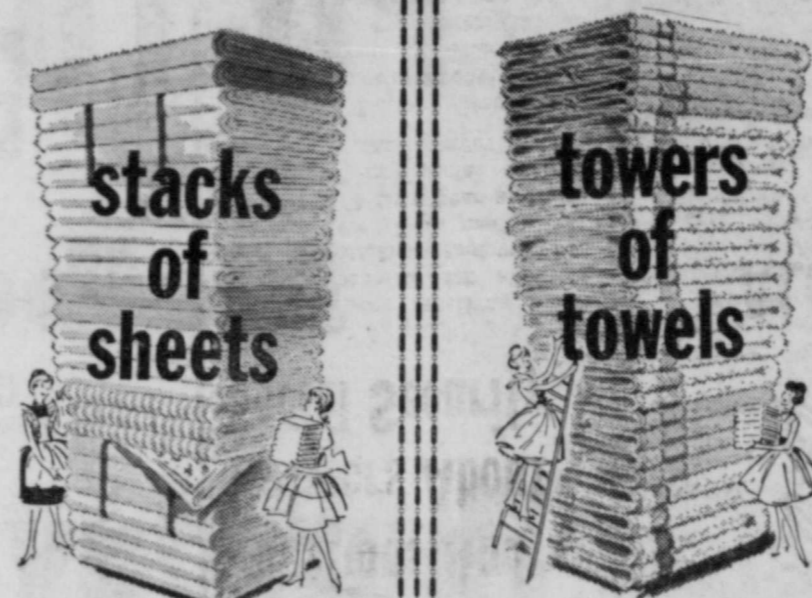

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I am 67 years old and have been receiving social security benefits for about a year. My neighbor told me that the law now allows me to earn over \$1200.00 in a year and still receive all my social security benefits. Is this correct?

Answer: Your neighbor was only partly correct. There was a change which is effective in 1961. If you earn over \$1200.00 in 1961 you will lose some benefits, but not as much as you would under the old law. If you make between \$1200.00 and \$1500.00 you will lose only \$1.00 in benefits for each \$2.00 you earn from \$1200.00 to \$1500.00. For every \$1.00 that your earnings go above \$1500.00 your benefits for the year can be reduced by \$1.00. Your social security office has a free pamphlet explaining this change in the law. Ask them for Pamphlet OA-C806.
