Goldthwaite School Calendar Is Approved; Opening Date Announced

Members of the Goldthwaite Lions Club and their guests were presented some interesting facts about their own electric distribution system and the Lower Colorado River Authority, from which the city purchases power, at their regular meeting last Tuesday night.

W. C. Barnett, Manager of City Utilities, was program chairman and introduced guests for the evening. Officials of the LCRA presented part of the program for the evening.

Following are remarks made by Barnett as related to the history of the electric department of Goldthwaite City Utilities.

"Lion Chairman, fellow Lions and distinguished guests, "We asked for this spot on your program tonight for three reasons.

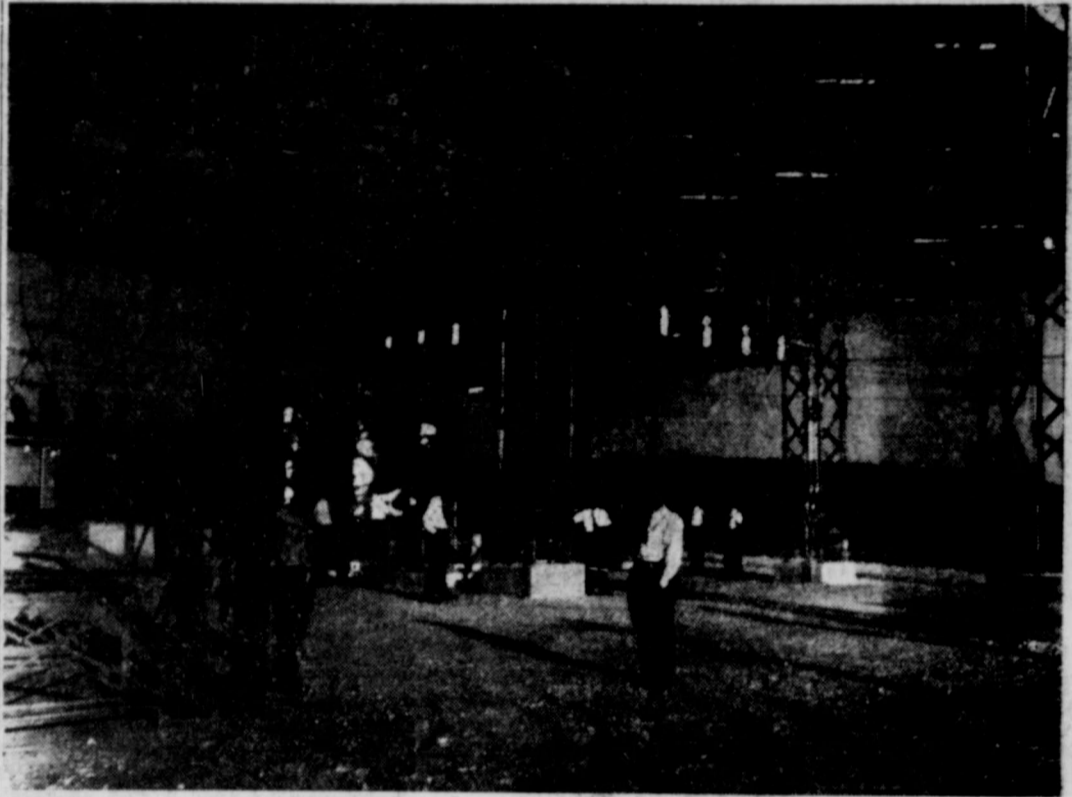
"First—to honor, in some small way, our guests from Austin, General Manager, chief engineer and other employees of Lower Colorado River Authority, who are responsible for building into Goldthwaite the new 69,000 volt line from a point near San Saba.

"Second—to bring you a story of twenty years of operation of The City of Goldthwaite Electric System.

"Third—to carry this story to all the people of Goldthwaite in words and pictures through the facilities of the Goldthwaite Eagle.

"In 1940 the citizens of Goldthwaite decided, by vote, to go into the electric business in competition with Community Public Service Company, who then served the City. The Lower Colorado Authority was contacted and a contract entered into whereby the City would buy power from Lower Colorado

City Officials Unhappy Over Phone Directory

Members of the City Council meeting in regular session Monday expressed their unhappy feelings regarding the new telephone directories issued by Southwestern States Telephone Company without street address listings and emergency numbers for calling volunteer firemen.

New directories mailed to local subscribers recently didn't have these listings after the city had made a request for them.

Southwestern representatives meeting with the council about six months ago when new rates were being requested, told council members that street addresses for local subscribers could be included in the next directory. The city had volunteered to furnish the listing information.

OTHER BUSINESS

Other routine business conducted by the council included report of operating statements of the various departments for July, street paving and improvements and sewer extensions.

A committee was named to investigate the possibility of trading the old city grader for a later model. Howard Campbell, Sam Edington and W. C. Barnett are on the committee. They are to check into the matter and report back to the council.

LCRA officials were guests at the regular Lions Club meeting last Tuesday night at the American Legion Hall. Some of them took part in presenting the program pointing out facts about LCRA operations.

They were introduced by W. C. Barnett, program chairman, who also presented other guests of the evening including Mayor Y. B. Johnson, Jr., members of the city council, Fred Reynolds, Ray Duren, Sam Edington and V. A. Hudson, city secretary Glynn Collier, and city employees, D. W. Arnold, J. L. Huffman and John A. Hester.

LCRA officials came to Goldthwaite from Austin on the completion of the new power line from San Saba to Goldthwaite with substation at both San Saba and Goldthwaite. The new 69,000 volt line supplies power to Goldthwaite City Utilities, replacing the old line from Lometa to Goldthwaite.

The Authority operates the following plants: Buchanan Dam Hydro Plant; Inks Dam Hydro Plant; Wirtz Dam Hydro Plant (Granite Shoals); Marble Falls Hydro Plant; Mansfield Dam Hydro Plant (Marshall Ford); Tom Miller Dam Hydro Plant (Austin) and Comal Steam Plant at New Braunfels.

In transmission lines the Authority maintains 981 miles of 69 Kv line and 495 miles of 138 Kv line.

The firm has interconnect points with other utilities as follows: Texas Power & Light Company—Lampasas, Round Rock and Sandow; Houston Lighting & Power Co.—Peters Substation near Bellville, Texas; Central Power & Light Company—Columbus and Luling; West Texas Utilities Company—Mason; City Public Service Board of San Antonio—New Braunfels and City of Austin, Austin.

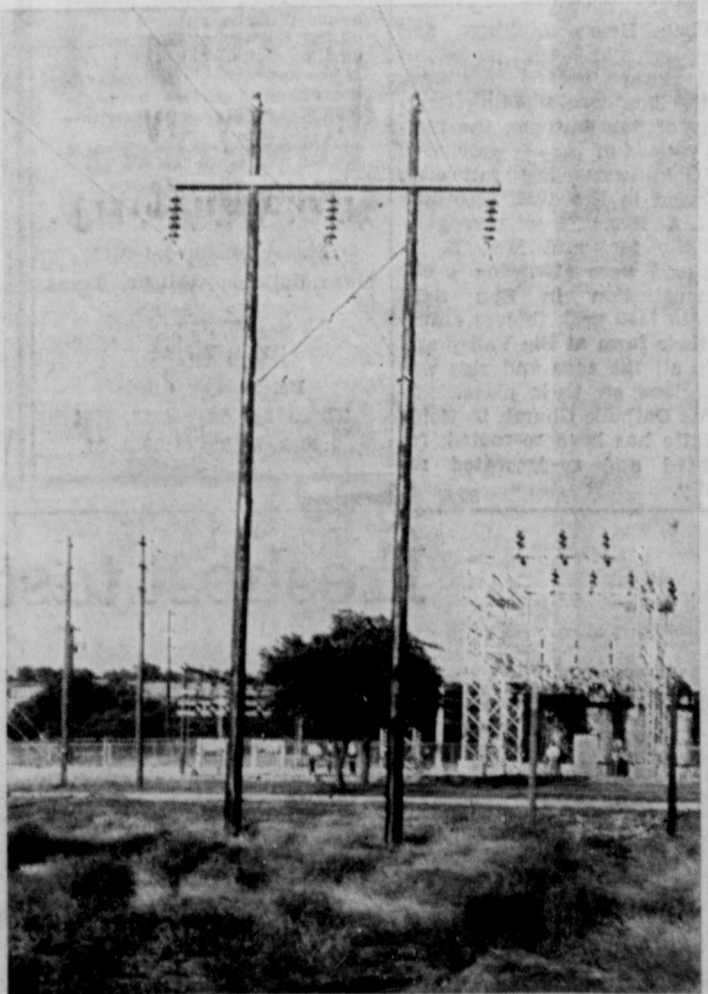
Balance sheet of the firm reflects assets in the neighborhood of \$75,000,000. Present day replacement cost would probably be about twice that amount.

Employees of the firm number from 575 to 600 depending upon the work in progress.

During construction period of this project the City of Goldthwaite built a heavy added circuit from the substation to town. This provides the electric distribution system of the city five times the capacity of the old line. Both the old and new lines into town are now being used by the city.

According to reports they didn't seem to cover the entire town either. Some sections reported very few while others were literally covered.

While some of them remained, it appeared that the big wave moved out in a couple of days just about the way they moved in.

SIGN IN THE POSTOFFICE—Goldthwaite got some mention in the Port Arthur News on July 31. It was in regard to a sign in the local p. o.

Mrs. R. G. Kelly of Nederland, Texas, wrote the editor a note saying: "The Port Arthur News had an amusing little item in the Editor's Column on July 31, about our hometown. I am attaching the article and hope you enjoy it."

The clipping shows that in the "Supper Table Talk," column by John Ayres he commented as follows: "A touring Port Arthurian, Louis Abraham, saw this sign in the p. o. at Goldthwaite (the Texas town that sounds like it was named by somebody who lisped): 'THERE IS NO LIMIT TO THE GOOD A MAN CAN DO IF HE DOESN'T CARE WHO GETS THE CREDIT.'"

For Mr. Ayres's information, I believe that history has it that Goldthwaite was named after some distinguished official of the Santa Fe Railroad, who happened to be an Englishman.

I'll agree, though, it looks like they could have picked some official with a name that would have created a little less confusion among out-of-towners through the years.

MORE HOUSES ARE NEEDED—Judging from the inquiries received at the Eagle office and reports of business firms in the city, one would come to the conclusion that there is definite need for housing in Goldthwaite.

It seems that there is a real need at this time for some rental units, both apartments and houses.

There have been several cases in recent weeks and months where people were looking for places to rent with the specific idea of locating here, but were unable to find a place to move to, and had to go elsewhere.

It is true more new houses are being built right along. This provides more units in the community and helps toward the end of providing additional rental units for others. But, it seems that they are being taken up as fast as they are available and there continues to be a demand and need for more.

Just as an example, here is one inquiry received a few days ago at the Eagle office. Mrs. B. G. Hanlon, Box 233, Lancaster, Texas, wrote as follows: "Enclosed is a quarter, please mail me your latest copy of your paper. What is the population of Goldthwaite and do you have any nice rent houses available? We used to visit there quite often and it's a beautiful site all around."

Goldthwaite with a population of 1,383, (official census figures) appears much larger than the nose count would indicate. When you consider the fringe area which is really a part of the city, although not in the census nose count for city limits, it is considerably larger.

Again we would like to point out from this corner, there seems to be a genuine need for some additional rental units in the city, both in apartments and houses. If they could be provided we would have more people here as time goes on and the nose count would increase.

A telephone message was received this Thursday morning announcing that a young man by the name of Jim Lindley, whose home was at De Leon, had been drowned in the San Saba river near Richland Springs late Wednesday evening.

Thursday morning, August 8, Mr. Jul Kauhs, whose farm is located a few miles south of Goldthwaite, brought in the first bale of this season's cotton to the market. The cotton was classed as good middling, and the bale weighed 494 pounds. J. J. Mills bought it at 8½ cents per pound, which amounted to \$42 for the bale.

While the first bale was being weighed Mr. G. H. Harrell of the Rock Springs community, drove in with the second bale. It was bought by Gatlin at 7½ cents per pound and weighed 445 pounds.

W. B. Jackson and his two sons visited the Antelope Gap community Wednesday and Thursday.

Dr. Sharp was carried to Brownwood Monday night to be treated by Drs. Anderson and Allison. He appeared to be in a dangerous condition and his friends were very uneasy about him, but reports each day have been favorable and it is now hoped and believed that he is on the road to recovery.

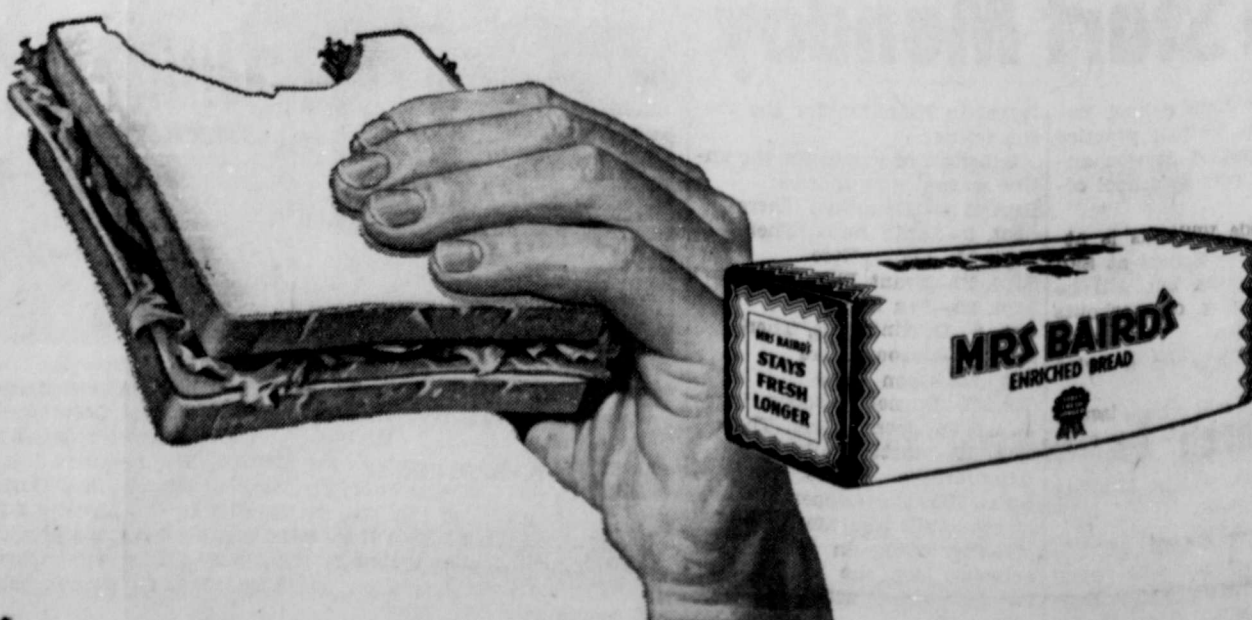

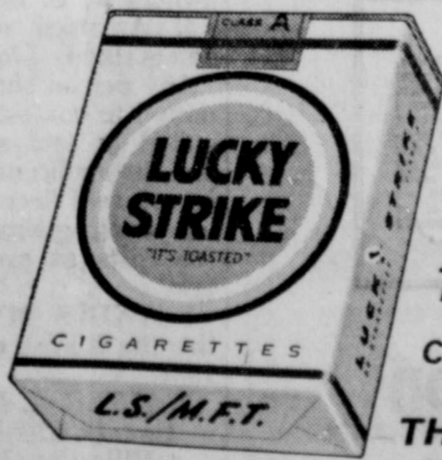

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Amid the and fury of the tax battle in the Legislature, Texans to the idea of far-reaching taxes—could be heard trying to get to the bottom of things by calculating their effects upon such things as baby's clothes, handbags, canes, unattached buttons, ornamental buttons of any type, bathing suits, sleeping garments, bath-linens, negligees and pajamas.

Historic Document On Water Problem — "If Texans cannot change the weather, they can at least, through sound, far-sighted planning, conserve and develop water resources to supply their needs."

So said the State Board of Water Engineers as it turned in to Gov. Price Daniel the state's first comprehensive, projected plan for meeting the industrial, municipal and other water needs in 1980.

Governor Daniel termed the 200-page document, which envisions the construction of 45 new reservoirs over the state, "one of the great things in the life of our state."

The board made the observation that the people of Texas have not yet been "aroused to the dire consequences of inaction or to the consequences of building projects which at best provide for only small increases in water needs . . . in relation to long term future needs in many areas, water is the least abundant of Texas' important natural resources; certainly it is the most indispensable."

The board said that through proper development, Texas has adequate water to meet its municipal and industrial needs in 1980 and sustain agriculture and other uses. A significant statement in the report was to the effect that such a program as outlined "appears to be within the financial capability of the state and local interests, with federal participation in projects containing flood control."

In short, the so-called "Master Plan" for development of the state's water resources is at least an outline of what can be done, and might be done, to meet one of the state's most crucial problems.

Attack On "Softness" Launched — Physical education teachers from over the state at a meeting in Austin have come up with a plan to turn talk into action and do something about physical fitness in the schools. The plan includes 15 minutes of strenuous body exercise in physical education periods; teaching the right way to walk, sit, climb, pull, push and all, the other ways the body obeys the laws of physics; teaching games and sports people can use throughout their life including tennis, golf and swimming and other popular sports; teaching the history of games; fitting activities such as folk dancing into social studies; emphasizing sportsmanship as part of social behavior; accomplishing social control through release of tension in athletics; and promoting a favorable attitude toward physical activity both as children and as adults.

Governor For A Day — One of the nicer traditions in Texas politics is that which permits the man who is third in line to the Governorship officially to take over the reins of state government for a day.

By custom, the Governor and Lieutenant Governor absent themselves from the state for a 24-hour period so that the Senator who has been elected by his colleagues as President Pro Tempore of the Senate can step into the Governor's chair. The honor went to easy-going, well-liked Senator Preston Smith of Lubbock last week. Motion made by Harper, seconded by Watson to accept proposed school calendar (Copy Attached) with school to open actually on Aug. 31, 1961 and to close May 25, 1962. The motion carried unanimously.

Motion was made by Harper, seconded by Rudd and voted unanimously to buy milk and our other dairy products from Pure Milk of Waco as stipulated in proposal filed. 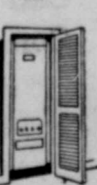

Good Dove Season Will Depend On Weather Conditions And Weeds

With fewer than 30 days until the opening of the mourning dove season in the North Zone, September 1, there is still a great deal of speculation as to how plentiful this year's crop will be. According to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, some hot, dry weather is needed to ripen feed seed, and darken considerably the green effect of the present abundance of foliage.

In parts of West Texas where there hasn't been too much rain, weed seeds are now ripening, according to information received in Austin. In these

cases, the doves seem to be plentiful at the present time. However, the abundance of rain in Central Texas has vegetation very lush, and weed seeds are not yet ripening. Since water holes have been filled completely, this will tend to scatter late evening dove shooting around the water holes.

So, according to the executive secretary, it is anybody's guess as to how good the dove season will be. On the other hand, the quail crop right now looks to be in top condition. There are still a few nesting birds, but for the most part there have been heavy hatches in practically every part of the state. As a result, a big crop of birds is expected in areas where there were practically no birds last year.

Under the general laws, the quail season will open December 1. The Game Commission will set the quail season in regulatory counties at its quarterly meeting early in October.

River Authority at a delivery point in Lometa, Texas delivered at 12,470 volts. Included in construction of the system was approximately 19 miles of line to the delivery point in Lometa. The original cost of this venture was \$82,500.00, of which \$28,000.00 was the 19 miles of line.

"By 1945 the City had most of the customers of the community connected to their lines, thereby enabling them to purchase the remaining facilities of Community Public Service Company, at a very favorable figure of \$21,250.00, thus bringing the City's investment to \$103,750.00. All of the indebtedness has been paid and the City operates almost wholly on a cash basis.

"The cut over was made and the City was well established in the Electric business, showing a profit each year and saving their customers a considerable amount in lower rates.

"It became apparent that the 12,000 volt line from Lometa, built by the City, was going to be inadequate in capacity to serve the growing demand for electric service in the future.

The Lower Colorado River Authority was contacted regarding a higher voltage line and a deal was finally worked out whereby the Authority became owner of the approximately 19 miles of 12,000 volt line, Lometa to Goldthwaite, and a new purchase contract was entered into in 1949 whereby the Authority agreed to serve the City at the now existing location about one mile south of the city limits. The load and demand on the system increased as foreseen and numerous improvements to the line and sub-station facility were made, over a period of the next ten years.

"In 1958 the Authority started with preliminary work, which finally resulted in building a 69,000 volt line from a point near San Saba to Goldthwaite and building a sub-station structure, both modern and adequate, for present and future needs of the City for years to come. We now have about ten times the original capacity.

"If these things had not happened the City would be in about the same position on Electricity as we now are for Water—plenty of Water eight miles away—plenty of Electricity, but nineteen miles away.

"The City is enjoying prosperity from a power standpoint and with the earnings has been able to use over \$50,000.00 in cash and other benefits for
