Changes In Your Social Security

There was one recent change in the social security law that, while minor, directly or indirectly affects everyone under age 72 receiving old-age or survivors insurance benefits. This was a change in the so-called "retirement test."

Under the old law, a person could earn \$1,200 and receive all of his monthly social security benefits, \$1 in benefits was withheld, however, for each \$2 he earned from \$1,200 to \$1,500, and \$1 for each \$1 earned over \$1,500. Under the new law, only \$1 is withheld for each \$2 earned from \$1,200 to \$1,700, with an additional dollar withheld for each dollar earned over \$1,700.

This means that under the new law a person eligible for social security benefits may earn up to \$1,700 and receive more in total earnings and benefits than under the old law. Of course, for each \$1 earned over \$1,700, \$1 is withheld in benefits.

An important part of this change, too, is that it applies to earnings for this year. People who are receiving benefits and earning \$1,200 or more may get more information about this by writing or visiting the Temple Social Security Office, at 909 First National Building.

There is no change in the provision that, regardless of how much a beneficiary earns in a year, he will get a benefit check for any month in which he is over age 72, or in which he neither earns more than \$100 in wages nor performs substantial services in self-employment.

O. C. Fisher Writes From Washington

Fidel Castro's Communist regime in Cuba has aroused a widespread demand that the United States have a showdown with the Red dictator. Perhaps never in history has a Nation tolerated so many insults and restrained itself in the face of so many provocations. Aside from becoming a military base for the Soviet Union only a hundred miles from our shores, Castro's Cuba has become a haven for pirates and thugs wanted for major crimes in the United States.

Brzen confiscation of American-owned property without any semblance of compensation is in itself intolerable. And the holding without any legal right of a commercial plane stolen at the point of a pistol by a Castro agent adds insult to injury.

It is time for action. The hour is growing late. The security of this Nation and of the Western Hemisphere is being seriously

jeopardized every day that action is delayed. Can we afford to stand idly by and permit Cuba to become a Soviet missile and submarine base?

A total economic embargo should have been imposed long ago. There is ample justification for a military blockade, following an ultimatum calling for return of the plane and the hijackers. The time is overdue when the Castro regime should be treated for what they actually are—a band of murderers, thieves, swindlers, and Russian puppets.

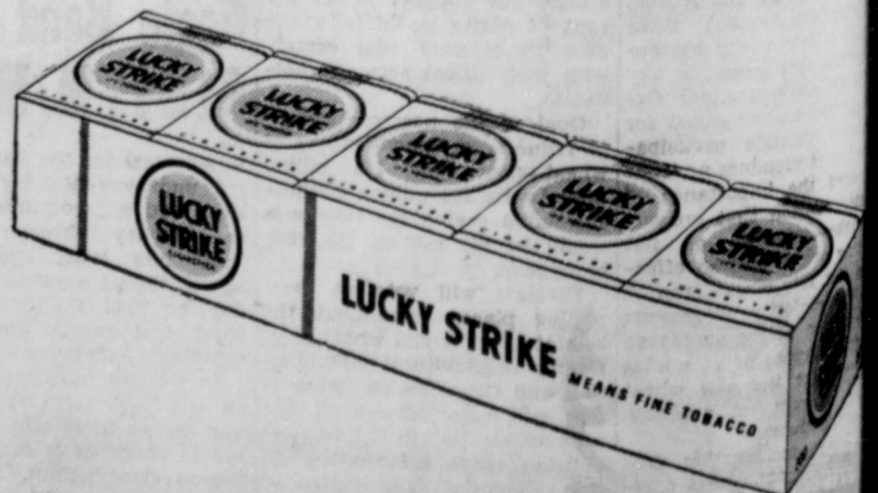

Buffalo Clover Festival

Buffalo Clover is what the old settlers called it. Now it's known as the state flower of Texas.

Most likely you prefer the modern name of this beautiful lupine plant for it does look more like what it is now called—the bluebonnet.

You haven't seen much of Texas either if you haven't seen the fields of sky-blue bluebonnets.

Every April the town of Marlin in Central Texas (Falls County) holds a "Bluebonnet Festival." Beautiful models are provided to pose for the amateur photographers who travel from all over the nation to see the festival and to compete in the annual photo contest.

Side-Wheelers At Jefferson

Old side-wheeler boats used to churn up from New Orleans to Jefferson, Texas, in the northeast part of the state.

In 1874 a natural barrier in the Red River was removed. This resulted in a lowering of the water level seven feet in Cypress Bayou, thus making it un navigable for boat transportation.

This ended Jefferson's standing as the principal river port and gate-of-entry to Texas.

Richmond Honors Fighting Secretary

An impressive statue of Mirabeau Buonaparte Lamar, valiant military hero and acclaimed Father of Education in Texas, stands in Richmond, Texas, southwest of Houston.

Lamar served as Secretary of War and was the commander of the cavalry at the Battle of San Jacinto.

He was well known for his service both as President and Vice-President of the Republic of Texas and was instrumental in securing a public endowment for Texas schools.

Weatherford Walls Bullet Scarred

A double log cabin stands at Holland's Lake just a few miles east of Weatherford, Texas, west of Fort Worth.

Its east room is where George McCleskey was killed by Indians in 1873. This room still contains its bullet-scarred walls.

The cabin was a popular spot for old settlers reunions. Now it is a monument to the pioneers of Parker County.

Nacogdoches

Was Battleground

You could write a book about the battles that were fought for Nacogdoches. Also one about the armies and expeditions that captured this East Texas town.

Two expeditions bent on freeing this land from the Spanish were those of Magee-Gutierrez and Dr. James Long. Both were ill-fated excursions.

As a reminder of this stormy history, one of the oldest of the many historic homes still in Nacogdoches today is that of Adolphus Sterne, the Alcalde at the city when it was under Spanish rule.

Sam Houston once lived in this same house.

Only Alto Site Remains

Texas expelled the Neches Indians from the site in 1839.

The site of one of their old villages is just five miles southwest of Alto, in Cherokee County, in the central portion of East Texas, near Rusk.

This village was active in the lives of the Neches at the beginning of the 18th Century.

The Neches River was named for these Indians, as was a nearby mission established by the Cherokee Indians, the Mission San Francisco de los Neches.

Hot Brings Cold

Hot water heaters are used to cool water in Smiley, Texas.

Sounds outlandish to say the least, doesn't it?

This happy sounding town in Gonzales County, in the central part of South Texas, has a powerful artesian well that pours forth its own hot water.

The town of Smiley pipes this hot water right into the homes. These fortunate Texans have all the hot water they need. But the residents use hot water tanks, not connected for heating purposes, to store the water long enough for it to cool for drinking purposes.

So, when in Smiley, remember to turn on the hot water faucet for a cold shower.

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, TEXAS—Texas has crossed the great divide of controversy and entered the field of general sales taxation.

To the central collection point for the operation of the state's business, this means some \$320,000,000 in the next two-year period.

To the individual taxpayer, the cost is unknown, but educated guesses already are being made.

James McGrew, research director for the Texas Research League, has estimated it will cost the average Texas family \$25 to \$30 a year, "maybe less if they don't buy any furniture or home appliances."

With some exceptions, the general sales tax will be two per cent on purchases of 25c or more.

Passage of the tax bill and the attending publicity caused many a man—and woman—on the street to suddenly realize that there already was a state sales tax on such things as cosmetics and appliances.

Actually, the sales tax bill was only part of the tax package handed down by the lawmakers. In addition to the \$320,000,000 estimated to come from this source, they passed a corporate franchise tax worth \$20,500,000. They increased drivers' license fees by \$7,250,000. They made a bookkeeping transfer of motor fuel tax funds totaling \$4,000,000. They also taxed dedicated gas reserves \$3,330,000. And they passed a bill designed to bring in some \$3,000,000 from abandoned property.

In addition, the Legislature had passed a tax on private clubs, calculated to raise some \$4,000,000.

Roughly, it is figured that all these things will cover the state's needs for the next two-year period, and provide for a school teachers' pay raise of \$810 per year.

ESCHEAT BILL OMITTS BANKS
Gov. Price Daniel won a partial victory in his long fight to tighten the state's escheat law. It's the law under which abandoned cash and property held by private business and industry is supposed to revert to the state.

After several attempts the Legislature passed a bill requiring institutions holding such property to report it to the state. Banks, however, were ex-

empt from the provisions of the bill, much to the dismay of Governor Daniel.

"With everyone else covered," he said, "the banks cannot hold out much longer. The enforcement procedures should include banks and I shall continue to fight for this, both as a principle and as a means for the state to obtain property it already owns under the present escheat law."

PROBLEM AT GATESVILLE
Recent breaks at the Gatesville School for Boys, and the death of an attendant beaten with a baseball bat, have focused attention on that institution which is without walls or barricades of any kind.

A delegation of attendants came to Austin, talked with Governor Daniel and complained that measures which they are allowed to take are too indefinite. They said no attendant is allowed to "discipline" inmates of the school. Sometimes the boys will mind and sometimes they will not.

Dr. James A. (Jack) Turman, Executive Director of the Texas Youth Council, told the men that changes were being made which would help. A maximum security unit is being built, a trade school is under contract, and a double maximum security fence is in the works for the worst offenders.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL SWAMPED
The Texas Legislative Council has been requested by the Legislature to look into a host of things which may require new laws.

One request asks a study of the adequacy of the present cattle brand inspection laws. It was pointed out that Texas, unlike many other western states, has no state-wide brand registration system, relying on county by county registration which permits duplication of brands.

TLC also has been asked to look into the problem of job discrimination because of age; problems of urban mass transportation; and the feasibility of using state parks as evacuation centers in the event of enemy attack.

HOUSE STREAMLINES
The House of Representatives has voted to do away with more than a third of its committees in order to streamline its oper-

ations. House's 43 committees will be reduced in the 1963 session to 25 by combining several groups. Seniority would determine the membership of one fourth of each committee.

TEXAS BUSINESS GOOD
Business activity in Texas dropped three per cent in June, from an all-time high in May, reports the UT Bureau of Business Research. But it still was seven per cent above the level of one year ago.

June activity also was the second highest for any month since the bureau began computing in 1953.

Prospects are fine for good business conditions to extend well into 1962. This partially as a result of the expanded arms program, resulting from the Berlin situation.

However, the agency said there is a possibility of inflation plaguing the economy again.

TEACHERS HONOR NEWSPAPERS
Ten Texas newspapers were honored for public service by The Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association at a meeting in Austin.

Awards went to the Marshall News-Messenger, the Bovina Blade, The Midland Reporter-Telegram, the Colorado County Citizen at Columbus, the Clay County Leader at Henrietta, the Weatherford Daily Herald, the Fredericksburg Standard, the Clifton Record, the Dayton News and the Raymondville Chronicle.

STATE GUARD STRENGTH REPORTED
With the possibility of calling up the National Guard for active duty, Adjutant General James E. Taylor has been furnished a report on the active strength of the Texas State Guard—1,504 officers and enlisted men in active reserve units, and 218 officers in the ready reserves unassigned.

Corps has a total authorized strength of 10,000, when mobilized to full table organization. All officers and men in this service serve without compensation and provide their own uniforms.

The State Guard is subject to being called by the Governor for internal security service.

COLLEGIANS URGED TO STAY WITH IT
Col. Morris Schwartz, State Director of Selective Service, has advised college students to stay with their studies and not be disturbed by increased draft calls.

He predicted no change in the present policy of not drafting anyone under the age of 22, "at least in the foreseeable future," and said college students will be considered for scholastic deferment and likely will be deferred if they are full-time students making passing

Women Scientists Vivaly Needed, March of Dimes Grantee Warns

Increasing numbers of young women must be encouraged to become medical research scientists. They are needed to make up the loss of men researchers who more and more are turning to electronics and other technical fields unrelated to the nation's health.

This is the view of Dr. Virginia Tennyson, a medical scientist herself, who sees the day near when there will be an acute and dangerous shortage of science laboratory talent unless hundreds of girls—now in high school or entering college—can be won over to science as a career.

Dr. Tennyson is an anatomist and electronmicroscopist at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York City. Under a National Foundation-March of Dimes grant, she is working today to determine what causes excess fluid in the brain of infants, one of the major birth defects (hydrocephalus) with which thousands of babies are born every year in the United States.

This dread disease leads to gross enlargement of the head, wasting away of the brain, loss of mental powers—often death. Dr. Tennyson has suggested that there is an advantage in having women in some laboratory studies.

"I think it fair to say that in some fields of scientific inquiry, women are better equipped by nature than are men. For instance, few will argue that women aren't more intuitive. In the laboratory, they are more inclined to respect a hunch, which is just another word for disciplined imagination and deduction. We women 'hunch' because we are determined to get a realistic answer.

"Then I also think," she said, "that women workers in science are inclined to be more patient than men researchers. Perhaps that's because women are more likely to persevere, less prone to give up because of boredom and tedium."

Dr. Tennyson mentioned that the National Foundation offers

today post-doctoral fellowships to promising young individuals preparing for careers in science. In addition to offering aid to prospective research scientists, The National Foundation is taking steps to interest young persons in entering the allied health professions. Under this program, the health organization has awarded almost 1,300 scholarships (each worth \$2,000 if maintained for the full period of four years) in the fields of medicine, nursing, physical and occupational therapy, and medical social work.

The National Foundation offers 515 of these health scholarships each year to students in every state in the nation.

Since Dr. Tennyson is dedicated to the serious task of determining the "why" of hydrocephalus, a person might conceive of her as a granite-faced zealot, oblivious to all save laboratory test tubes, reports and microscopes.

Instead, this slim, auburn-haired and blue-eyed scientist looks like nothing so much as a professional model or dancer, and one endowed with humor. Her chief interests and training all relate to medical science, but when the occasion arises she can whip up the most epicurean crepes suzette one

would ever hope to taste. She is also a talented amateur artist.

Young women on the threshold of a science career, Dr. Tennyson advises, should realize that in some laboratories exceptional demands are made of them in ability and natural scientific talent. Inevitably, they represent competition with their male colleagues. She puts it this way:

"If a young woman enters a science career with a 'feminist' chip on her shoulder—with the attitude of demanding her rights—she will doubtless arouse hostility, and so will meet with hostility. But I have found that most professional people will accord you more than your 'rights' if you have ability. If you do have it, it will be recognized. Appreciation of it shouldn't be forced down your colleagues' throats."

For all her preoccupation with birth defects research, a field The National Foundation entered in 1958, Dr. Tennyson says she tries to lead a life of "dynamic equilibrium, the rule we find in all nature. 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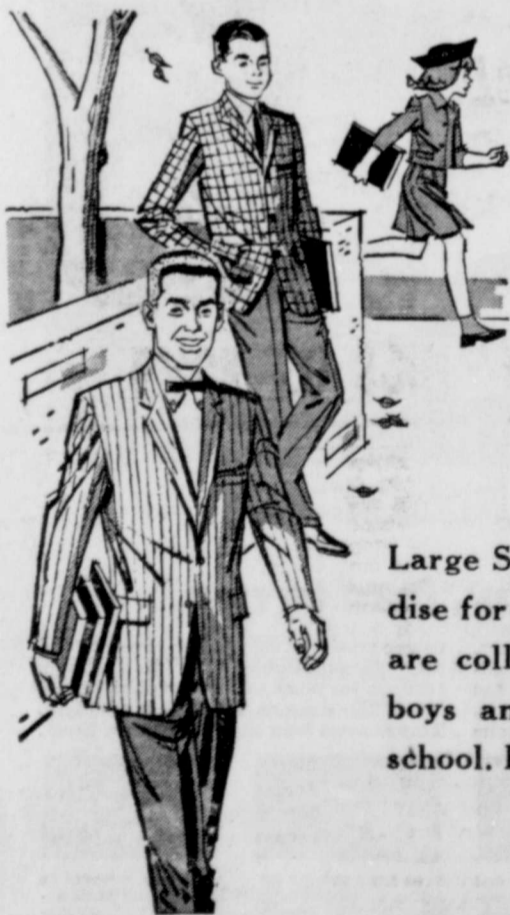

DELICIOUS — Souffle Magic Cheese Potatoe Souffle

4 Servings Instant Mashed Potatoes, prepared as directed on package
4 Eggs, separated
2 Cups shredded sharp Cheddar Cheese
1 teaspoon Worcestershire Sauce
1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

—If you like it.
Mushroom Sauce (Recipe below)

To prepared potatoes blend in egg yolks, then cheese, Worcestershire sauce and pepper. Beat egg whites until stiff peaks are formed. Fold into potato mixture. Turn into greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. To make high-hat, cut through mixture with spatula to make a circle 1 inch from edge of casserole. Bake at 350° for 40 to 50 minutes, or until deep golden brown. Serve immediately with Mushroom Sauce. Yield: 4 to 6 portions.
Mushroom Sauce: Combine and heat together 1 can (10 1/2-oz.) condensed cream of mushroom soup, 1/3 cup milk and 2 T. lemon juice.

Home Economics Briefs

Use frozen bread when you must make sandwiches several hours ahead of time, suggest extension foods and nutrition specialists of the A&M College of Texas. It is easier to spread than fresh bread. The chill from the frozen slices will keep the filling fresh. Even lettuce keeps fresh for several hours. When slices thaw, they have the characteristics of fresh bread.

outward on all windows and doors. Use of spray—both space and surface types—in and around the house, and the new bait preparations outside when flies gather, such as around the garbage can.

Use recommended methods to freeze and cook frozen foods. Get a copy of the extension bulletin, "Frozen Foods" from your local home demonstration agent. It gives directions for preparing, packaging and freezing fruits, vegetables and prepared foods, such as cakes, pies, breads and combination dishes.
