Old Landmark, Duren School Building Falls Victim To Modern Times Change

Another old landmark has been victim to changing and modern times. The old Duren School Building which was a familiar sight to most citizens of Mills County is in the process of being razed with a modern church building and community center. This will add to and enhance the beauty of the well kept cemetery.

In fact, this is the third time a people of the community, through taxation or bonds, have razed a building. They accomplished this by means of enthusiastic cooperation and donations.

Through the years, the buildings have served a dual purpose—a place of worship and place of schooling.

Duren was one of the first schools in the county to be razed and the last rural school in the county. In 1948 it contained the Mullin and Priddy Schools.

The first building was erected in 1890. It was replaced in 1911 by a one room structure to which additions were made until it provided space for four classrooms and nearly one hundred pupils.

Members of the Goldthwaite school board at their last regular board meeting passed a resolution unanimously approving the observance of the eleventh annual Public Schools Week. Faculty members are putting to work a program of visitation within the schools. Each day of the week is to be observed as visitation day beginning Monday, March 6 and continuing through Thursday, March 9. "It is hoped that every parent, grandparent and friend will 'Beat A Path To Our Door,' on these days," said Supt. J. T. Jones.

Visitors will be welcomed in groups and after signing register will be taken on guided tour through the entire school premises. This will include the elementary building where they will see classrooms, a small dark

City Council Filing Deadline Is March Fourth

This week Saturday, March 4, is the last day for candidates to file for the city council election and have their names printed on the official ballot.

City election is scheduled for Tuesday, April 4, and filing deadline is 30 days before the election.

Two aldermen are to be elected this year for a two year term. Those desiring to be a candidate should file with City Secretary Glynn Collier.

School Trustee Filing Deadline Is March Second

Today, March 2, is the last day on which candidates may file for the trustee election and have their names printed on the official ballots. Filing deadline is 30 days before the election which is scheduled for Saturday, April 1.

Two trustees are to be elected to the board for Goldthwaite, Star, Mullin, and Priddy school districts. Two members are to be elected to the county school board, one from precinct three and one from at large.

Candidates for Mullin, Star, Priddy and the county board must file with County Judge Cecil Egger while candidates for the Goldthwaite School board must file with secretary of the board, J. D. Harper.

Names of candidates may be placed on the official ballot by the candidates signing application, or intention, to be a candidate or by petition properly signed by five qualified voters.


Last year, the fifth annual such edition, received favorable comment from a wide area. There were more than fifty



BRIEFS FOR FOOD SHOPPERS
Citrus fruits offer good values now. Supplies of grapefruit, oranges and lemons are abundant. The high vitamin C content of citrus fruits makes them ideal choices during this season of the year when colds are prevalent.

Shop the fresh vegetable counter for salad items to add contrast in food texture to daily menus. Iceberg lettuce, perhaps the most popular salad item, is in heavy supply. Cabbage, dry yellow onions, cauliflower, turnips and greens, collard, mustard greens are among the more economical vegetables.

Eggs, fryer chickens, and turkeys are low in cost per serving now. Other meat prices continue to fluctuate with specials offered by some stores on pork and beef items.

Best pork values are found in loins, shoulder roast and ham portions. In the beef department, look for arm and blade pot roasts, ground beef, short ribs and round steak.

Lamb and fish offer variety for menus and will give added stretch to the meat dollar.

Since March 3 of the past year, the new Textile Fiber Products Identification Act has been in effect. This means that all textile fiber products must now carry a label which gives the generic (family) names and percentages by weight of the fibers in the product.

We all recognize the natural fibers—cotton, linen, silk and wool; but, some of the man-made fibers have unfamiliar generic names. It is very important to learn these new names because they give an important clue to proper washing, drying and pressing temperatures and to spot removal.

Trade names also exist for many fibers. But when a manufacturer uses a trade name he must pair it with the generic

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

TIPS for OUTDOORSMEN

A Few Hunting Don'ts

Never say anything against your hunting partner's dog. Also, don't pat it or feed it. And don't give the dog orders. If you kill a bird, tell the owner... not the dog. Follow these don'ts and you'll keep the respect and friendship of your partner.

For Better Shooting

As you get older, the open sights of your rifle get fuzziest and won't stay on the target. You find yourself missing the target often.

Of course, this can be overcome by using scope sights. But often a scope isn't feasible, or you may not like scopes.

So, the next best thing to do, is to switch from open to ring, or peep sights. You won't have to squint, and your target is again clear.

Better change the front sight at the same time. Replace with one that has a higher post. Most rifles are drilled to receive peep sights, so you can install it yourself.

Be Careful With Bullets

Carrying loose ammunition around in your pocket is foolhardy. The little .22 cartridges are especially dangerous. They are small and easily lost, and may turn up in the open fireplace with a bang—literally.

Remember The Dogs

Hunting dogs, especially setters, have a mighty hard time in hot weather. So don't forget to give yours plenty of shade and water at all times. Many sportsmen are inclined to neglect the pooch during off-season.

To Clean Ducks Easily

Next time you scald ducks to remove the feathers, try using a home detergent in the water. The feathers come off easily and quickly.

Smoking Out Coons

Don't smoke coons, possums, or squirrels out of dens or hollow trees. You can cause a disastrous forest fire by doing so.

Instead, tie a wad of cloth on a stick and soak in common household ammonia. Thurst ammonia-soaked end of stick in tree hollow or den and the occupant will hustle out in a hurry.

Protecting Your Motor

Does your outboard motor get scuffed, scarred, or thrown out of adjustment when carried in your car trunk?

Next time out try laying it on an old inflated inner tube. The inflated rubber absorbs the knocks and scuffs, and preserves the finish.

Patching Holes In Boots

An enduring emergency patch for that hole in your rubber boot can be made by heating (not too hot) enough common

tire tape to do the job, and applying to the dried surface of the boot. It lasts!

Carsick Pup Needs Air

When you pup begins to get carsick he will drool at the mouth. That's the time to hustle him out of the car in a hurry (to avoid much unpleasantness) and walk him around in the fresh air.

Easy Way To Probe Shot

Use as very small sharpened screwdriver to probe shot and imbedded feathers out of your game birds.

It does the job better than a knife blade and is easy to carry with you on a hunting trip.

New Use For Tin Shears

Pack a pair of small tin shears in your duffel bag next hunting trip.

They are excellent for chopping off the legs, wings, heads, etc., of any game you might be dressing.

Saves dulling your knife on bones.

Be Alert For Snakes

Watch out for snakes when in the field, or wear snake-proof boots. Don't think there are not snakes about just because of the calendar. A warm sun on a cold day often brings the reptiles.

Also, remember that rattlers don't always rattle before striking. So don't depend on your ears.

Look for moccasins around water and in damp places. Rattlers usually inhabit rocky or timbered country.

Always carry a snake-bite kit, to be on the safe side.

"Seasoned" Hunting Clothes

Smoke those new-smelling hunting clothes over a campfire. This will prepare them for the hunting season so they won't scare off game, or get ribald comments from your fellow hunters.

Goldthwaite Public Schools

Payroll during the year totals \$131,785 which is paid to 46 members of the faculty and employees.

Annual budget for Goldthwaite school system this year is \$203,129. This does not include lunchroom operations.

There are 26 teachers and administrators in the school system.

The school system operates six buses and two private carriers driving approximately 102,000 miles per year.

Estimated value of school buildings, land and equipment and all physical facilities of the district would run in the neighborhood of \$700,000. These include Elementary School, High School, Gymnasium, Stadium, Band Hall, Agriculture Building, Bus Barn, Storage Building, High School Lunchroom and approximately 80 acres of land.

Total enrollment for the 1960-61 year has now reached 522 pupils for both high school, junior high and elementary school.

Goldthwaite Schools operate two modern lunchrooms serving an average of 420 meals daily and total expected for the year of 73,500.

Clementine Wilmeth Briley Writes From Temporary Home In El Paso

Spring flirted with us a few days this past week. It began Saturday, February 11. The thermometer rose to 72. Sunday was a beautiful day with the thermometer up to 75. And most of the days this week have been with quite a bit of sun-

The radio warned Thursday it would be cooler today. The wind came in the night and disturbed Johnny till he couldn't sleep. This morning the yard was full of tumble weeds. There's a high rock fence around the back yard. I wonder how tumble weeds could get into it. John says they just blew up and over a rock wall. It was a cold north wind that has blustered all day.

Tuesday I received a clipping from the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, sent me by Roscoe Reeves, a man. It told of the passing of my cousin, Jim Wilmeth, McKinney. The clipping stated that he died Thursday, February 9, at his home near McKinney where he had lived all his life. He was 85. When we were in Arkansas, Cousin Jim lived with us and went to school there. He was very like me and was a great favorite where he went. I have the most precious childhood memories of him. Additional Funds Made Available For Eligible Farm Housing Loans

An additional \$50 million has been made available to the Farmers Home Administration for farm housing. Mr. Maris C. Barker, the agency's county supervisor, announced today.

He said that the new loan funds assure an adequate supply of this type of credit for eligible farm families during the balance of the fiscal year. Loans made so far this year plus those being processed had practically exhausted the funds previously available.

Farm Housing loans are made throughout the rural areas of the United States. The loans provide farm families with an opportunity to acquire an adequate house and efficient service buildings.

Application for farm housing loans may be made at the local office of the Farmers Home Administration, Mr. Barker said. The loans bear 4 per cent in-

terest and are repayable over periods up to 33 years.

The major demand in Mills County is for loans to construct and modernize farm houses, and most of the funds are used for new construction. Improvements financed with the loans include the installation of central heating, and pressure water supply systems, the addition of bathrooms and the modernization of kitchens. These funds may also be used to adjust service buildings to the changing requirements of agriculture.

To be eligible a farmer must own a farm that will annually produce for sale or home use at least \$400 worth of commodities based on 1944 prices and be of sufficient value to adequately secure the loan. In addition, he must lack the resources needed to obtain credit elsewhere and has sufficient income to pay farm operating and family living expenses and meet payments when due on his debts.

The local FHA office is located on the second floor of the County Courthouse and is open every Tuesday from 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

Chickens For School Lunches

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced February 17 that the U. S. Department of Agriculture plans to buy five million pounds of young chickens for use in the National School Lunch Program.

Purchases will be made with Section 6 funds made available by Congress to provide additional protein foods to schools. The quantity to be purchased will provide for one distribution to schools participating in the lunch program.

This is the first time USDA has undertaken a program to provide chicken for school lunches. In preparation for this experimental program, USDA

technicians have been working with school lunch personnel devising appropriate techniques of preparation and serving.
