Methodists Honor Mrs. John G. Berry On Completing 50 Years As Organist

A program, "This Is Your Life, Mrs. Nora Hooks Berry," was given by the Goldthwaite Methodist Church Sunday evening, honoring Mrs. John G. Berry for 50 years as pianist and organist, terminated by her resignation effective June 1. After a brief evening worship including an anthem by a full choir of young people and a short sermon by the pastor on the stewardship of talents, the program moved into a Ralph Edwards type presentation to a crowded house. Mrs. Berry was ushered to the platform by her husband and Thurman Head, who pinned on her an orchid corsage. The program was conducted by Dr. T. C. Graves.

The following persons appeared in order representing and recalling various scenes in

her life: Mrs. Flora Bowles, one of her earliest school teachers; Mrs. Helen Saylor, one of her school girl companions and lifelong friends; Mrs. Ruby Lee Dickerson Kilgore of Houston, one of her outstanding music pupils; Mrs. Sam Sullivan, choir director with her in the church for many years; Billy Saylor of Port Lavaca representing her junior choir; Mrs. Hollis Blackwell representing her church orchestras; Julian Evans representing the "minstrels" for which she was so well known; Mrs. David Buchanan of Temple, representing the State Garden Clubs; and Rev. Geo. B. McCrary representing the 26 pastors of the church during the 50 years.

In addition to her leadership in the music of her home

church for 50 years, it was noted that Mrs. Berry served as secretary-treasurer of the local Red Cross from World War I to World War II, she organized the U. S. O. in Mills County during World War II, she was the organizer of the Garden Club in Goldthwaite, through which she has served to state and national recognition in instituting and conducting the Garden Therapy Committee of the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc. Her special interest therein has been the blind. In 1956 she was named the "Woman of the Year" on Garden Club Day at the State Fair. In 1960 she was listed in "Who's Who of American Women."

Mrs. Berry is a member of the Mayflower Descendants Society, Daughters of American Colonists, Daughters of the American Revolution, Order of the Eastern Star, Self Culture Club and Garden Club. She is at present co-authoring a book on garden therapy for the blind with Mrs. Mary Alice McComb.

The orchid corsage she wore was given by the Claude Saylor family, the altar flowers of red carnations were the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Powhatan Carter, Jr. and family of Fort Sumner, New Mexico. The church presented her with the book, "This Is Your Life, Mrs. Nora Arminta Hooks Berry," and a lovely solid gold charm bracelet engraved, "50 Years as Organist."

Mrs. Letrice Trent Sullivan was presented a beautiful American Revised Version Bible bound in red leather with her name in gold in appreciation for the many years of service as choir director and countless other services to the church during the same period as Mrs. Berry.

RED CROSS GIVES SUMMER SAFETY TIPS—"Life Preservers" for the millions of Americans who will take to the water and the woods this summer are recommended this week by the American Red Cross as the outdoor vacation season begins.

The most popular summer sports, swimming and boating, account for the majority of the 6,500 annual drownings, A. W. Cantwell, national director of Red Cross Safety Services, said.

To prevent them and other waterside accidents, he advocated these precautions:

1. Never swim alone. At beaches, stay near a lifeguard.
2. Stay out of the water when overheated, for an hour after eating, and during electrical storms.
3. Stay away from area immediately in front of the diving board.
4. Don't depend on a tube or inflated toy to hold you up.
5. Don't dive in shallow water or in unknown waters.
6. Watch your step. Walk, don't run, around pool area.
7. Stay out of deep water if you can't swim.
8. Beware of sunburn, even on a cloudy day.
9. Dry off after swimming. Cover up if it's chilly.
10. In ocean and river swimming watch for riptides and currents. Lifeguards will tell you how to recognize these conditions and how to save yourself if you are caught.
11. In long-distance swimming, always swim parallel to the shore and with a companion or a boat.
12. Stay away from piers and pilings.
13. Alcohol and swimming don't mix. Stay out of water if you have been imbibing.
14. Fence your swimming pool for the protection of small children.
15. Separate deep and shallow water in your pool by a buoyed line.
16. Keep handy such rescue equipment as ring buoys and reaching poles, as well as a first aid kit.

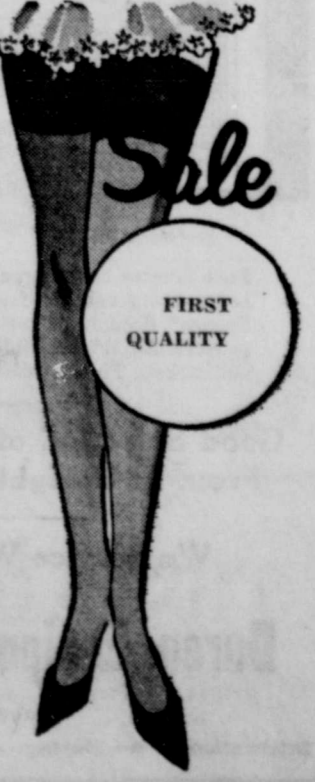

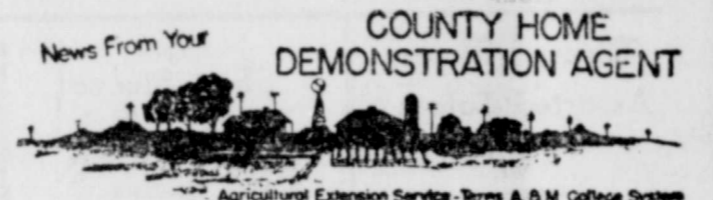

FURNITURE FOR NEWLY-WEDS

Ever stop to think how much money newly-weds invest in home furnishings—especially furniture? Or how many times a costly suite or piece of furniture chosen in a hurry, turns out to be a "white elephant"? Selection of furniture reflects taste and judgment as well as a financial investment. Careful choice will pay dividends in savings and satisfaction. Keynote of today's furniture is comfort, simplicity, flexibility and usefulness. It is designed to meet changing needs of many families on the move, and is scaled to the dimensions of today's home. Newly-weds may be confused by all the possibilities and wonder where to spend and where to save on furniture. I suggest spending as heavily as possible on such items as a sofa bed, spring and mattress, and lounge chair. These are necessities and long term investments. Buy good permanent storage units, such as chests of drawers which can be used anywhere in the house. Favor open stock rather than whole suites of furniture. It is often smarter to buy two or three piece sets. Choose design carefully. Comfort is not a matter of the size and amount of upholstery, but one of clever design. Look for graceful, simple lines and good construction. Consider care and upkeep. Furniture should be appropriate to your way of living. The furnishings should have the same general feeling so that they will be appropriate to each other in design, texture and color. You can assemble pieces of any period in one room, or you can combine light and dark finished woods—just be sure to let one period and one finish dominate.

ALL MEAT CUTS CAN BE TENDER

Any cut of meat can be tender and appetizing—if properly prepared. Years of research in home economics laboratories and kitchens, using thousands of meat cuts, have established this fact. The phrase "if properly prepared" is the key to tenderness. For one thing, all meats should be cooked at low temperatures. This retains the juices and flavor, cuts down on shrinkage, and assures tenderness. A meat thermometer is invaluable in bringing meat to just the right degree of doneness. Another vital tip on meat cookery—cook the tender cuts by the dry heat methods and use the moist heat methods on the less-tender cuts.

Man-made situations can cause shade tree troubles. Soil added or moved by bulldozers or graders may be responsible for the death of many shade trees. Too much fill soil around new homes may cause trees to die after three to five years or even longer, says Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist.

The Texas Animal Health Commission announces the receipt of Mills County petition for Type II Brucellosis Control.

Proclamation by the Governor No. 156 has been issued and a hearing set for July 17, 1961, at 9:30 a. m., in the office of the Texas Animal Health Commission, State Office Building, Austin, Texas.

All those in favor of or in opposition to the designation of this County as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area are invited to attend. If no opposition is presented, Mills County will be designated as a Type II Control Area effective September 14, 1961.

As of June 8, 1961, veterinarians in Mills County are eligible to receive free vaccine from the Animal Disease Eradication Division, Agricultural Research Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, for use in vaccinating cattle in that County.

Livestock owners should contact their veterinarians for further information concerning the vaccine.

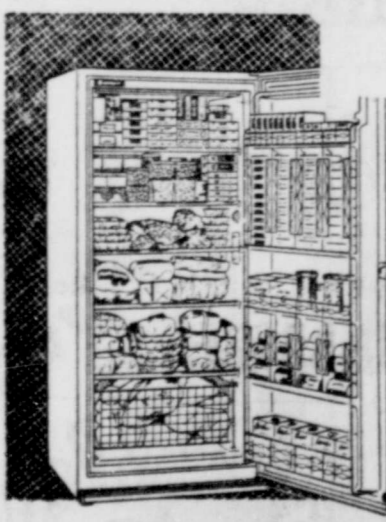

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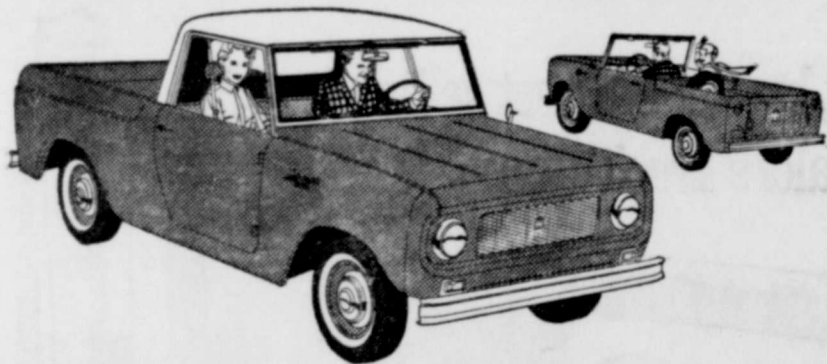
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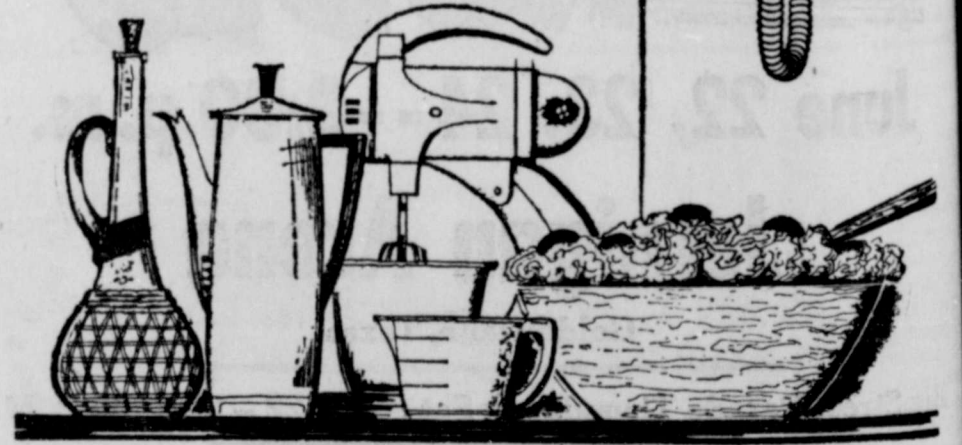
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**Sherry Shaw

FACTS ABOUT YOUR HEARING

Yet someone will either ask them and over what someone will put their hand behind their ear trying to understand what is being said, or sit in a chair and say yes when they have said no, or they will wear a shell and stay away from church, etc., and yet they are afraid someone will say that they wear a hearing

aid. Other facts: If people would have a hearing test made when they noticed the first sign that they were getting hard of hearing they would not have so much trouble later on. Lots of people will put it off until they get in real trouble and expect to be corrected over time, although they have been years getting that way—they still want correction over time. If this same person had been tested at least every six months, they would not have been in trouble. You do not know until you are nearly blind that your eyes tested do you? Maybe the above statements are a little blunt, and maybe they hit below the belt, but we in the hearing business have spent thousands of dollars on research to aid and help the hard of hearing. We feel you should know the facts and here are some of the facts from our line of the fence. Years ago if everyone had to wear a hearing aid, they would have had big battery boxes and cords and buttons in the ear. It was like hooking up the harness on a buggy horse. No more cords, tubes, etc. Now people that would not wear hearing aids before because of some of the reasons we have mentioned before can now be fitted to hear again with the whole unit in the ear. In fact, you can sleep in it if you cared to do so.

Yes, the hearing industry has come a long way, and with the "all in the ear" unit, has reached the end of a long rough road so that you—the hard of hearing—may enjoy the fruits of a long battle. Now there is no reason for anyone that is hard of hearing to suffer any longer.
