Anthony Ryan wasn't normally a crybaby. But at 10 months he began crying almost incessantly, and at times even screamed.

His loving parents in Philadelphia were nearly out of their minds. With four other small children, the household was pandemonium. No one ap-peared to know precisely what was causing the infant's dread-ful paroxysms of pain.




