Construction started this week on a new 14 unit addition to Mauney Courts on the corner of Parker Street and Hannah Valley Road.

I. W. Mauney, owner of the courts, announced plans for this addition a few weeks ago when he acquired the corner lot providing room for the new units and much needed parking space.

The 14 units will be added to present eight units for 22 units in all. The new addition will be just across the alley west of present courts.

There will be seven units on the first floor and seven on the second floor. The structure will be of fireproof masonry, with tile back walls, brick end walls, all glass and aluminum front and concrete floors and roof.

Two of the units will be larger than the rest to provide for family accommodations. All will have tile baths and refrigerated air conditioning. There will be a five foot balcony type runway for second floor units.

Mauney came to Goldthwaite in 1930. He purchased the lot at Fisher and Hannah Valley Road in 1936 and constructed his first rock courts in 1938. The entire unit was razed in 1955 when new modern units were constructed.

M. F. Horton is contractor for the project.

Rev. L. L. Hays, 99, Pioneer Baptist Preacher, Dies Sunday

Funeral services for Rev. L. L. Hays, retired Baptist preacher, were held in the Trigger Mountain Baptist Church, Tuesday afternoon, April 18, at 2:30 o'clock. Services were conducted by Rev. S. D. Taylor of San Saba, Rodger Croker, pastor of the Trigger Mountain Church and Rev. Presnall H. Wood, pastor of First Baptist Church at Goldthwaite. Burial was in the Trigger Mountain Cemetery under the direction of the Roy Wilkins Funeral Home.

Rev. Hays was born December 29, 1861 in Scotsborough, Alabama and passed away in a local hospital Sunday evening, April 16, at 11:40. He was licensed to preach in January 1885 by Scotsborough Baptist Church. He and Miss Julia Ann McCutcheon were married in Scotsborough, December 8, 1886 and they moved to Delta County in Northeast Texas in 1887. He taught school and preached

and later began fulltime church work.

In 1897 the Hays family moved from Bexar County to Mills County and bought a farm in the Trigger Mountain community east of Mullin. Rev. Hays helped build Baptist Churches at Star, Center City, Big Valley, Trigger Mountain and Newburg, and was pastor of Baptist Churches at Mullin, Zephyr and Rock Springs.

He was a Mills County stock-farmer for 63 years before his retirement in 1954. He and his wife celebrated their 68th wedding anniversary just prior to her death in 1954. He served the Trigger Mountain Church as pastor for over 20 years.

Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. Adelyn Swafford of Muleshoe and Mrs. Kate Byler of Brownwood; five sons, Mack Hays of Abilene, Byron Hays of Idalou, John Hays of Cameron, Rev. Jim Hays of Brookshire and Rev. Lawrence Hays of Denison; 10 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren and a multitude of friends.

Senator Barry Goldwater writes, in National Review: "Armament races throughout history have always been a symptom of international friction—not a cause of it. Friction does not disappear by rival nations suddenly deciding to turn their swords into ploughshares. No nation in its right mind will give up the means of defending itself without first making sure that hostile powers are no longer in a position to threaten it. The Communist leaders are, of course, in their right minds. They may preach general disarmament for propaganda purposes. They may also promote mutual disarmament in certain weapons in the knowledge that their superior strength in other weapons would leave them, on balance, decisively stronger than the West . . . If all nuclear weapons suddenly ceased to exist, much of the world would immediately be laid open to conquest by the masses of Russian and Chinese manpower."

From the Wall Street Journal: ". . . we wonder what a vista would open up for the American economy if, every single year, the Government let the people keep a few more billions of dollars to spend on their homes, their cars, their clothes and their pleasures. Might we not find that this enlargement of the private-income stream would not only speed up the factories but keep them humming?"

Once a child has indicated he is left-handed he should be encouraged to develop his left-handedness. He should not be prodded into becoming right-handed or ambidextrous. That is the consensus of a number of experts quoted in an article in the April issue of Today's Health, the American Medical Association's magazine of general circulation. Forcing a left-handed child to use his right hand may lead to serious emotional disturbances.

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States says that an increase in the minimum wage would cause lay-offs, inflate prices, step up imports, and slow down exports. Also, it adds, the increase would hurt employment, dollar stability, and economic growth.

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During a debate on federalization of the unemployment compensation system, Senator Lausche (D-Ohio) said: "We already see the signs which indicate what will be proposed. Uniformity, straitjacketing, no difference anywhere, a monolith. It sounds rather close to the philosophy of monolithic government that has dominated nations in Eastern Europe and Middle Europe—the peoples under the control of Russia. Nothing different, all must be identical, and if they are not equal by nature, the Congress will make them equal."

The Standard, of Elkton, Kentucky, says: "People who frequent cabarets and night clubs were given a pleasant surprise: Congress passed a law cutting the twenty per cent on night club entertainment to ten per cent. People who drive cars and trucks got a different kind of surprise. Their last surprise was a boost in the Federal gasoline tax that shot the rate up to four cents per gallon. Now the combined state and Federal taxes on a gallon of gasoline average — nationally — about 50 per cent of the retail price of the fuel itself."

Austin, Texas—Sometime be-
tween now and August 31, the
Texas Legislature must come to
a showdown, do-or-die, back-
to-the-wall decision on a big
new money-raising bill.
But many lawmakers believe
the situation will have to have
reached the desperate, no-
choice-left stage before such a
decision can be made. To meet
current needs, say some law-
makers, the tax bill will have
to be a big one and it's bound
to bring static from voters.
Only way they can survive,
said one, is to be able to say,
"Look, I don't like this bill either.
But what can we do . . .
close the schools?"

In this climate, the House
postponed floor action on the
general sales tax measure by
Reps. John Allen of Longview
and Forrest Harding of San An-
gelo. Gov. Price Daniel attacked
the bill as "obnoxious and
inequitable," hitting everything
"from the cradle to the grave."

Governor Daniel urged com-
promise through a "package"
bill. Ingredients for the pack-
age, he said, might be gotten
from Rep. George Hinson's om-
nibus tax bill and Rep. Ben At-
well's selective sales tax meas-
ure.

Hinson's bill would hit in
many areas—watches, jewelry,
power tools and machinery,
construction materials, natural
gas, restaurant meals, non-es-
sential beverages, etc.
Atwell's bill is akin to a gen-
eral sales tax except that it
would tax rather than making
a blanket provision.

Senate Cool To Tax — With
less than bubbling enthusiasm,
Senate State Affairs began
hearings on the first tax bill
sent over by the House.

It is Rep. Charles Ballman's
"loophole bill" designed to raise
some \$43,000,000 toward retiring
an expected \$63,000,000 deficit
in the general revenue fund.

Senators listened with seem-
ing sympathy to witnesses who
criticized the bill's provision for
a revised franchise tax formula
and a gift tax. They listened,
too, to a lengthy pro-sales tax
discussion by Tom Sealy of Mid-
land, chairman of the Citizens
for a Sales Tax group.

Under the Ballman bill's
broad caption, the Senate could
add extensively to its revenue-
raising features, but most ob-

servers doubt the Senate will be
eager to seize the initiative at
this stage.

Campaign Limit Killed—A bill
to limit campaign expenditures
to \$25,000 in a race for the U.
S. senate or congressman at
large was killed by the House,
83-to-50.

Sen. Martin Dies Jr. of Luf-
kin was sponsor of the bill
which passed the Senate.
Supporters of the measure
said that as things are "a rich
man can buy his way into of-
fice." Opponents said the limit
was unrealistic and that a new-
comer to politics could never
become known with such re-
strictions on a statewide race.

Insurance Change Flounders
Sen. Grady Hazlewood's bill to
set ground rules for the state's
merit rating auto insurance has
had at least a temporary set-
back.
Senate voted 16-to-13 to take
up the bill. However, a two-
thirds majority is needed to be-
gin floor action.

Prior to this action, the State
Board of Insurance announced
extensive changes in the rating
plan, effective August 1. Such
violations as running a red
light or stop sign, illegal pass-
ing or turning, negligent col-
lision and breaking of drivers'
license restrictions were remov-
ed from the list of actions
causing a driver to pay higher
insurance rates.

Senator Hazlewood was not
satisfied with the changes. He
criticized the removal of red
light running from the list and
the keeping of penalties for
speeding, no matter how slight.

Hours Cut Approved—A bill to
cut the work week of state hos-
pital employees from 44 to 40
hours was voted out unani-
mously by the Senate Commit-
tee on State Departments and
Institutions.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Austin, Texas—Sometime between now and August 31, the Texas Legislature must come to a showdown, do-or-die, back-to-the-wall decision on a big new money-raising bill.

But many lawmakers believe the situation will have to have reached the desperate, no-choice-left stage before such a decision can be made. To meet current needs, say some lawmakers, the tax bill will have to be a big one and it's bound to bring static from voters.

Only way they can survive, said one, is to be able to say, "Look, I don't like this bill either. But what can we do... release the schools?"

In this climate, the House postponed floor action on the general sales tax measure by Reps. John Allen of Longview and Forrest Harding of San Angelo. Gov. Price Daniel attacked the bill as "obnoxious and inequitable," hitting everything "from the cradle to the grave."

Governor Daniel urged compromise through a "package" bill. Ingredients for the package, he said, might be gotten from Rep. George Hinson's omnibus tax bill and Rep. Ben Atwell's selective sales tax measure.

Senate Cool To Tax — With less than bubbling enthusiasm, Senate State Affairs began hearings on the first tax bill sent over by the House.

It is Rep. Charles Ballman's "loophole bill" designed to raise some \$43,000,000 toward retiring an expected \$63,000,000 deficit in the general revenue fund.

Senators listened with seeming sympathy to witnesses who criticized the bill's provision for a revised franchise tax formula and a gift tax. They listened, too, to a lengthy pro-sales tax discussion by Tom Sealy of Midland, chairman of the Citizens for a Sales Tax group.

Under the Ballman bill's broad caption, the Senate could add extensively to its revenue-raising features, but most ob-

servers doubt the Senate will be eager to seize the initiative at this stage.

Campaign Limit Killed—A bill to limit campaign expenditures to \$25,000 in a race for the U. S. senate or congressman at large was killed by the House, 83-to-50.

Sen. Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin was sponsor of the bill which passed the Senate.

Supporters of the measure said that as things are "a rich man can buy his way into office." Opponents said the limit was unrealistic and that a newcomer to politics could never become known with such restrictions on a statewide race.

Insurance Change Flounders—Sen. Grady Hazlewood's bill to set ground rules for the state's merit rating auto insurance has had at least a temporary setback.

Senate voted 16-to-13 to take up the bill. However, a two-thirds majority is needed to begin floor action.

Prior to this action, the State Board of Insurance announced extensive changes in the rating plan, effective August 1. Such violations as running a red light or stop sign, illegal passing or turning, negligent collision and breaking of drivers' license restrictions were removed from the list of actions causing a driver to pay higher insurance rates.

Senator Hazlewood was not satisfied with the changes. He criticized the removal of red light running from the list and the keeping of penalties for speeding, no matter how slight.

Hours Cut Approved—A bill to cut the work week of state hospital employees from 44 to 40 hours was voted out unanimously by the Senate Committee on State Departments and Institutions.

New Activity
In Housing Loans

The farm housing loan program of the Farmers Home Administration is picking up new momentum, not only throughout the Nation, but here in Mills and Brown Counties.

That's the word from Marlis C. Barker, County Supervisor in charge of the agency's lending program in these two counties. He said this renewed farm housing loan activity follows the early February announcement that an additional \$50 million is now available to the Farmers Home Administration for its 4 per cent loans to farm owners to build or repair farm houses and essential farm buildings. Such a loan may extend over a 33-year period.

The new loan money broke up of a log-jam of applications that were being held because funds had been exhausted. Nationwide, loans are now being processed at the rate of about \$5 million a month but indications point to a probable doubling of that pace.

In this area Mr. Barker said he looks for the main demand to continue to be for loans for new construction, although farm owners may need the credit to repair or remodel dwellings, put in modern kitchens, install pressure water supply systems, central heating, bathrooms, and other conveniences. Other uses include building, repairing or modernizing barns, dairy and poultry facilities, and other farm service buildings. Farm owners find much of this type of construction necessary to cope with changing agricultural conditions.

Mr. Barker pointed out that byproducts of this loan program include employment of carpenters and other skilled and unskilled labor, and increased business for concerns that han-

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: After learning of the reduction in the number of quarters of coverage required to be eligible for social security retirement benefits, I obtained a job and began working October 1, 1960, and worked until March 15, of this year. This should give me the two extra quarters I was advised were necessary for me to qualify. Must I wait to apply for benefits until after my earnings for these quarters are reported by my employer and recorded on my social security record?

Answer: No. You may apply for benefits immediately. Your social security office will secure the needed information from your employer.

Question: My daughter receives social security benefits from my deceased husband's social security account. She will be age 18 in April. She will graduate from high school in June and wants to go to college. Will she continue to receive social security benefits for schooling, or must benefits be terminated with her 18th birthday?

Answer: Benefits to a minor child are terminated with the month before the attainment of age 18. An exception to this is a disabled child whose disability began before age 18; benefits are continued as long as the child remains disabled to the extent that he cannot engage in substantial gainful employment.

Question: I had to stop work

in 1946 and was supported by my wife until her death in 1951. I am 65 but never worked under social security. Can I get payments from my wife's social security record?

Answer: Yes, if your wife had worked under social security as much as one and a half years. Contact the social security office. Take your marriage certificate, your wife's social security number, and proof of your age. Bring any records you have showing the income you and your wife had during the year before she died.

KILL INSECTS ON ORNAMENTAL PLANTS

Springtime brings an assortment of hungry insects that attack ornamental plants. Determining the kind and amount of insecticide to use on the different insects becomes a problem.

To answer these and other questions, extension entomologists of the A-M College of Texas have prepared a leaflet entitled, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants."

The leaflet describes the most common insect pests, describes the type of damage and gives directions for treatment, complete with dilution chart for mixing sprays.
