Local Markets

The sheep sale at the Mills County Commission Company on Friday showed a total of 1,800 head selling. The goat sale showed a slight decrease from the week before with 2,500 head passing through the auction ring.

SHEEP
Fat milk lambs, 12c to 13½c; yearling lambs, 7c to 12c; yearling ewes, per head, \$7 to \$10; 4c to 4½c; yearling ewes, 6c to 10c; aged wethers, 5c to 8c.

GOATS
Good mutton goats, \$6 to \$8; weighing kind, 5c to 6c; good nannies, \$5 to \$8; cull nannies, 4c to 6c; kids, \$5 to \$6 per head.

August Rainfall Only .12 Inch

Goldthwaite received only .12 inch of rain during the month of August, according to official record kept by weather observer Jerry Allen.

Total for the eight month period, January through August, is 23.33 inches.

On Monday, September 4, Labor Day, .08 inch of rain was recorded here.

SEPTEMBER 1ST HOTTEST DAY
Mr. Allen reports that last Monday, September 1, was the hottest day of this year with temperature reading of 100 degrees.

Barley Program Details Announced

More details on the 1962 winter barley feed grain program were announced Wednesday by E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The Chairman explained that producers diverting a part of their acreage will receive payments for the diversion and they also will qualify for price support.

A barley producer can forego the diversion payments and qualify for price support if he elects to devote the diverted acreage to one or more of these crops: Castor beans, sorghum, sunflower, or pecan. Adjustment in the diversion payment can be made if only a part of the diverted acreage is so used. Special program provisions enable growers to plant acceptable varieties of malting barley to qualify for price support without participating in the barley feed grain program.

Payments will be made to those barley growers who devote the diverted acreage to an approved conservation crop. Such growers must also maintain an acreage in soil-conserving crops or practices, including summer fallow and cropland, equal to their 1959-60 average acreage in such crops.

According to the Chairman, only those barley producers who participate in the program will be eligible for price support.

County ASCS Committee To Be Elected

In a statement released today, E. L. Burkett, Chairman of Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, named some of the requirements necessary for a person to be eligible for election to the county committee.

The committee will be elected by farmer-chosen delegates to a county convention to be held on Sept. 25, 1961 at the ASCS Office.

A candidate for the county ASCS committee must be eligible to vote in the county, must be a resident of the county, and, generally, must not have been actively engaged in politics, such as serving as a member of a political committee or doing political ward work. Also he must not be a full-time employee of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Chairman Burkett added that there were other restrictions and requirements concerning a candidate for the county committee post, but that these were the important ones.

He also noted that the date of the election is September 25, and urged all ASCS farmer-delegates to the county convention to be sure to attend. Further information is available at the County ASCS Office.

Lions Club Donates \$100 To Park Improvement Fund

The Garden Club voted at their Tuesday night meeting to contribute \$100 to the Mills County Park Improvement fund. The money is to be added to that pledged by the Garden Club and is to be used by the Garden Club Park Committee and the Park Board where it is needed most in the way of improvements.

According to announcement last week the Garden Club has earmarked \$550, which the club won last year from the Sears Foundation, for park improvements. The prize money was won on the club's park improvement project.

This makes \$650 available for park improvements.

The Garden Club has pledged an additional \$550 to match the prize money won from the Foundation. This is to be raised through various activities that

are in the planning stages.

ENTRANCE PLANNED
Plans are being prepared for an attractive entrance to the park. It will be on the East side, north of the American Legion Hall, on the Lometa Highway.

Overall landscaping plans call for several additional tables and benches to be constructed. These are to be of brick and concrete and will be permanent structures.

Mrs. W. P. Duren, chairman of the Garden Club park committee, announced Tuesday that the club has received construction bids for these brick and concrete tables with benches.

They will cost \$85 in a single unit or \$80 each in a group of six.

The Garden Club will start work on building a picnic table with benches in the next few days for the park. It will be located near the Lometa highway. Mrs. Duren announced Wednesday morning.

Interested civic groups, clubs or individuals are invited to get behind this project. The units may be sponsored by a club or group paying for one, or several may join to sponsor one.

The park maintenance fund is still short \$430 to complete this year's work, according to W. P. Duren, park board chairman. The maintenance fund is supported by a sustaining \$12 per year membership by interested individuals and business firms. It requires \$1200 a year to provide up-keep and maintenance on a year around basis.

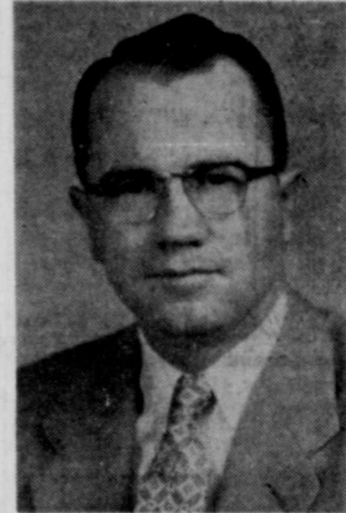

The headache may last a long time.

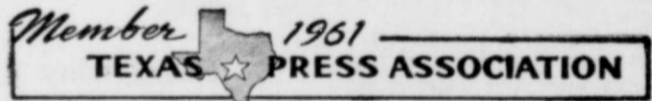
GIFT FROM A PRO—Trippi Mayfield got a gift from a pro, while he was visiting here a few days back.

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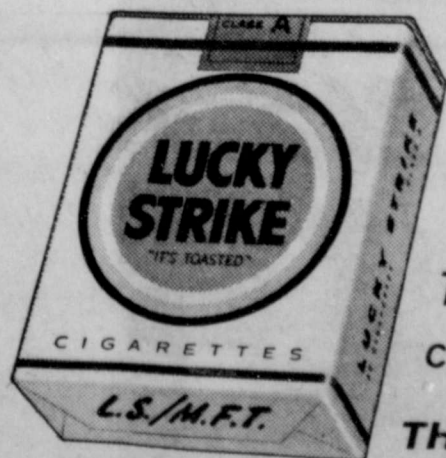

HOUSE OF CARPETS

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

Austin, Texas - Gov. Price Daniel, pointing to the record of most other states that have a general sales tax, warns Texans that without concerted efforts to shave state spending the Texas tax could grow to three or four per cent in the future.

More than that, he said, unless there is "prudent economy and reorganization" of state funds and services, a state income tax might become law.

To make his point, Governor Daniel reported that two-thirds of the 34 states that have general sales taxes have increased the rate to three per cent or more, and there are now four states charging a four per cent sales tax.

He again made clear his dislike for the two per cent Texas tax, but added:

"So much for the good and bad which will result from the new tax bill. On September 1 it will be the law of our state, and as long as the law is in effect, it behooves all of us, whether we like it or not, to cooperate in its enforcement. This I shall do, and I believe every good citizen will do likewise."

Meanwhile State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert is being swamped with questions about the new tax. After checking with other states which have pioneered in this field, he has become reconciled to the likelihood that confusion will reign for some time to come. A spokesman for his office pointed out that "California and Illinois got a sales tax in 1933, and they're still issuing rulings."

The Texas Research League has noted that the tax bill exempts sales of animals ordinarily eaten by humans. Also food for such animals. Exempt too are seeds and plants edible by humans and raised for sale, fungicides and insecticides used on such plants, and fertilizer used on lands where such food is grown.

But the researchers say this exemption would not apply to tropical fish, grass seed and fertilizer for lawns and rose bushes.

MORE WORK FOR NEXT SESSION

Governor Daniel has found several more items to be submitted to the next special session of the Legislature. He plans to call lawmakers back to Austin again before the end of the year.

Daniel's expanding package now includes maintenance funds for farm roads, loan shark control, municipal annexation, tourist attraction, lobbyist controls, adding banks to the abandoned property seizure law, improved law enforcement measures, and action on juvenile crime.

"As long as Texas continues to grow," he said, "there will be more problems to solve, but there are some which should not be delayed. It will be my aim to meet the most urgent of these later this year or in January of next year."

Governor Daniel vetoed the second year appropriation of \$15,000,000 for construction of new farm-to-market roads, in an effort to free these funds for maintenance. The \$15,000,000 for this purpose for the first year of the new biennium was not affected.

A law passed in 1949 provides for the use of this yearly amount for new construction. But the Governor insists, "It is just as important to maintain our vast and important 33,000-mile farm road system as it is to build new roads. Maintenance costs, now amounting to \$19,000,000 annually, are taken from the basic intrastate highway fund which is the poorest of all department programs."

BLUE LAW CONFUSION

Under the new Texas "Blue Law," shopping for certain items on Saturday or Sunday may prove a chore.

The law that started out as a device to hit the discount houses operating on Sunday was changed to include Saturday as an alternate because the lawmakers felt a straight

Sunday closing law might appear discriminatory to some religious groups who observe the Sabbath on other days.

Included in the list of items merchants are not allowed to sell on one of the two weekend days are lawn mowers, toys, motor vehicles, clothing, furniture, kitchen utensils, air conditioners, home appliances, jewelry, cameras, radios and television sets.

The law has teeth—a fine of \$100 is provided for the first conviction, going up to \$500 and six months in jail for subsequent convictions.

SELLING TEXAS IS BIG JOB

The State Industrial Commission, given \$100,000 by the Legislature and charged with the duty of selling Texas as the place for industries to locate, faces a challenge.

Chairman E. B. Germany told the commission, "It is a challenge to make that \$100,000 do what it is supposed to do even though it is not enough to do what we want to do."

Executive Director Walter Dickerson reported 3,000 copies of a brochure entitled "Texas: A Strategic Location" have been printed. Brochure will be distributed to a "very carefully selected group of people who have responsibility for making decisions," says Dickerson.

He appealed to Texas cities to contribute information for the commission's industrial surveys. Such information would be kept on file for the use of industrialists considering Texas sites. This would make it possible for industries to choose an area without it being known in advance.

ATHLETICS NOT SELF-SUPPORTING

State college and university athletic programs, with few exceptions, are not self-supporting, says State Auditor C. H. Cavness.

He made the statement in connection with a report on the operations of Sul Ross College at Alpine where the athletic program showed a \$26,357 loss for the year. Income was \$56,245, while expenditures amounted to \$80,136.

Cavness noted that athletic scholarships and coaching salaries have been paid from educational and general funds.

HIKED TRAIN FARES ASKED

On September 6 the Texas Railroad Commission will consider the request for increased passenger rail coach fares of

five railway companies operating in Texas.

Companies asking for the hike in fare included Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad Company, Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company, Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railway Company, Missouri - Kansas - Texas Railroad Company, and Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company.

DUCK HUNTING SEASON SET

Ducks will be fair game in Texas beginning at noon on November 18 and ending at sundown December 27, says Howard Dodgen, Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

Bag limit will be three ducks per day and six in possession. There will be no open season on redheads, canvasbacks and black belly tree ducks.

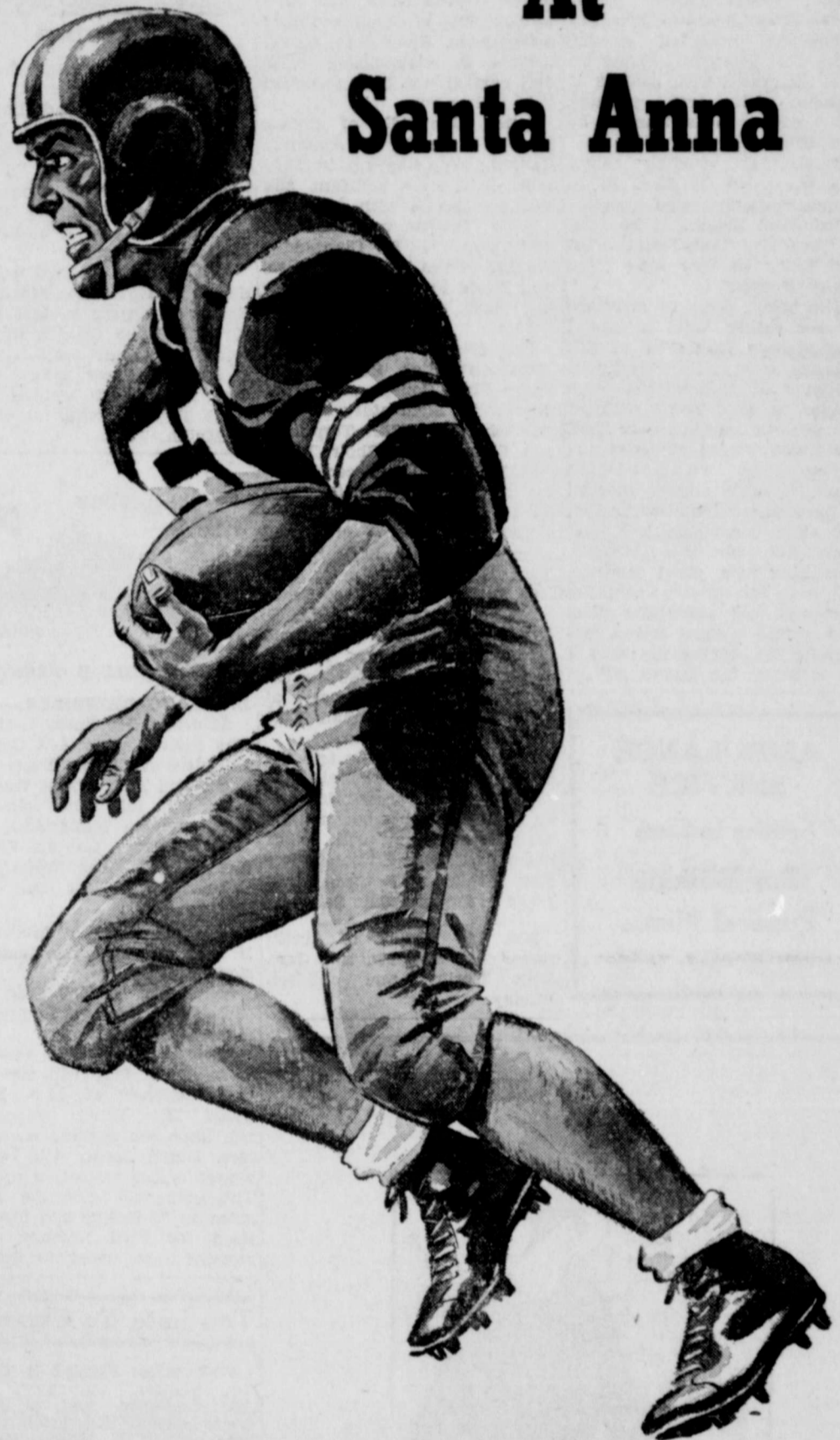
