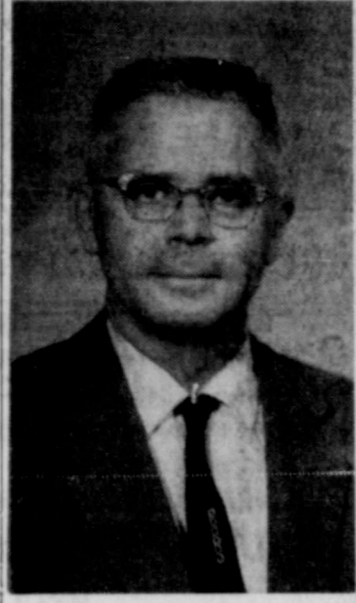

Reports are circulating that this has been the most pleasant June and July experienced here in many years. Rainwise and weatherwise it has been a very pleasant summer, so far.

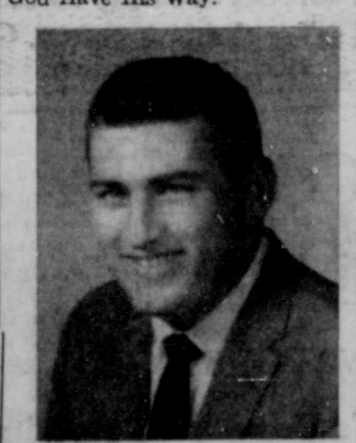

Owen Hamilton Yarborough was born in DeWitt County, September 28th, 1882, the son of Charles C. Yarborough and Nanny Hamilton Yarborough. The family moved to San Saba County while he was a baby and moved to Goldthwaite about the time town lots were first sold here.

He was educated in private schools, in the Goldthwaite public schools, and later at Cherokee, Texas where he attended West Texas Normal and Business College.

He worked in the office with his father who was County-District Clerk of Mills County. In 1903 he started working in the Bank here, that was then "D. H. Trent - Banker," a private bank, and later Trent State Bank. He remained with the bank for about 16 years, with the exception of a year and a half while he and his brother Lee were in the Furniture and Hardware business.

On May 26, 1909 he was married in Goldthwaite to Mabel Mullan of Goldthwaite. To this union two sons were born, William G. and Owen Harold. Mr. Yarborough opened a Dry Goods Store in Goldthwaite in 1919 and continued in that busi-

During his busy career he also served as: president of the Retail Merchants Association for 15 years; president of the school board; vice president, Boy Scout Council; County Councilman of Boy Scouts; City Treasurer for many years; secretary-treasurer of Chamber of Commerce; director in State Retail Merchants Association; director and stockholder Trent State Bank; a 50 year Mason; a 25 year Lions Club member, Noble Grand of the I. O. O. F. Lodge; a member of The Red Man, Woodmen of The World, The Woodmen Circle, The Rebekahs and Worthy Patron of The Eastern Star.

Surviving him are his wife, two sons, Harold of Goldthwaite and William G. of Angleton; three grandchildren, Joe Michael Yarborough, Linda Kay Yarborough and Owen Bascomb Yarborough.

County Judge Cecil Egger has officially proclaimed July 23-29, 1961, as "Farm Safety Week" in Mills County, according to W. G. Bishop, president of the county Farm Bureau.

President Kennedy and Governor Daniel have previously designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce needless suffering and loss of life.

The county farm leader said that failure of rural people to observe safety in their daily living exacts a heavy toll in both economic and physical suffering. He stated that there is a disabling accident every 32 seconds and a death every 45 minutes to farm residents over the nation.

In his official proclamation, County Judge Egger said: "The economy of our county, state and nation is greatly dependent upon the continued well-being and progress of our agricultural population. Accidents from farm work cause needless suffering, distress and loss of life each year among our rural families."

"A vigorous farm accident-prevention education program will be conducted during this week by the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Mills County Farm Bureau," the proclamation continues.

School Board Considers Building Needs At Special Meeting Friday

Members of the Goldthwaite school board met in called session last Friday night to give further study and consideration to building needs to meet state education requirements with respect to Vocational Agriculture and Band Hall. All board members were present.

Board president Charles Conradt was instructed to name a committee to draft tentative plans and determine costs for a new agriculture building and a band hall.

Named to the committee were L. B. Burnham, chairman, J. D. Harper and L. R. Rudd.

This committee is to report back to the board and also make suggestion on what part of the campus the new buildings are to be erected.

The proclamation further urged all farm families to increase their vigilance against accidents and encouraged interested organizations and individuals to participate in this program.

County Farm Bureau President W. G. Bishop said that the theme of this year's observance is "Safety is a Family Affair." He said a different phase of farm and home life would be emphasized each day during the week: Sunday, reverence for life; Monday, safety begins at home; Tuesday, agricultural chemicals; Wednesday, prevent falls; Thursday, highway safety; Friday, farm machinery; and Saturday, recreation safety.

The Mills County Farm Bureau is cooperating with the Texas Farm Bureau's Farm Safety Department in its effort to promote "Farm Safety Week" all across the state.

County Farm Bureaus are becoming increasingly active in safety work, Bishop said. This includes cooperating with the TFB Safety Department to stage safe driving demonstrations in high schools and by participating in a fire extinguisher project.

From time to time the Editor receives a letter that testifies to that fact. One such letter came to yours truly the past week. It is from Mrs. Hilma B. Carrell and her daughter, D'Ann, Comfort, Texas. They experienced an auto accident at the East edge of the city a few days ago and the letter tells of their impression of the people of Goldthwaite.

I want to share the letter with our readers, so here it is:

"Dear Editor:

"I do not know the name of your paper; nor did we know anyone in your town until our recent car accident at the edge of your little city; but we are taking this means of thanking your citizens for the cordiality extended to us while we were there.

"Especially our sincere thanks go to Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Jones, the first to reach us at the scene of the accident, for remaining helpful throughout the day, and to Dr. Childress and staff for prompt and efficient aid; to the bank representative for his extended courtesies to place possessions in his vault; to Landrum and Collins Motor Co., for the many helpful courtesies shown us, and to the ambulance crew—especially to the driver when he gave these words of encouragement. 'Now, don't worry, Mrs. Carrell, you are not alone. This is a small town; but a friendly town and anyone who can is ready to help you. Anyway they can help they will if you just express it. Just take it easy—you have no need to worry.' He was so right.

"Our town of Comfort is still smaller but, it is at the cross roads of the Summer tourist travel of Houston, San Antonio, and Galveston. I have learned a good lesson in everyday friendly neighborliness from Goldthwaite people that we can apply here.

"It takes such an accident as ours to make us stop and know there are good people everywhere—instead of riding through the street of the highway and just see people in their yards and on the streets.

"Thanks again and again to everyone who aided us in any way at Goldthwaite." Sincerely, Mrs. Hilma B. Carrell and (Miss) D'Ann Carrell.

"P. S.: I forgot to mention in person your officers and their politeness and quietness in talking to my daughter. This was her first such accident and they were very considerate and patient with her. She has nothing but the highest regard for them."

Mrs. Carrell is Counselor for Kendall County Public Schools serving Boerne and Comfort High Schools.

The past week bank officials had something new to show. Furniture for the community room, which was not here in time for open house, was delivered.

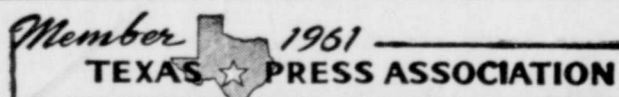

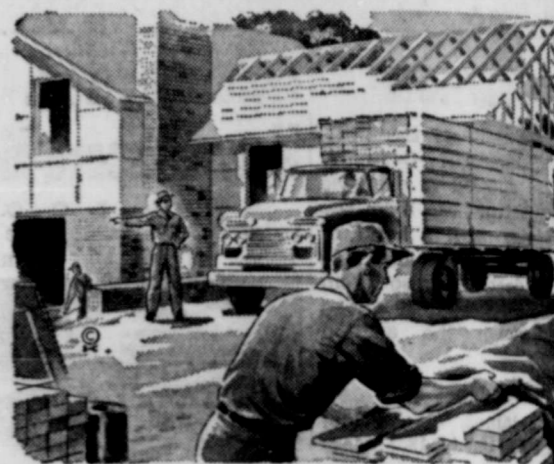

FARMERS GAS TAX REFUND

Farmers are reminded of their eligibility for a refund of the 4-cent per gallon Federal gasoline tax on that used for farming purposes. The claim should include all eligible gasoline gallonage purchased between July 1, 1960 and June 30, 1961.

The claim for refund should be filed on Form 2240 and not later than September 30.

The gasoline on which a refund may be claimed covers that used for farming purposes and includes most normal production operations. Three exceptions, however, are noted. They are gasoline used on the highway, even though for transporting farm products; that used for processing, packaging, freezing or canning operations and that used for non-farming or personal purposes.

Records of fuel purchases should be kept to verify the refund request and care should be exercised to avoid inaccurate

GALL FORMING INSECTS—OR PHYLLOXERA

There has been a large number of people asking for information on how to control the galls on the leaves of plants. Many kinds of galls are caused on leaves, stems and roots of trees by aphids, mites, tiny flies and wasp-like insects. Usually the galls form as insects feed and lay eggs upon buds, stems or leaves; the young usually develop inside the galls. Gall forming insects sting the plant cells. Thereby they stimulate growth and cause the forma-
