Who Must File Federal Income Tax Return For 1961

All citizens or residents of the United States, including minor children, who had gross incomes of \$600 or more in 1961, must file a federal income tax return. Virgil W. Newman, Administrative Officer, Internal Revenue Service, Brownwood, announced today.

If the taxpayer is 65 or over as of December 31, 1961, he or she is not required to file unless his or her gross income for 1961 was at least \$1,200.

The IRS representative added that even though a taxpayer is not required to file under these rules, he or she must file to obtain a refund, if any income tax was withheld from his or her pay.

He said there is one exception to the general rule. Self-employed persons such as sole proprietors, partners, and independent contractors, must file an income tax return and pay a self-employment tax, if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.

Many questions about federal income tax returns can be answered by telephoning the IRS office.

Oh, yes, the filing deadline this year is Monday, April 16!

Auto Salvage Buildings Are Destroyed By Fire

Two buildings belonging to Tom Moore, operator of Moore Auto Salvage, were completely destroyed by fire Wednesday morning.

The buildings, located just north of the City limits, along with contents were a total loss. Firemen answered the call about 9:30 but were unable to stop the blaze which destroyed a storage room and a auto workshop with tools and used auto parts and supplies.

Fire Chief Jack Reid said firemen were unable to hook up the pumper since fire hydrants were frozen. The blaze was fanned with high winds and had gained considerable headway by the time firemen arrived on the scene.

It's Time To Request Soil And Water Conservation Help

Farmers who are interested in establishing soil and water conservation practices on their farms under the 1962 Agricultural Conservation Program should file their requests as soon as possible, suggests E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Requests to participate in the program must be filed at the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office in Goldthwaite and the conservation practice approved before work is begun.

Under the 1962 program, farmers may get help averaging about one-half the cost of carrying out such conservation practices as establishing and improving vegetative cover of grasses, legumes, or trees for soil protection, installing erosion control structures, and practices for the conservation or more efficient use of water.

In addition, the 1962 program also provides for similar cost-share assistance to farmers in developing soil and water conservation practices beneficial to wildlife.

The Agricultural Conservation Program is designed to encourage farmers to protect soil, water and woodland resources by sharing the costs of needed conservation measures.

"Without this assistance, most farmers simply couldn't afford to make this needed investment, particularly since the majority of these practices provide little or no immediate returns," Mr. Burkett explained.

Bank Deposits In Mills County Are Higher Than A Year Ago

Bank deposits in Mills County are higher than they were a year ago, according to official statements in this issue of Mills County State Bank, Goldthwaite and Farmers and Merchants Bank at Priddy.

Deposits at Farmers and Merchants Bank are \$354,932.86. A year ago deposits were \$369,675.68, showing a slight drop for the year.

Mills County State Bank deposits are \$4,065,008.45. A year ago deposits were \$3,853,684.56, reflecting an increase.

Loans and discounts of both institutions are up over a year ago. Farmers and Merchants Bank has loans and discounts of \$242,843.34 while a year ago loans and discounts were \$229,535.35.

Mills County State Bank has \$2,244,346.06 in loans and discounts while a year ago they were \$2,203,339.59.

Total resources of Farmers and Merchants Bank are \$400,936.03. Mills County State Bank has total resources of \$4,544,794.30.

Charles Hardgrave, son of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Hardgrave, was named to the Regional band, playing third chair French Horn. He was also first chair French Horn at the District Band meet in November.

There were over 350 students from this Region with over 25 schools represented Saturday. Of this total, only 109 were selected for the Regional Band, and of this total only 8 members were selected for All-State, according to announcement by Nell Chamberlain, Goldthwaite Band Master.
