W-2 Tax Forms Must Be Issued By January 31

Employers, Internal Revenue Service has a reminder for you Employees should receive two copies of a Withholding Statement, Form W-2, on or before Wednesday, January 31, 1962.

Virgil W. Newman, Administrative Officer, of the Internal Revenue Service at Brownwood said, "This statement shows the total wages paid and the income tax and social security tax withheld if any, during the calendar year 1961."

Total wages shown on an employee's W-2 must include a mounts received as sick pay from his employer, even though no tax has been withheld on such sick pay. Sick pay is not required to be shown separately



Screwworm Eradication Program Is Expanding, According To Reports

ication program in the Southwest moved a step forward with the announcement that the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation's board of trustees is being expanded and that an advisory council has been created.

C. G. Scruggs, recently elected president of the Foundation, said that each county which has an organized committee will the advisory council, and that additional advisory council

members can be appointed. Scruggs pointed out that 216 counties in Texas now have organized committees and that other counties in the state are in the process of organizing. "Interest in the program also is growing in other states," he said. "Seven parishes in Louisiana have organized."

Scruggs said the selection of Harry Jersig of San Antonio as a trustee brings the total number of trustees to 16 at this time. Jersig will represent Wildlife and Sportsmen's clubs.

In their latest meeting the trustees emphasized - through the following statements-that every penny collected would be used solely to bring about a eradication proscrewworm gram "That it be the policy of the board of trustees that all funds received from producers shall and will be held in escrow to be expended only in the event funds are available or authorized to initiate the screwworm eradication program and in the event that efforts to secure sufficient funds fail, all monies in such escrow accounts shall be returned to the individual or organization from which they were received."

The screwworm eradication program is literally one of self extermination. It is based on the fact that the female fly mates only once. The native population is overwhelmed by systematic release of screwworm flies which have been sterilized by irradiation.

The foundation reports that of January 10, 210 Texas counties had met, organized and begun collecting funds. By January 15, at least 225 to 235 counties were expected to be underway. A count of 42 counties, informally received, showed an average of nearly \$7.500 per county with none complete.



On January 8, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced the minimum national average support price for 1962 crop peanuts at \$221 per ton. This is the same as the 1961 support price. The announced support reflects 85% of the January, 1962 peanut parity price of \$260 per ton.

The above information was telephoned to the office of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association from the Department of Agriculture in Washington on last Tuesday.

Association officials worked diligently in 1961 for the \$29 per ton increase in support levels. They had again this year repeatedly expressed the hope that it would not be necessary to decrease price support levels due growers on 1962 crop pea-

The announcement by the Secretary that the 1962 support level would not be lowered is therefore heralded by Association officials and is expected to result in extreme satisfaction when received by growers over the Southwest area.

Through continuation of the relatively high support level on peanuts, major producing counties in the Southwest will be aided tremendously in maintaining a desirable level of economy


