1,174 Poll Tax Receipts Issued

NEWSPAPER COVERAGE AND READERSHIP

Of the 54,000,000 households in the continental United States 86.4% read at least one newspaper on an average weekday; 80.4% of the homes buy and read at least one newspaper each day; and another 6% read one or more newspapers on a pass-along basis.

Four out of five adults (21 and over) and 72% of the country's 13,000,000 individuals between the ages of 15 and 20 read a newspaper on any given weekday. In the course of a five-day period, 88% of the adults read a newspaper on one or more days.

Total newspaper readings by adults on every weekday are 125,500,000 and by the teenagers, another 12,750,000.

Surveys show that 71% of the time the newspaper reaches the reader by means of regular home delivery, by newspaper boys usually, and by mail. In 25% of the cases the newspaper is bought at a store, a newsstand, or a self-service rack.

Two-thirds of the people have an habitual time for reading the newspaper. It takes place at every time of day. However, the newspaper is not normally read in a single sitting. The typical reader picks up and looks into his newspaper 2.4 times each weekday.

Americans do more than just read the newspaper. They actively use it in a number of ways: 52% report they have clipped some item other than advertising, in the past three months; 27% still have the clipping at home; 18% have turned the clippings to someone else; 28% have clipped advertisements; and 15% went right out and bought the advertised product.

Newspaper reading is about as high in the suburbs as it is in the metropolitan areas, where it ranges from 89% to 93%.

Survey was conducted by the Audits and Surveys Company in consultation with the Advertising Research Foundation and financed by six major Canadian newsprint manufacturers comprising the Newsprint Information Committee of ANPA. There were 4,826 interviews with individuals 15 years of age and older, representing 2,449 households drawn from 622 sampling points.

When asked to describe how they would feel if they had to go along without television and without newspapers, 49% said "I would feel quite lost without it" when speaking of newspapers and 28% said the same of TV.

The newspaper emerged from the study as an important hometown institution with which the public comes into immediate contact in a variety of ways: 43% have visited the newspaper office or plant; 45% have placed classified ads; 23% have written or phoned the newspaper for information; 8% have written letters to the editor.

A NEWBORN'S HERITAGE—"The first child born in 1962 will owe \$1,603," says the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. "So will every other child born during the year. That figure is the per capita share of the public debt. Let's not make it bigger."

"The dollar, 100 cents purchasing power at the beginning of this century, has 28 cents today (the two bit dollar is almost at hand). If inflation continues at the rate since the Korean War, the dollar will rot to 16.2 cents at the end of this century."

"To be successful a farmer must have a well organized and executed plan of action. This plan must include such things as good seed, proper seed bed preparation, timeliness in planting and rate of seeding and the use of the proper kinds and amounts of plant nutrients. The place to start your plan is with a soil test."

There are several soil testing laboratories in the state to serve your needs. Why not check with your county agents as to how to make a soil test and how to send it to a laboratory for testing?

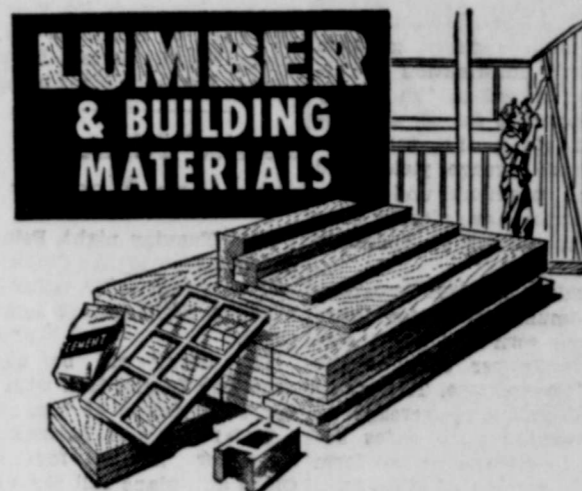

Feed Grain Growers Are Urged To Report Their Crop History

Growers of corn or grain sorghum who did not take part in the 1961 feed grain program but who would like to participate this year are asked to check with the ASCS County Office to be sure the necessary information for their farms is on record. The sign-up under the 1962 feed grain program now is under way, and will extend through March 30.

E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said that information on a farm's crop acreages for 1959 and 1960 is being used in establishing the farm's corn - grain sorghum base. This information is already on record in the county office for most farms, and notices listing the particular farm's base acreage, yields, and rates of payment under the 1962 program have already been mailed to owners or operators of these farms.

As under the 1961 program, the minimum acreage for diversion from corn and grain sorghum is 20 per cent of the farm's base acreage. The maximum diversion of acreage to soil-conserving uses varies according to the size of the farm base. The acreage diverted from these feed grain crops to an approved conservation use under

the program must be in addition to the farm's average acreage devoted to conservation for 1959 and 1960 and also to the acreage diverted under the 1962 wheat stabilization program.

Mr. Burkett stressed the fact that price support on the feed grain crops from a farm where corn or grain sorghum is grown will depend upon cooperation in the 1962 feed grain program.

The national average support prices for 1962 feed grains are: Corn, \$1.20 per bu. average for all grades; grain sorghum, \$1.93 per cwt. for grade No. 2 or better; oats, 62 cents per bu. for grade No. 3; barley, 93 cents per bu. for grade No. 2 or better.

Representative Terry Townsend Reports On The Special Session

Your Representative had the honor on the last Monday of the Special Session of being appointed as one of the five House conferees on the Loan Shark Bill. This is the most important piece of legislation considered by the Legislature during the Special Session, and one in which I was vitally interested.

The House conferees met and worked with the Senate conferees morning, noon, and night for the last four days of the session in an attempt to compromise the differences between the Houses and come up with a good Loan Shark Bill.

We reported back a bill on small loans that would have provided as tight a regulation over the industry as exercised by any state.

It was a bill that would put the loan sharks out of business and for this reason they worked day and night trying to defeat the measure. The House accepted the bill 85 to 57, but a

few hours later it was rejected by the Senate 16 to 14. Our Senator and I represented the sentiments of our districts and voted for the measure and against the loan sharks.

In the closing hours of the session, the House withstood many pressures and voted down 75 to 73 an appropriation bill which contained some good features, such as \$275,000 for tourist advertising, but too much "fat," such as \$750,000 for a parking garage for state employees in Austin and an untold thousands of dollars for pay raises for state employees, many of whom just received pay increases last year.

Earlier this session the Legislature sent Daniel three of the new acts he said were needed so much a special session was necessary.

They provided a new financing plan plus \$15,000,000 appropriation for farm-to-market road construction and maintenance; an escheat enforcement act applying to banks and savings and loan associations requiring them to advertise for owners of dormant and inactive

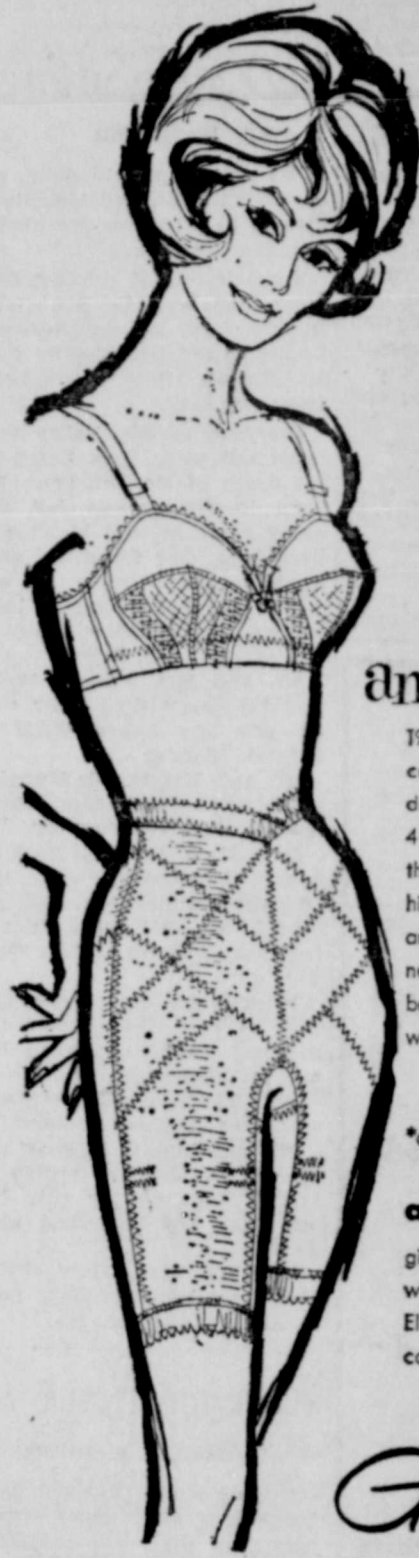
accounts and turn over to the state those under \$25 if owners are not located, and reorganization of the Board of Water Engineers into the Texas Water Commission.

On the whole this Special Session accomplished a great

amount especially considering the fact that the Government opened the call to so many subjects that it was difficult in the short 30 day session to pass anything.

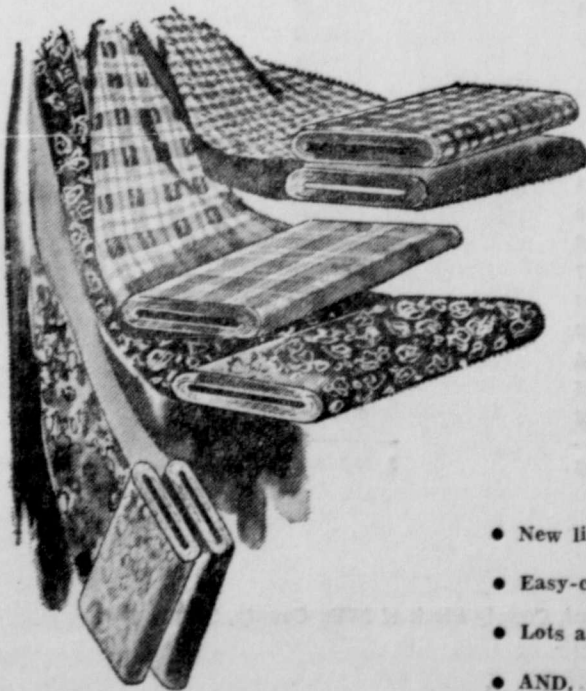
