Total scholastics for Goldthwaite, Star, Mullin and Priddy according to this year's census is 867 while in 1960 the total was 894.

The count includes all scholastics from age six through 17 and shows Goldthwaite, 474; Mullin, 154; Priddy, 140 and Star, 99.
