\$115,000 Approved For New FM Road Construction In County

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$115,000 for construction of new Farm to Market Road in Mills County as part of the 1961 FM Road Program.

announced District Highway Engineer E. M. Pritchard of Brownwood.

Pritchard said 6.1 miles from the end of FM 573, 4.7 miles southwest of Mullin, southwest to FM 574 at Ridge will be built. This work does not include a new bridge for the Pecan Bayou crossing, as the present bridge and low-water dip will be used until additional funds are available. The work will be under the supervision of Glenn G. Trotter, Supervising Resident Engineer, Goldthwaite.

The work authorized for this county is part of the \$15 million FM Road Construction Program which will involve 133 counties throughout the state. Some 600 miles of new farm roads will be built under the program.

Unlike previous farm road construction programs, this one is for one year only instead of two years. The Highway Commission said the reduced one-year program is the result of Governor Price Daniel's recent veto of a \$15 million farm road appropriation which would have come to the Highway Department next year.

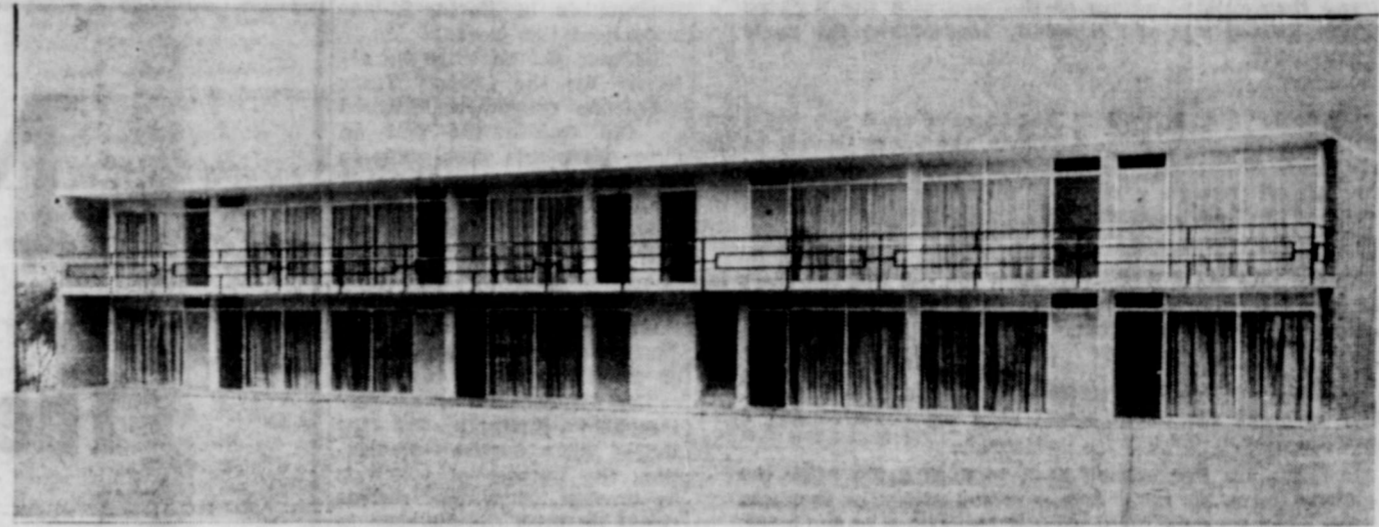
The Governor recently vetoed the Colson-Briscoe farm roads allocation for the second year of the current biennium on the grounds that there should be more flexibility in the use of the funds in order to provide for proper maintenance of the farm roads system.

In approving the 1961 farm roads program, the Commission said it is vital that the 1962 Colson - Briscoe appropriation be reinstated at the forthcoming special legislative session if the Highway Department is to continue the Farm to Market Road Program at the current pace.

The Commission reiterated its hope and belief that the legislature at the special session will see fit to reinstate the second-year farm roads appropriation together with statutory provision for adequate flexibility in the use of farm road funds for maintenance, as recommended by Governor Daniel.

The Commission said that maintenance of all FM Roads had been paid for out of trunk highway funds since the inception of the Colson-Briscoe program in 1949, and that this was advisable during this period due to the necessity for construction of many new miles of FM Roads. However, the Commission pointed out that the problem now is the adequate maintenance, improvement, and reconstruction of the 34,000 miles of Farm to Market Roads that have already been built. The Department has now reached the point where a portion of the total earmarked FM road funds must be used for maintenance purposes, the Commission said.

District Engineer E. M. Pritchard said a total of 16.3 miles in this highway district would be involved in the program at a total cost of \$382,000.

Bobby Letbetter Still Critical After Airplane Crash Sunday

Specialist 1-C Bobby Letbetter, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Letbetter, was doing as well as could be expected Tuesday afternoon, but was still in critical condition in a Wilmington, N. C., hospital.

Letbetter was a member of the Army's famed sky diving team at an air show when the plane carrying them aloft crashed and burned before some 100,000 spectators Sunday at Wilmington. According to news

reports their plane broke into two pieces and burst into flames. Three servicemen were killed in the crash.

Mr. and Mrs. Letbetter received word of the accident about 7 p. m. Sunday and left by plane at 7 a. m. Monday for Wilmington where their son is in the James Walker Memorial Hospital.

Bobby underwent brain surgery. His father reported by telephone to Goldthwaite Tuesday afternoon that after seeing their son and talking to his doctors they are encouraged, but that his condition is still critical.

He is stationed at Fort Bragg with a paratroop division, returning only last year after six years service overseas. His wife and two small children live in Virginia, near Fort Bragg.

All money contributed to the Mills County chapter will go for direct relief for Carla victims and citizens are urged to support the cause.

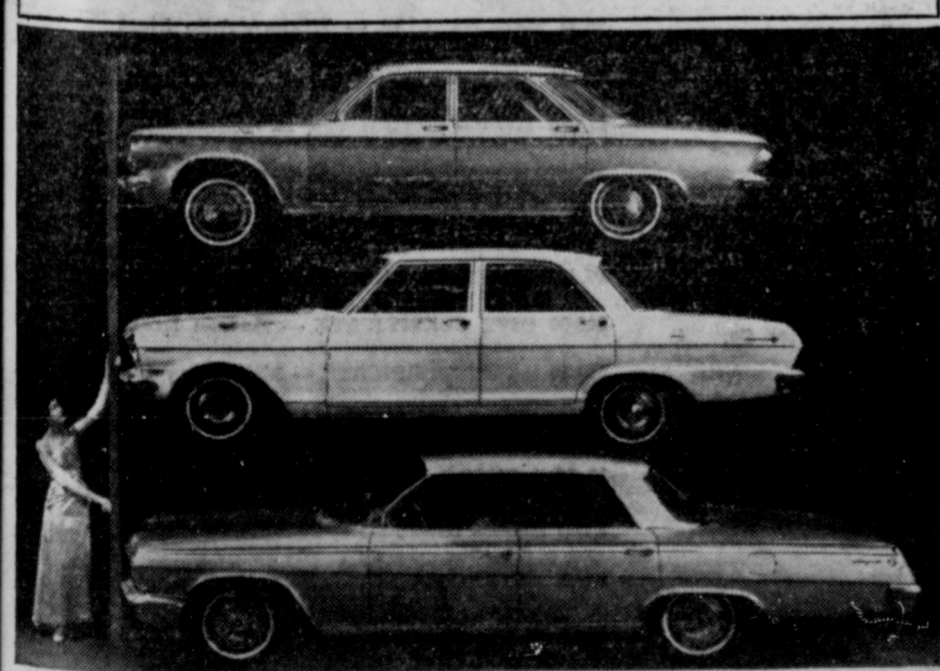
Long said Tuesday that a number of contributions have

Have you ever taken time out to think what would happen to us if our Doctors had only one or two types of medicines for our aches and pains, or how many of us would be unable to see if our Optometrists had only one or two types of lenses for our glasses? Have you ever wondered why someone you know that is hard of hearing won't have anything done about it? I'll tell you why . . . In most cases they are so afraid that someone will stare at them, or feel sorry for them. Of course this is not so . . . People have learned to accept things we wear. In fact in a poll taken by a hearing co. nearly everyone said they had ten times rather see someone wearing a hearing aid than have to shout at them.

How many of us remember just a few years back if we wore glasses we were called "four eyes" and had fun poked at us? But not any more. No one pays any attention to a person wearing glasses. If you lose a leg the Doctors can do nothing to the part you have lost, but he can build you an artificial limb to fit the part you have left.

Most people think that only the elderly people have hearing trouble. This is not true. . . Our schools have an alarming number of children with hearing problems. We just go along thinking our boy or girl is a slow learning child when it could be they are not hearing the full meaning of words. There are any number of children with speech defects caused by not hearing all the sounds. They pronounce the words just like they hear them. A hearing test would show if bad Hearing was the cause. It costs nothing for the test, why not bring them in for a test. If you can't bring them in I will be most happy
