Committee Discusses Ways And Means For Up-Keep Of Cemetery

The up-keep and expenses and how to obtain funds for carrying on the work that is necessary received top consideration by the Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery committee meeting here Monday, according to announcement by Raymond Little, chairman. It was pointed out that a well kept cemetery is the pride of a good town and interested citizens. All agreed that it is very evident to all concerned that the cemetery is in good condition now and that the many improvements that have been made are good ones. After considerable discussion the committee decided to send a letter to all people who might be interested in the up-keep and beautification of the cemetery. The letter will be mailed to several hundred, seeking their financial support. Those who have addresses of persons who might be interested in the project are urged to inform the secretary, J. A. Hester. Through the letter the committee hopes to acquaint interested parties with some pertinent facts. Former residents, or those not residing here, are informed that the cemetery in the last year or so has looked better than ever. Also that there have been some planned improvements for beauty and permanency and all are urged to visit and see these accomplishments. It points out that for a continuation of this up-keep however the committee will need financial support. This is especially true at this time of the year when expenses just about triple. Sheep And Goat Meet Scheduled Here Tuesday

J. A. Gray, Animal Husbandman with the Extension Service will discuss the selection of sheep and goats at the district courtroom in Goldthwaite next Tuesday, March 11, according to announcement by County Agent George Reese.

The meeting will start at 9:30 a. m. Mr. Gray is the specialist on sheep and goats for the Extension Service and is widely known among the sheep and goat producers of Texas.

A selection of sheep demonstration will be given by Mr. Gray at David Waters' ranch. This selection will be based on quantity of wool, length, density, completeness of covering, size of the animal, soundness of fleece, and purity of fleece. Every rancher and sheep and goat producer in Mills County is invited to attend this meeting.

A light vote was cast in the city election Tuesday when two aldermen were elected for a two year term. S. A. Edgington got 76 votes and F. D. Reynolds 77 in their uncontested bid for re-election, according to un-official returns.

County Voters Give Wright Slim Margin

Mills County voters gave Congressman Jim Wright a slim margin in casting their vote for U. S. Senator here Tuesday, when 658 voters went to the polls to cast their ballot. Wright got 203 votes and Blakley 197, according to un-official returns. Wright led William A. (Bill) Blakley by six votes while John Tower was only a few votes behind for third place in the county, with 182.

The other three who were considered in the running polled only a few votes and were trailing as they did over the state. Fifteen of the long list of candidates received some votes in Mills County with seven getting one lone vote.

Taxpayers In County To Fork Up \$681,000

Park Fund Is Up To \$644.50

Mills County park fund was boosted another \$22 during the past week as three more contributors joined the honor roll. Those making their contribution the past week, according to announcement by Park Board chairman W. P. Duren include the following: Pearl Casbeer, Goldthwaite Home Demonstration Club, Walter Reeves. This brings the total to date to \$644.50 with 56 contributing. Forty-five have supported the fund in the suggested amount of \$12 or more for \$578, while 11 others have contributed \$66.50. The committee is continuing the drive to secure \$1200 to provide funds for park maintenance and improvements. Checks should be made out to Mills County Park Fund and mailed to Mills County State Bank or given to any member of the park board.

How much will Uncle Sam collect from residents of Mills County in the form of personal income taxes when tax day, which is April 17th this year, rolls around? Will it be more or less than it was last year, when local income and employment taxes added up to approximately \$618,000? That figure is based on income reports and on an unofficial breakdown of Treasury Department receipts from the State of Texas. They show that individual income taxes collected in the state came to \$2,059,000,000 last year. Thus, residents of Mills County paid some 0.03 per cent of the state total.

Although the nation was in a period of recession during the greater part of 1960, with incomes dropping in many areas, the country as a whole ended the year with earnings that were higher than in 1959. As a result, the Government counts on nearly \$2.9 billion more in the way of personal income taxes being produced, come April 17th, than was turned in a year ago. The total then was \$44.9 billion. On the basis of preliminary figures on income in Mills Mills County, the current payments are expected to come to nearly \$681,000. From many directions now come signs that the recession is reaching an end and that there will be an upturn before the middle of the year. The Kennedy administration generally thinks it will occur in the April-June quarter. Such a resumption of business activity is being counted on to reduce unemployment and to boost the gross national product well over the \$503 billion recorded in 1960. A rise in personal income, which would naturally go hand-in-hand with it, would yield income taxes next year of \$50.2 billion, according to the Federal budget, as compared with this year's \$47.8 billion. To keep pace with this budgetary forecast and to continue carrying their present share of the tax burden, residents of Mills County would have to attain a combined income in 1961 that is 5.0 per cent greater than it was last year.

Goldthwaite FFA Schedules School Rodeo April 14-15

Goldthwaite FFA Chapter has scheduled a Goldthwaite Schools Rodeo for next week Friday and Saturday, April 14 and 15, at the Jernigan Arena, two miles east of Goldthwaite. This is the third annual event sponsored by the FFA for Goldthwaite schools in the spring of the year. Their invitational rodeo will be held sometime in late summer, according to Thurman Head, Vocational Agriculture teacher. There will be a street parade both days. Friday's parade at 3 p. m. will be in cooperation with the school's Western Day. The parade on Saturday will be at 5 o'clock. Events will include: calf roping tie-down, cutting horse contest, trailer races, barrel races, calf riding, ribbon roping, goat racing, steer riding, pole bending and grade school boys' goat roping.

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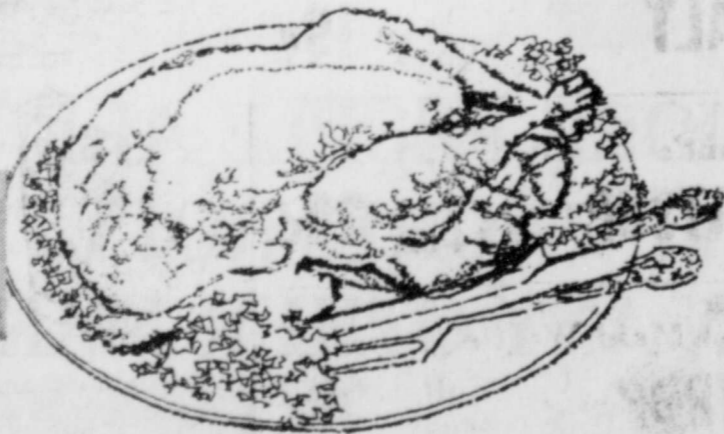

USDA Plentifuls Enable Thanksgiving Fare In April

Here's a switch! Turkeys and cranberries, once only fall-time fare, now are yours in abundance for light, springtime meals.

These traditional Thanksgiving festival items are featured

on the U. S. Department of Agriculture's April list of plentiful foods for Texas consumers, reports the Agricultural Extension Service.

Six other popular items also

receive USDA's plentiful tag for April. They are cabbage, dry beans, canned freestone peaches, canned ripe olives, peanuts and peanut products, and milk and dairy products.

These foods have been chosen for special emphasis because supplies of each are in excess of normal demand, as inventoried by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. Because of

their abundance, shoppers will find prices reasonable.

Last year's cranberry crop was record large. The fresh berries went through trade channels at a fairly normal pace, but we still have an abundance of cranberry sauce, juice and jellies, to add color and flavor to April meals.

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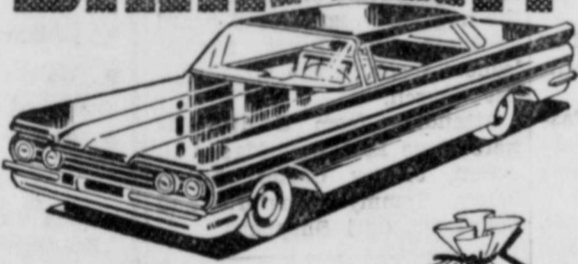

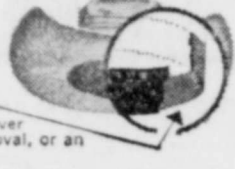
