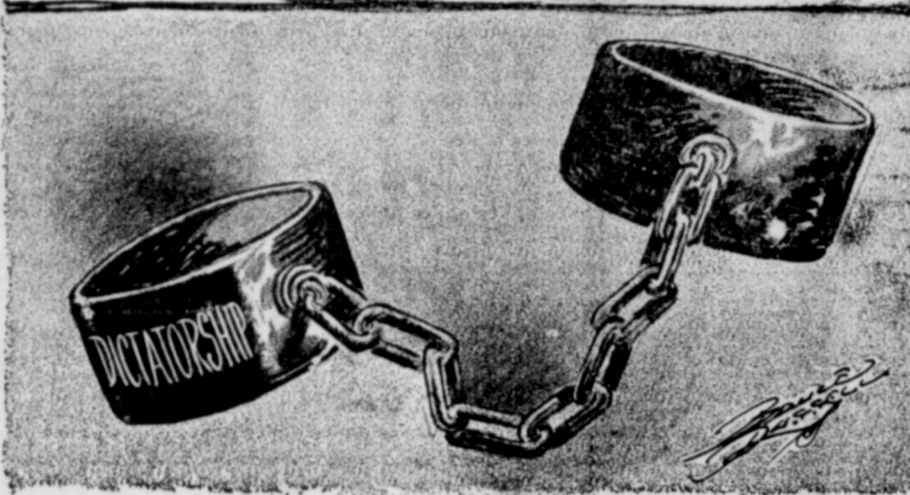

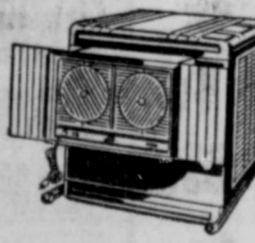

Self Help Program, and is financed by a one cent deduction from each pound of wool sold on which the incentive is paid. The annual income is approximately \$3,000,000, and some 270,000 growers contribute. In Texas, better than 20,000 growers contribute.

WOOL—The American Wool Council program covers all phases of the wool industry, and is a strong and impressive force for wool products produced in this country. The slogan used in all ads and publicity releases is "Natural Wool Loomed in America."

The aim for using this slogan is to give strength and support to U. S. mills and manufacturers who are the buyers of American grown wool. The wool program covers advertising in trade papers and national magazines. Some \$650,000 is allocated for direct and joint advertising. The mills and manufacturers contribute some \$300,000 to the Wool Council's program, providing a total of close to one million dollars for advertising.

The second phase is Education and Sales Training. Some 33 fashion specialists are employed in key cities all over the United States. These fashion specialists have two big jobs: (1) Working with Retail stores, doing sales training, telling the merits of wool, and acquainting the retailers with the Council's program for wool; (2) Conducting educational programs for wool in schools, colleges and before women's clubs.

The third phase is product publicity. The Wool Council works with knitters, mills and manufacturers on a 50/50 basis. This program covers: (1) Fashion shows in New York for designers, fashion editors, buyers and others; (2) Publicity stories for the press on the latest fashions, styles, new scientific advancements in use and care of woolsens and other features, which will help broaden acceptance for wool products; (3) The Council sponsors the Miss Wool of America Program jointly with the San Angelo Pageant Committee, and Woolens and Worsteds of America. The winning girl tours the United States as an Ambassador for

American Wools; and (4) The Council also sponsors the "Make It Yourself With Wool Contest."

Some 16,000 girls entered it in 1960. This year, the contest will be nationwide and at least 25,000 girls are expected to enter.

The Council cannot spend its money for research, but works very closely with the Department of Agriculture Wool Research Laboratory in Albany, California, and with the research people of The Wool Bureau. Many new developments are being tested and processed to broaden the usage of wool such as shrink proofing, wash and wear, moth proofing, stain resistant, permanent creasing and pleating, and a number of other advancements. The new result of all this effort has been rewarding for wool.

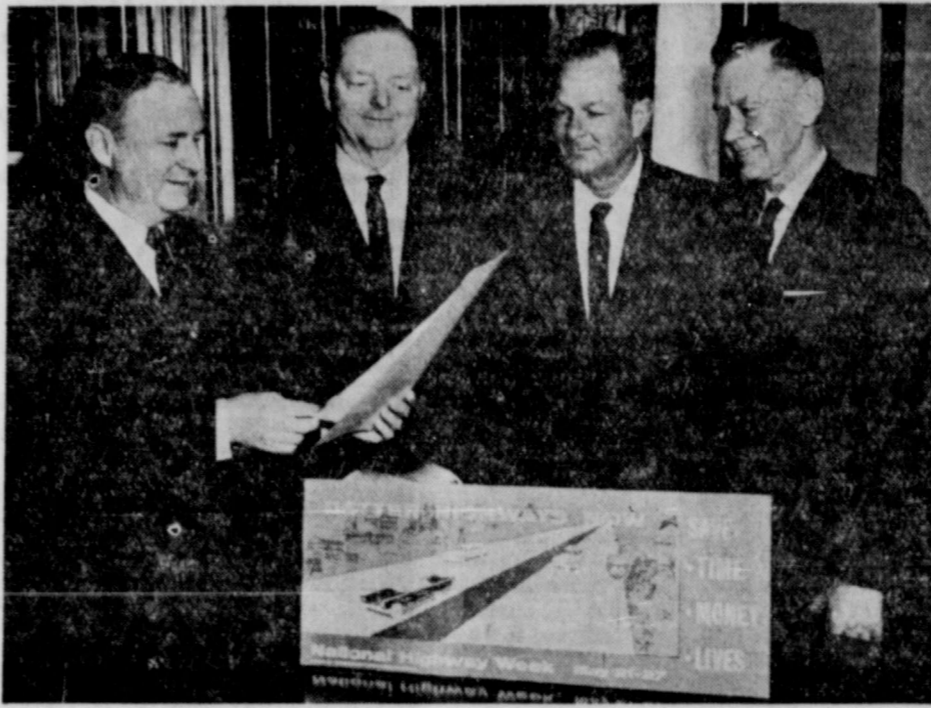
LAMB—The American Lamb Council has a well rounded and effective program for increasing consumption of lamb. The Council covers all phases of promotion, advertising, merchandising, education and publicity.

The Lamb Council limits its promotion to the heavily populated areas due to several factors, such as availability and distribution of lamb. The objective of the Council is to widen the acceptance for lamb.

Some \$800,000 is spent annually on advertising through newspapers and radio, for instance, the Don McNeal Breakfast Program. The Merchandising Department of the Council employs 15 to 16 merchandising and two meat cutting specialists to work closely with retail stores. The Consumer Sales Department employs some 25 home economists who work with schools and colleges and also appear before women's clubs giving talks and demonstrations on the preparation of lamb and why people should include lamb in their diets.

The efforts expended have widened acceptance and increased lamb production, but unfortunately have not resulted in stimulating the price received by the producer for his lambs. The results, profit wise, have been very discouraging. There are a number of factors which have adversely affected the price received for live lambs. The chief reason is the ever increasing imports of lamb at prices below producers' cost of production. Also, lamb is being sold by large retail outlets at bargain prices as a feature item one week, and at a high price the next week. There are also other factors such as drought, low pelt credit, and poor quality which influence sale prices.

In conclusion I would like to bring out the fact that the sheep producer is facing a fight for survival. The American Sheep Producers' Council cannot legislate, but only promote. The growers should support the
