

If we think of safe practices as a means of doing things, rather than as a set of do's and don'ts, accident prevention will become a way of life-a way of life that will preserve the lives of farm families.






SOMEBODY TALKING ECONOMY-A report from Austin shows that somebody is talking economy in state government and spending
