The Mills County Commission company showed a good increase in the number of head of sheep and goats last Friday after a week's lay-off in sales. A total of 4,700 head of sheep and 1,000 head of goats passed through the auction ring that market prices were variable in all classes of sheep while all classes in the goat division showed a good increase in price.

Sale of Edgington Motor Company, long time Mills County Ford Dealership, was announced this week by D. R. Edgington and the new owners, Kellis Landrum, Goldthwaite, and W. R. "Bob" Collins, San Saba, Texas. Edgington has operated the establishment for the past five years after acquiring Weatherby Auto Company which had been in business here for many years. Edgington also formerly operated E & M Food Store here and has had interests in food stores in West Texas for a number of years in addition to his ranching and livestock interests in Mills County. Kellis Landrum joined Edgington Motor Company in November as a partner in the firm. He came to Goldthwaite with his family from Houston where

he had been associated with Ford Dealerships for several years. He is a native of Mississippi. Collins, a former resident of Goldthwaite, has been living in San Saba County for the past eight years. He has interests in ranching and is a quarterhorse breeder, trainer and show judge. The new owners announced that business will continue to be conducted in the same location and no changes in other personnel are contemplated. Kellis will be manager of the firm and Collins will continue to devote part of his time to his string of registered quarterhorses.

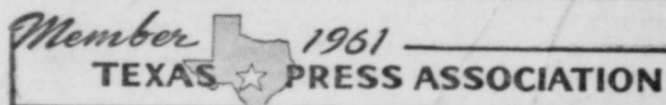

TESTS TO JUDGE RUG QUALITY

If you are considering a carpet or rug for a heavy traffic area of your home, look for thick, dense construction, whether the pile is looped, cut or uncut.

First, run your hand over the carpet pile. Does it feel dense and thick. Next, press your fingers down into the pile. Does it spring back in place when you release the pressure of your hand?

The amount of yarn used and the closeness of the weaving, tufting or knitting and the type and quality of the yarn affect the resilience of the pile.

To judge closeness and compactness of construction, bend a corner of the rug back diagonally on the top side. If the pile is skimpily and loosely constructed, you will see the backing. This indicates a poor quality. Pile of good quality, in heavy duty carpeting, stands erect and

is sufficiently dense to hide the backing.

RE-CHECK YOUR HOME FOR SAFETY HAZARDS

SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

REGULAR MEETING OF THE GOLDTHWAITE ISD BOARD OF EDUCATION — 1-9-61

The Board of Education of The Goldthwaite Independent School Board met in regular session on January 9, 1961 at 7:30 in the regular place, the Conference Room of the high school with Dale Reid, president, J. D. Harper, Secretary, Charles Conradt, Walton Daniel, L. R. Rudd, L. B. Burnham and O. P. Shelton attending. Among other things there came on to be considered the following:

Minutes of the meeting of December 1960 were approved as printed in the letters sent each trustee after a motion by Conradt, a second by Burnham and a unanimous vote.

Bills as presented were approved and ordered paid upon a motion by Shelton, a second by Daniel and a unanimous vote. All invoices were presented and studied.

Motion by Harper, a second by Burnham that the best bid on the unregistered 1951 model Chevrolet be accepted and the contract awarded Charles E. Jones on his bid of \$71.10. Other bids received were: J. T. Jones, \$66.66 and Carl Causey of \$60.00.

The destroying of the Band Hall on January 6, 1961 was introduced with a declaration that its cause was purely theoretically but insurance had been adjusted or adjudged at 100% loss. Thus the payment of the amount of coverage on building and contents was set at \$5,000.00 plus the return of the unearned premium which was estimated to be less than \$50.00. The amount named is forthcoming. Arrangements for temporary band work is in the Auditorium. In discussion of the situation named options of doing away with the band and this received no consideration; a second was to rework the old two story high school and this appeared to be farfetched; the third option was that of constructing a new building. No action was taken on any of the options but Supt. Jones was asked to contact the Texas Education Agency for the free service of surveying the possibilities. This idea prevailed unanimously and such move will be made.

On motion of Burnham, a second by Conradt and a unanimous vote, Supt. Jones and Band Director Milnor was given full authority to have such instruments as appear to be repairable, put in first class shape and to replace those destroyed that belonged to the school with new instruments of good quality.

The board adjourned subject to call into a special meeting by the president of the board at any time.

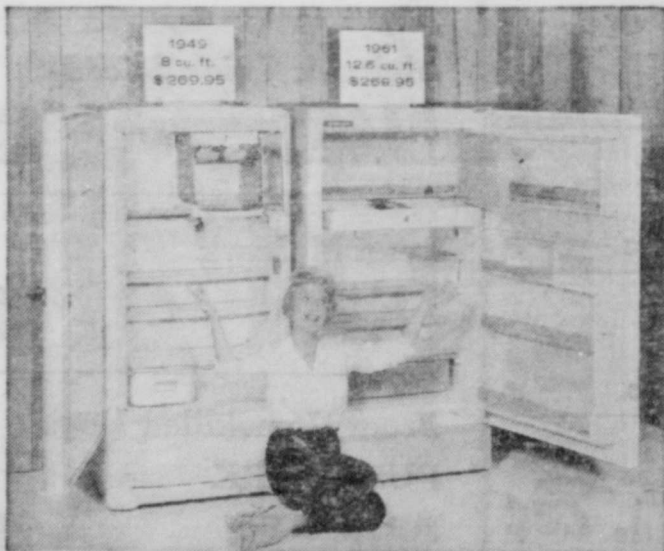

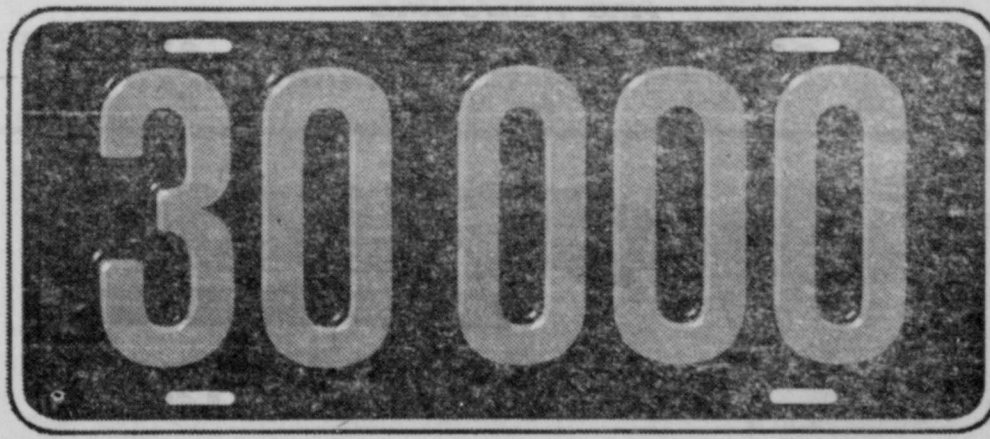
