## Rev. Thomas Hastings Receives Baptist Award In South Dakota

A news story of interest to many Mills County residents appeared recently in the Lead, So. Dakota, Daily Call.

It tells the story of Rev. Thomas Hastings being named "Baptist Pastor of the Year" at the 80th annual South Dakota Baptist Convention held on September 23-25. This is the highest award bestowed by the Convention on one of its pastors. Rev. Hastings was also elected program chairman for the 1962 State Convention.

Mrs. Hastings is the former Doris Harper, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. O. Harper of Star.

Following is the story that appeared in the S. D. paper.

Rev. Thomas Hastings, 36, Lead, has been named the South Dakota "Baptist Pastor of the Year." The award was bestowed Sunday afternoon during the 1961 state Baptist convention held in Huron, by Dr. Ralph S. Cobb, Sioux Falls.

The Lead pastor was chosen on the following points: Devoted service to the cause of Christ; untiring ministry to his congregation; Christlike example to his community; spirit of cooperation with other Christians; kindness and humility in relations to fellow pastors; charity toward all men, and his zeal for the spreading of the gospel through missions.

Many improvements have been made to the church and parsonage since the Rev. Mr. Hastings' arrival in Lead in February, 1958. He is a graduate of Central Baptist Theological Seminary in Kansas City, Kan., and Howard Payne University, Brownwood, Tex.

He and his wife are the parents of four children: Howard, 10; Louise, 8; Lydia, 5 and Lynda, 2. The Rev. Mr. Hastings is president of the Lead-Deadwood Ministerial Association, and is a member of the Kiwanis Club, of which group he has served as secretary.

Farm fires caused losses estimated at \$165 million in the nation last year. W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer, said the figure was supplied by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Building losses accounted for about 65 per cent of the total loss payments by companies for which a breakdown by property class was available, he added. Almost three-fourths of the building losses were on main buildings—homes and barns.

Allen continued that now is the time for neighbors to attack this problem of fires, and suggested that special emphasis be placed on fire prevention during National Fire Prevention Week, October 8-14. This period is just ahead of the month when farm fires take their greatest toll. November was the peak month last year. Four-fifths of all 1960 farm fires and 84 per cent of the lives lost occurred during the six months from October through March.

Allen said.

President John F. Kennedy in his proclamation designating the special week said, "Our communities and the Nation can ill afford this inexcusable waste of our resources."

Family training in fire hazard removal and fire fighting and drills for establishing escape routes in case of fire were suggested by the engineer as things families and neighbors could work on together. Farm families, in particular, he added, must rely on their own fire

safety training, fire prevention check-ups, and fire prevention measures to safeguard their lives, income and property.

Local county extension agents can supply information and suggestions for carrying out educational programs not only on fire prevention but also on farm and home safety activities, Allen said. A visit with the agents and community leaders was suggested by Allen as a starting point in planning for National Fire Prevention Week activities.

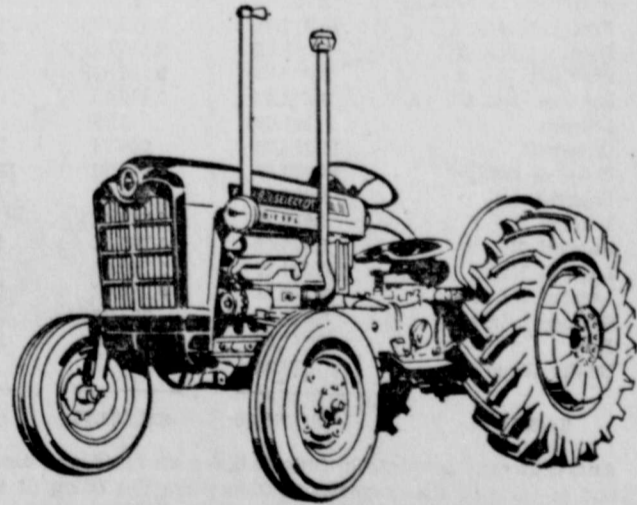

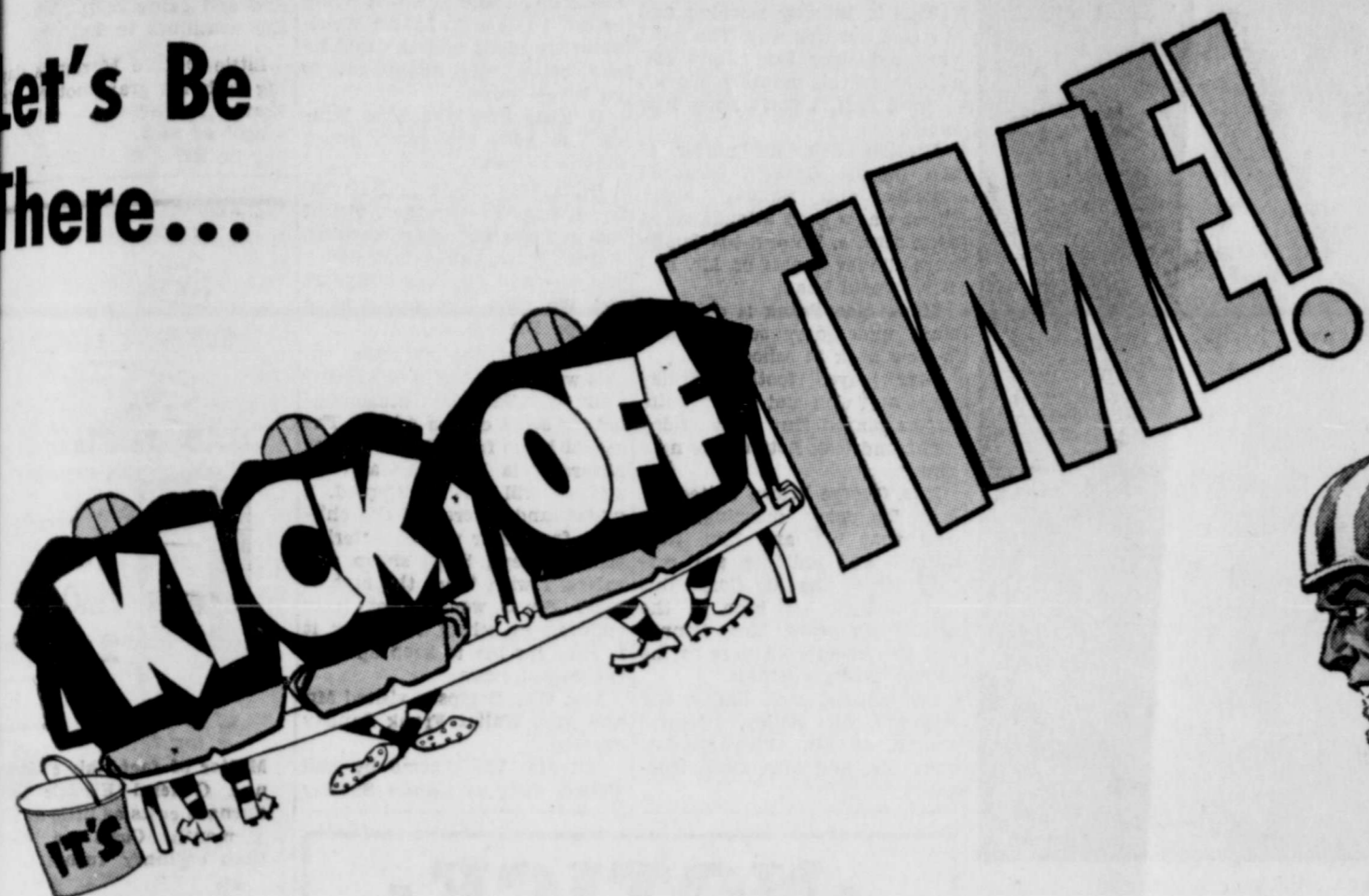

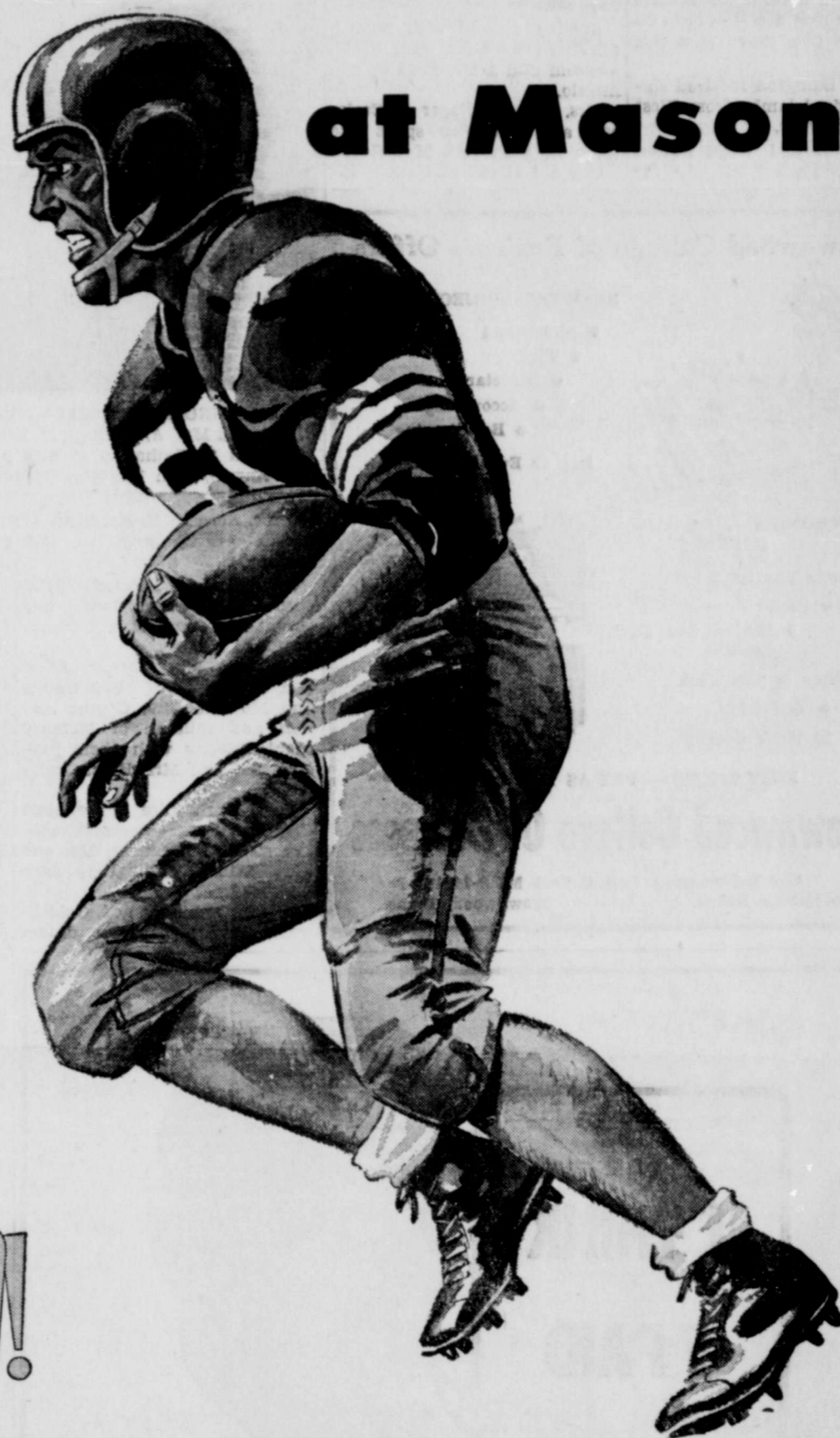

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## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, TEXAS—Final legal details were bulldozed from the path of the biggest state water project in Texas history. Reason—to pave the way for groundbreaking ceremonies Thursday near the site of Toledo Bend Reservoir on the Sabine River.

State Board of Water Engineers, Texas Water Development Board and the Attorney

General's office worked overtime in order to approve the project—from engineering, fiscal and legal standpoints.

Sabine River Authorities in both Texas and Louisiana are 50-50 partners in the Toledo Bend Dam to be constructed near Newton, Texas. It may cost as much as \$60,000,000. Original estimate, back in 1957, was \$54,000,000.

No federal aid was sought. Louisiana put up \$15,000,000 in tax money. Texas is lending the SRA of Texas \$15,000,000. Rest will be borrowed from private investors.

This giant hydroelectric project will provide power for utility companies in Texas and Louisiana to market. It will supply Calcasieu Parish, La., and Orange County, Tex., with water for domestic and municipal use, irrigation and industries.

### LOST LAND?

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler dropped a bombshell in the laps of the Austin City Council.

In checking records at the

Land Office, where all Texas land titles originate, he found no evidence of a patent or sale of Lots 6 and 7 of Block 185 of the original City of Austin.

Sadler referred the matter to the Attorney General, noting that these two lots hold one of Austin's water plants. Capitol wags were quick to ask if Sadler was trying to cut the city's water off.

### STATE DEFICIT GROWS

Texas is still waiting for the full impact of the new sales tax. Meanwhile, the deficit in the general revenue fund increases. Latest report shows a hike in the fund-shortage of \$20,500,000 in a period of 11 days.

With the mailing of first installments on this year's state aid to the school districts, the new total deficit is \$76,811,173 according to the State Treasurer Jesse James.

First sales tax payments from retailers are due October 31.

### STEPPED-UP CHECK ON UNEMPLOYMENT CLAIMS

Texas Employment Commission is hiring additional investigators to look into unemployment claims to ascertain that only those entitled to it receive it.

Commissioner J. J. Pickle, Employers, representative on the three-member commission, reports that eight or nine new probes are being hired by authorization of U. S. Department of Labor to study claims.

New investigators will be assigned to the larger employment district offices throughout Texas.

Commissioner J. E. Lyles, Employees' representative, said "too many people are receiving benefits from this program through misrepresentation, honest or otherwise."

### DRIVER TRAINING—FEWER ACCIDENTS

Governor Daniel reports "major progress in reducing involvement in fatal accidents through the steady expansion of driver education classes in Texas public schools."

Driver education students are having 21 per cent fewer accidents. Since 1957 a total of 265,028 students, in the 15 to 24 age bracket, have completed driver education courses, an increase of 80,091 or 43.2 per cent, over the preceding four-year period.

### STATE JOB CLASSIFICATION LEGAL

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has ruled that the new state job classification program is constitutional.

Question was submitted by State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.

Opinion held that the graduated pay schedule for state employees is legal because the Legislature has authority to use this method of classifying workers.

New system provides for pay raises on the basis of seniority.

### CARLA'S AFTERMATH

"Carla the Hurricane" has long since left Texas, but her mark remains.

Governor Daniel modified his remarks about insurance adjustors by saying that most companies were paying claims fairly.

### But a Chicago insurance executive came to Texas and blasted both Governor Daniel and Sen. Ralph Yarborough for remarks about fine print in insurance policies.

Speaker James Turman sent his general investigating committee probing along the Gulf Coast, intent on recommending a new windstorm insurance law and one governing the handling of claims.

Texas public trusts and foundations have contributed \$225,000 to aid hurricane victims, and fund-raising appeals under the Red Cross are under way across Texas.

As usual, warm-hearted Texans are chipping in to help those hit hardest by Carla.

### GOVERNOR-FOR-A-DAY

Many senators get to be governor-for-a-day. But Sen. Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi got a bigger break.

While Governor Daniel was attending the Southern Governor Conference, of which he is chairman, Reagan was acting governor for a full week. He even issued some clemencies.

Reagan made the most news however, by publicly disagreeing with Daniel. He said he saw no need for another special session of the Legislature.

Proclamations issued by Reagan included one designating "Port of Corpus Christi Day" and a series of three praising Del Mar College, Texas College of Art & Industries, and the

### University of Corpus Christi.
