Mills County State Bank will have formal opening of their new bank building on the west side of the courthouse square this coming Sunday, June 11, from 2 to 5 p. m.

Bank officials, directors and personnel, will be hosts for the open house which will get underway with ribbon cutting ceremonies at 2 p. m.

Banking officials along with city and county officials will take part in the ribbon cutting ceremonies.

There will be registration for attendance prizes, refreshments will be served and souvenirs for all.

The new modernistic bank structure is being completed this week in time for the open house Sunday and opening for business Monday morning.

Construction on the building started in December after six months of planning. The building is of charcoal brick with aluminum, steel, glass and masonry construction. It is on a 75 by 120 foot lot which also provides driveway for drive-in banking facilities.

Two new features of the bank, not found in most small cities, are the night depository and the drive in banking service.

The new bank home features large customer lobby, space for six tellers, two statement windows, and one for notes. Number One teller cage is a combination job where teller can wait on customers in the lobby or at drive in window.

The building has private booths for safe deposit box patrons, large officers' working area, president's office, directors' room, bookkeeping and clerical area that has been quadrupled in size with built-in furniture, large vault with safe deposit box section and storage room, storage and filer room, community meeting room to seat 75 persons, kitchenette facilities and utility room.

On the north side of the building there is a paved driveway leading to the drive in banking window. Private parking space is provided at the rear of building.

The new bank home is modern in every detail, air-conditioned throughout for summer and winter comfort, and with fixtures representing an expenditure of \$125,000.

W. H. Barsh Construction Company, Waco, was general contractor and Horace C. Maples, Fort Worth, the architect.

This is the first move for the pioneer financial institution which has operated on the northeast corner of the courthouse square, at Fisher and Fourth, for 71 years.

Hundreds of bankers and customers of the firm are expected for open house Sunday.

New Fire Truck Delivered To City This Week

The new fire truck which was ordered purchased some weeks ago by the City Council was delivered here this week after pumping equipment was installed in San Antonio.

Fire Chief Jack Reid reported to the council Monday night that the equipment had been checked over and met all specifications.

Monthly operating statements for the various departments were presented to the council by city manager W. C. Barnett.

The council went on record to set a rental charge of \$2.50 per hour for the city's air compressor and to restrict its use to the city limits or on city property.

Barnett reported to the council that a new pump had been purchased at a cost of \$2,388. The pump replaced one in use on city well number seven, for several years. The pump went out a few days ago and was beyond repair.

In 1947 he joined the Bank as director and loan officer. In 1953 he was elected vice president and was named executive president in 1951 and president in 1953.

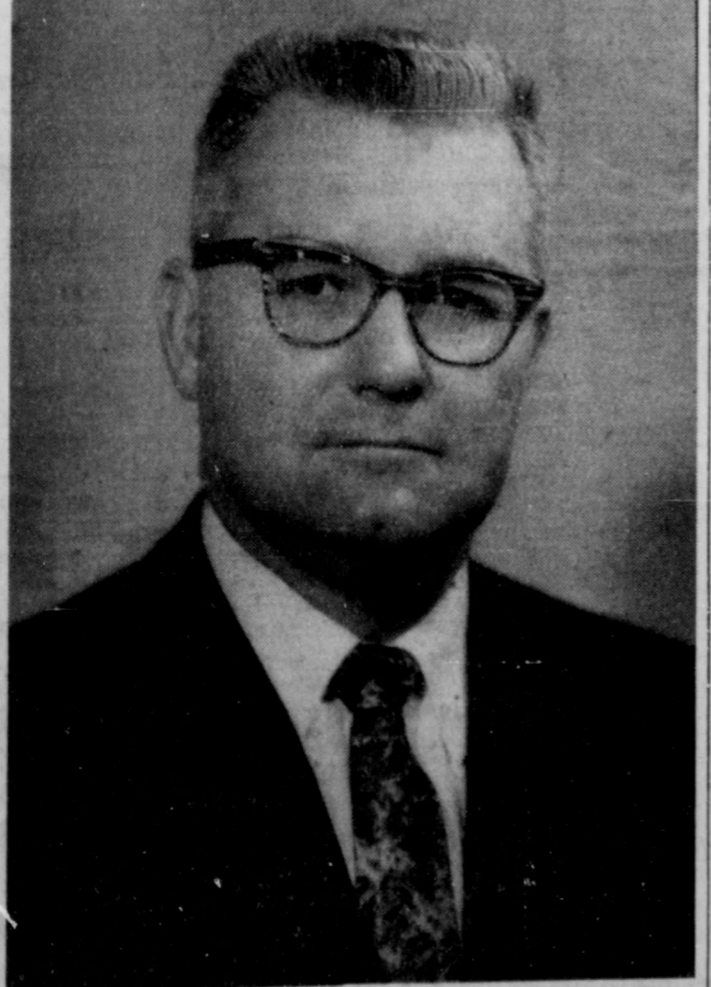

SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF GOLDTHWAITE I S D
JUNE 5, 1961

The Board of Education of the Goldthwaite ISD met in regular session on June 5, 1961 with L. B. Burnham presiding.

J. D. Harper, Secy., O. P. Shelton, L. R. Rudd and Elmo Watson present and on time. Charles Conrad and Walton Daniel were not in attendance. Supt. Jones was present and presented the agenda. Mr. Gordon Charlton was present.

Minutes of the two meetings of May were approved as duplicated and sent each member. Bills were studied and order paid as presented after a motion was made by Rudd, seconded by Shelton and carried by unanimous vote.

Returns of the Bond Election were studied. From the returns, it was determined that 521 votes had been cast with 110 votes being cast for the \$80,000-00 Bond and levying a tax in payment thereof and 403 votes against such proposition; 107 votes for and 394 votes against the Maintenance Tax thus both propositions were declared to have been defeated. Discussion of the building program was discussed at length by the Board of Education that led to the consensus of opinions of all members that another program be presented to the people with only the bare minimum requirements of The Texas Education Agency included and that proceeding of such be immediately initiated.

Motion was made by J. D. Harper, seconded by Rudd that we continue the painting program of the interior of the buildings in all classrooms structures. The motion carried unanimously and Supt. Jones was asked to put the program in motion.

Motion was made by Shelton, seconded by Watson that the six bus drivers, namely Dan Long, foreman, Elton Horton, R. W. Phillips, Cruz Corona, Hugh Owens and Cleo Dempsey, be hired as bus drivers for next term of school or so long as their services are acceptable at the salary and under conditions as stipulated in the Board of Education Meeting in May. Motion carried unanimously.

Selection of a janitor was considered but favorable applicants were not present thus the selection was deferred until a later date.

Motion was made by Harper, seconded by Watson and voted

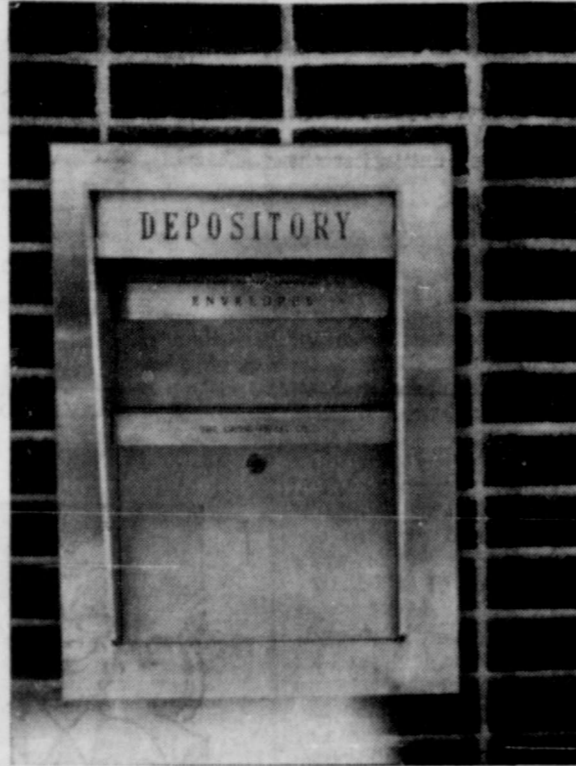

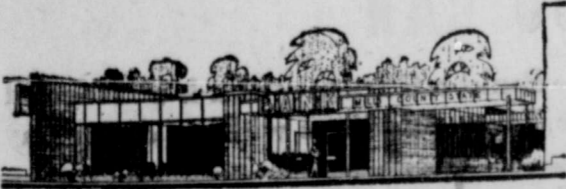

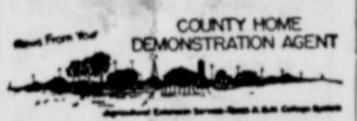

door called "Satellite" made in Germany of solid stainless steel.

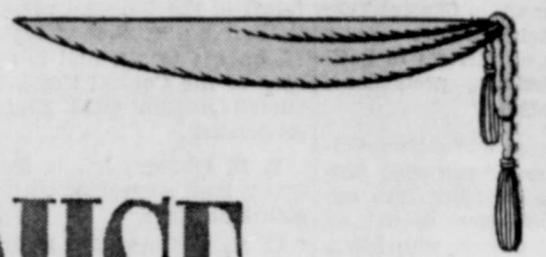
Community room is equipped with kitchen, coffee bar and banquet tables and chairs and cafe tables and chairs.

HIGHLIGHTS OF BANK'S HISTORY

The history of Mills County State Bank dates back to a humble beginning of D. H. Trent "Banker," on June 4, 1888, with deposits of \$4,168.61 and Stock Account of \$11,449.50.

Four years later in 1892 the First National Bank of Goldthwaite was organized. Members of the Board were D. H. Trent, Brooke Smith, M. B. Ferguson, J. D. Harris and W. H. Trent.

In 1901 the stockholders of First National Bank voted to liquidate and the building, furniture and fixtures were sold to D. H. Trent, who again operated as D. H. Trent "Banker."

In 1908 the first meeting of stockholders of the Trent State Bank was held. Directors were D. H. Trent, W. H. Trent, E. B. Anderson, W. H. Thompson, Eli Fairman, L. E. Patterson and W. C. Dew. Charter No. 369 was granted, under which charter Mills County State Bank still operates.

In 1909 the Mullin Bank was discontinued and W. C. Dew came into the Trent State Bank and served as president for about 28 years.

After Mr. Dew's death in 1937, W. E. Fairman was elected president and served until he died in January 1941, when Mrs. W. E. Fairman was elected to serve the bank as president. In the latter part of 1941 she sold her interest to E. T. Fairman who served as president until July 1953 when Dr. J. C. Terrell became associated with the bank as chairman of the board and W. P. Duren was elected president.

Directors of Trent State Bank voted on January 1, 1952 to change the name of the bank to Mills County State Bank.



The three buildings shown here next to the two story structure on the West side of the square were razed to clear the way for the new bank home.
