Floyd Daniel Is Brown-Mills Conservationist For The Month

Fighting shinnery oak brush is nothing new to Floyd Daniel, Goldthwaite stock farmer. Daniel, who was named "Conservationist of the Month" by Brown-Mills SCD for May, has been working toward improving his 175 acres of native range for eight years.

When he first began his operation he goated the brush for 3 years but found he wasn't gaining ground. He then had the brush knocked and since has been goating heavily.

Except for one pasture he has made headway and the shinnery cover is getting lower and lower. As part of his normal operations he rests a pasture each year. This has resulted in good grasses such as little bluestem and Indiangrass but the deferment also allows the shinnery to recover and grow. His future plans call for shredding and goating with 3 to 6 goats per acre until his objective is reached of 1/3 brush and 2/3 grass.

Seventy-five acres of the Daniel stock farm is cropland used to supplement the grazing program of his sheep, cattle, and goat operation. All but 12 acres of seepy land

is usually planted in grazing crops, such as small grain including a soil improving crop of clover or vetch about once every three years.

The 12 acres of wet land is being planted to coastal bermuda grass. Two acres will be sprigged when the soil is dry enough to prepare a seed bed.

"Conservationist of the Month" Floyd Daniel has made progress in his fight with shinnery. Through his grazing program less area is shaded by brush and at the same time his native range has improved in kinds and amount of grass.

YOU NEED TO BE INFORMED TO SURVIVE—That is the title of a little article brought to this corner by Mrs. Rachel Trent, Mills County Home Demonstration Agent.

Mrs. Trent wrote the following footnote to the item: "I am very concerned about civil defense and would like to see more, or something, in Vic's Soliloquy."

Here is what she reported, or wrote, about the fact that "you need to be informed to survive."

"Did you attend the Rural Civil Defense Meeting??? (only 70 Mills County residents did.)

"In the event of enemy attack, how would you provide for your own safety, safety for your family, and safety of your neighbors???"

"How much food is needed for your survival, how much water???"

"What about your livestock, what about your land???"

"What would you do if you had a few hours' warning, what would you do if you had a week's warning???"

"What would you do during fallout, how long is fallout dangerous?? You cannot live without water!! How much water do you have stored???"

These questions by the HD Agent are addressed primarily to rural residents, since the meeting in question was called for the express purpose of discussing RURAL CIVIL DEFENSE.

That doesn't mean that those not living in rural areas should not concern themselves with the problem of Civil Defense. Civil Defense is something that concerns everyone, and everyone should be concerned about the problem.

HOW DID IT HAPPEN?—That is a question that will take a lot of kicking around for the next few weeks, months and possibly years in Texas political circles.

Texas voters elected a Republican, and a conservative Republican at that, to the United States Senate last Saturday. The first time since back in the eighteen seventies.

A fellow one time is reported to have said: "They can't put me in jail when he was already in there."

A lot of people in Texas had the feeling for many years that the voters of the Lone Star State couldn't elect a Republican to a U. S. Senate seat, but they did.

There could be several reasons for it. One is that the liberal Democrats voted for the Republican rather than for a conservative member of their own party, or they may have stayed away from the polls and let the Republicans slip one over on them.

Then there is also this one thought to consider. Maybe the voters of Texas just have their 'FILL' of the way things have been going in recent years and have decided to make a change.

Whatever the reason may be, one thing is certain. The two party system of government moved ahead a big step last Saturday in the Lone Star State.

SCHOOL BONDS LOST BIG—There should be no question as to how voters of Goldthwaite Independent School District felt about the \$80,000 school building bond issue that was voted on Saturday.

Voters let the school officials and board of education members know their feelings about the matter, when they defeated the issue nearly four to one.

School Board members know how the 521 voters feel about it, but, that doesn't relieve them of the problem the school district is facing in providing facilities that meet the requirements of the State Education Agencies.

The fact remains that the Goldthwaite School District must provide better and more adequate facilities for the Vocational Agriculture department, the band and lockers with sanitation facilities for the athletic department.

That problem was not solved in the election Saturday, it must yet be solved.

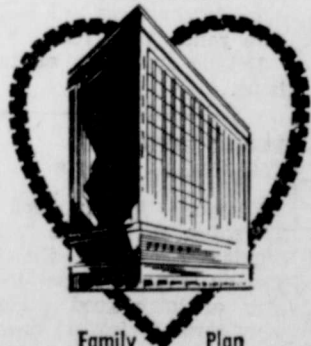
25 YEARS AGO—
