Central Texas Registered Goat Breeders Have Annual Meeting, Elect Officers

The fifth annual meeting of the Central Texas Registered Angora Goat Raisers Association was held in Goldthwaite, Texas Wednesday night with 28 members present.

Purpose of this meeting was to elect officers and name committees for 1961 and to set dates for the annual show and sale for this year. During the business meeting, Raymond Casbeer gave a financial report, which was approved.

The Association is composed of the following counties, San Saba, Lampasas, Hamilton, Mills, Brown, Comanche and Coryell.

In the election of officers, M. V. Z. Cornelius was re-elected president by acclamation. David Watter, vice-president; T. C. Graves, secretary-treasurer.

Directors elected were: Feltz Terrell, Comanche County; J. Martin, Lampasas County; J. McFarland, Brown County; Robert McGregor, San Saba County; A. B. Wilkerson and C.

Proposed Improvements Discussed At Called School Board Meeting

Proposed improvements for Goldthwaite Independent School District and the possibility of additional bond issue for financing them were discussed at a special called meeting of the school board this week, according to announcement by J. T. Jones, supt.

Charles Roberts, representative of the Texas Education Agency, met with the board to discuss letters from the Accreditation Committees during the past two years requesting that the district build agriculture shop, band hall and additional dressing rooms in the physical educational department.

These requests were considered along with the school's bonded indebtedness and possibility of additional bonds being issued. Also discussed were the immediate needs arising from the recent band hall fire calling for repair bills in the amount of \$1,000 for band instruments, more than \$100 for music replacement and additional or replacements of band instruments which would require an estimated \$1,000. The district also lost five new uniforms in the recent fire.

Since this is a matter of importance to patrons of the district Supt. Jones said that the school administration and board would like to hear expressions from citizens on the matter.

1961 License Tags Go On Sale Here Wednesday

The new 1961 license tags for cars, trucks and trailers will go on sale in Mills County at the tax assessor-collector's office starting next Wednesday morning, February 1.

New plates are of white background with black letters and numerals.

Car owners are urged to bring their certificates of title and license receipt from last year when coming in to purchase their new tags. This will save time in getting new licenses issued.

221 Mills County Voters Are Disqualified In Last Election

\$442.50 Contributed To Park Maintenance Fund, Report Shows

A total of \$442.50 has been contributed to date by 34 interested citizens to the Mills County Park maintenance fund, according to announcement by W. P. Duren, park board chairman.

Approximately 400 letters were mailed out to those who supported the fund last year and other citizens that the committee felt would be interested in taking part in the project.

The park maintenance fund was established last year when the committee enlisted the support of individuals who contributed one dollar per month or \$12 for a year to provide funds for caretaker for the park on a year around basis.

Before the drive last year ended 123 interested citizens contributed \$1,210 to the fund. Marked improvements were made in the park during the past year as a result of this program.

The committee feels that \$1200 will be needed again this year to provide the necessary care and upkeep along with some permanent improvements that are needed.

Chairman Duren said Wednesday that the response to the committee letter is good to date.

Those who received letter from the committee and have not sent in their check are requested to do so. Anyone who did not get a letter and who would like to have a part in the project is invited to do so by sending check to Mills County State Bank or give it to any member of the park board.

Checks should be made out to the Mills County Park Fund.

The park is a Mills County project and everyone in the county is invited to take part in it. Anyone interested in the park and its improvement, who lives outside the county, also is invited to take part.

Honor roll of all who have contributed to the park maintenance fund for this year will be published in the Eagle starting in February.

Two hundred and twenty-one Mills County citizens failed to have their vote counted in the presidential election November 8. The votes were disqualified mainly because the voters had failed to scratch out the Constitution and Prohibition Party candidates.

This figure, representing some 10 per cent of the total vote of the county, and other statistical information pertaining to voting in this area, were released today from Republican State Headquarters in Houston. The results of the study have been revealed in an effort to apprise Texans of the dangers of careless voting, and to point up the peculiarities in our state election laws which have contributed to an abnormally high vote disqualification.

The report states that there are two election laws which contradict one another. Art. 6.06 of the Election Code provides that the voter shall mark out the names of all candidates he does not wish to vote for, but that the failure to do so shall not invalidate the ballot if the intention of the voter is clear in the opinion of the election judge. Art. 8.21, however, provides that no ballot shall be counted if the candidates for more than one party are left un-scratched.

Since, apparently, both laws cannot be applied, the individual Precinct Judge is left with the burden of deciding which law is just. This inconsistency in the law has contributed to the irregular pattern of vote disqualification between not only counties, but between precincts within counties.

For instance, within this county, returns from Precinct 8 showed 16 voters disqualified from a total of 266 votes cast, for a low rate of about 6 per cent. Precinct 10 on the other hand had 41 votes "thrown out" of a total of 237 cast or about 17 per cent disqualified.

Other illustrative figures in this county include Precinct 20 with no votes not counted; Precinct 7 with 21 per cent not counted; and Precinct 11 with 19% votes disqualified.

The report pointed out that even under ideal conditions it's reasonable to expect a small percentage of votes to be improperly marked. However, in the opinion of the investigating group, human error could not be responsible for such wild fluctuations in vote "throw out." Instead, they credit the ambiguous election laws for these wide variances.

In the whole state variations of from no "throw outs" in 411 precincts to as high as 63% of the votes disqualified in one precinct in Anderson County.

The fact that only 1½% of the votes were disqualified in Starr County as opposed to a 25% "throw out" in Waller County would further indicate that irregular interpretation of the Election Code was a factor.

Purpose of the report to each county from Republican Headquarters was described as non-partisan, and in no way intended to reflect on the recent election contest. The objectives of the report, which would benefit either party, were:

1. Make the public aware of the necessity of voting carefully and properly.
2. Arouse public sentiment for modernization and simplification of existing Texas election laws through action by the Texas Legislature.

NEW MONEY FOR TEXAS—A unique program — one designed to make money for the State, rather than spend it — has been submitted to the Texas Legislature.

It is a budget request from the Texas Development Board asking \$300,000 a year for the next biennium for tourist advertising, to be handled by the State's officially designated tourist agency, the Texas Highway Department.

Action is needed to protect and expand the Texas tourist market, for it is a significant source of income: tourist now pay \$17 million in direct State taxes annually. At a time when Texas is facing aggravating tax problems, it makes good sense to take advantage of a source of tax revenue with almost unlimited potential.

Tourism is recognized nationally as a legitimate cornerstone of community development. The U. S. Department of Commerce states that a town which can attract two dozen tourists a day has a source of income equivalent to an industry with a \$100,000 annual payroll. The tourist dollar is new income, earned elsewhere but spent in Texas, for the eventual benefit of all Texans.

But while the national tourist market is in the midst of an unprecedented boom, the Texas market is in a spiraling decline due to hot competition from other States. Texas is 20 years behind the times in advertising its bountiful attractions.

When Texas enters this field, the experience of other States indicates it will reap a handsome profit. Our neighbor New Mexico gets \$34 in State taxes for each dollar spent for tourist advertising; Arkansas gets \$40 in taxes for each advertising dollar. Some other States report even larger dividends. Tourists generally buy those items which carry the stiffest state taxes. Tourist advertising doesn't cost — it pays.

It is not a giveaway; it will bring in new tax revenue, put people to work, stimulate business, and channel millions of new dollars into our State's economy. With the State Treasury not only broke but millions in the red, why not officially invite tourists to come to Texas? They'll enjoy their visit and at the same time help ease our tax burden. Tourists advertising is a sound investment for the State of Texas.

"3 — That most of these offices should be abolished, and without the creation of a 'substitute' to take their place."

The AAA paid Mills County farmers in 1934 a total of \$73,798 in benefits. These transactions were based on 882 cotton, 366 corn-hog and 22 wheat contracts, renting the government 3,115 acres. Of the rented acres 2,632 were planted to food and feed crops; 675 to soil improvement and 808 allowed to lie idle.

A delegation composed of Judge R. J. Gerald, Mayor H. G. Bodkin, F. P. Bowman, T. F. Toland and W. P. McCullough went before the highway commissioners in Austin Monday in the interest of the improvement of Highway No. 7, from Goldthwaite to Waco. The commission gave the committee a careful hearing and gave assurance that the improvement of the highway would be made as soon as Hamilton, Coryell and Mills Counties secured required right of way.

All of the details for building the Goldthwaite sewerage plant have been completed, with the exception of securing a location for the disposal plant. As soon as the location is secured it is believed there will be no further

delay in beginning the work of installing the sewerage system in the city.

Ex-servicemen living in Mills County are due to draw \$112,533.96 in bonus money because of the passage in Congress this week of the law authorizing immediate payment of the soldier bonus due in 1954.

Some weeks ago the Community Public Service Co. advertised to give a certain number of Kelvinators to writers who would give reasons why they preferred Kelvinators to other iceless refrigerators. This offer was published in this and other states, where the company operates a plant and two of the Kelvinators fell to Texas, and one of these came to Goldthwaite. Mrs. E. B. Mrs. Marler, age 88, is the former Miss Leona Traylor. She was born near Calvert in Rob-



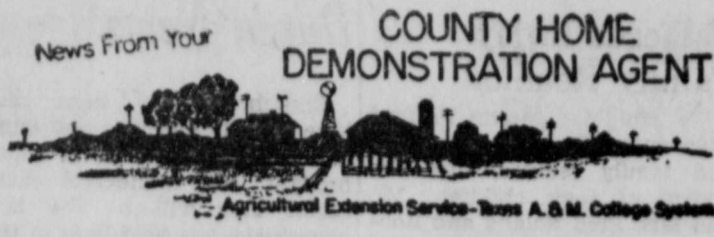

Seven February Plentiful Foods Listed For Texas
Cabbage pretty well leads the pack of foods expected to be plentiful supply in February. The winter cabbage crop is moving in volume from an acreage

quite a bit larger than a year ago, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

While cabbage is the feature, six other foods will be available in more - than - normal supply this month. These are dry onions, rice, canned ripe olives, peanuts and peanut products, cranberry products and small white beans.

The February plentifuls can provide color, nutrition, flavor variety and economy to family meals or special occasions.

These foods have been selected for special promotion this month by the food distribution division of the Agricultural Marketing Service.

Grocery stores, newspapers, radio and TV features will make special efforts to encourage wide use of the plentifuls, in efforts to reduce the "burdensome" supplies.

Consumers will find it to their advantage to serve plentiful foods often because lower prices usually accompany abundance.

Fourteen years ago the average grocery bill for a year was \$767. Of this amount, the farmer got less than \$400. Today the grocery bill has been estimated to exceed \$1,100, and the farmer is still getting about \$400 for his part.

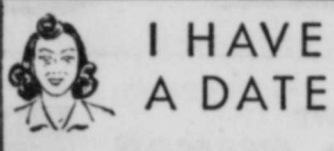

New USDA Planning Committee Organized For Mills County

Under a plan announced last week by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, a State USDA Emergency Planning Committee is being organized in each State.

The State Committee in its first meeting set the machinery in operation which will lead to the establishment of a county USDA Emergency Planning Committee in each county in Texas.

Following USDA personnel and the agencies they represent named as officers of the county committee: Lee W. Tabor, Chairman, ASC and Elgin Smith, Deputy Chairman, SCS. Other members of the committee are George Reese, County Agent, Rachel Trent, County Home Demonstration Agent, and Marlis Barker, F. H. A. Supervisor.

A major objective of the plan is to have a "built-in-readiness" for planning emergency activities essential for meeting food needs and other agricultural requirements of the Nation in time of national crisis, County Chairman Lee W. Tabor said. The Committee will meet on call of the chairman, and will work closely with local civil defense officials.

RANGE SEEDING

Range seeding must not be overlooked from a practical and economical standpoint, however, it is not a substitute for the desirability of restoring natural vegetation on grazing lands through rests and proper grazing management. Conservation management is necessary to keep good rangeland from becoming depleted; to restore a good cover of grass; or to establish a good stand of seeded grasses.

Taking an optimistic viewpoint, probably only 5 to 25 per cent of the total seeding needed in this area has been accomplished.

Seed should be planted at the proper time, at the right rate, at the correct depth, and have high purity and germination rates.

Young grass stands should be protected from grazing and weed competition until well established. This usually means a complete rest for one or two years.

The optimum date for seeding most native grasses is from March to May 15. There are exceptions to this. Seeding rates vary greatly depending upon the quality of the seed. Native grass seeding rates may often go as high as 10 to 15 pounds of commercial or bulk seed per acre with small seeded grasses being much less.

The usual seeding depth is 1/4 to 1 inch depending on soil, climate, and seedbed preparation. Seeding good grasses on rangeland with brush infestations presents a problem. It is

best to have land where grasses can be drilled but a "get-by" method is seeding with attachments on brush control equipment at the time of rootplowing, cutting, shredding, chaining, or whatever method used. The seed must not be buried too deep and a firm seedbed insures a better stand. Some brush control methods leave the soil too loose for a good seedbed and should be packed some way (by rolling with a packer, using dozer tracks, etc.) for better germination.

The kind of grass to seed will vary with each farm or ranch, depending largely on the kind of plants present and desired, soil type, and topography.

While all grasses can be successfully established in pure stands it is common to seed mixtures because obtaining a stand is more reliable. Under native conditions grasses occur in mixtures.

As to the species to plant, some natives that might be considered in this area are Side-oats grama, Green Sprangletop, Arizona cottontop, and the bluestems.

The Soil Conservation Service assisting the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District will give "on-the-ground" assistance for planning and seeding range plants upon request.

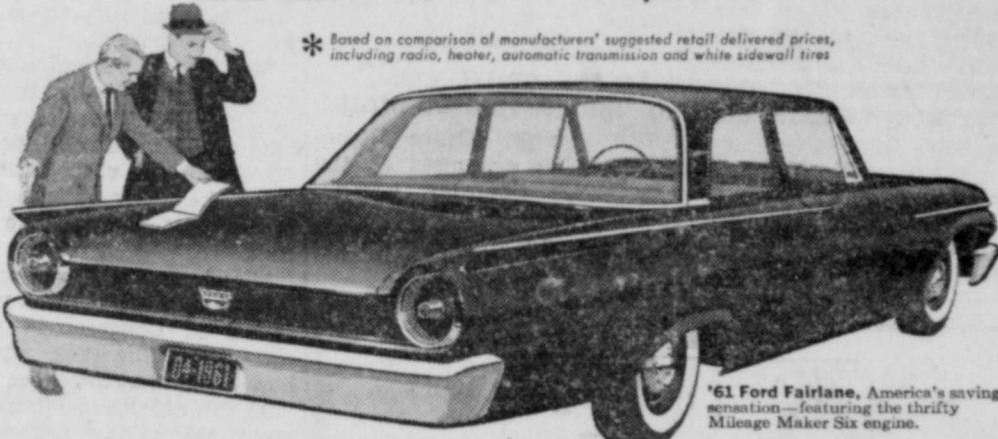
