New Fire Truck Is Purchased By City

The City Council has purchased a new truck with fire fighting equipment for the City of Goldthwaite.

In a special meeting last Friday the council accepted low bid from Landrum & Collins Motor Company for a two ton

Ford Truck chassis with V-8 motor. The truck is to be delivered here in approximately 15 days at a cost of \$2,920.

After the truck is delivered to the city it will be taken to the Sims Fire Fighting Equipment Company in San Antonio where it will be equipped with pump and the latest type booster tank.

It will be equipped with 500 gallon per minute pump of the latest design, a 35 foot extension ladder and 350 gallon booster tank complete with hose. Cost of equipment is \$7,640.

The completed unit will be delivered to the city, demonstrated, and put into service, guaranteed to satisfy the State Fire Insurance Commission. Delivery is expected about July 4. Overall cost of the unit will be \$10,560.

The old fire truck pump is being repaired at the present time in San Antonio and is expected to be returned this week. It will be maintained as a stand-by unit.

In the meantime the city has a fire truck on loan from the Brownwood fire department.

The old fire truck is a 1928 model and should have been replaced a number of years ago, city officials point out.

The necessity of purchasing this new equipment points out the fact that the city can't always keep existing on the pitifully low tax structure, city officials announced.

The City Utilities department has been carrying the burden.

J. V. He will supervise activities in State Senatorial District 16 which covers Bandera, Brown, Burnet, Concho, Gillespie, Kerr, Kimble, Kinney, Lampasas, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Menard, Mills, Real, San Saba, Uvalde and Zavala Counties.

His appointment was announced this week by Tom Sealy, Midland attorney who is State chairman of the "Citizens for a Sales Tax."

SOME WILL BE SORRY—From all indications there are a good many people in Mills County this year that will wake up one of these mornings real sorry. Yes real sorry over the fact that they did not pay their poll tax for 1960.

Records show that the tax assessor-collector's office issued 953 poll tax receipts this year. This is a big drop from last year's total of 1,566. It means that there are several hundred county citizens who will wake up, when it comes time for the city, school and special Senatorial elections that are coming up, and find out they are not qualified to vote in these important elections.

Possibly a good many thought it was an off year, since there is no presidential race this year. Actually it is far from being an off year when there is a special Senatorial election coming up on April 4, and in all probability a run-off election to name a U. S. Senator in May.

So all one can say is that some will wake up and be sorry they did not pay their poll tax.

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A GOOD MOVE—A recent story coming out of Austin tells of a proposed constitutional amendment that would require elected officeholders to resign their job before they could run for another office.

It is too early to tell the outcome at this point, but, that is something the voters should have an opportunity to express themselves on. Rep. Bill Newton Walker of Cleveland has introduced a bill in the house that would present the matter to the voters in November 1962.

The proposal would specify that "no person holding any elective office of this state or of the United States shall be eligible to file as a candidate for any other elective office . . . other than the one he holds, in any party primary of general election without first resigning such office."

The need for some action in that direction is shown quite clearly at the present time in connection with the field of candidates out for the U. S. Senate seat.

Some of them are duly elected officials that are supposed to represent the people in the state or federal government. They are falling down on their job when they are out campaigning for another office while on the taxpayers payroll to do a job, they were elected to do.

One can't blame a man for wanting to better himself and move on and try for a better job. But, there is this fact to consider, if the man isn't happy with the job he is holding, the job or office he was elected to, then he ought to step out and let the job be filled by someone who is willing to devote his time to it.



TIPS for OUTDOORSMEN

Hunting A Broken Quail Covey

Quail hunters following a broken covey that lights here and there as singles, often are puzzled to find that their dogs can't locate the birds, or blunder smack-dab into them with no chance to stand.

This happens because:

(1) An alighting quail usually hits the ground running and ends up a "far piece" from the spot where it landed.

(2) Your dog can't smell such a bird out because the newly-grounded quail has air-washed its body odor away in flight.

You can get around this by waiting patiently for about half an hour before going after the singles. This gives the birds time to regain the distinctive scent the dogs depend on.

Try Stuffed Goose Decoys

It may be too tough for your pocketbook, but if you own and use a flock of "stuffed" goose decoys, you'll get the geese when others don't.

Some hunters claim fantastic luck when using such decoy substitutes as paper bags, handkerchiefs, etc., but the fact remains that a goose is a sharp-eyed critter and the more natural your decoy appears, the more likely geese are to come down to your pit.

Taxidermist-mounted decoys can't be beat. They must be handled with care, but are worth the extra trouble.

Or you may substitute skins that you yourself have stuffed with cotton, etc. These are inferior to the professional jobs, but they will surprise you by the number of geese they will decoy to your blind.

Stuffed decoys have been used by many sportsmen with great success.

To Find Squirrels—Hunt Nest

In the South, most squirrels build their nests around a vine, either a grape vine or whatever sort comes handy.

Smart hunters look for these vines, then shake them vigorously. If there is a squirrel in the nest, out it comes into the open.

Hunt Woodcock On Wet Days

Best woodcock hunting can be had on muggy, humid, or downright wet days. The birds are more active then, and the scent lingers longer on the ground for your dog to nose out.

Shot Size Is Important

When hunting turkeys on the wing use No. 2 shot in a modified barrel — 12 gauge, or 20. The gauge makes little difference.

If ground shooting, best results are obtained with No. 6 or 8 shot, aiming for the head only.

Rifle hunters should use a Hornet, or .22 long rifle loads.

Shoot for the head, if you are confident, and save good meat.

Cooking Rabbit — Texas Style

Ever eat rabbit fixed Texas style? If not, you are in for a treat.

Cut up two choice cottontails as you would a frying-size chicken. Season well with chili powder, and brown in olive oil. Put pieces in well-greased casserole. Season with salt and pepper, parsley, and chopped onion. Cover with fine white wine, and bake slowly until most of the wine is soaked up — or until the meat is thoroughly done.

Make a gravy by thickening juices left in casserole with flour and cream.

For Easier Lacing

Harden the tips of your rawhide shoe laces by holding them over the flame of a match, until match burns out, or until the rawhide is thoroughly charred. You'll find they lace much easier.

Tunes For Coons

Coon hunters can bring a coon out into the open when it is hiding in a leafy tree by blowing several quick, short notes on a silent dog whistle, toy flute, harmonica, or tuning fork.

Lighter Guns For Older Men

As a man gets older he should shoot lighter guns. It will greatly improve his shooting.

Slowing reflexes respond better when the gun is lighter. So, if you have reached the 50-60-70 year bracket, and find that your shooting is getting progressively worse, lay down that 12 gauge, and pick up a 20.

Carry Chlorine Tablets

Boil all water of which you are not absolutely sure. Five minutes boiling is sufficient for safety.

To save time, and should boiling be not practical, treat water with chlorine. Used as directed, it makes water safe for drinking. Carry a bottle of chlorine tablets with you.

To Cut Glare From Sights

Smoke the front and rear sights of your rifle to overcome glitter that could spoil your aim at a critical moment. Pass sight several times through the flame of a burning match.

Condensed Milk For Glue

You have an emergency glue right in camp.

Use condensed milk! It will glue just about everything — wood, paper, plastic, etc. Just apply and let dry as you would actual glue.

Coat Hanger For Decoys

Crow hunters — here's a novel decoy.

Stretch old black socks over wire coat hangers. Twist hangers to resemble crow's shape, stretch on socks, then hang here and there on tree limbs around your blind.

Hangers and socks are easy to carry and are very effective, especially when used in conjunction with a good crow call that is expertly used.



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

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I have been a clergyman for many years but have never taken any action to be covered by the social security program. Is there a time limit under which I must act?

Answer: There is. All clergymen have until April 15, 1962, to secure social security coverage by filing a waiver certificate (Form 2031) with the Internal Revenue Service. Generally speaking, only new clergymen may elect coverage after that date, and they must file Form 2031 within 2 years of entering the ministry.

Question: How can I get a brief printed explanation of the latest changes to the Social Security Act?

Answer: Write or telephone your nearest social security office and ask for pamphlet No. 1 covering the Social Security Amendments of 1960.

Texas Exchanges Quail For Chicks With Nebraska

Greater prairie chickens from Nebraska will be given an opportunity to get a foothold in Texas, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. Twenty of these birds were flown into Texas last week and released on the Flat Top Ranch, southwest of Fort Worth.

More of the birds will also be brought in as they are trapped in Nebraska, according to the secretary. Texas is giving scaled quail in exchange for the prairie chickens. These quail are being trapped in the Trans-Pecos country, where there is an abundance of birds and a short supply of feed.

On another exchange, more than 100 Rio Grande wild turkeys from the King Ranch have been shipped to Hawaii. This also is on an exchange basis, and will give the newest state a start of Texas propagated birds.

In recent months there has been an import of stripers from California, which were planted in Kemp Lake near Wichita Falls. And on the Black Gap area in the Big Bend, reports are that the Big Horn sheep imported from Arizona during the past two years are doing really well in the 600 acre predator-proof enclosure.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Organized, but in some quarters, highly disgruntled, the Texas House of Representatives is down to business.

Speaker James Turman did what comes naturally. He gave committee chairmanships, down the line, to those who supported him in his race for speaker. Key committees have a solid majority of Turman men.

Supporters of Turman's opponent, Rep. Wade Spilman of McAllen, are not happy with their assignments. Mostly experienced legislative hands, they can be expected to do some land mining along the path of the slim Turman majority.

Among chairmen of major house committees are these: Revenue and Taxation, Rep. Charles Ballman of Borger; Appropriations, Rep. James M. Cotten of Weatherford; State Affairs, Rep. Bill Hollowell of Grand Prairie; Constitutional Amendments, Rep. Charles Sandahl Jr. of Austin; Education, Rep. Malcolm McGregor of El Paso; Agriculture, Rep. Grain-grain McIlhany of Wheeler; Live-stock and Stock Raising, Rep. Steve Burgess of Nacogdoches; Insurance, Rep. Murray Watson Jr. of Mart; Congressional and Legislative District, Rep. C. W. Pearcy of Temple; Highways and Roads, Rep. Alonzo Jamison of Denton; Judiciary, Rep. L. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi; Banks and Banking, Rep. Ben Lewis of Dallas; and Game and Fisheries, Rep. D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur.

Lt. Governor Ben Ramsey of San Augustine had named his Senate committees several weeks ago.

Sen. Wardlow Lane of Center heads the Senate's State Affairs Committee. It's a post he held four years ago for the 55th Legislature.

This is the committee that will consider new tax bills after they have passed the House. Money raising measures must originate in the House.

Appropriations, the other half of the money raising-money spending puzzle, will be handled in the Senate by the Finance Committee, headed by Sen. Ray Roberts of McKinney.

Other Senate committee chairmen are: Sen. George Mof-fett of Chillicothe, Agriculture and Livestock; Sen. Robert W. Baker of Houston, Banking; Sen. Charles Herring of Austin, Claims; Sen. Louis Crump of San Saba, Constitutional Amendments; Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, Contingent Expenses; Sen. A. M. Alkin Jr. of Paris, Counties, Cities and Towns; Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress, Education; Sen. Culp Krueger of El Campo, Game and Fish; Sen. Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi, Insurance; Sen. Preston Smith of Lubbock, Interstate Cooperation; Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, Jurisprudence; Sen. David Rat-

liff of Stamford, Labor and Management Relations; Sen. Abraham Kazen Jr. of Laredo, Legislative, Congressional and Judicial Districts.

Tax Referendum Pushed — Two bills have been introduced to allow voters to express their tax likes and dislikes directly in a referendum at the April 4 senatorial election.

Rep. Wesley Roberts of Lamesa introduced a measure which would allow voters to make a choice between a sales tax, income tax or payroll tax. Rep. Henry Fletcher of Luling introduced a similar bill with the additional choice of selective sales taxes.

Meanwhile, these have been added to the money-raising measures introduced in the House:

A 2 per cent general sales tax, exempting groceries, school lunches, prescription drugs, farm machinery, seed and fertilizer, by Rep. John Allen of Longview. Estimated yield: \$80,000,000 a year.

A revised formula for franchise taxes on interstate corporations, by Rep. Franklin Spears Jr. of San Antonio. Estimated yield: \$10,000,000 a year.

A temporary (one-year) increase in the gas production tax from 7 to 10 per cent, by Rep. George T. Hinson of Mineola. Estimated yield: \$22,500,000 a year.

SS For Lawmakers — Social security deductions from Legislators' salaries will be paid by the state under a bill finally passed by both Houses.

This bill stirred up fireworks in the House where it passed only 76-65. Rep. R. A. Bartram of New Braunfels was spokesman for those who deplored the legislators' spending more money on themselves in the face of the recent salary raise and the state's need for more money.

Speakership Plan Proposed — New ground rules are being pushed for one of the hardest-fought, most trouble-causing races in Texas politics.

A proposed constitutional amendment would allow newly elected House members to meet and elect their speaker at least a month before the regular session opening day. Reps. W. T. Dungan of McKinney and Ben Lewis of Dallas are sponsors.

This plan would give the winning speaker time to name committees and be ready to begin work in the House and require monthly reports on campaign contributions.

Proposed amendment would also limit a presiding officer to one term, bar campaigning in the House and require monthly reports on campaign contributions.

Also proposed is that the post be an elective one the same as the Lt. Governor's office. That would let the people decide and
