Other readers in the top ten were: Paula Council, 10th grade, 31 books; James Berry, 6th grade, 30 books; Gary Holcomb, 7th grade, 28 books; Barbara Bruce, 3rd grade, 27 books; Mary Ann Corona, 6th grade, 24 books; Joyce Robertson, 2nd grade, 24 books; Poncho Rahl and Betty Robertson, both 7th grade students with 21 books each.

The theme of the program this year was "The Evolution of The American Flag." Each participant received a certificate with flags of the United States from 1775 through 1960 pasted on, for the books they read. The three high readers received books published by The Dallas News, "The Story Of Old Glory."

Total of 2,015 juvenile books were checked out during the six week period of the reading program. Also 371 adult books have been checked out during this time.

"We urge you to take advantage of your County Library and use its facilities. We are open Monday, Wednesday and Saturday afternoons from 2:30 until 5:30 and books can be returned at anytime through a book slot in the Library door," commented Mrs. V. C. Bradford, Librarian, in reporting on the reading program for 1961.

The Newburgh Story

THE NEWBURGH STORY—The recent announcement from Newburgh, N. Y., a city of 30,000, on the Hudson, that it is cracking down on deadbeats and chiselers who live on relief money from welfare agencies, is timely and should inspire other cities to follow suit.

Newburgh, which spends a third of its \$3 million annual budget on relief for 1400 residents, or 5% of its population, decided it was time to provide some relief to the people who are working and paying the bills.

So, these rules were announced:

1. Welfare payments are to be denied to able-bodied recipients

who refuse to work when offered a job.

2. Relief payments for any one family is not to exceed the pay of lowest paid city employee with a family of comparable size.

3. Except for the blind, aged or disabled, any such assistance shall be limited to 3 months out of the year.

4. Hereafter payments to mothers of illegitimate children shall be refused, if they have any more children.

5. No relief to recent residents unless they can prove they were offered a job in the city before they moved to Newburgh.

This is bad news for those who find it easier to collect relief checks than to work. And it is bad news for the unwed mothers who see in new-born children a chance to obtain a fatter relief check each month.

Such practices, are reported to be quite general over the country, are demoralizing to the recipients and are becoming increasingly distasteful to the public. Only a crack-down can stop the tempo of the trend. Here in Washington, for example, the rate of illegitimacies among Negroes run 265 per 1,000 births. Among whites it is 59 for every 1,000 births. And here, as in Newburgh and most cities, every illegitimate birth adds to the relief check each month.

But Newburgh may be running into trouble. New York's State Welfare Board warns that the rules may be too strict, and a hearing has been ordered. And the Federal government may crack down on Newburgh by denying a sizeable share of the relief cost because of the restricted rules.

One thing is certain: if state or federal laws interfere with this common sense reform at Newburgh, then it is high time the federal and state laws are changed.

Central Texas Telephone Co-operative, Inc., board of directors at their last regular meeting made a number of changes in district boundaries with board representation. The Co-Op operates 14 exchanges presently and will add two new ones this year.

Eola was purchased in 1959 and is being converted to dial system and will be put into operation within the next 30 days, serving about 150 customers. The exchange served about 60 customers under the old system.

The Priddy Exchange was purchased last year and construction for modern dial system has been underway for some months now. Construction is expected to be completed soon and the exchange will be put into operation about November. It will be the Co-op's 16th exchange and will serve about 150 customers.

Both Eola and Priddy plants are classed as buried plants with all rural cables being about two feet underground.

The new district set-up with exchanges will be as follows: District 1, Star and Caradan; district 2, Algeria, Locker and Big Valley; district 3, Mullin; district 4, Priddy; district 5, Cherokee and Bend; district 6, Voca; district 7, Rochelle and Mercury; district 8, Lohn, Doole and Melvin; district 9, Eola.

FARM SAFETY: A YEAR 'ROUND JOB—We Americans seem to need an official "week" each year to remind us of things we really should practice every week of every year.

There's nothing wrong with the idea—the official reminder usually proves helpful—but too often too many people will substitute one week's observance for a year's practice.

National Farm Safety Week, being celebrated this week, is a perfect example of a "week" that should be considered a continual part of rural life. Especially is that true in this area in which agriculture plays such a leading role in our economic life. It is just plain good sense to avoid the suffering and economic losses resulting from farm accidents.

Co-sponsored on the national level by the National Safety Council and the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture and on the state level by the Texas Farm & Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Farm Bureau and the Extension Service, the 18th annual Farm Safety Week has as its theme, "Safety Is a Family Affair." The Eagle is glad to be among the many newspapers helping in the campaign to draw attention to the need for the year 'round observance of safety practices on the farms and ranches.

Accidents in American farm homes take about 2,700 lives a year, according to the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, and some 3,400 persons are killed each year doing farm work. This is in addition to the 4,700 farm residents who die on the highways in non-work accidents.

If we think of safe practices as a means of doing things, rather than as a set of do's and don'ts, accident prevention will become a way of life—a way of life that will preserve the lives of farm families.

Let's make every week Farm Safety Week.

SOMEBODY TALKING ECONOMY—A report from Austin shows that somebody is talking economy in state government and spending.

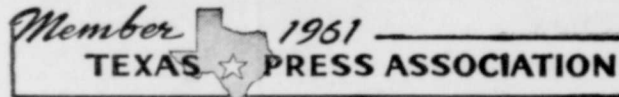

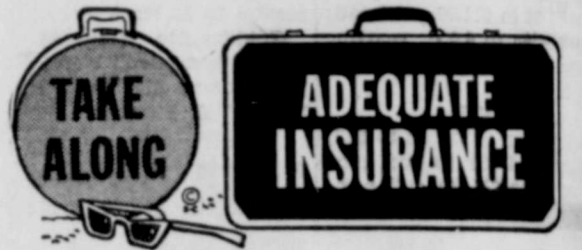

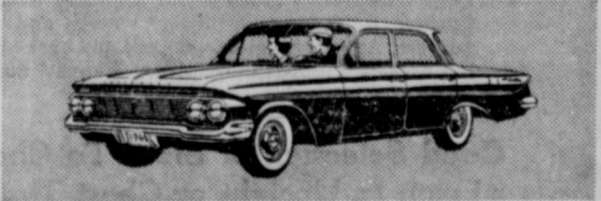

Young Men Are Reminded About Registration

Texas Local Board No. 84 and the Selective Service System reminds all young men who will reach their 18th birthday during the summer months that they may register with Selective Service at any local board office which is convenient to them.

The "Place of Residence" given at the time of registration will determine which local board of the system will be required to accept jurisdiction over their records and classification, etc.

Young men are required by law to register with Selective Service within five days upon reaching their 18th birthday regardless of where they may be temporarily working or living at the time.

By presenting themselves to the local board nearest to them

for registration and by giving their permanent home address (legal residence) as their "Place of Residence" will assure the prompt forwarding of the registration card to the boy's "Home Board" which will assume jurisdiction over his Selective Service records.

No purely temporary residence or mailing address should be given if a permanent residence has been established.

It should be kept in mind that most Selective Service Board offices are closed on Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays and it therefore becomes important for young men to register promptly upon reaching 18 years of age. They may register on their 18th birthday but cannot be registered before.
