MOVING AHEAD-We're off to a good start for the new year of 1961

The holiday season, which is a wonderful time of the year to look forward to, has come and gone. Christmas was good to us and we hope it was especially good to all of you.



Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I am 67 years old and have been receiving social security benefits for about a year. My neighbor told me that the law now allows me to earn over \$1200.00 in a year and still receive all my social security benefits. Is this correct?

Answer; Your neighbor was only partly correct. There was a change which is effective in 1961. If you earn over \$1200.00 in 1961 you will lose some benefits, but not as much as you would under the old law. If you make between \$1200.00 and \$1500.00 you will lose only \$1.00 in benefits for each \$2.00 you earn from \$1200.00 to \$1500.00. For every \$1.00 that your earnings go above \$1500.00 your benefits for the year can be reduced by \$1.00. Your social security office has a free pamplet explaining this change in the law. Ask them for Pamplet OA-C806.
