'Hard-Luck Kid' Feels He's Had It Good

A lot of folks call Charles Cornelius the hard-luck kid of the Houston Fat Stock Show.

But if you ask Charles, he will say he is pretty lucky.

Charles, 22, of Goldthwaite, won the reserve championship of the show in 1959 and 1960 and this year he took the reserve champion Hereford honors of the open show.

In 1959, Cornelius came to Houston with a Hereford. That year he was beaten out of the grand champion by an Angus.

So last year, he came back with an Angus in the open show. He was beaten by a Hereford.

Charles and his father, V. Z. Cornelius, jointly operate a 2300-acre ranch in Mills County.

He does much of the hard labor on the ranch and daily

commutes to Howard Payne College in Brownwood 35 miles away.

"I don't feel that I've had any tough luck," Charles said. "Some of the people around Goldthwaite think I did, but I'm plenty happy I got what I did," he said.

Charles got interested in the cattle business when he was 8 years old. He and his dad bought a couple of Hereford cows and have built up a herd of 50 registered Herefords. Last year they sold 68 head.

For the past two years, Charles' reserve champion has sold for \$4000. With this \$8000 he has paid for his college education in business administration and helped to increase his herd. —Houston Chronicle.

Mills County School Census Shows Decline

Mills County public school census figures for 1961 just released by County Superintendent of Schools Cecil Egger show a decrease of 27 from 1960. Census figures are certified by the county superintendent to the Texas Education Agency.

Total scholastics for Goldthwaite, Star, Mullin and Priddy according to this year's census is 887 while in 1960 the total was 894.

The count includes all scholastics from age six through 17 and shows Goldthwaite, 474; Mullin, 154; Priddy, 140 and Star, 99.

In 1960 the count was Goldthwaite, 482; Mullin, 147; Priddy, 162 and Star, 103.

Feed Grain Survey Is Underway Here

A survey of all farms in Mills County which produce feed grains is under way, according to Lee W. Tabor, Office Manager, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

The survey is being conducted throughout the "major feed grain producing area" (which includes Mills County) as an advance step in connection with proposed feed grain programs now under discussion. The proposals would include adjusting the 1961 acreages of corn and other feed grains.

To put such a program into operation for 1961 crops in a manner which would be fair to all growers, accurate data must be obtained immediately for the possible establishment of feed grain base acreages for all farms in the major feed grain producing area. Such information will include the acreage history of corn and grain sorghum, as well as the acreage devoted to other crops and land uses, for all farms in the area where one or more of these feed grains were produced within the past 2 years.

Mr. Tabor explained that it is the intention, as far as possible, for the County Office to interview each farm operator or owner in Mills County whose farm has produced feed grains either in 1959 or 1960.

Because it will be necessary to obtain complete coverage of all feed-grain farms in the county, farmers are urged to report all acreages devoted to feed grain not later than March 21, 1961.

903 Lambs Graded In 4-H And FFA Commercial Lamb Program

Mills County 4-H and FFA club members had 903 lambs in the commercial lamb feeding program which has just closed.

The lambs were brought to the Show Barns in Goldthwaite last Saturday for grading before being taken to the Fort Worth market.

Six hundred and ninety-three out of the total of 903 were taken to market. Out of the 693 lambs passed for market 292 were choice, 147 good and 494 were feeder lambs.

Mills County 4-H club members had 110 choice, 51 good and 123 feeders for a total of 284.

Priddy FFA members had 63 choice, three good and 81 feeders for a total of 147.

Star FFA members had 44 choice, 20 good and 100 feeders with 164.

Goldthwaite FFA members

had 75 choice, 43 good and 190 feeders with total of 308.

TRIBBON AWARDS

Mills County 4-H club members received three blue ribbons, one red and seven white, with 11 entries.

Priddy FFA members received seven blue and three white with 10 entries.

Star FFA members got three blue ribbons and 10 white with 13 entries.

Milk is always a good buy. Are you serving your family enough milk? A pint a day for most adults, a quart a day for children is what is recommended. If you're using less than that, you may be short-chang-

ing yourself and your family in health. And there is no food that can be used more times a day in more different ways than milk.

**SAVE COLOR AND FOOD
VALUE IN VEGETABLES**

Limp, over-cooked, drab-looking vegetables have little appetizing appeal, and little food value. You will save color and food value by using proper cooking methods.

Serve three vegetables each day—a green or yellow vegetable, sweet or Irish potatoes, and one other vegetable. Here are some pointers to remember in cooking vegetables.

Use fresh, crisp vegetables. Cook in as little water as possible.

Cook only until tender—don't overcook.

Cook vegetables in their skins whenever possible. Cook most green and all yellow vegetables in a covered pan. Never use soda in cooking vegetables—it destroys part of the food value.

Serve vegetables as soon as possible after cooking. The longer they are exposed to heat and air the more vitamin C they will lose.

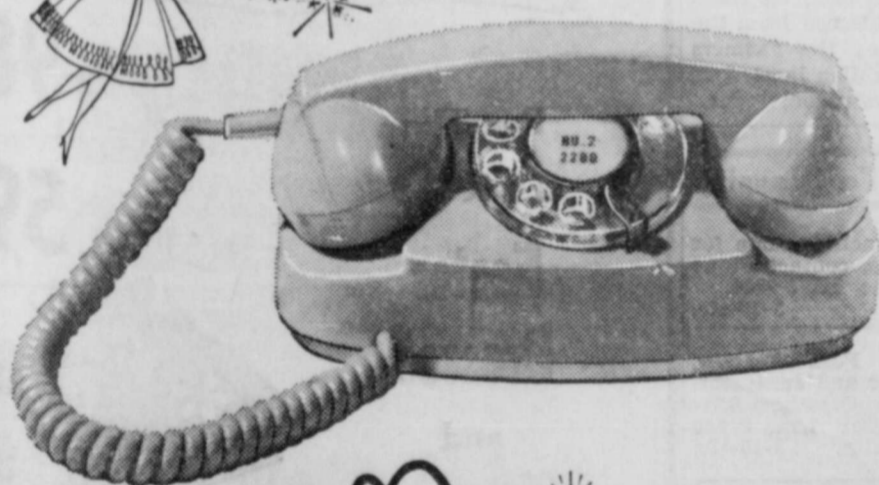

Additional Funds Are Available For FHA Farming Operation Loans

Additional funds have been made available to help meet the needs of eligible farmers who need operating money to carry out their farming operations, Maris C. Barker, County Supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration announced today.

Mr. Barker said that a \$35,000,000 contingency fund provided by the 1961 Agricultural Appropriations Act has just been released to the Farmers Home Administration to meet the growing demand for credit.

This move was taken by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Mr. Barker said, in an effort to make certain, within the authorities and funds available, that no qualified family-type farmer will be required to give up farming because of his inability to finance his 1961 operations.

Because of high operating costs and unfavorable margins of profits many farmers have exhausted their regular sources of farm operating credit. The amount of operating loans made so far this year by the Farmers Home Administration totals 20 per cent higher than last year. The credit Agency's biggest lending season lies just ahead as farmers prepare to start their spring work.

Most of the applications so far this year are for loans to buy livestock, seed, fuel, fertilizer and machinery repairs. Some applications have also been received for the purchase
