953 Poll Taxes Are Issued Here

A total of 953 poll tax receipts were issued in Mills County before the deadline on Tuesday, January 31, records at the tax office show.

This is a big drop from last year when 1,566 poll taxes were paid in the county.

Park Maintenance Fund Boosted To \$521.50 As More Join Move

Contributions to the Mills County Park Fund total \$521.50, it was announced Tuesday by W. P. Duren, park committee chairman.

Seven interested citizens made their contribution during the past week. This brings the total contributors to 41.

The park committee is shooting for a goal of 100 contributors who will support the park maintenance fund in the amount of \$12.00 each to provide the committee with sufficient funds for park maintenance on a year around basis.

Last year 123 interested parties contributed \$1,210 to the fund. With this support the committee was able to make

many improvements along with maintenance of the park.

A number of contributions last year came from former residents and some from non-residents who were interested in the project.

This support is again evident this year. The committee received a note from Mick Stephens, Lometa, in which he stated: "Please accept my donation to the Park Committee, check enclosed."

"It is well worth this contribution to pass this well kept park on the highway and take a look at it where weeds, and very high ones, formerly occupied this spot."

"With all good wishes for the success of the fine venture."

Chairman Duren said this week that the list of supporters is being compiled now and the honor roll of contributors will be published starting soon.

Letters were mailed out by the committee to approximately 400 citizens in Mills County soliciting their support in behalf of the project. Many have responded. The committee feels that many more will and that the goal of \$1200 will again be reached.

To Get New Fire Truck

The City of Goldthwaite will have a new fire truck soon, according to action by the city council in two special meetings Friday and Monday.

Special meetings were called by Fire Chief Jack Reid and it was decided that the fire truck that has been used by the city for several years had played out. The commission pumping system is out and the city was faced with the problem of replacing replacement equipment.

A truck has been loaned to the city by the Brownwood fire department on a temporary basis.

The council voted Monday to purchase a new fire truck equipped with a pump. Bids will be received Friday for purchase of the chassis in Goldthwaite.

All fire trucks are made to special order no equipment is available from dealers. It will require approximately four months for delivery. The old truck has been taken to Antonio where it will be repaired for possible repair for emergency or stand-by use.

SOLILOQUY



REVOLT — There are indications that the welfare state concept and its "liberal promoters may face a revolt among younger people. According to The American Economic Foundation, the tide of opposition is rising on college campuses from coast to coast. An example of the thinking of thousands of young Americans is found in the following statement of a conservative intercollegiate group that met last fall at Sharon, Connecticut:

"We as young conservatives, believe: That foremost among the transcendent values is the individual's use of his God-given free will, whence derives his right to be free from the restrictions of arbitrary force; that liberty is indivisible, and that political freedom cannot long exist without economic freedom; that the purposes of government are to protect these freedoms through the preservation of internal order, the provision of national defense, and the administration of justice; that when government ventures beyond these rightful functions, it accumulates power which tends to diminish order and liberty."

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EXPENSIVE ITEM — It costs the U. S. Government for storage \$14,000 a day for flaxseed and rye; oats \$15,000; rice \$17,000; soybeans \$23,000; milk and butter \$29,000; barley \$64,000 and cotton \$76,000. "But these are peanuts," comments the Arlington, Texas, Citizen, "compared to the big boys. Have a good look: Grain sorghums cost \$262,000 a day . . . Corn costs \$444,000 a day . . . wheat \$579,000 a day for storage." Total cost of storage for all these commodities comes to over \$550,000,000 a year.

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"THE HOTTEST FIRES OF HELL" — After a 28,000-mile tour of many foreign lands, Tom Anderson, Editor of Farm and Ranch Magazine, Nashville, Tennessee, says this about socialized New Zealand: ". . . nobody goes to bed hungry . . . The average wage . . . is around \$25 a week. Butter and other foods are government-subsidized — sold below cost. Medicine and doctors are 'free'. Few people have cars. Government owns and rent-controls a big portion of housing. There is no unemployment. Except for the old, the sick and the goldbrickers on government relief, everybody works — but not very hard . . . Everybody's 'equal', by government regulation . . . One New Zealander bragged to me, 'We look at people like a sow looks at her litter — 12 pigs all get the same treatment!'"

The United State is headed down the welfare state road (socialism) with federal power, federal housing, federal money loaning, federal wage-fixing and other federal activities limiting private opportunity. And coming up for consideration is compulsory federal medical aid, more compulsory wage and hour provisions, more compulsory taxation for so-called depressed areas, more federal support of education, plus many other political proposals to limit and restrict the field of private enterprise.

Of course, all these gifts, or services at cost, will in the long run be paid for by the recipients through taxation.

As Mr. Anderson says, in concluding his article, "We're being spent, planned, maneuvered, cheated and 'neutralized' out of our freedoms . . . (those who refuse to take a stand . . . remind me of Dante's classic indictment: 'The hottest fires of hell are reserved for those who, in a period of moral crisis, maintain neutrality.'"

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Dr. Harry A. Snyder writes in a recent Saturday Evening Post on the problem of juvenile delinquency as follows: "If there is any remedy for disrespect for the law, dearth of moral values and absence of religious guidance, it appears that the family circle must assume the primary responsibility."

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Answer: If your son worked in employment covered by the social security law for at least 1½ years before he died, you may possibly receive monthly payments as a dependent parent of an insured worker. You must file a claim, however. In addition, you must present some evidence that your son was supporting you when he died. Under this change in the law, payments to the survivors of workers who died before 1940 started with the month of October 1960. So call or arrange to visit your social security office as soon as you can.

— IT PAYS TO ADVERTISE —

Q. I am now in my 70's, but because of poor health, have never worked under the social security law. I have been living with a niece and her family who share what little they have with me. Until my son died in December 1939, he and I made our home together. He was my sole support because even then I was not able to work. I have read a lot in the papers lately about changes in the social security law and wonder if I can get benefits based on my son's work under social security.

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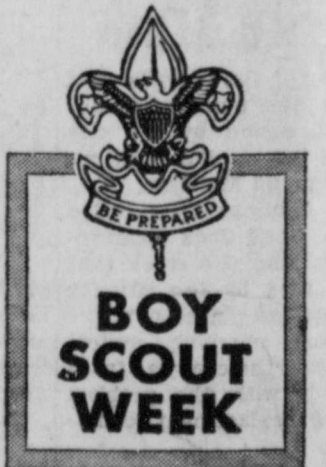

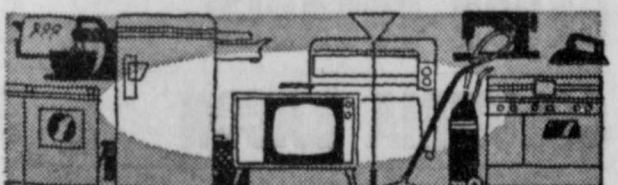

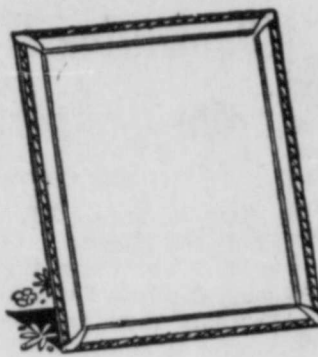

SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

REGULAR MEETING OF THE GOLDTHWAITE I. S. D. BOARD OF EDUCATION FEBRUARY 6, 1961

The Board of Education of the Goldthwaite I. S. D. met in regular session in the Conference Room of the High School February 6, 1961. The meeting was called to order by Dale Reid, president, at 7:30 p. m. with J. D. Harper as secretary and L. B. Burnham, L. R. Rudd, Charles Conradt and Walton Daniel present. O. P. Shelton was not in attendance.

Minutes of the previous meeting of 1-9-61 were approved after having been studied upon motion by Conradt, and a unanimous vote.

The bills and invoices were studied and ordered paid as presented upon motion by Burnham, a second by Conradt and a unanimous vote.

Mr. Elam Horton was present and presented papers of mid-term test with a complaint that the questions were dim and unreadable and that some of the papers in question had not been properly graded but by unanimous consent, the working out of his problems were left entirely to Supt. Jones, Principal Ray Standley and Mrs. House, the teacher concerned, with a declaration that all such problems on details must be left to the faculty.

Mr. S. W. Jackson of Dittmar & Company was present to discuss the drafting of petitions calling for bond elections, the proper procedure to be followed in securing such services and suggested a range in which similar bonds are being sold at present. The school board was not ready to employ a person or firm for such services at present.

By unanimous consent, the resolution on renewal of the Bus notes in favor of Mills County State Bank be renewed which calls for continued retirement of the indebtedness of \$6,308.00 at the rate of \$275.00 per month. Such motion was made by Conradt and seconded by Daniel. (Such resolution is recorded in full by copy attached to this minutes).

The resolution on the Observation of the 11th Annual Public School Week in the Goldthwaite Schools was passed unanimously after the resolution was read and so moved by Daniel and seconded by Burnham that the resolution be adopted in its entirety. The resolution is as follows:

WHEREAS, for the ten year periods 1951-1960, inclusive, one week each year has been set aside and observed as PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK in Texas and The Goldthwaite I. S. D. and such week has been designated as such by the Legislature and so proclaimed by the Governor; and

WHEREAS, This designation of PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK has provided an opportunity for citizens of Texas to attend our public schools and observe the educational procedures being followed in keeping with free democratic processes, as well as opportunity to gain a proper appreciation and understanding of the duties, obligations and rights of American citizenship; and

WHEREAS, It is the duty of every citizen to cooperate with his respective school board members and teachers in a constant effort to improve our public schools; and

WHEREAS, The Texas Legislature desires to express its belief that a sound progressive system of Education requires and must have the active interest and participation of all of our people and that public un-

derstanding is a matter of necessity if we are to keep our public schools at a local level; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, By the Board of Education of the Goldthwaite Independent School District, that the week of March 6 through March 10, 1961 be designated as the Eleventh Annual Goldthwaite Public Schools Week, and that all people of the district be urged to attend and visit a public school during the period in order to acquaint themselves with the physical plants and the systems used, and the accomplishments that public schools have attained in our district.

There being no further business the school board adjourned.
