

A Moment With The Bible

"Take heed to yourself: If thy brother sin, rebuke him; and if he repent, forgive him. And if he sin against thee seven times in the day, and seven times turn again to thee, saying, I repent; thou shalt forgive him" (Luke 17:3, 4).

If a man truly loves his brother, he will rebuke him when he sins, and if that man repents, he will forgive him. To forgive is to forget! If that man sins seven times in one day against his brother but repents, the other shall forgive him and remember those sins no more.
