Signatures Are Added On Petition For Brucellosis Test

In April, 1961 there were 12 counties in Texas that have been certified as modified areas of the Texas Brucellosis program. Twelve counties are in process of testing and nine have petitioned for control areas, according to County Agent, George Reese. Mills County there are 511 signatures on the type II petition according to R. L. Steen, president of the Mills County Cattle Raisers' Association. He leaves 24 more names to be added before the petition is certified and presented to the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Steen requests that each owner sign the petition for Mills County can be set in motion.

Wm. G. Yarborough Will Not Return As Mills County Judge

Former Mills County Judge, Wm. G. Yarborough, who left the office and Goldthwaite about six months ago to attend to some private law practice has notified the Commissioners' Court that he does not plan to return to Mills County and the office he formerly held.

Cecil Egger, former County Commissioner from precinct

four, was appointed by the Court to serve as County Judge when Yarborough left.

Yarborough had corresponded with the Commissioners in recent weeks regarding his returning to the office and last week notified them regarding his decision. He told the Court in part: "Since you, who would make the appointment, have expressed your unanimous satisfaction with your present County Judge, and since I am just getting started in my law practice in Brazoria County, I do not choose to re-qualify as County Judge of Mills County. My resignation remains effective."

Sign Up For Feed Grain Program In Mills County Slow

The final date that Mills County producers may sign up for the Feed Grain Program is May 31.

Mr. Lee Tabor, ASC Office Manager for Mills County, informs us that there are 416 Feed Grain farms in Mills County and as of May 5, there were 58 signed applications.

The corn acreage totaled 296.8 acres and 1035 acres of Grain Sorghums. This makes a total of 1331.8 acres that are signed up in the program.

The base acreage for Mills County is 2562 acres of corn and 7395 acres of Grain Sorghums for a total of 9957 acres of corn and grain sorghums.

The purpose of this program is to: (1) Increase farm income; (2) Prevent further buildup of the feed grain surplus and reduce it if possible; (3) To help assure consumers of fair and stable prices for meat, poultry and dairy products; (4) To reduce ultimate feed grain program costs to taxpayers by about \$500 million.

This is a voluntary program with each producer and applies only to the 1961 crops.

It goes without saying that it took a lot of work and planning on the part of a number of the ladies who carry on the work of the Garden Club and they are to be commended by the community for their efforts in behalf of a county project such as Mills County Park.

It is indeed good news to learn that now more and additional improvements can be undertaken by the ladies in the park. They have worked hard in the past and we feel certain they will continue to do so in the future.

Their cooperation with the park board and other civic minded groups and individuals will continue to boost the park improvement program.

The award won by the club will not be used for park maintenance, it will be used for permanent improvements.

Park Maintenance will continue to be sponsored by the Park Board through the park maintenance fund which worked so well last year.

The response to the park fund drive this spring has been good so far, but it hasn't come up to where it was this time last year. Seems just a little slow in coming in to date.

But, let us hope that all those who are interested in the project will rally to the cause and see to it that the Park Board will have the \$1200 again this year to carry on the needed work. It doesn't take too much from anyone. One hundred persons at \$12 will do it.

MISSILE MESS GROWS WORSE—Senator John L. McClellan again has uncovered dangerous practices of labor unions working in defense areas. Testimony before the permanent investigations subcommittee is alarming and irrefutable.

Executives of General Dynamics Corp. Convair Division, Boeing Airplane Co., Bendix Corp. and other firms have testified that wildcat strikes and other labor troubles have widened the missile gap and hiked the cost of United States programs.

Since construction started in 1957 at Cape Canaveral, Vandenberg and Patrick bases, 347 strikes and work stoppages have caused a loss of 162,000 man-days.

Cost of overtime has been terrific: A journeyman electrician earned \$6,694 in three months. Another workman was paid \$26,843 in one year. For many union members, the weekly pay regularly has exceeded that of the vice-president of the United States and other high governmental and defense officials.

Even worse is the fact that an organizer for the International Brotherhood of Teamsters (that's Jimmie Hoffa's union) illegally forced union shops on contractors, then hid behind the Fifth Amendment when questioned by McClellan. Before the Senate Rackets Committee four years ago, this organizer also pleaded the Fifth; now, he won't even say whether he is a citizen of the United States.

At the worst, treason is involved here. At the best, there is greed, selfishness and dangerous ignoring of the need for defending our country. Racketeers among unions must bear most blame, followed by rank-and-file unionists who let self-interest cause them to take advantage of an unsavory situation.

Criticism also falls upon government officials, executives of contracting firms or others who knew the worst but kept quiet until investigators pressed them.

It is a shameful situation—a blot on individuals and the entire setup—that should be remedied without waiting for further testimony which may prove even worse than is now apparent.

Again Senator McClellan has rendered the nation a real service by exposing this shocking disregard of the country's welfare.—The Dallas News.

WORK SMARTER—NOT HARDER

Doing a job in less time does not mean working harder or faster to get it done. It does mean leaving out the unnecessary motions and trips.

EATING ENOUGH VEGETABLES?

Do you eat at least three different kinds of vegetables daily? Or are you in the habit of eating only the starchy ones like potatoes, dried beans or peas and corn? If so, you are depriving your body of some vitamins, minerals and roughage needed daily.

According to the Texas Food Standard, a recommended guide for daily food needs, each family member should eat a serving of green or yellow vegetables, a serving of other vegetables and a serving of potatoes each day. Markets offer many varieties of these vegetables fresh, frozen or canned, and they can be prepared in many different ways.

Tested recipes for many special vegetable dishes, are given in B-923, "Vegetables, Selection, Care, Cooking," written by extension foods and nutrition specialists.

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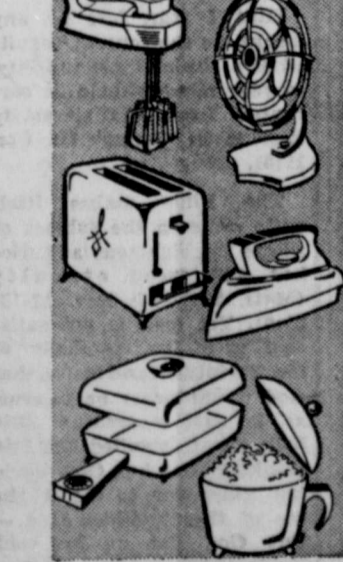

Sheila, A Little Girl with Great Courage, Invents A Game, 'Let's Play Sunday School'

Sheila Nelson of Minneapolis, a blue-eyed and brunette young lady of five years whose cherubic face is generously seasoned with freckles, has just invented a game called "Let's Play Sunday School."

The reason for this bit of little-girl contrivance is that Sheila no longer can walk to the Lutheran Church half a block up the hill from her home. And because of sidewalk bumps, it's equally excruciating to get her to her real Sunday school by wheel chair propelled by her mother.

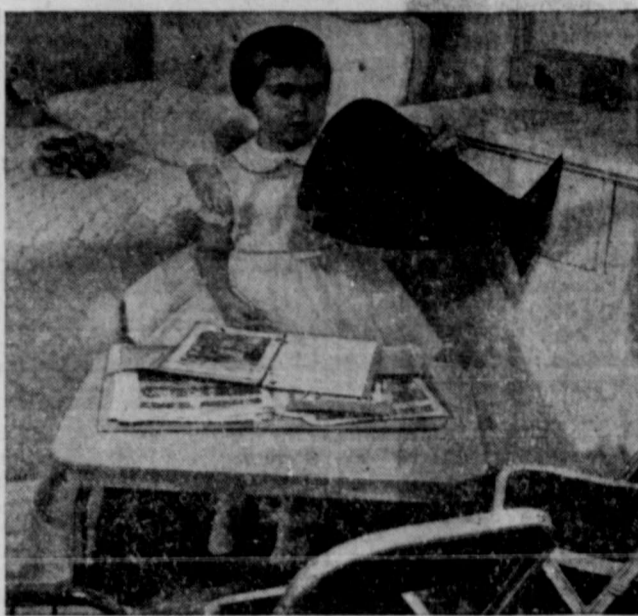
Indeed, she may never be able to make her way again to that house of worship at the top of the hill, a journey's end that seems more unattainable with each painful, passing day. So Sheila today must "make believe" about Sunday school at home.

Severe rheumatoid arthritis of the neck, hands, wrists, knees and feet, cruelly intensified in recent weeks, account for her inability to travel up that hill to church on the Sabbath, to listen to biblical stories and to scissor paper cut-outs of Noah's ark "with everything that creepeth upon the earth," together with lambs and kneeling camels and other figures of the Nativity.

Another 30,000 children in the nation each year are in the same aching predicament as Sheila, the answer to which The National Foundation is seeking today with March of Dimes contributions.

"It's difficult to believe," says Mrs. Ronald Nelson, the child's mother, "but many of my neighbors just won't believe that children are stricken by arthritis. They actually tell me—after all my experience with Sheila—that arthritis is a disease that only the old folks get."

Two years of caring day and night for Sheila have taught her attractive mother that juvenile rheumatoid arthritis is a long way removed from harmless "growing pains." Mrs. Nelson, her husband and two other children are often awakened in the night by Sheila's outcries although much of the time the

child beats back her tears and fears.

Once a week, Mrs. Nelson and Sheila travel tedious miles across Minneapolis to the March of Dimes-supported Children's Rheumatism Clinic of the University of Minnesota. There scientists study any blood changes in Sheila and, under the almost astronomical magnification of electron microscopy, also study specimens of tissue and fluid from her knee. For her part, at the clinic, the mother takes lessons in home physical therapy for the child.

"Sheila is a withdrawn and tongue-tied little girl most of the time," her mother says, "but the cat doesn't have her tongue on Sundays when she 'opens' her Sunday school 'class' here at home. We think the likely reason for this is that when she was able to go to our church until some months ago, that was the one time and place where she somehow blossomed. If she did have pain then, and that was often so,

she was just spunky enough not to let the Sunday school teacher and the other kids know about it."

Through the exercise of prodigious badgering, a stranger was admitted to Sheila's "at home" Sunday school a Sunday ago. Dressed in her blue-orange best and seated on the living room couch, the young lady was reciting with appropriate gestures the story of Jonah and the Whale to a wholly imaginary audience of others of her small fry generation.

With March of Dimes contributions, The National Foundation has been able to establish four arthritis study centers across the nation and has made an additional 20 research grants in this one field. But more such centers and grants are needed if Sheila is to climb back up the hill to her real-life Sunday school; and if the torments of the other 30,000 child victims of rheumatoid arthritis are to end.

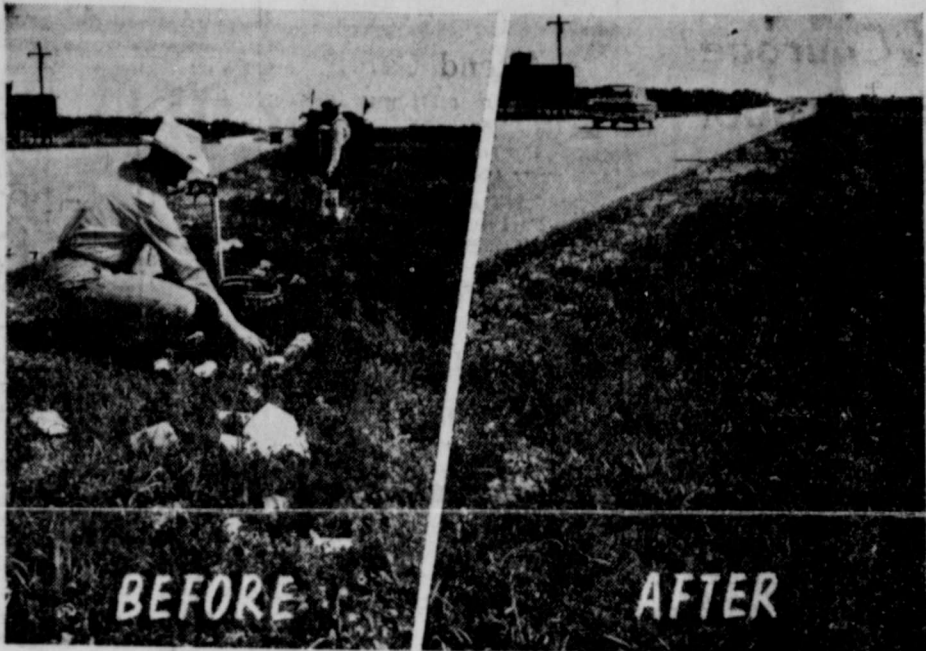

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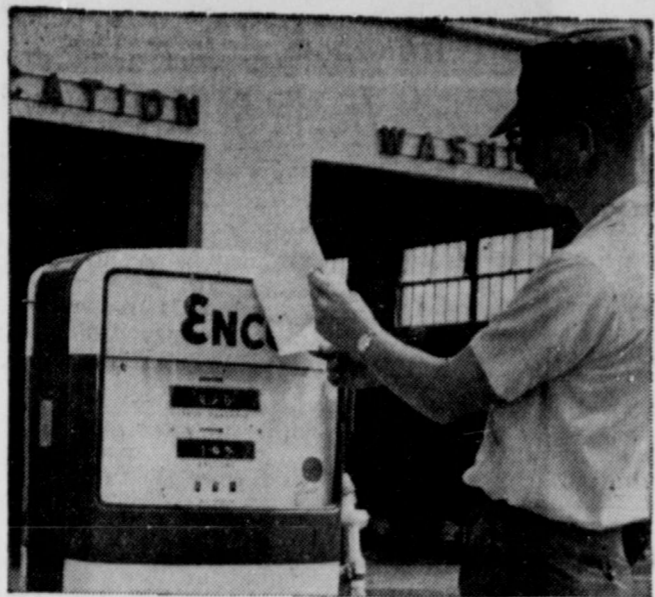

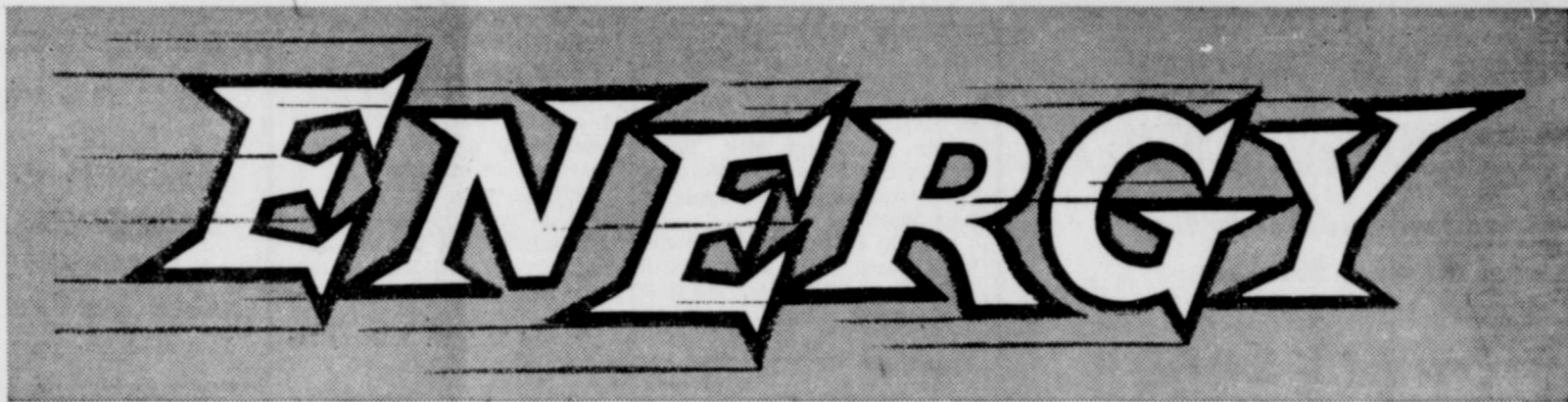

But this morning America's first astronaut had just made his 115 mile leap into space aboard the spacecraft, Freedom, and had won for America and mankind a historic breakthrough — the first flight in space controlled by the pilot himself. Billy is really happy that we are that much ahead of the Russians.

We have been having some summer days. Monday the thermometer went to 91. Tuesday to 92. But today it is cool, with a howling wind and plenty of dust. 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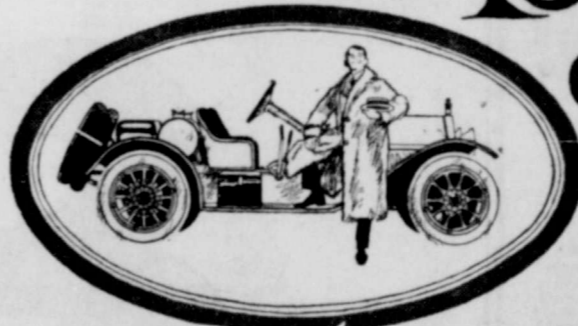
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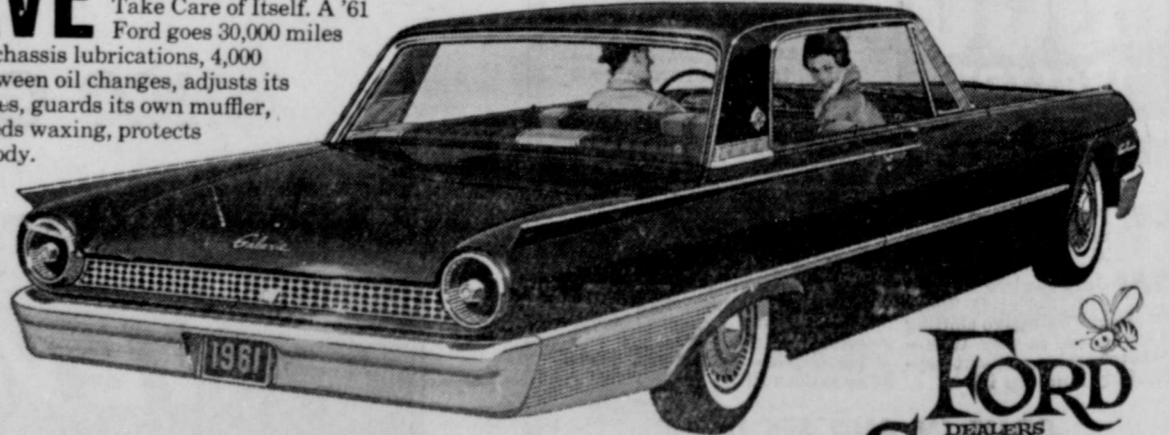

TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

PECANS— The Pecan nut casebearer is the major insect pest attacking pecans in Texas. Casebearers can be successfully controlled if insecticides are applied in the proper manner and at the correct time.

Insecticides must be applied at about the time the eggs are hatching or before the young worms have entered the nuts. Proper coverage is essential in order to deposit an insecticidal residue on the nut clusters and on the stem a few inches below the cluster. Good equipment is essential to force a sufficient volume of spray through the foliage, directly on the twigs and nut clusters in all areas of the trees. Inadequate coverage more than any other factor, is responsible for poor control of the pecan nut casebearer.

There are several insecticides that can be used for the control of the casebearer but the following have proved very good.

- (1) DDT— 3 pounds of 50% wettable powder to 100 gallons of water.
- (2) Malathion— 3 pounds of 25% wettable powder in 100 gallons water.

CAUTION— All insecticides are poisons. Follow the directions on the manufacturer's label.

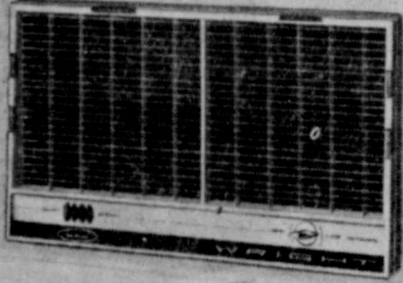

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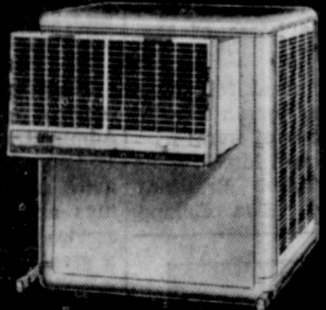
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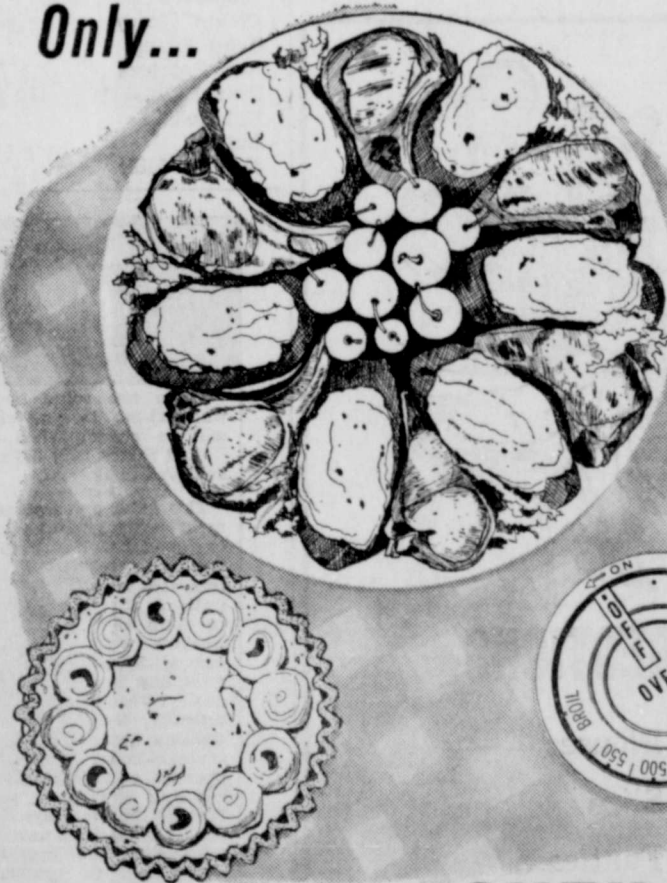

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WASHINGTON AND

There are some observers who feel that true sovietization will be accomplished in the United States long before it is achieved in Russia.

This quite provocative statement requires some background explanations. Under the true Soviet system, it is visualized that in time the workers will own all business and industry. Theoretically, the Russian government is at present only running the C. W. Harder Russian business system until such time as the workers can take over the operation of everything. Of course, it is quite unlikely their politicians will ever give up the economic power they now hold.

However, in America, the trend is quite possibly moving quite rapidly in that direction.

During the winter season recently in Miami, the nation's most powerful labor leaders released a statement that they are contemplating going into the home mortgage business to perk up home building with a cool billion dollars put out at lower than prevailing interest rates in mortgages.

A billion dollars is a lot of money. Less than 20 banks in the entire nation have as much as a billion in total assets.

But labor unions, aided by entered payments of dues plus huge sums paid into pension and welfare funds, are today a major financial power and growing daily.

And unlike banks, insurance companies, et al, these funds are subject to no regulation.

Thus, it is no idle threat that the unions can enter the home mortgage field at cut rate interest rates. It is only reasonable to expect that they will enter into many fields of business, banking, manufacturing, retailing, transportation. It is not inconceivable that in due time, entire industries will be owned by the unions.

For after all, in an era when financing is important in business, so one can finance so easily, or with no expense.

Yet the worker in a unionized plant where the dues are taken out of his paycheck actually has little to say, from a practical standpoint, how much those dues should be, has no control of the money. Neither does he have any control over vast sums paid in, usually by the employer, to union's so called welfare and pension funds.

There has been amassed, and there continues to grow, vast sums of interest free capital practically uncontrolled.

Here then, are the great powerhouses of finance. It is quite possible that some of the huge companies who complaisantly agreed to take the dues money out of their workers checks and turn them over to the union are financing in fact their own destruction. And every payday throughout the land, more and more money pours into these immense stores of capital. Thus in a limited period of time there could come in affect the system that Russian politicians have only talked about... the ownership of the tools of production by labor.

Farmers Showing Interest In FHA Housing Loans

Maris C. Barker, County Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration, said today that owners of farms who need to build, replace or repair dwellings and other essential farm service buildings are showing a great deal of interest in the agency's farm housing loan program.

These loans are available to qualified owners of all sizes of farms provided the farm produce at least \$400 worth of commodities for sale or home use each year, based on 1949 prices. Additional loan funds have recently been made available for this type of credit. The loans are repayable over period up to 33 years at 4 per cent interest.

Farm housing loans serve the dual purpose of providing better homes and stimulating the local economy. Mr. Barker pointed out. Homes and other buildings constructed with the loans provide work for electricians, carpenters and other tradesmen. The purchase of building materials increases local trade.
