Texas Turkey Growers Oppose USDA Turkey Marketing Orders

Two representatives of the Texas Turkey Industry Steering Committee left Saturday from Waco for Kansas City to oppose "by using every means we can" the proposed National Turkey Marketing orders.

USDA Secretary Orville Freeman called a hearing for Kansas City which began Monday, January 29 and will end on February 1, (today).

Representing the Texas Turkey Industry are Bertram Geeslin, Goldthwaite turkey grower and secretary of the Steering Committee, and Homer Fikes, Fredericksburg turkey grower.

The two were selected as Texas representatives by the 18-member Steering Committee at a meeting in Goldthwaite last Thursday, January 25.

The Committee was formed as a result of six turkey marketing order educational meetings held over Texas in November.

A three-man delegation was elected at each of those meetings to attend a state-wide session in Stephenville in early December prior to the Oklahoma City hearing on December 4-6. The state-wide group voted unanimously to oppose the proposed national orders.



To give us a little sample of the Urban Renewal program and how some of it functions we need only to take a look back to the past week and recount the news item appearing in one of our metropolitan papers telling what the Urban Renewal Agency is doing in Wink, Texas.

The story said the Wink Urban Renewal Agency auctioned off improvements on 35 lots including one building which sold Hoppe of Dallas. Mrs. Thompfor a high bid of 50 cents.

The 35 lots were purchased by the Agency for a total price of \$80,100, including any structures on them. The buildings brought \$6.196.75 at the sale.

Highest price, according to the story, paid for one structure was \$4,100 for a house. The Agency had purchased the house and finished on two massive stone Bank, which happy event was lot for \$8,400. That leaves the Agency with a lot costing \$4,300.

The 50-cent purchase was made by a Wink man. He bought what observers said could be loosely called a building. The structure and lot were bought by the Agency for \$1,700. So the Agency has a lost costing \$1,695.50.

All this activity is happening right here in Texas. The Agency got a Million or more dollars from the Federal Government to ial Hospital. She weighed eight tended the Baptist Ladies' tea try to rebuild a town which once was a booming oil town.

According to this auction the Agency has from this transaction 35 lots costing more than \$73,000

One wonders, if the economy of the town and surrounding area wouldn't justify businessmen or residents to buy these properties and improving them, what are the chances for the Agency. Will the Agency be able to sell the property, improve it and sell it, or what have you. If the Agency can rebuild the property and sell it, what chances are there for those to follow in making a go of it when the economy of the town and area didn't justify it in the first place and it was left to rot and ruin.

And who is going to pay for it? Surely someone will have to dig up to pay for it, whether it is directly or indirectly.




1961 Bond Sales
