Deer Season Will Open Today

The basic deer season on white-tailed deer opens in Texas today, November 16. They will be legal in approximately 200 counties in Texas at that time.

There are a few scattered counties where there are short seasons. The counties west of the Pecos river, in what is generally termed the "mule deer" country doesn't open until Dec. 1, and closes Dec. 8.

Generally, the white-tailed season will close Dec. 31, although there are a number of counties where earlier closing dates have been set.

According to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, the deer population is heavy this year throughout the state. In a number of counties under regulatory authority, the Commission has authorized the taking of a third or "bonus" deer, in an effort to reduce the herds of does in those areas. The taking of does also will be permitted in many of the counties. Permits for these already have been turned over to landowners, who will be responsible for their harvest.

Definite information on hunting in any area may be obtained from your local game warden.

World Traveler-Lecturer To Speak At Union Thanksgiving Service Here

Miss Helen Poe, world traveler and noted lecturer, will be the guest speaker at the Union Thanksgiving Service at the First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite, next Wednesday, November 23, 7:30 p. m.

The union service is conducted annually by the Mills County Ministers' Association.

Miss Poe's subject, "Christians on Trial," comes not from one on the outside criticizing, but from one of us. Her home is Dallas, she is the daughter of a Presbyterian Minister, and a graduate of Southern Methodist University. Furthermore, her preparation and experience fitting her for the high recognition she now holds as a lecturer include post graduate studies at Columbia University and the Julliard School of Music, 13 summers spending some three months each traveling, studying conditions and also lecturing in Europe, Asia and Africa.

Her travels have been research studies into world conditions and tensions to gather the materials for her lectures. In 1958 and 1960 she was in

Russia and other Soviet countries. In 1961 she was in Africa, Israel and the Middle East.

This quotation from some of the publicity material in hand speaks well for her: "With international tensions soaring to heights just short of the boiling point, this world traveler's responsibility is to phrase each thought as accurately as a prescription for a dangerous drug, weigh each word as carefully as a dram upon an apothecary's scale, and make absolutely certain that each sentence has only one crystal clear meaning."

Miss Poe's latest venture has been into the field of addressing youth groups; high school, college and junior high audiences. Many professional speakers will not accept engagements before 1,000 teen-agers. She believes that in the modern world where college students have been revolutionary leaders, this is a very important group. Miss Poe makes very special appeal to the young people of America. Mills County young people are extended a special invitation to hear her.

Miss Poe's coming to Goldthwaite is sponsored by the Mills County Ministers Association, Self Culture Club, Art and Civic Club, Tuesday Study Club, Garden Club, Home Demonstration Clubs of the County, Parents and Teachers Association, the Farmers and Ranchers, the Farm Bureau and the Lions Club.

Cecil Egger Announces For County Judge

Cecil Egger this week authorized the Eagle to announce his candidacy for the office of Mills County Judge and ex-officio county superintendent, subject to the Democratic primary election.

He is a native of Mills County and was appointed County Judge by the Commissioners' Court in November 1960 to fill a two-year unexpired term.

Mr. Egger served as county commissioner of precinct four from January 1953 until December 1958, a period of six years.

In announcing for the office he stated that he feels qualified to take care of the duties of the office and will appreciate the support of voters for a full elective term.

Officials Believe Screw-Worm Can Be Controlled Effectively In Southwest

Based on many years of research and the success of the screw-worm eradication program in the Southeast, scientists believe that the screw-worm can be controlled effectively in the Southwest by the release of sterile males.

The overwintering areas of the screw-worm play an important part in the planning and success of proposed control programs because these areas serve as sources for reinfestation each spring.

The proposed control program in Texas consists of a series of large scale field tests in two phases which will be required to answer certain questions concerning the effectiveness of releasing sterile males for screw-worm control in this area. Funds currently being raised by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation will be used to help finance these tests.

Several major problems face the screw-worm program in Texas and the Southwest.

1. In the Southeast, the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico served as effective natural barriers against reinfestation. Such natural barriers do not exist in the Southwest.

2. Because of high temperatures and low humidities common in the Southwest, there are indications that the sterile males will not live as long as they did in the Southeast. This

3. Because of the lack of natural barriers in the Southwest, a permanent buffer zone must be established in which sterile males are released continually.

4. The occurrence of average or severe winters and favorable conditions for survival of released sterile males will improve considerably the chances for the success of the proposed control program in the Southwest.

THE WAY TO OBLIVION—A man from Mars listening in on world arguments as to freedom and peaceful coexistence would be completely confused. Half the people of the world don't know the meaning of freedom. The other half have become so used to having it, without any effort or sacrifice on their part, that they accept political trends that would destroy it, without thinking.

Centralized authority that emerges from the welfare state and government in business in competition with its own citizens, evolves eventually into socialism and communism. In the name of freedom and liberation of a people, government then tells the individual what to do, and shoot him if he resists.

When people become mere servants of public officials rather than their masters, freedom no longer exists. A government that guarantees freedom is one that protects individual opportunity and ownership of property, not one that restricts and destroys life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

When people forget this they are on their way to oblivion.

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In an editorial on Soviet intentions, *The Saturday Evening Post* says: "... everything hangs on one factor: the will of the western world and particularly that of the American people. If we are puny enough to be demoralized by threats from without and subversions from within, that could be the ball game. And we'd better carry the fight to the enemy, for Mein Kampf warns us of the grim alternative."

All in all, the magazine goes on to point out, the tax burden today is close to 30 per cent of the entire national output — 20.4 per cent of that output being taken by the federal government, and 8.2 per cent by state and local government. Percentage-wise, state and local tax collections have shown the most rapid rise in late years. But the possibility of further increases in the federal tax load is facing us.

What's the solution? There are various answers, some of a highly technical nature. But one thing is sure—unless non-essential spending is eliminated, at all levels of government, the time will come when you'll be working a third, or a half, or two-thirds of your time to pay the cost of government. This is the price of having government take care of you from cradle to grave.

Some Men Never Die

'Tis said that two things are sure on this earth—death and taxes.

Though death may be sure, it isn't so certain just how you'll be remembered after death. But some men, like William "Bill" Goyens, will never die. They live on forever, in the hearts of other men.

Goyens' body now lies in a cemetery four miles west of Nacogdoches in the central portion of East Texas. His gravestone tells his story well:

"Born a slave in South Carolina, 1794, escaped to Texas in 1821, rendered valuable assistance to the Army of Texas, 1836. Interpreter for the Houston-Forbes Treaty, with the Cherokees, 1836, acquired wealth and was noted for his charity, died at his home on Goyens' Hill, 1856. His skin was black, His heart, true blue."

Are You An Amichelian?

Although there is some doubt as to who was the first white person to tour Texas, it probably was Alonzo Alvarez de Pineda, the Spanish explorer.

Pineda was sent here by the governor of Jamaica to explore the Gulf Coast. Pineda named all the vast Gulf land "Amichel."

So, Texans came mighty close to being called Amichelians, rather than Texans.

Who Named Baylor University?

Baylor University, at Waco was named for an outstanding Judge. He was Dr. Robert mettt Bledsoe Baylor. How came to pass is an interesting story.

The man who placed Baylor name on this great national institution was William Melton Tryon. He was the second missionary sent to Texas by the American Baptist Mission Society. He was a leader in church and state and the chaplain in the Congress of the Republic of Texas.

Tryon, who first originated the idea of a Baptist university in Texas, was made a member of the committee appointed to secure the university charter from the Republic of Texas. Tryon rejected Judge Baylor's suggestion that the school be named Tyron and into the plication wrote "Baylor."

Tryon then served as the permanent President of the Board of Trustees of Baylor University.

PARENT PROBLEMS

Children Should Help When Taken Visiting

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

IT'S A GREAT privilege for children and their parents to spend several days or weeks in the summer with grandparents. Usually it's fun for the grandparents.

Sometimes, however, it is a burden for them.

Unaccustomed for some years to the normal noises made by young children, they may find it a nervous strain if the visit is prolonged.

More Physical Strain

Usually, too, it means more physical strain for the grandmother, especially if neither the mother nor children share in the usual chores.

However, when the mother, father and the older children pitch in and help with the housework, no one needs to be unduly burdened, and time can be had for mutual enjoyment.

Don't Do Chores

But it's my observation that, as a rule, visiting children over six don't often share liberally in the housekeeping chores. Usually they have not helped their mother much at home and while visiting they are even less inclined to do chores.

If you go visiting Grandma or other relatives with your children over six, let me offer the following suggestion:

Assign these children first of all to make their own beds and tidy up their rooms. In addition, define a few other chores they must perform during the visit and don't be a shirker yourself.

What It'll Mean

It's not the helping by you and the children which will mean most to Grandma, but the thoughtfulness and consideration it will symbolize to her. When she feels that neither you

nor your children care about her, she just can't feel you are very gracious relatives and guests.

Many parents who wish to go abroad or have lighter burdens at home may get the bright idea of sending one or several children to stay with grandparents.

Usually these grandparents welcome the children. But if the period is a long one, and the children have not been trained at home in self-reliance and responsibility, this may be a hardship to the grandparents.

If you do send your children for the grandparents to keep for a period, make clear to these children in the presence of the grandparents, that the latter shall have sole authority to guide and discipline them. If the children are over six, define, in the presence of the grandparents, the regular chores they shall do.

In all these matters the rights and welfare of the grandparents, though important, are not most important. The character growth of your children is.

Answering Parents' Questions
Q. I can seldom get my daughter, nine, to help me about the home, even though I often tell her she would help me if she loved me.

A. Why do you act so childishly?

Why don't you assign her a few regular jobs and enforce a penalty for her derelictions?

Just remember that jawing does no good.

AUSTIN, TEXAS—What happened to the million tourists who did not come to Texas this year?
That question faces a State conference of "Texans for Tourists" called for November in Austin, by Gov. Price Daniel.

Nationally, tourism is the third largest industry. In Texas, it ranks 13th.

Texas voters amended the constitution in 1958 to allow state money to be spent to attract tourists. But two sessions of the Legislature have declined to appropriate the money.

Charged with responsibility of promoting tourism in Texas is the State Highway Department.

The upcoming all-day session is designed to build grassroots support for legislation to finance a program of advertising.

SAFE HIGHWAYS

An increase in highway fatalities this year, after a 26 percent decline in past years, disturbs the state's chief policeman, Col. Homer Garrison Jr. of the Department of Public Safety.

Present statistics indicate the number of deaths in 1961 will be 20 to 25 more than the 2,254 of 1960. So Colonel Garrison has sent out word for his men to redouble their efforts to remove

Attracting the greatest number were the rugged canyons of Garner State Park. Gain there was 70 per cent, or an increase to 138,951 from 99,731, during 1961. Palo Duro Canyon and Huntsville State Park also showed substantial gains in campers.

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

"This annual survey has been a joint undertaking of the Post Office and the Agriculture Department since 1942," concluded Mrs. Fairman.

It is located at \$5,143,623. It's not for sale for the total of \$15,092,014. But at least it's on the books right, now.

Incidentally, the old Capitol is getting a refurbishing. Workmen are replacing cracked and splintered panels in the hallways, and removing the old varnish. It will come out lighter and brighter.

NEW LAWS

Atty. Gen. Will Willson quickly plugged one possible loophole in the "Blue Law."

He advised Dist. Atty. Henry Wade of Dallas that a corporation owning two or more stores must close them the same day. One can't stay open Saturday and the other Sunday. Nor can a store accept orders by phone in advance to be delivered on Sunday.

Wilson also is busy interpreting other new laws, among them the one requiring holders of property for others, except banks, to report it to the state when the owner hasn't been around for seven years.

He advised Treasurer Jesse James that an oil company which holds royalties outside Texas on oil produced in Texas does not have to report it to the State of Texas except that amount held for persons whose last known address was in Texas.

The attorney general expects so much work out of this new law that he set up a special division to handle it.

In another opinion, Wilson held that wiretapping to record phone conversations is not illegal in Texas.

THIRD ROUND

In the next few weeks, Gov. Price Daniel will have completed his third round of appointments.

Most of the state's operations are directed by 3 or 9-member boards, appointed for six-year overlapping terms.

These appointments are made to more than 140 state boards and commissions.

Latest appointments include: David B. Irons, Dallas; Dr. Horace Cromer, Austin; Mrs. H. E. Butt, Corpus Christi, and Howard Tellepsen, Houston, to the Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools; Max Starcke, Austin, and Harry Hornby, Uvalde, to the State Parks Board; and Sam G. Wood, Killean, and Hatton W. Simpson, Tyler, to the State Board of Pharmacy.

WATER POLLUTION BOARD

Governor Daniel named former Rep. Sam Wohlford, Stratford; J. S. Hudnall, Tyler, and C. G. Shigley, Freeport, as public members on the new State Water Pollution Control Board.

Board of Water Engineers Chairman Joe D. Carter, State Health Commissioner J. E. Peavy, M. D., and Game & Fish Executive Secretary Howard Dodgen, or their alternates, will complete the board.

In the future, no one may discharge waste of any kind into or adjacent to the public waters of Texas, or the Gulf of Mexico, without a permit from this board.

Unfortunately, this board was handed a big job but no operating money. Governor Daniel will ask the Legislature, at a special session in January, to provide some expense money for it.

SHORT SNORTS

Starting January 1, the State Welfare Department will begin paying medical, hospital and nursing home bills for the 225,000 needy aged who are on the old-age assistance rolls. Program will cost about \$12,000,000 in state money in the coming 20 months. Federal dollars match the state's.

Governor Daniel has reactivated the Governor's Committee for the White House Conference on the Aging, to resume its study of the problems of the aging. Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro was re-named chairman.
