Fair Taxation, which is pushing Gov. Price Daniel's plan for additional selective sales taxes, plus more business taxes, higher taxes on alcoholic beverages and others

A third committee, appointed by the Governor, avoided a single, specific recommendation but pinpointed some sort of retail sales tax as the most likely source for the amount of money needed. This committee is composed mainly of the chairmen of governing boards of state welfare and educational agencies.

Committee suggested that either the retail sales tax passed by the Senate last session (a "general" sales tax with exemptions for food, farm supplies, medicine) or a "Pennsylvaniatype" tax which affects only combination of the two might
