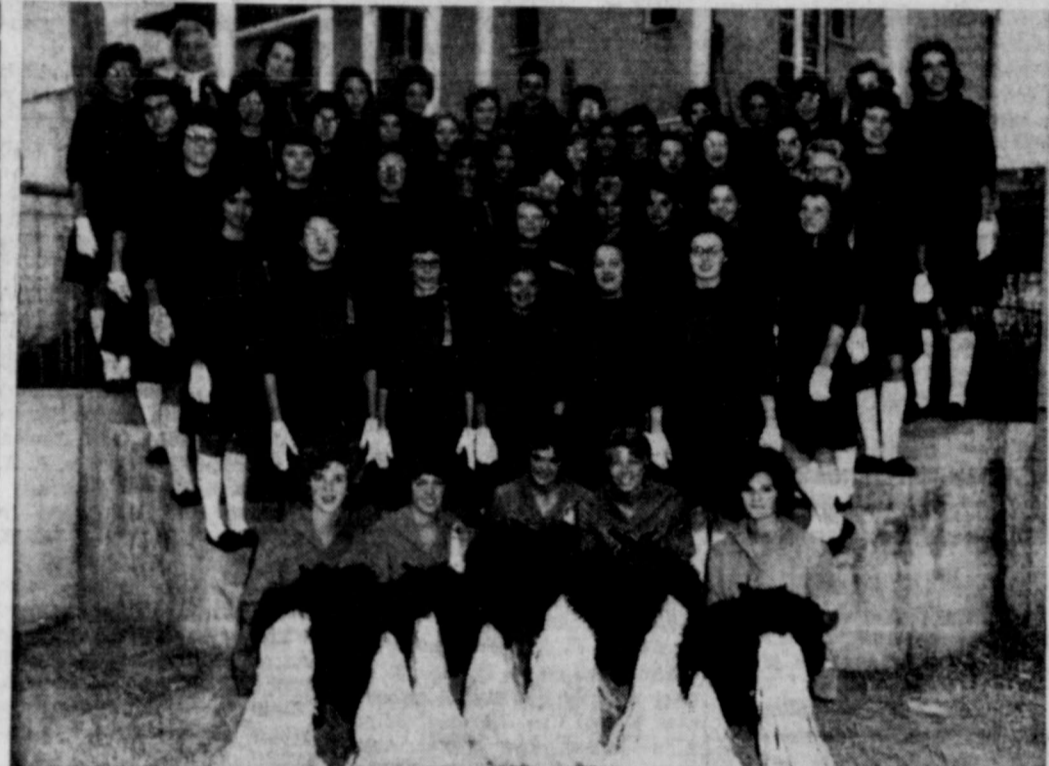

## Wheat Growers Advised On Acreage

Some small wheat producers, who have grown less than 15 acres of wheat in the past 3 years may be subject to marketing quotas—and penalties—under provisions of the wheat stabilization program for 1962, according to E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Under previous programs, farms that had less than 15 acres of wheat, or farms that did not produce more than 200 bushels of wheat annually, were not subject to marketing quotas even though they had allotments of 15 acres or less. The 200-bushel exemption has been repealed, and the 15-acre exemption is no longer applicable under the new program.

For 1962, the marketing quota exemption for those who planted 15 acres of wheat during any one of the 3 years 1959, 1960 or 1961, and whose allotment is

less than 13.5 acres, will be reduced to 13.5 acres. Exemption for growers who planted less than 13.5 acres of wheat will be the highest planted acreage in any one of these 3 years if the 1962 allotment is less than such highest acreage.

In addition to these quota requirements, some small producers may also be subject to marketing quota penalties under certain conditions, Burkett pointed out. For example, farmers who have not grown wheat in any one of the past 3 years and who grow wheat for harvest without an allotment in 1962 will be subject to marketing quota penalties on the entire production.

Another group of producers who will also be subject to wheat marketing quota penalties are those who have grown 13.5 acres or more in one of the 3 years, 1959, 1960 or 1961 and whose 1962 allotments are 13.5 acres or less and who grow for harvest more than 13.5 acres in 1962.

Penalties may also apply to small producers who exceed their 1962 allotment when that allotment is greater than the acreage planted for harvest in any one of the years 1959, 1960 or 1961.

On farms where there is excess wheat acreage, the amount of wheat subject to a marketing

quota penalty will be twice the normal yield of the excess acres multiplied by 65 per cent of the May, 1962, parity price for wheat. Downward adjustment in this determination may be made if the producer furnishes evidence of his actual production. In those cases where a producer exceeds the exemption, the penalty is figured from the allotment rather than the exemption.

Approximately two-thirds of the wheat producers in the United States grow less than 15 acres of wheat, yet these small producers raise about one-sixth of all the wheat grown in this country, Burkett explained. By reducing the wheat marketing quota exemption, these growers now have an opportunity to make a greater contribution in the national effort to bring wheat supplies more nearly in line with demand.

## 4-H Club Calf Tour Slated Here For Saturday Morning

The Mills County annual 4-H Club beef calf tour will be held this Saturday, September 23rd. The tour will start from the courthouse in Goldthwaite at 8:30 a. m., according to announcement by County Agent George Reese.

Calf feeders visited will be: Wanda and Jimmy Soules. They have one Hereford and one Angus steer. James W. and Ella Ruth Clary who are feeding two Angus steers. Rhonda and Lynda Cook who have seven Hereford steers and one Angus steer on feed. Jerry Duren has one Hereford, two Angus and one Short-horn steer in his pen. Charles Cornelius is feeding one Hereford steer.

Brady Wayne and Nelma Jane Duren have two Short-horns, one Hereford and five Angus steers in their pens and Mark Daniel has one Hereford steer on feed. The tour will be ended around 12:30. Comanche County plans to send a group of calf feeders to make the tour with the local group. Everyone is invited to make the calf tour and see the way that the boys and girls are handling their calves. This tour also encourages the club members in their demonstrations.

## City Will Purchase New Motor Grader

The City of Goldthwaite has placed an order for purchase of a new motor grader. City Council voted to purchase the new grader in a special meeting last Thursday night when bids were received from six equipment companies.

The new Caterpillar motor grader is being purchased from Treanor Equipment Company, Abilene, Texas. The 85 hp unit is completely equipped and will be delivered in Goldthwaite at a cost of \$12,115. The delivery price includes trade-in of the city's old AC motor grader which was purchased by the city eight years ago as a used machine.

Special meeting of the Council was called after a committee had investigated the need for a grader to replace the old machine which had served its usefulness.

Yarborough said Wednesday that the need for funds is desperate and that many counties and cities have their drive well underway.

**POSING A PROBLEM**—Retailers employ great numbers of young people who attend school on a full-time basis, and work for limited periods in the afternoons, or evenings, on Saturdays, and during vacation periods.

This employment provides untrained youngsters with a source of income and, additionally, enables them to learn skills and responsibilities that will prove valuable in later life. But the newly-expanded federal Wage-Hour law, which includes retail workers for the first time, poses a serious problem.

A statement by the American Retail Federation puts it this way: "We are convinced that . . . if retailers are required to pay the going minimum rate, most of the job opportunities now available for full-time students will disappear. Retailers cannot be expected to pay the full legal minimum to part-time inexperienced workers. But the type of work now done by these students, in most cases, will not be performed by adult workers. It will either be done by mechanization, changes to self-service, or through other economies. In some cases it will not be done at all, with the resulting loss of student jobs as well as service to the public."

The law is supposed to provide exceptions in situations such as this. Unless it does, in actual practice, the increased unemployment that many feared would result from an extended minimum wage law, will become a reality.

**NORWALK, CONN., HOUR:** "A new law makes it legal for Washington to accept contributions to help pay off the national debt. This gives ex-congressmen who ran it up an opportunity they never expected would come their way."

**A SMALL CARROT**—One of the most important proposals made by the President—and one which, in principle if not in detail, should excite little controversy—is that concerning the stimulation of industrial expansion and the modernization of plants and equipment.

The stimulant proposed is a tax credit, to be applied against the federal income tax. The formula suggested in the Presidential message is a complicated one, and some fear that the average businessman might not be able to fully understand it. So a substitute formula, of a very simple nature is being considered, and this, it is reported, has Administration approval. Under it, Congress would determine the amount of investment credit to be allowed. Say the figure established was 8 per cent. In this case a business could deduct \$8 for every \$100 invested in depreciable assets.

It is hoped this small carrot held before the work horse will encourage business and industry to replace obsolete equipment at a faster rate. This would mean more jobs and better jobs, as well as more and better goods for consumers. Increased business activity, and the increased payrolls and sales, would produce increases in tax revenues to offset the tax credit.

**TAXES ALWAYS INCREASE**—You can say one thing with virtual certainty about taxes—they always increase.

Take the social security tax as an example. The combined employee-employer rate, with each paying half, was 2 per cent on a maximum of \$3,000 a year in earnings when the plan went into effect in 1937. Now the rate is 6 per cent on \$4,800.

This isn't all. The tax is scheduled to reach 9.25 per cent in 1969—without increased benefits. If benefits are increased, the tax will have to be boosted still farther, and applied to higher income levels.

### TIME FOR BREAKFAST—

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Texas — Hurricane Carla had its impact on the State Capitol. But not like it did on the Coast.

Refugees camped on the Capitol grounds the first night of the storm. They were moved

into public buildings as the rains reached Austin. Several giant trees on the Capitol grounds were blown down, and the Board of Control estimated damage of \$5,000 to Capitol grounds and buildings.

State officials were busy, too. Gov. Price Daniel's on-the-scene inspections led to several coastal counties being declared disaster areas. Thus they became eligible for Federal aid.

State Insurance Chairman Thomas Ferguson announced that several hundred insurance adjusters had moved into the coastal area to begin estimating damages to insured properties.

So far no one had any estimate of the total damage Carla did to Texas.

One sure thing is that insurance companies, which have taken in about \$15,000,000 in premiums this year for wind-storm and rain damage in the seacoast territory, will have substantial losses to pay above their income from this source.

### MORE SALES TAX RULINGS

Comptroller Robert S. Calvert is still issuing rulings on how the new state sales tax applies to specific sale situations.

He has changed his mind for the first time. It's on the subject of repairs.

New ruling declares that the repairman is the consumer of the tangible personal property which goes into a repair job, unless he has a contract under which he is to bill the consumer separately for labor and parts or materials. In that case, he can collect the sales tax from the consumer on the materials only. But if the repair contract is for a lump sum price, the re-

pairman must pay the 2% sales tax on the supplies and materials at his cost.

These and other complications of the huge new tax law led to two proposals for changes.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson recommended that it be changed to an across-the-board 2% tax, with no exceptions.

State AFL-CIO Pres. H. S. Brown called for complete repeal of the sales tax, and substitution of an income tax which he said "you pay just once a year, instead of 15 times a day."

### WHAT'S A FARM TRAILER?

The new revision of the law which used to exempt farm trailers from license fees has lots of people in a swivet. The law was revised twice during the spring sessions of the Legislature. Governor Daniel vetoed the first bill by Rep. Grainger McIlhane of Wheeler, so it was passed again in modified form.

It now requires larger farm trailers to have "exemption tags" which cost \$5. It also requires owners of oil-well servicing and drilling equipment to have license plates if they are to be moved over highways.

Oilfield servicing companies brought suit to set aside this interpretation of the law. License plates, based on weight, would be staggering, they claim as they maintain that the legislature did not mean to tax them when it wrote in an exemption for the water well drillers.

Rural legislators report some farmers aren't happy about having to pay \$5 to be exempt.

### CLUB TAX REVENUE HEAVY

Another new act of the Legislature which took effect Sept. 1 levied a tax and license requirements on the "private clubs" where mixed drinks are served.

Texas Liquor Control Board had little idea how many such clubs there are, and how many members they had. In the first two weeks, the license-fee receipts at the Liquor Board came to \$420,000, and returns are still coming in.

This would indicate a private-club membership of about 210,000, since the tax is approximately \$2 per member per year. Clubs operated by veter-

ans organizations and fraternal organizations are exempt from the tax and license requirements.

The new law was pushed by the hotel and restaurant people, who wanted to get the private clubs legalized and out of the no-man's land where they have been operating for several years. Regulations require them to have food available to serve their members and guests in order to be eligible for a license.

### MORE ELECTIONS

Special elections will have to be held in Bexar, Grayson-Cooke, Galveston and Potter Counties to fill House vacancies before Governor Daniel can bring the Legislature back into the special session he plans for it this fall. If he sets the special session for late October or early November, as many think he will, the elections will have to be called soon, to have the new lawmakers ready to go to work when the session opens.

Major item for the special session is the enactment of legislation to license lenders and regulate interest rates.

House passed a bill during the regular session in the spring to set up tight regulation with fairly high interest charges. But the Senate could not agree. So the bill died.

As the law now stands it is illegal to charge more than 10 per cent per year in interest. Courts have wiped out all the various subterfuges by which higher rates were being charged. So lenders, who contend they cannot get by on 10 per cent on small loans, are anxious to be legalized in some fashion.

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### NEW OIL POLICY-MAKER

Lieut. Gov. Ben Ramsey became Railroad Commission Ben Ramsey in ceremonies Monday, and went right to work at the statewide oil proration hearing held Tuesday.

Ramsey leaves behind a record that probably will never be broken—election to six terms as lieutenant governor. Some earlier holders of that office had

won as many as three terms, but there had been few of them.

Ramsey's salary goes up from \$4,800 a year and an apartment in the Capitol to \$17,500 a year, but he will have to pay his own rent.

Senator Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi assumes the duties of lieutenant governor until the special session opens. Then the Senate will choose another senator to preside over its meetings. Choice lies between Senators Culp Krueger of El Campo, Charles Herring of Austin and Henry Gonzales of San Antonio. All three came to the Senate on the same day in 1957.

Senators Preston Smith of Lubbock, Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, Robert Baker of Houston, Wardlow Lane of Center, A. M. Alkin Jr. of Paris, George Parkhouse of Dallas and Speaker James A. Turman of Gober are among the officeholders likely to run for lieutenant governor.

Don Yarborough of Houston, who gave Ramsey his closest race for the office in 1960, is also expected to run.

Maury Maverick Jr. of San Antonio is another potential candidate.

### STATE DOLLARS

The year-end report of Comptroller Calvert gives Texans an idea of how big their state government has become.

During the state fiscal year which ended Aug. 31, the state government took in \$1,210,107,355 and spent \$1,192,569,099. Of the spending, \$370,000,000 went for highways, \$468,000,000 for education, and \$188,000,000 for public welfare.

Those three big items total \$1,000,000,000, leaving less than \$200,000,000 for all other activities of state government, including the executive department, the courts, the legislature, safety, health, state mental hospitals and the correctional institutions.

The figure on state spending will be substantially larger this

year, mainly because of the increases in the school-aid program and the improvements in higher education. Biggest source of state money is Federal grants for highways, education, welfare, game and fish, health and other programs. They add up to \$288,000,000 a year. The new retail sales tax will be the third biggest source of money this year. It is estimated to bring in about \$150,000,000, which will put it ahead of the oil production tax, the present third-place source of money at \$122,000,000 a year, but still behind the motor fuel sales tax, which brought in \$177,000,000.

### PAPERS BACK IN SCHOOL?

State Board of Education has launched a study into the question of how much could be saved by using paper-back books in schools, and whether it would be worth it.

"We can't say what the savings will be until the study is made," State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar said, "but it appears the initial savings will be considerable." He pointed out the principal cost

of some books is what's in rather than the materials. Board authorized the Textbook Agency to start asking bids on both soft cover and hard cover editions of textbook—Vocal Music for ninth and eighth grades. It authorized the agency to a qualified laboratory test wearability of paper against hard covers and mit findings.

### ROAD MAINTENANCE FUNDS NEEDED

State Highway Commission asking more flexibility in use of funds for maintenance Farm-To-Market roads.

Problem today is adequate maintenance, improvement, reconstruction of roads already built. Therefore, a portion of the total F-M earmarked must be spent for maintenance.

Governor Daniel vetoed earmarked construction for the second year of the biennium as a step in this direction. The Highway Department expects legislation introduced at the coming special session to finish the job.

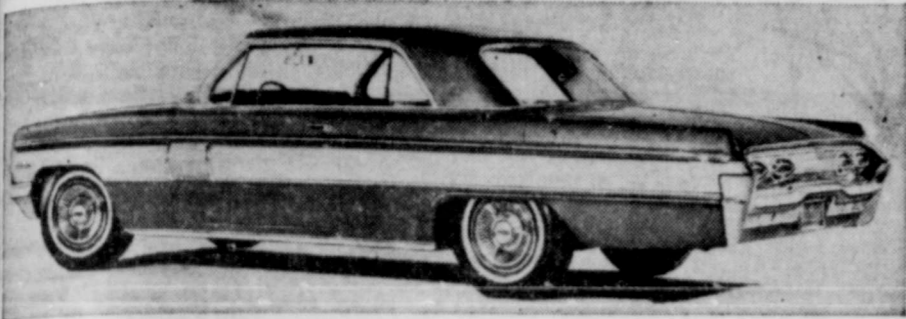
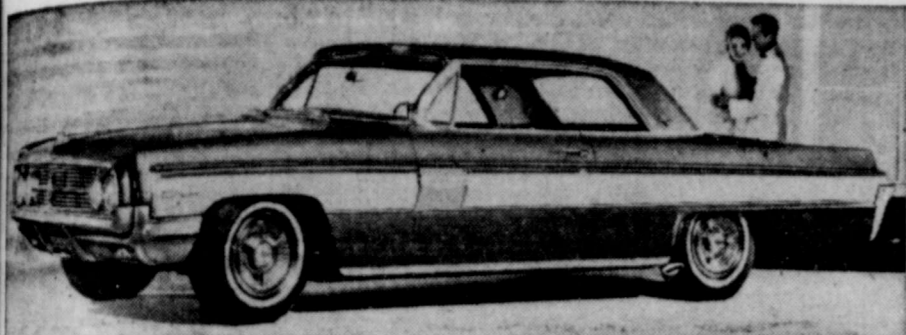

# OUTDOORS IN TEXAS



many times have you seen an unusually large fish being caught? Or a greenhead being dropped a 12-point? It's very often—most likely. These catches, or kills, are the kind of news that your local newspaper wants to publish. Unfortunately your newspaper may

never hear of your feats unless you, or a friend, advise them.

Chances are your newspaper will publish a picture of your catch or your bag of game if the photo is suitable for reproduction.

With just a little effort you can take pictures that the editor wants. You don't have to be a master photographer to do it. But there are a few simple rules you must follow.

For ideas on how to plan and take printable fish and game pictures, thumb through some of the national hunting and fishing magazines. You'll note that the pictures usually are close-ups, with good lighting, and with backgrounds that do not detract from the main subject.

Suppose you catch an eight-pound bass. That's certainly a newsworthy feat, meriting both story and picture. If you have your camera along, and you should on every outing, have a friend snap the picture of you as you admire the fish—preferably while you're in the boat or near the water.

By holding the fish at chest or eye level, and having your friend snap the photo from a low angle, you'll get the sky in the background. That way you automatically eliminate cluttered backgrounds and objects that detract from the subject matter. If you're lucky enough to have beautiful clouds in the sky—so much the better.

When your friend snaps the picture, however, be sure to look at and admire your fish. A picture like that is of greater value than one of you looking right into the camera lens. After all, the fish is the center of interest!

You could snap the same picture at home, but consider for a moment how a background of the garage door or the front porch detracts from the photo.

How about photographing that big buck?

Shoot such a photo on location. Suspend your deer from a tree. Drape it across the hood of your car, or the tailgate of your station wagon.

Again good lighting is a must. If the deer is suspended from a tree, be sure there are no confusing limbs or bushes in the scene, to give a poor background effect.

The hunter's car is always a good prop, if for no other reason than the fact that you can move it into the sunlight for better illumination of the subject. A flashgun on the camera of course eliminates the need for sunlight.

One cardinal point about big game pictures. Don't use "blood and guts" stuff.

If your deer, bear, or whatever animal it may be has been gutted, swing the body around so that the gutted underside

won't show in the picture. Most newspapers frown on "blood and guts" pictures even if the animal is of record size.

Chances are you'll have your film developed and printed at the corner drug store or the local photo supply. That means that your prints will come back considerably smaller than post-card size.

Pick out the best negative and have it enlarged to at least 5 x 7 size. An 8 x 10 is even better as newspapers can make much better cuts from the larger sizes.

A 5x7 glossy print will cost

you about 50 cents; the 8x10 size 75 cents. Glossies make better cuts than do the dull-finish photos. The newspaper will return the print to you if you request it.

Most photographers take extra precautions when they carry their cameras into the field or out on the water.

Moisture will damage a camera fast. Either carry your camera in a leather case or wrap it in a plastic bag. When you're afloat it's wise to put camera, case, film and all in a plastic bag. You can pick up a lot of damaging spray while

outboarding across a choppy lake or bay.

This is equally important with your film. In fact I recommend that you carry the film in an insulated plastic bag if possible. And be sure to store it in a cool place.

Heat will quickly destroy film so don't allow the sun to beat down on your camera or the camera bag. Above all don't keep the camera above the dash. It's also unwise to store it in the glove compartment. Coolest spot, ordinarily, is the floor of the car. Heat rises, you know.

Exercise the same precautions against dust, while in the field or on the road.

You might use only one roll of film on a trip, but play it safe and carry a few extras. And that sudden shot just might be recording a once-in-a-lifetime event.

You don't need an expensive camera for your outdoor snapshots. Nor a bag full of gadgets. They are for the photographer who makes his living by taking saleable photos. You can get acceptable results with an inexpensive camera just by taking your time and using care.

Keep this thought in mind in taking pictures. Don't just snap one and let it go at that. Film is cheap! Shoot several shots from many different angles. Second or third shot very likely

will be far superior to the first one you snap.

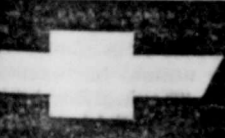

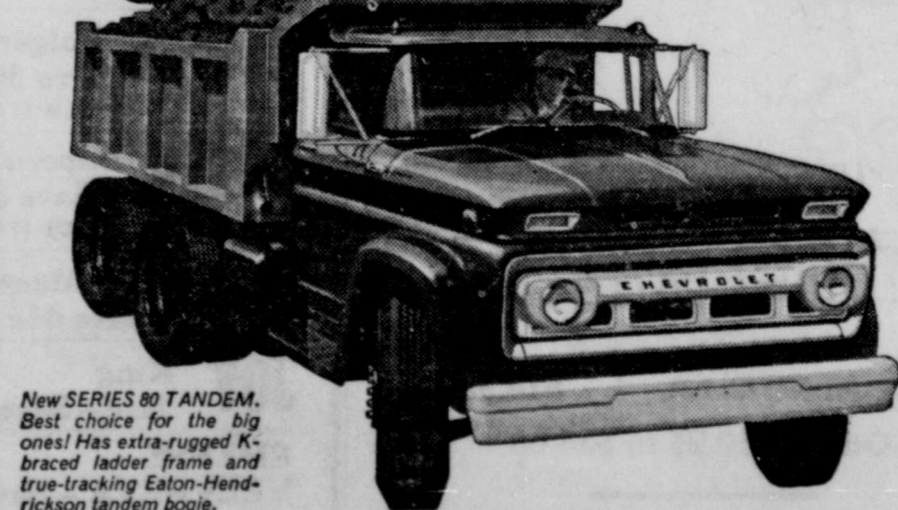

Ladies' Night will be observed by the club on November when Herb Perty, chairman of the Texas State Highway Commission, and past president of Lions International, will be guest speaker.

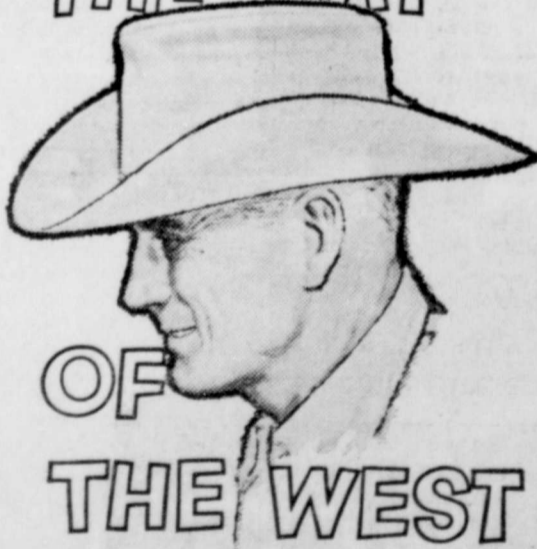
